To the Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, New York City:

Sir—Herewith I submit a general report of the work done by the Department of Bridges during the year 1905, with a statement of the condition of the principal work under construction at this time, and a few suggestions for the future.

A great deal of work has been done by the maintenance gangs under the several Engineers in charge of the different boroughs, and all the bridges under the jurisdiction and care of the Department have been kept in good condition and repair.

The financial statement forming part of the report will show the condition of the several appropriations and funds as of the date of December 1, 1905, setting forth the amounts appropriated and expended in each case to that date.

The list of changes in the employees of the Department will show all changes during the months of October and November, 1905. For the list of changes for the portion of the year from January 1 to September 30, 1905, I respectfully beg leave to refer you to the statements set forth in great detail in the several quarterly reports which I have had the honor to heretofore submit to you, and which said quarterly reports were published in the CITY RECORD on May 16, September 5 and November 18, 1905, respectively.

Many of the structures, and notably the Brooklyn Bridge and Harlem river bridges, have, as usual, required considerable expenditure for repairs and maintenance, and especially for painting. The iron and steel bridges must be kept well painted, and this is done as rapidly and completely as the appropriations will permit.

No. 1—Brooklyn Bridge.

In conformity with plans authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, contract for the new stairs, passageways and additional platforms in the Manhattan terminal was awarded about May 1, and these have been erected and the bridge railway switching tracks extended, to permit quicker train movement. These improvements have been partially opened to service, and permit the distribution of the passenger traffic over a wider area in approaching or leaving trains. The limit of train operation in the present station during the rush hours has been reached. Records of counts taken recently show about the same totals as to the number of passengers carried each week day as do those taken the previous year. A count made October 17, 1904, shows a total of 356,976 passengers carried in surface cars and on the bridge railway in twenty-four hours; a count taken July 6, 1905, during the holiday season when travel is usually heavier during the non-rush hours, shows a total of 370,478 passengers carried; and the latest count, made October 19, 1905, shows a total of 356,308 passengers carried—practically the same number per day as the previous year.

The following statement shows the intense and growing concentration of traffic during the morning and evening rush hours, of passengers carried in surface cars and trains between the hours of 7 and 9 in the morning, and between 5 and 7 in the evening, without material difference in the number of cars and trains in service on the bridge, and with no immediate prospect of providing further relief:

From the above statement it will be noted, that the total number of people carried from Brooklyn is greater by 19,036 than the number carried from Manhattan, but from a count made the same day, of passengers carried to and from the ferries in Brooklyn, it was found that many people returned to Brooklyn from Manhattan by way of the ferries.

No. 2—Williamsburg Bridge.

The Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company commenced operating its cars on November 3, 1904. The work on the conduit tracks, however, was not completed until February 9 of this year, at which time the New York City Railway Company's cars began running over the bridge. The Fourteenth street crosstown line began running on the date above mentioned, and the Eighth street line began running on February 15. These lines have run continuously during the year, and on the 28th day of November the Grand street line was run over the bridge, so that the New York City Railroad Company now runs three lines over the bridge, all terminating in loops on the Brooklyn plaza. It is expected that at least one more line will be run over the bridge within a few weeks, running through widened Delancey street and on Third avenue to the loop tracks in front of the Astor House.

The Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company's cars have been run continuously during the year, and the efficiency of the stub terminal has been somewhat increased, so that, beginning with only about 100 cars an hour dispatched from this terminal station as a maximum, the maximum number of cars now dispatched from this station approximates 150 cars an hour.

The result of count taken for the twenty-four hours ending October 19, 1905, is summarized in table, as follows:

It appears from a comparison of travel over this bridge and over the Brooklyn Bridge that while the Brooklyn Bridge has not gained materially in travel during the past year, and has lost therefore the slight amount that it had gained in previous year, 1903, the Williamsburg Bridge is to-day transferring about one-third the total number of passengers carried over the Brooklyn Bridge, and 70 per cent. of the number of passengers carried in trolley cars over the old bridge. Of course a great portion of the travel on this Williamsburg Bridge is taken from the ferries crossing the river at the foot of Grand street, but a large portion of this travel must be new business created from the existence of the bridge itself, and it is perfectly evident that if more lines of Brooklyn cars could run over the bridge the number of passengers transported would be greatly increased with definite relief to the Brooklyn Bridge.

I am now having plans made for an enlargement of the stub terminal at Clinton street, which will permit an increase of the number of cars run over the bridge of at least 50, and possibly 100 per cent. This enlargement of the terminal would facilitate progress on the terminal subway station, and could be ready for use by next spring. Its cost would be about \$50,000, and it would doubtless be in use for about a year, during which time it would enhance the usefulness of the bridge and help develop the travel, which can only be fully accommodated by the terminal subway station.

The plans for the terminal subway station were approved by the Art Commission at its meeting on December 13, and the contract and specifications for the work are about ready for advertisement.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the issue of the Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the extent of \$500,000 for this work on September 15, 1905. I requested the authorization of \$750,000, and the contracts for the subway terminal cannot be awarded until this money is in hand. It is intended to let this contract first, then a contract for the changes necessary in the bridge itself, and then a contract for the elevated railway connection in Brooklyn; all of these contracts, aggregating about two million dollars in cost, should be in process of execution before May 1 next.

I am having tentative plans made for a shelter on the easterly portion of the Brooklyn plaza for the shelter and comfort of passengers changing cars at that point, and hope to have these ready in a few weeks so that they may be submitted for criticism and suggestion.

The most important question on this bridge has always been the treatment of its Manhattan terminal as to the accommodation of railway cars and trains. Although the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners never, I believe, definitely rejected the plan for connecting this bridge with the Brooklyn Bridge by elevated railway, the popular sentiment against the construction of an elevated railway showed that such a line would at least be unpopular in the district through which it would pass, but this was not made evident until June of this year, when, on the recommendation of a committee, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved the plans for a subway terminal station under Delancey street, between Clinton and Norfolk streets, which should accommodate both the elevated and surface cars from Brooklyn under the surface of the street.

These cars will find housing here adequate for the present and until they can be run through subways in Delancey street to other points in Manhattan more distant from the bridge.

The bridge was lighted for more than a year by the New York and Brooklyn Edison Companies. The Street Cleaning Department built a refuse disposal plant under the bridge and this Department built a lighting plant adjacent to the disposal plant, and on October 30, 1905, the bridge was lit and has since been lit by this plant, obtaining its steam from the heat generated by the burning of refuse.

The old dock at the foot of Delancey street should be removed at the earliest possible date, and the river at this point should be dredged out so that small vessels may pass inside the steel towers as they can on the Brooklyn side and obtain access to the bulkhead. The land between Kent avenue and the bulkhead on the Brooklyn side should be utilized by the construction of a shop and power plant at Kent avenue and the grading and surfacing of the land adjacent thereto.

No. 3—Manhattan Bridge.

The contracts for the anchorages of the bridge were awarded on the Manhattan side to the Williams Engineering and Contracting Company, on February 9, 1905, and on the Brooklyn side to the Kosmos Engineering Company, on January 24, 1905. Delays occurred from inability to give the contractors complete access to the site, but since this obstruction has been removed good progress has been made on the work, especially on the Brooklyn side. The excavation has been practically completed on both sides of the river, and about 20,000 cubic yards of concrete have been placed in position and a good start has been made on the setting of the granite masonry on the Brooklyn side.

Bids were opened for the construction of the steel superstructure complete on August 10 last. There were five bidders for the work and the contract was awarded to the lowest bidder on August 16. An injunction was obtained in a taxpayer's suit brought by the secretary of the company making the next higher bid. On November 21 the Supreme Court Justice hearing the case pronounced the contract illegal and the specifications inequitable. This decision was appealed from and is now before the Appellate Division on review. It is hoped that the legal delays may not continue over long, and that the work of constructing the steel work of the bridge may proceed with vigor during the next year.

Preliminary plans for the terminals have been prepared for both sides of the river and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has been asked to secure the lands requisite for the approaches, the construction of which should be commenced next year. It is still possible to complete this bridge by January 1, 1909.

No. 4—Blackwell's Island Bridge.

The manufacture of the steel work for this bridge has been well advanced during the year and about 25,800 tons of steel have been delivered at the shops and about 12,000 tons have been delivered at the site. There was a serious delay in the delivery of certain large castings requisite for the work, so that the erection of the steel work could not be rapidly advanced until September last. About 6,000 tons of steel have been erected on the island span, and the contractors are now in advance of a schedule prepared last summer predicated on the completion of the bridge during 1907.

Condemnation proceedings have been authorized for land required for the approaches and it is hoped to contract for these early next year. Only this fall has it been known that a subway route would be laid out over this bridge; in time, however, to provide for strengthening the bridge to carry subway trains.

Plans are being prepared for the Manhattan terminal of this bridge and these will be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment within a few weeks.

Harlem River Bridges.

The Southern Boulevard approach of the Willis Avenue Bridge was opened to the public on November 15, 1905; the stairways were not quite complete at that time, but are now about ready for use.

Plans have been completed for the temporary bridge to be used during the reconstruction of the Madison Avenue Bridge. Lease for the property required for the temporary bridge are ready for execution, and the contract for the work will be let within a few weeks.

The One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge was completed and opened to the public on August 24, 1905, and the bridge will aid materially in the development of the Borough of The Bronx, and in facilitating travel during the reconstruction of the Madison Avenue Bridge.

The contract for the balance of the masonry and the grading for the University Heights Bridge was awarded on April 27, 1905, for the estimated sum of \$595,897.80, and the contractors have made a good start on their work.

The fixed spans of the Ship Canal Bridge have been replaced with the new spans designed to accommodate the Rapid Transit Commission's route and the street railway cars over the bridge and the passage of the new line of tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad under the northerly span. The contractors have been much delayed in securing suitable material for the draw-span, but it is expected that the entire new bridge will be ready for use and the old spans placed at University Heights Bridge during next year.

General preliminary plans for the Henry Hudson Bridge over the Harlem river at Spuyten Duyvil Heights have been prepared and submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, who have authorized the issue of Corporate Stock to the extent of \$1,000,000 for starting construction on the bridge. This bridge will cost about \$3,000,000, and unless some serious delay occurs the bridge should be ready for use in September, 1909. The approaches of the bridge are of masonry piers and arches and are connected by a single steel span, which will not be less than 800 feet, and may prove to be the longest steel arch in the world.

A permit was issued on May 12, 1905, to the New York Interborough Railway Company to lay its trolley tracks and set ornamental poles on the Washington Bridge. The tracks have been laid and the design for the trolley poles has been approved by the Art Commission.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The foundations and piers for the Pelham Bridge over Eastchester Bay have been nearly completed. There is still some doubt whether the work can be fully completed this season, but a delay of this kind cannot materially delay the commencement of work on the superstructure next spring.

The Westchester Avenue Bridge over the Bronx river on the line of Westchester avenue was opened to the public on April 20, 1905.

Plans are nearly ready for the reconstruction of the Unionport Bridge, but the plans for the reconstruction of the Eastchester Bridge over Hutchinson river are not so far advanced.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The Vernon Avenue Bridge over Newtown creek, which was commenced early in 1902, was opened to the public on October 18, 1905, and has proved, as was contemplated, a great boon to the people of the vicinity.

The bridge over Flushing creek, from Jackson avenue, Newtown, to Broadway, Flushing, has made fair progress. A large amount of time was lost in getting possession of the property on the Newtown side. The masonry of the abutments and for the approaches is practically completed, the steel work is nearly all delivered and it is expected that the bridge will be completed before the 1st of June, 1906.

The relatively new bridge over Newtown creek at Grand street is very badly located with reference to the line of travel in the creek, and one or two accidents have occurred from collision of vessels passing the bridge. Grand street is a busy highway, destined to become much more so, and the people using this bridge have complained of its interference with the travel on the street. Grand street also crosses the Metropolitan Avenue Bridge only a short distance further west. The necessity for water front on the short spur of the creek south of Grand street, at the Grand Street Bridge, is not very great, and a great improvement in the traffic on the creek would be effected if the Grand Street Bridge should be removed and the short spur of the creek south of the Grand Street Bridge was closed and filled in. This would probably necessitate the acquisition of about 1,537,000 square feet of property, assessed at \$182,700, but the navigation of the creek would be materially improved by the change.

A new bridge will some day be required at Maspeth avenue and the Grand Street Bridge could be used at this point.

The Metropolitan Avenue Bridge, which is narrow and carries two broad avenues over it, must soon be rebuilt to meet the increasing demands of travel.

Plans and specifications have been prepared for the reconstruction of the Borden Avenue Bridge over Dutch Kills, and the contract for this work should be let early next year.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN AND RICHMOND.

The Bascule bridges over Gowanus canal were opened to the public on the following-named dates:

Union street, March 4, 1905.

Third street, April 1, 1905.

Ninth street, July 13, 1905.

Hamilton avenue, March 4, 1905.

The construction of these bridges frees the canal of all centre piers and provides an unobstructed waterway, of not less than 45 feet, for the whole length of the canal, and has made the canal cleaner and more easy to navigate.

The planking on the bridge and trestle approach at Fresh Kills, Borough of Richmond, has been extensively repaired during the year. The Lemon Creek Bridge has also been repaired. Surveys have been made looking to the reconstruction of this bridge at an early date.

The underground system consists of 130.18 miles of cable in subways, or 1,043.17 miles of conductor. During the quarter 3,895 feet of cable were laid, of which 3,505 feet were for alterations and repairs, and 390 feet for extending the system. 52,940 feet of wire were put up, of which the entire amount was for alterations and repairs. 55,840 feet of wire were taken down. Six poles were set, three poles reset and one pole taken down. 2,900 feet of flexible cable were strung for extensions and 182 feet for alterations and repairs. 438 feet of pipe were laid, of which 417 feet were for alterations and repairs, and 21 feet for extending the system.

NOTABLE FIRES.

July 1, 1905, 2.58 a. m., Station 648.

No. 299 Devoe street.

Fire originated on first floor in hallway of three-story frame building, 25 by 60 feet, located at No. 299 Devoe street. Fire extended to second and third floors and roof by way of stairway; building and contents considerably damaged.

Henry Hammil, age 30 years, of No. 299 Devoe street; Annie Docklin, age 20 years, of No. 299 Devoe street, and Arthur Graff, age 15 years, of No. 180 Locust street, Flatbush, were suffocated or burned to death before the arrival of the Department. Lena Hammil of No. 299 Devoe street jumped from second floor window before arrival of Department and sustained internal injuries.

Chief officers present were Thomas Lally, Deputy Chief of Department in Charge, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; Wm. McCarthy, Acting Deputy Chief of Seventh Division; Chiefs of Battalion Graham and Matschke, and Acting Chief of Battalion McKeon.

The services of three engine and two hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about twenty minutes.

Estimated loss, \$2,000.

At 3.09 a. m., the second alarm was sent out.

August 24, 1905, 11.28 p. m., Station 912.

Foot of Forty-fourth street and New York Bay.

Fire originated in one-story brick buildings, 75 by 100 feet each, occupied by Bush Company, Limited, as storehouses Nos. 27, 29 and 30, for storage of bales of cotton; building and contents considerably damaged. Also extended to one-story brick building, size 75 by 100 feet, occupied by same company, as storehouse No. 28, for storage of cotton; building and contents considerably damaged.

Chief officers present were John Binns, Acting Chief of Department; James F. Murray, Deputy Chief of Department, Acting in Charge, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; John O'Hara, Acting Deputy Chief of Eighth Division; Chiefs of Battalion Root, Cummings, Dooley, Kellock, and Acting Chief of Battalion Braisted.

The services of twelve engine and three hook and ladder companies and two fire boats were required, and the fire was under control in about three hours.

Estimated damage, \$10,000.

At 11.34, 11.46 and 11.53 p. m., respectively, the second, third and fourth alarms were sent out for station 910.

September 16, 1905, 12.21 a. m., Station 2-365.

Fort Hamilton, foot of Ninety-seventh street and New York Bay.

Fire originated in one-story frame building, 25 by 125 feet, occupied as gymnasium; building and contents totally destroyed. Extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 125 feet, occupied as hospital; damage to building and contents, slight. Also extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 125 feet, occupied as reading room; building and contents totally destroyed. Also extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 125 feet, occupied as barracks No. 1; building and contents totally destroyed. Also extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 125 feet, occupied as barracks No. 2; building and contents totally destroyed. Also extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 125 feet, occupied as band quarters; damage to building and contents, trifling. Also extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 50 feet, occupied as school house; building and contents totally destroyed. Also extended to one-story frame building, 25 by 50 feet, occupied as cook house; building and contents totally destroyed. The fire spread rapidly to all the buildings, owing to their close proximity and frame construction, and was under full headway when the Department arrived.

Chief Officers present were Thomas Lally, Deputy Chief of Department in Charge, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; James F. Murray, Deputy Chief of Eighth Division; Chiefs of Battalion Travers and Root.

The services of five engine and three hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about one hour and a half.

Estimated damage, \$10,000.

At 12.38 a. m., second alarm was sent out.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Municipal Civil Service Commission,
No. 61 Elm Street,
New York City, January 12, 1906.

A meeting of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Friday, January 12, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

All the Commissioners were present.

The minutes of the meeting held January 10 were approved.

The Committee on Transfers recommended that the following transfers be allowed:

George Foulk, from the position of Law Clerk in the Department of Health, to that of Clerk.

Edward Fitzgerald, Stationary Engineman, from the Department of Correction to the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

Mary Devlin, Attendant in the Department of Parks, to the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

John J. McGailey, from the position of Clerk in the Tenement House Department, to a similar position in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Brooklyn.

William E. Mollitor, from the position of Attendant in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, to the position of Janitor in that office.

James T. Malone, from the position of Assistant Clerk in the Coroner's office, Borough of Manhattan (\$1,500), to the position of Clerk (fifth grade) in the Department of Health.

And that the following request be denied:

The recommendations of the Committee on Transfers were adopted.

Resolved, That Rule XVII. of the Civil Service rules, as adopted December 4, 1903, be and the same is hereby amended by substituting for paragraphs 3 and 4 the following:

3. "The subjects of rating in such examination and the relative weights thereof shall be as follows: Physical development and strength, 50; and mental tests, 50. The mental tests shall embrace an elementary knowledge of government, information as to city streets and localities, writing from memory the substance of communicated orders and such other elementary subjects as may be prescribed.

4. "A candidate to be eligible for appointment must obtain an average of not less than 70 per cent. on the physical development and strength. Candidates for the Fire Department who obtain an average of over 80 per cent. on the physical development and strength and a final average of 75 per cent. shall also be eligible for appointment."

On motion it was

Resolved, That the salary of Sampson D. Oppenheim, Examiner in the office of the Civil Service Commission, be and the same is hereby fixed at the rate of \$2,100 per annum, taking effect January 1, 1906.

On motion it was

Resolved, That the salary of Francis J. Barry, Clerk in the office of the Civil Service Commission, be and the same is hereby fixed at the rate of \$900 per annum, to take effect from this date.

The Secretary recommended that Civil Service rule VII., Clause 1, be amended by adding thereto, after the words "shall be" in the third line, the words "announced to the various departments," and by striking therefrom, in the same line, the words "published at the beginning of each year," so that the same shall read:

"So far as practicable examinations for admission to positions in a graded service shall be held periodically, and the dates thereof shall be announced to the various departments with such information with reference to the conditions of each as can be given."

The Secretary was instructed to arrange a public hearing on the proposed amendment, to be held on Wednesday morning, January 24, at 10 o'clock.

The Secretary requested the Commission to fix a minimum age for candidates for the position of Probation Officer and Special Parole Officer, and requested instructions as to whether said examination should be open to both men and women. After careful consideration of the matter the Secretary was instructed to accept applications from no persons under twenty-five years of age, and it was decided to open the examination to both men and women.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated December 29, stating that the examination for Apothecary, held on November 21, had been completed.

On motion it was

Resolved, That the eligible list for the position of Apothecary be and the same is hereby established by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, and the Secretary is hereby instructed to certify from same in answer to all requisitions for eligibles for appointment to that position.

A report was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 5, with reference to the appeal of Ruliff S. Van Cleaf, Jr., for a rerating of his technical paper and that the arithmetic paper submitted by him be rated. The Chief Examiner stated that it was impossible to make a specific report regarding the case for the reason that the candidate failed to state for what position he applied, but that his arithmetic paper had not been rated owing to the fact that he had failed on the technical paper. The appeal was denied.

The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 6, submitting a report made by Monitor Barry with reference to the case of candidate No. 79 in the examination of Volunteer Fireman for admission to the paid Department. It appeared that the candidate's papers were canceled by the Chief Examiner for the reason that it was discovered that he had brought a copy of questions and answers on Richmond Borough localities into the examination room with him; that the candidate had subsequently appealed to the Commission to rate his papers, denying the charge. After an investigation of the case, the Commission sustained the action of the Chief Examiner.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 8, with reference to the appeal of Morris Cybener, for a rerating of the papers submitted by him in the examination for Apothecary. It appearing from a report of the Chief Ex-

aminer that the candidate pointed out no manifest error of marking, and that the appeal therefore did not come within the provisions of Civil Service Rule IX., the same was denied.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 8, forwarding reports of Examiners Oppenheim and Clark in reference to the case of James Murray, candidate for promotion to Sergeant of Police, in which it was recommended that the candidate's final rating be changed to 80.04 per cent., and that his name be placed upon the eligible list. It appeared that an error was made by the Police Department in transmitting the candidate's record to the Commission prior to the holding of the examination; that upon examining his papers the candidate discovered the same, and thereupon applied to the Police Department for a correction of the error; that the Commission had rerated the candidate's record, which gave him a percentage of 79.72, thus bringing his case within the operation of the "automatic appeal rule," and that after the papers had been referred back to the Examiners and re-examined by them in the usual way, they had stated that, in their opinion, he was entitled to a mark of 80.04 per cent. The revised marks of the Examiners were adopted, and the Secretary was instructed to place the candidate's name upon the eligible list in accordance therewith.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 9, stating that the examination ordered on November 2, 1905, for promotion from the grade of Assistant Engineer to Principal Assistant Engineer in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, had been delayed because of the fact that one of the eligibles who had been deputized by the head of his Department to send in the candidate's record, had refused to send in his own. The Chief Examiner was instructed to proceed with the examination without further regard to the said candidate.

A communication was presented from the Record Clerk, dated January 11, submitting a list of the applications on file in the office of the Commission which had been received between the year 1898, and February 4, 1902, since which time, by resolution of the Commission, no applications had been received for any examination not advertised. It appeared that many of the applications were for positions not appearing in the present classification, and the Record Clerk recommended that they be canceled, and that public notice be given of such cancellation by advertisement in the CITY RECORD. The recommendation of the Record Clerk was adopted, and the Secretary was instructed to proceed with the advertising.

A communication was presented from Clerk Barry, dated January 9, stating that the eligible list for promotion to Roundsman of Police had never been officially announced by the Civil Service Commission, and that the said list bore no exact date of establishment. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Chief Examiner and request him to inform the Commission of the exact date upon which he completed the rating of the papers and referred the candidates' percentages to the Secretary to be registered on the eligible list.

The Secretary presented a list of competitive positions appearing in the classification for which there were no eligible lists in existence and requested instructions as to the advisability of calling examinations for them. The matter was laid over.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the case of George S. Wilkin, who had been appointed temporarily as a topographical draughtsman in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, without the usual certification by the Commission, and whose payroll, therefore, the Commission had declined to certify. The Secretary stated that the candidate had since passed a non-competitive examination and had been certified and appointed in the manner prescribed by Rule XII., paragraph 3, for employment until such time as a permanent selection could be made from the new list. In view of that fact the Secretary was instructed to certify Mr. Wilkin's payroll for the services rendered by him prior to the time of his passing the non-competitive examination.

A communication was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated January 9, requesting the Commission to consent to the transfer of Francis J. Barry, second grade Clerk in the office of the Commission, to a similar position in that department. The request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to issue a certificate of transfer.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated January 9, requesting approval of a leave of absence, without pay, for six months from that date, granted Mr. George F. Hammond, Assistant Engineer. It appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that the leave of absence was granted on account of illness, the same was approved.

A communication was presented from the Commissioners of Accounts, dated January 10, requesting that the title of Richard F. Treacy be changed from Examiner of Accounts to Examiner, in view of the fact that the former title was not appropriate to the duties performed. The Secretary stated that the records of the office showed that Mr. Treacy's title had been "Examiner" since June 6, 1898; that on May 1, 1902, his position was transferred to the Competitive Class, and that his title had never been Examiner of Accounts. He was instructed to notify the Commissioners of Accounts of such fact.

A communication was presented from the Commissioners of Accounts, dated January 9, requesting that an examination be held to qualify all the Accountants and Clerks serving in the fifth and sixth grades in that department for promotion to the seventh grade. The request was granted, and the Chief Examiner was instructed to proceed with the examination.

A communication was presented from the Chief Clerk of the Police Department, dated January 8, requesting that in future the records of candidates for promotion in that department which might be transmitted to the Civil Service Commission prior to the holding of such examinations, be returned to the Police Department in order to have placed thereon such entries as would bring them down to the date of the examinations. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Police Department and state that the Commission could not see its way clear to adopt such a course as it would undoubtedly result in confusion; that at the time examinations for promotion in that department were scheduled, in all cases where the same might be necessary, supplementary records could be forwarded to the Commission.

A communication was presented from the Private Secretary to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn transmitting a letter addressed to President Coler by his Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices, in which he requested to be informed whether he could properly designate some persons in the employ of his bureau to act temporarily as Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent of Baths and Public Comfort Stations, pending the decision of the Court of Appeals as to the legality of the transfer of Messrs. Worstell and McNamara to those positions, and stating that "in view of a recent decision of the Supreme Court" it seemed advisable to make such designations. The President was requested to communicate with President Coler and state that the Commission was not aware of any recent decision of the Supreme Court that altered the existing situation regarding the transfer of the aforesaid persons; that it believed the best interests of the City would be subserved by making no change until after the Court of Appeals had rendered its decision.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Fire Department, dated January 3, transmitting a copy of a writ of mandamus issued by Mr. Justice Wilmot M. Smith of the Supreme Court on January 11, 1905, ordering the restoration to duty in the Fire Department, as Assistant Foreman, with salary at the rate of \$1,800 per annum, of Mr. James Flannery, together with an opinion of the Corporation Counsel to the effect that the commands of the writ should be obeyed. The Secretary was instructed to certify Mr. Flannery's payrolls when presented.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Fire Department, dated January 6, stating that Alfred J. Stuart had been dismissed from the position of Fireman in that department on April 28, 1905, as a result of charges which had been preferred against him, and requesting that his name be stricken from the list for promotion to Assistant Foreman. The Secretary was instructed to notify Mr. Stuart that he would be given an opportunity to show cause why his name should not be removed from the list for Assistant Foreman, under the provisions of Civil Service Rule VII., paragraph 14, on Wednesday morning, January 24, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

A communication was presented from the Chief Clerk of the Police Department, dated January 8, 1906, transmitting the application of Sergeant Frank Jedlicka, of the Seventy-seventh Precinct, to have two commendations awarded him while he was in the grade of Roundsman, and for which he received no credit in the examination for Sergeant, computed as a part of his record in the examination for promotion to Captain. The application was denied.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated January 3, transmitting a report of the Board of Examiners for positions in the Non-Competitive Class in that department, dated December 30. The same was approved upon the recommendation of the Chief Examiner.

The report of the Board of Examiners for positions in the Non-Competitive Class, Department of Correction, dated December 30, was approved on the recommendation of the Chief Examiner.

A communication was presented from the Deputy and Acting Commissioner, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated December 14, requesting the Commission to approve the reassignment to duty of Neil Gillespie, Engineman, who was granted a leave of absence for three months prior to December 1. It appearing from the certificate furnished that the said leave of absence was granted on account of illness, the reassignment to duty was approved.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated January 8, requesting approval of the reassignment to duty of Michael McCormick, Engineman, who had been absent on account of illness from November 29, 1905. It appearing from the certificate furnished that Mr. McCormick had recovered and was able to report for duty, the reassignment was approved.

A communication was presented, signed by the Chairman of the Committee on Administration and the Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, dated December 30, requesting the Commission to consider the advisability of classifying the position of Foreman, of whatever designation, in the Competitive Class, and setting forth at length the reasons for believing such a change to be practicable. The matter was laid over.

Communications were presented from Messrs. Pinney, Thayer and Van Slyke, dated January 9, stating that on January 1, 1906, the Coroner of the Borough of Richmond removed Messrs. Charles Hoeft and Thomas R. McGinley from the positions of Clerk to the Coroner and Chief Clerk in the office of the Coroner, respectively, and protesting against such removal on the ground that no charges of any kind were preferred or tried, and requesting, in view of the fact that suit has been begun to reinstate said persons in the positions from which they were dismissed, on the ground that they are veteran volunteer firemen, that the Civil Service Commission withhold its certificate from the payrolls of the persons appointed in their places, pending the determination of the mandamus proceedings. The request was denied.

A communication was presented from Henry E. Wilke, Esq., No. 180 Montague street, Brooklyn, attorney for Irving L. Bloch, transmitting an affidavit from Mr. Bloch's mother to the effect that he was born on the first day of August, 1885. The Secretary stated that the candidate had filed an application for Stenographer and Typewriter on June 12, 1903, in which he stated that he was born on August 1, 1884, and that he was nineteen years of age; that on November 8, 1905, he was appointed in the Dock Department, and in filling out his declaration sheet he gave August 1, 1885, as the year of his birth; that the discrepancy was noted, and the Commission requested him to produce either a birth or a baptismal certificate, which he had not done, but rather had had his attorney furnish the aforesaid affidavit of his mother. The Secretary stated further that if the date given by her was correct—August 1, 1885—the candidate was not eighteen years of age at the time of entering the examination, and consequently was ineligible for same. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Wilke and state that the affidavit furnished by him was not satisfactory to the Commission and could not be accepted.

A communication was presented from Herbert C. Hill, No. 25 Herkimer street, Brooklyn, dated January 9, requesting that his name be restored to the list of Transmitter and Computer, and stating that he declined appointment in Richmond on November 29, 1905, on account of illness. The Secretary was instructed to request him to furnish a doctor's certificate setting forth the facts in his case.

A communication was presented from John H. Johnson, No. 1109 Park avenue, dated December 29, stating that he was employed as a chief engineer by a large company in the city at a salary of \$5 a day, and that he therefore did not wish to accept the appointment offered him in the Department of Public Charities, and requesting that his name be retained upon the eligible list. The request was denied.

A communication was presented from Miss Alma J. Smoot, candidate for Tabulator, dated December 26, requesting that her address be changed from No. 523 West One Hundred and Fiftieth street, city, to No. 627 South Carolina avenue, Southeast, Washington, D. C., together with the request of the Certification Clerk for instructions as to whether the candidate's name could remain upon the eligible list. "City Hall, New York City, January 15, 1906.

"HON. WILLIAM F. BAKER, President, Municipal Civil Service Commission, No. 61 Elm Street, New York City, New York:

"Dear Sir—At the last meeting of the Art Commission Dr. Milo R. Maltbie, the Assistant Secretary, presented a request for leave of absence, without pay, for six months. After full consideration the Commission unanimously granted the request, upon the condition that arrangements satisfactory to the Art Commission be made for the performance of Mr. Maltbie's duties during his absence. On behalf of the Art Commission I request, therefore, that you authorize me to grant Mr. Maltbie a leave of absence, without pay, for a period not to exceed six months, as provided by Rule XIII., paragraph 2, of the Municipal Civil Service Rules of The City of New York.

"Mr. Maltbie intends to spend this leave of absence collecting data regarding European cities and investigating municipal conditions and civic improvements in foreign countries. The Art Commission considers that this work will increase the value of his services to the Commission and place at its disposal a considerable amount of information upon many specific points that would not otherwise be easily accessible, and at no expense to the Commission therefor.

"In order that the work of the Assistant Secretary may be efficiently performed during Mr. Maltbie's absence I request also that you authorize the Art Commission to select a person as Assistant Secretary during such leave of absence without competitive examination, as provided in Rule XII., paragraph 5. The Commission does not request that the position of Assistant Secretary be placed in the exempt class, but merely that authority be granted to fill this temporary vacancy. The reasons for this request are as follows:

"The work of the Assistant Secretary to the Art Commission demands peculiar and exceptional qualifications. The Art Commission has to pass upon practically all works of art and public structures of any importance erected in New York City, from a \$15,000,000 bridge to a park shelter costing \$5,000. During 1902 the amount of money involved in structures passed upon by the Art Commission was approximately \$6,800,000; in 1903 their cost was nearly \$33,600,000; in 1904 about \$29,800,000, and the number is steadily increasing. No member of the Art Commission receives a salary, and the administrative work of the Commission falls upon the Assistant Secretary. All the designs and papers relating to these structures must pass through his hands and be reported upon. It is especially important that this work be thoroughly well done by a competent person well posted upon the subjects coming before the Commission. Contracts covering large sums depend upon the approval of the Commission and the accuracy of its records. The position demands unusual administrative ability, a wide familiarity with civic matters, especially improvements of all sorts and with the experience of other cities in the United States and Europe.

"Originally, when the position of Assistant Secretary to the Art Commission was created, it was placed in the competitive list and a special examination held by your Commission. From the eligible list thereby determined the Art Commission selected Mr. Maltbie, and he has very satisfactorily performed the duties of the office to the present moment. The eligible list created at the time of the establishment of the office is no longer in force, we are informed by your office. The other lists from which it might be possible to make a temporary appointment have been examined and have been found unsuitable, owing to the peculiar and exceptional qualifications which the Assistant Secretary to the Art Commission must possess, as above outlined. It would, therefore, seem necessary, if the work is to be satisfactorily performed during Mr. Maltbie's absence, to authorize the Art Commission to make a limited appointment without a competitive examination.

"Hoping that these matters may receive your immediate attention, as Mr. Maltbie wishes to leave for Europe immediately, I am,

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

New York, January 18, 1906.

The following proceedings were this day directed by Police Commissioner Theodore A. Bingham:

I, Theodore A. Bingham, Police Commissioner of The City of New York, by virtue of authority vested in me by law, do hereby make and adopt the following rules and regulations for the conduct of vehicular traffic in the use of the public streets, squares and avenues of The City of New York.

Hereafter, from 8.30 o'clock a. m. to 6.30 o'clock p. m., on week days, in order to prevent congestion of vehicular traffic and to insure the safety of men, women and children traveling on foot over the territory in the vicinity of the Park row entrance to Brooklyn Bridge, Borough of Manhattan, the following traffic rules will be enforced by the Police Department:

No vehicles will be allowed to travel in a northerly or southerly direction on Park row, opposite the entrance to Brooklyn Bridge.

All vehicles traveling in a southerly direction on Park row, whose destination is beyond the Brooklyn Bridge, will, upon reaching Chambers street, proceed in a westerly direction on the north side thereof to the westerly side of Centre street, and thence in a southerly direction along the westerly side of Centre street and Park row, between surface car tracks and curb.

All vehicles traveling south on Park row and bound for Brooklyn, via Brooklyn Bridge, will, after passing along Chambers and Centre streets, continue along the westerly side of Park row, between the westerly car tracks and curb, until they have passed beyond the main promenade of City Hall Park, when they will cross directly over to the easterly side of Park row, and thereafter continue between car tracks and curb to the southerly roadway leading to and over Brooklyn Bridge.

All vehicles going in a southerly direction on Park row, for the purpose of loading or unloading merchandise on that part of Park row between Chambers street and Tryon row, will be allowed to do so by proceeding along the westerly side of Park row to their destination, and thereafter crossing over to the easterly side of Park row, and thence in a northerly direction between the easterly car tracks and curb, in compliance with the Rules of the Road.

All vehicles going in a southerly direction on Park row, beyond Chambers street and bound for North William street, will be allowed to proceed thereto in compliance with the Rules of the Road.

All vehicles traveling in a northerly direction on Park row, whose destination is beyond the Brooklyn Bridge, will, upon reaching Spruce street, continue along the southerly side thereof to North William street, and thence along the easterly side of North William street to Park row.

All such vehicles traveling in a northerly direction on Park row, bound for Brooklyn, via Brooklyn Bridge, will proceed along the easterly side of Park row, between the

surface car tracks and curb, to the southerly roadway leading to and over Brooklyn Bridge.

All vehicles going in a northerly direction along Park row to load or unload goods or passengers on Frankfort street, will be allowed to do so, in compliance with the Rules of the Road.

All vehicles traveling over the northern roadway of Brooklyn Bridge to the Borough of Manhattan, will, upon reaching Park row, proceed thereafter in a northerly direction along the easterly side of Park row, between the surface car tracks and curb, except that between 8.30 o'clock a. m. and 4 o'clock p. m., all such vehicles leaving the northern roadway of Brooklyn Bridge may proceed therefrom directly through Tryon row to Centre street, and thence in a northerly or southerly direction, between the surface car tracks and curb, in compliance with the Rules of the Road.

These rules will not apply to United States Mail wagons, Police and fire apparatus, ambulances, Street Cleaning Department vehicles and other vehicles authorized by permits issued by the Police Commissioner.

Ordered, That R. Thomas Short, architect for the construction of a new station house, prison and stable for the Nineteenth Police Precinct, be and is hereby authorized to employ the services of Francis K. Ford, City Surveyor, in making such examination, by boring or otherwise, of the ground on the site for such buildings, as may be necessary to ascertain the nature of the earth, at an expense not to exceed the sum of \$300.

Fourth—That our first partial and separate report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof, for the hearing of motions to be held in the County Court House in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 12th day of March, 1906, at the opening of the Court on that day.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
