## DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

### REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING MARCH 7, 1914.

#### TO THE MEDICAL PROFESSION.

In order to secure the fullest possible degree of co-operation with the medical profession, the Commissioner of Health has decided to send the Weekly Bulletin of the Department of Health regularly to all physicians in The City of New York commencing with this number. The Commissioner trusts in this way to secure a better understanding of the attitude of the Department of Health with respect to public health matters, and especially all matters affecting the medical profession.

The editor will appreciate criticisms and comments and will also, so far as lies in his power, be glad to answer any inquiries concerning any items published.

#### THE PHYSICIAN OF THE FUTURE.

That our view of the proper scope of public health work has broadened enormously in recent years, with emphasis very properly being placed more and more on prevention, and that all this has been of great value to the public, is hardly open to question. In many quarters the conviction is gaining ground that the further development of preventive medicine will inevitably lead, sooner or later, to a system of state medicine, a development which many practicing physicians view with dismay. Their fears, Warbasse assures them, are groundless. In a recent article in the *Long Island Medical Journal*, he states the case for State medicine as follows:

"The socialization of medicine does not mean that there shall be no private practitioners. Undoubtedly, there will be, just as there will be private business enterprises in the field which do not involve the necessities of life, or which spring up because of individual preference or expression. But whatever springs up outside of the State, if desirable for all the people, will find itself shortly taken over by the public. A physician of some special talent, or anarchistic taste, may prefer to withhold himself from the state and stand alone. Patients should continue to have the privilege of delivering themselves into the hands of private enterprises, just as now, if they so desire." \* \* \*

"The socialization of the care of the public health is not going to check scientific competition. It is going to stimulate it. The greatest scientific advancements in medicine are not now coming from the field of commercial struggle for existence occupied by the medical practitioner. They are coming from the men, who, by public or private means, have been removed from its blighting influence. The financial reward has not been the object which has stimulated the great medical discoveries. Now, it is well recognized that the doctor who is engaged in the competitive struggle for a livelihood is the least apt to contribute to the progress of science. Surgery is the last exception, but it is rapidly becoming commercialized, and soon its best progress will depend upon the financially independent workers."

"The whole history of medicine, with its splendid list of martyrs, is a glorious refutation of the sophistry that competition for profit is important to human progress. The competitive system, which surrounds and harrasses medical advancement, hindered it from the beginning, and retards it still."

That the increasing development of state medicine is not lessening the amount of employment of physicians, but merely changing its character, and that the future of the medical profession was never so full of promise as now, is the opinion of a writer in the *Lancet Clinic* (Dec. 20, 1913), who says:

"Never before has the physician been so widely identified with the life of the people as at present. There has never been a time in history when the science and art of medicine needed more those who measure up to the newer standards that are being set, and there will be rich rewards for them in public esteem and a place in public life that no merely secular statesman may attain if they take up honorable careers in public service. These careers will be as health officers, hospital superintendents and school examiners and will find expression in the community management of endemic diseases, the management of municipal departments, such as those of charities and corrections, which are essentially medical activities, and in full-time clinical professorships such as have been established at Johns Hopkins, in which the incumbents can devote every energy to the clinical study of disease."

#### THE EUGENICAL BABY.

"The medical man of to-day who has made a study of the various facets of life, while not opposed to the eugenical movement in its middle phases, is not enthusiastic about the eugenical child, because he sees underlying fallacies and knows the things that are beyond human power."

#### EPIDEMIC GONORRHOEA IN HOSPITALS.

It has been shown by a number of observers that among the poorer classes of New York City, a certain proportion (commonly estimated at 10 per cent.) of female infants and young children are infected with gonorrhoea, in an active or latent form, or as germ carriers. The widespread prevalence of this disease constitutes one of the most difficult problems in hospital management. No institution or hospital for children, however efficiently managed, has escaped ward epidemics from time to time, the origin of which it has frequently been very difficult to trace. In consequence a majority of children's hospitals will not receive infected cases. For obvious reasons, the hospitals of the Department of Health cannot refuse any patient on such grounds.

In view of the seriousness of the problem, the Department of Health several years ago began a careful bacteriological and clinical investigation\* to determine as far as possible the prevalence of the disease and to inaugurate measures to prevent its spread throughout the wards. As a result of this work, the following routine is now followed in the hospitals of the Department of Health:

Material for bacteriologic examinations is taken from every female patient on admission to the hospital and sent to the Research Laboratory of the Department of Health, from which a written report is made to the resident physician on the following

day. Patients without clinical evidence of the disease are immediately sent to "clean" wards, others to "observation" wards to await the result of the laboratory examination. If the latter shows the undoubted presence of the disease, the patients are immediately transferred to special wards for infected cases, to remain during their entire stay in the hospital. Observation cases are frequently found to have the disease in the latent form, and for this reason they also are kept throughout their stay in wards separate from the undoubted cases and also from the uninfected cases. Those patients in which a latent form of the disease lights up are immediately transferred to the infected wards, as are also those who develop the disease in the hospital.

As an example of typical conditions, the Scarlet Fever Service at Willard Parker Hospital for 1913, will be found instructive:

Patients admitted	1,589
Female patients admitted	791
Cases positive for gonorrhoea on admission	9
Observation cases	321
Observation cases becoming positive	21
Negative cases, becoming positive	6

In other words, 330 out of 791 female patients on admission had sufficient evidence of vaginal infection to demand their segregation, and of these, 21 subsequently developed clinical and bacteriological evidence of the disease and were transferred to the infected wards. It is not to be understood that all of these 321 cases had gonorrhoeal infection even in the latent form, but experience goes to show that a large number undoubtedly did. Without prolonged and repeated examinations, causing an unjustifiable annoyance to the patients, this point cannot be accurately determined.

It must be remembered that every year, at certain seasons, the contagious disease hospitals are overcrowded largely through the failure of the City to provide each borough with its own contagious disease hospital. Until such overcrowding is eliminated, and an ideal method of isolating individual patients is provided, a few cases of gonorrhoeal infection may reasonably be expected to develop in the wards.

No experimental work has been carried on either in syphilis or gonorrhoea in the hospitals of the Department of Health, and no cases of syphilitic infection are known to have developed in any department hospital.

#### WORK OF THE INFANTS' MILK STATIONS, FOURTH QUARTER, 1913.

The Bureau of Child Hygiene maintains throughout the City fifty-six Infants' Milk Stations. To each of them is assigned a medical inspector, a nurse, and a nurse's assistant. Mothers with babies go to these centres to obtain milk and to receive instruction in the care of their babies, including the proper preparation of food. When the baby must be artificially fed, the medical inspector gives the mother the proper formula for preparing the baby's food, and the nurse sees that the instructions are carried out.

Each afternoon the nurse visits homes and teaches mothers the care and preparation of food, and other matters pertaining to infant welfare and hygiene. The medical inspector visits sick babies, keeping them under supervision until the cases are properly terminated. The following table summarizes the work for the last quarter, 1913:

#### MEASLES, FOURTH QUARTER, YEAR 1913.

In the following table figures are given relating to the occurrence of measles during the last quarter of 1913. Comparing the figures with those for 1912, there is a reduction of 628 cases. Unfortunately, this reduction is without much significance for we know that measles, like many other infectious diseases, tends to recur in period of greater and less prevalence. It will be interesting to see what effect will be produced by the increased hospitalization of this disease, due to the opening of the new measles pavilion at the Willard Parker Hospital, foot of East 16th street.

There were 1,957 deaths and a death rate of 18.28 per 1,000 of the population reported during the past week, as against 1,723 deaths and a death rate of 16.73 for the corresponding week in 1913, an increase in the absolute number of deaths of 234 and in the rate of 1.55 points per 1,000 of the population, equivalent to a relative increase of 165 deaths.

Measles and diphtheria showed a considerably increased mortality, but the most important factor in the increased mortality for the week was the increased number of deaths reported from influenza itself and the greatly increased mortality from chronic organic diseases, the termination of which was hastened by the presence of the influenza epidemic. Its effect was most marked in the increased mortality from chronic organic diseases of the heart, pulmonary tuberculosis, digestive diseases and diseases of the nervous system.

Viewed from the point of age-grouping, there was a comparatively slight increase in deaths of infants under one year and children between one and five years. The great increase in the mortality was due to the large number of adults and old people who succumbed to the chronic diseases from which they were suffering.

The death rate for the first ten weeks of this year was 15.39 per 1,000 of the population as against 15.59 for the corresponding period in 1913, a decrease of .20 of a point.

The minutes of the meeting of January 20th were held as read and approved.

Bills, amounting to \$87,901.22, were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

A request has been received from Dr. Gregory, Resident Alienist, for the appointment of Dr. Harold Edward Connelly as interne on the staff of the psychopathic and alcoholic service for a period of six months. Dr. Connelly is a graduate of the Queens University, 1913, and served on the staff of the Lying-In Hospital. Dr. J. S. Chabot and Dr. Spiller are given as references.

The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has been communicated with almost daily in regard to the specifications for the fixtures for the Nurses' residence at Harlem and pavilions L and M at Bellevue. These are promised within the next few days. The delay has been occasioned by the necessity of doing certain work for the court house in The Bronx and the new Municipal Building.

For the information of the Board, it is reported that the entire laundry work of the Nurses' residence has been taken over to the general laundry of Bellevue Hospital. When this change was effected the entire laundry staff of the Nurses' residence declined to accept such transfer and the work is temporarily embarrassed by the thirteen vacancies thus occasioned.

In closing the accounts for 1913, it is found that there is a deficit of \$987 in the fund for the payment of special Nurses, and as there is no available account from which a transfer could be made, it will be necessary to request the Board of Aldermen to issue special revenue bonds for this amount. This excess was occasioned by the employment of special Nurses for a number of typhoid and other special cases at Harlem and Fordham Hospitals.

In 1913, the Board authorized the purchase of mattresses for all the hospitals as soon as funds should become available. Taking into consideration the occupancy of pavilions L and M and the vacating of certain surgical wards in the old building, it is found that 531 additional mattresses are needed at Bellevue, 171 at Gouverneur, 145 at Harlem, and 175 at Fordham, the total cost of which will be \$11,462.40. Authority to issue this order at once is requested.

In the maternity service of Bellevue Hospital, it has been customary for the waiting patients to perform a certain amount of the ward work. Dr. Flint has now directed that these women be relieved of some of this work, particularly the scrubbing. It will therefore be necessary to increase the working force by one additional Hospital Helper at a salary of \$180. The authority of the Board is requested.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The appointment of Dr. H. E. Connelly as interne on the psychopathic and alcoholic service was deferred until his credentials have been reviewed by the President; it was

Resolved, To request the Board of Aldermen to issue revenue bonds in the amount of \$987 to meet the deficit in the appropriation for the payment of special Nurses.

The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to issue an order for mattresses, as set forth in his report.

The employment of an additional Hospital Helper for the maternity service was approved.

**Reports of Committees.**

The Committee on Supplies reported that bids had been opened that day for food, medical and surgical, laundry and refrigerating supplies for the year 1914 (specifications 17, 18, 19 and 20). The Committee stated that the lowest bids appeared to be fair and reasonable and recommended their acceptance, with the exception of line 651 for smoked beef, which was higher than the price paid in 1913. The Committee recommended that the bids received on this line be rejected and the article not purchased during the first three months of 1914.

Resolved, To reject all bids received on line 651, and to accept the lowest bid received on all other lines.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that he had gone over the plans and specifications for the painting of pavilions L and M, transmitted by McKim, Mead & White, with their letter of January 8th. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was

Resolved, To accept these plans, and to transmit them to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

The Chairman of the Building Committee reported that they had inquired into the offer made by the John H. Parker Company in their letter of January 16th to allow a credit of \$40 for omitting all radiators in the pantries of pavilions I and K, and had found it to be fair. In accordance with the recommendation of the Building Committee and the architects, this estimate was approved.

The Gouverneur Hospital Conference Committee reported that they had considered the nomination of Dr. Alfred C. Henderson to the tuberculosis clinic, and recommended his appointment with the

title of Associate Visiting Physician. The Committee reported that they had considered the credentials of the applicants for the place of Instructor in Anaesthesia, and recommended the appointment of Dr. Charles S. Hunt. The Committee also recommended that the following doctors be reappointed for the year 1914:

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the Conference Committee was approved and its recommendations adopted.

The Fordham Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Henry K. Cudmore as interne for a period of two years, beginning January 1st, 1914, and Dr. Jacob Diner as Assistant Pathologist. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and Dr. Cudmore and Dr. Diner appointed accordingly.

The Fordham Hospital Conference Committee reported that they had considered the request of the Medical Board for the transfer of Dr. J. M. Sheridan from the nose and throat clinic to the genito-urinary and skin clinic in the out-patient department, but found that this transfer could not be made as there was no vacancy. The Committee reported that it had considered the applications of Drs. Gillette and Sheridan for the place of Admitting Physician, but was not ready to present a nomination.

The Committee also reported on the request of the Medical Board for the appointment of Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physicians and Surgeons. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the Conference Committee was accepted, and the question of appointing Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physicians and Surgeons was referred to the President for conference with Dr. Taylor and Dr. Welch.

The Committee on Officers and Employees recommended the appointment of a Diener at \$40 a month for service in the laboratory of Fordham Hospital, and it was moved, seconded and carried to approve of this appointment.

Mr. O'Keefe, on behalf of the special committee, reported that he had conferred with the Commissioner of Street Cleaning and that the Commissioner had under consideration a plan to do away with a number of the dumps on the water-front and would consider the request for the removal of the dumping board from the foot of E. 30th st. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was continued with the committee.

Mr. Stern reported that he had observed that some of the Physicians in the out-patient department did not record the time of their departure, and it was moved, seconded and carried to direct the General Medical Superintendent to instruct the Physicians to report the time of their departure, as well as of their arrival at the dispensary.

**Communications.**

A letter was presented from McKim, Mead and White under date of February 2nd, transmitting an estimate of \$7,650 from the John H. Parker Company for changes and additions to the radiographic department in pavilions I and K. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Building Committee.

A letter dated January 21st was presented from McKim, Mead and White, requesting the approval of certain changes in pavilions I and K, involving the reduction of the air filter chamber to enlarge the storeroom and changes in the style of hood over the kitchen range. It was moved, seconded and carried to refer this to the Building Committee.

A communication dated January 26th was presented from the office of the Mayor, requesting information as to whether the Department could furnish an exhibit for the International Urban Exposition to be held in Lyons, France. The President reported that he had replied



under date of January 28th to the effect that the Department could furnish a creditable exhibit made up of pictures, charts, etc. The action of the President was approved and the matter referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

A communication dated January 20th was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting that publicity throughout the Department be given to a report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades and a resolution adopted on January 16th in regard to municipal pension systems. This communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

A communication dated January 26th was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copy of a resolution adopted January 23rd transferring unencumbered cash balances in corporate stock accounts to the account entitled "C. F. M.—24, Moneys Available for Permanent Improvements." This communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication dated January 20th was presented from the Department of Finance, stating that an investigation is being made to determine whether the City is paying the State Prison Department higher prices than those prevailing in the open market, and suggesting that for the present no orders be given to the Prison Department for any considerable quantity of goods. This letter was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

Five letters were presented from physicians connected with the out-patient department of Gouverneur Hospital, explaining absences or lateness. These were ordered placed on file.

#### Unfinished Business.

Dr. William P. Healy, Visiting Surgeon to Fordham Hospital, appeared before the Board to explain his views on the subject of nursing at that hospital, referred to in his letter contained in the minutes of the Fordham Medical Board of January 2nd. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to refer the subject to the Advisory Committee on Nursing.

#### New Business.

In accordance with the rules adopted on May 8th, 1906, the election of a president and secretary was declared in order. On separate motion, duly seconded and unanimously carried in each instance, Dr. John W. Brannan was re-elected President, and Mr. James K. Paulding re-elected Secretary.

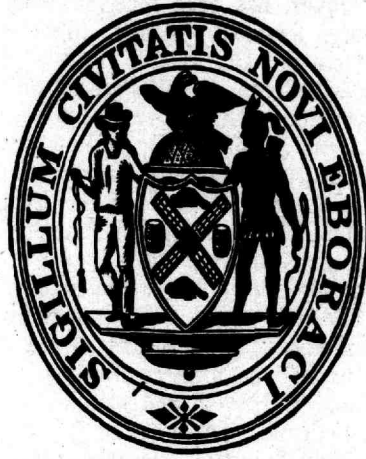

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on January 18, 1912, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as February 15, 1912, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least ten (2) days in the "New York Press" and "The Sun," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing; and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the Manhattan Fire Alarm Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Manhattan Fire Alarm Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Manhattan Fire Alarm Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

This Contract, made and executed in duplicate this day of March, 1914, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Manhattan Fire Alarm Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors under the streets and avenues within the Borough of Manhattan and the portion of the Borough of The Bronx lying west of the Bronx River, and to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors and the necessary conduits for the same under the streets and avenues within that portion of the Borough of The Bronx lying east of the Bronx River, the Borough of Brooklyn, the Borough of Queens and the Borough of Richmond for the purpose of electrically connecting detecting and signalling apparatus to be located upon the premises of subscribers with signal recording apparatus located or to be located at some suitable point or points where such signals are to be received and thereby maintaining and operating a fire protection signalling service system for the protection of the premises of subscribers and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor to and until December 31, 1928, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required

to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders, selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board, one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

1. The sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

3. The further sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) in cash, for use and occupation of the streets of the City since October 4, 1911, to be paid within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor.

3. During the first period of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

4. During the second period of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

5. During the remaining period of this original contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than eighty-five hundred dollars (\$8,500), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of eighty-five hundred dollars (\$8,500).

The annual charges shall commence from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the moneys due when this contract is signed by the Mayor shall be paid into the Treasury of the City within thirty (30) days immediately following such date, and provided further that the first annual payment thereafter shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the expiration of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires and equipment of the Company constructed, pursuant to this contract, within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.



If, however, at the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall so order, by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its electric system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances or departmental rules and regulations now in force or which may be adopted affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City.

No construction or repair of said electric system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permit so issued such officials may impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and the proper restoration of the surface of such streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Upon the completion of any work of construction the Company shall furnish to the President of the Borough a plan of such character as he may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structures erected, installed or constructed under this contract and the location and dimensions of all substructures encountered during the progress of the work. The depth below the street surface of the new structure and of the substructures encountered must be shown; also their location with reference to the nearest curb line and the nearest curb-line intersection.

The electrical and other equipment to be installed by the Company, whether the same be under streets and avenues, in any Department of the City or in private property, shall be constructed and maintained subject to the approval and under the supervision and control of the Fire Commissioner.

Seventh—The plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and all appurtenances thereto shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest approved manner and with the most modern and improved appliances, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to its plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and appurtenances from time to time, as such additions or improvements are necessary in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

All equipment installed and used by the Company shall be under continual test and be systematically inspected in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Fire Department. The Company shall keep accurate records of these tests and inspections and furnish verified statements of the same to the Fire Commissioner upon ten (10) days' request therefor.

Eighth—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). In the Borough of Manhattan and that portion of the Borough of the Bronx west of the Bronx River such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City, should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. In the other territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by virtue of this contract it may construct sufficient subways for the accommodation of its cables and wires and no more. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors of the character or tension of those used by the Company or similar companies in any or all of the Boroughs, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be necessary and available for the operation of the alarm system hereby authorized. No cables or wires shall in the future be strung above the surface of the streets and avenues by the Company, and those at present in existence shall be removed and placed underground when and where required by the Board or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Ninth—The Company shall not in the future connect any of its auxiliary boxes or apparatus of any kind with the street boxes or City box circuits of the Fire Department, and the connections now in existence shall be discontinued within one year from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, provided, however, that before the expiration of the said year the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Fire Commissioner, discontinue such connections as he shall so order.

Tenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant. Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the underground conduits herein authorized to be placed in the streets shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to lay and maintain conduits shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move its conduits and their appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate be changed at any time during the term of this contract or any renewal thereof, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction any public improvement upon said streets or avenues the Company shall take care of and protect its conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is operating, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish protection service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Fourteenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the 1st day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which are in use by the Company on September 30 preceding, and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall

also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the Fire Commissioner on or before the 10th day of each month a map or plan of the locations in which wires have been placed by it during the preceding month.

Fifteenth—The rates to be charged by the Company shall not be in excess of the following, without the consent of the Board, and it is agreed that the same may be altered or changed by the Board, as hereinafter provided:

(a) For ordinary fire alarm service by means of manual boxes installed in buildings or premises of any description a yearly rental of fifty dollars (\$50) for the first box installed and an additional yearly rental of ten dollars (\$10) for each additional box installed in the same building or premises.

(b) For Combination Fire Drill and Fire Alarm Service, with boxes and gongs arranged to give employees or other occupants of buildings or premises designated signals, a yearly rental of fifty dollars (\$50) for the first box and gong installed and an additional yearly rental of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for each additional box and gong so installed in the same building or premises, provided, however, that these rates shall be effective only where the subscriber contracts for a minimum installation of five such boxes and gongs.

(c) For Combination Fire Alarm and Watchman Supervisory service a yearly rental of sixty dollars (\$60) for the first box installed and an additional yearly rental of eighteen dollars (\$18) for each additional box installed in the same building or premises.

(d) For any other service furnished or to be furnished by the Company the rates charged shall be reasonable and fair, and before being put into effect shall be submitted to the Board for its approval.

The Company shall file with the Board on February 1 of each year a verified schedule of the rates charged by it for each class of service which it furnishes, and certified forms of the contracts used by it with subscribers for its various classes of service.

The Company agrees, upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City Government, to furnish service to any and all buildings under the control of such Board, Department or Bureau at one-half the rates above authorized to be charged by it for whatever class or classes of service may be required.

Sixteenth—During the term of this contract or any renewal thereof the Board shall have the power to regulate and fix the maximum and minimum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Seventeenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Eighteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purpose than those explicitly set forth herein and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places. Except with the express consent of the Fire Commissioner no circuit installed or maintained by the Company over which alarms of fire are to be transmitted shall be used for the transmission of other than fire alarm signals.

Nineteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twentieth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory covered by this contract, or any part thereof.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—If for a period of twelve consecutive months the fire alarm system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of eighteen months out of any consecutive twenty-four months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity.

Twenty-third—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company within The City of New York, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors and officers elected at the last meeting of the corporation, held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company, as by last report.

14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.

15. Number and location of premises served by the Company.

16. Total receipts of the Company for each class of business.

17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.

18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-fifth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within ninety (90) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privileges hereby granted, in default of which payment of the annual charges the City shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund, after ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements, furnishing of service to applicants as herein provided, the installation or maintenance of its structures and equipment, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws, ordinances or departmental regulations now in force in such case and in any of these events, the Company, except as herein otherwise provided, shall pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized, in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in default, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding shall right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-sixth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board, by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the system constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-seventh—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such cases such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-eighth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the city, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the city. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-ninth—The words "streets and avenues" or "streets or avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement, included within the limits of the territory in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Thirtieth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues of the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by this contract.

Thirty-first—Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to grant any right or privilege to the Company to make or continue any installation of its apparatus in the Headquarters or Fire Alarm Telegraph Bureau of the Fire Department, or to connect or continue to connect in any way with the City's Fire Telegraph system, and no such installation or connection shall be made or continued without the separate and additional consents of the Board and of the Fire Commissioner. The Company agrees that any consent so granted shall be a mere temporary and revocable license to make such installations or such connections, which may be revoked by resolution of the Board, approved by the Mayor, at any time, and when so revoked the Company holds and will hold the City harmless from any loss or damage sustained or which may be sustained by the Company or any of its subscribers on account of such revocation.

The Company further agrees that if permitted to make such installations or connections it will comply with all rules and regulations now in force or which may hereafter be made by the Fire Commissioner, and will pay such reasonable sum or sums as may be fixed by the Board on the recommendation of the Fire Commissioner for the space in such places where it makes its installations or for the use of such portions of the City's telegraph systems as it may use in making such connections, or for such other facilities as may be afforded to it by the City, and will pay such reasonable sum or sums as may be imposed by the Fire Commissioner as a penalty for each and every false alarm transmitted by its apparatus.

Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money shall not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally, upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
