REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE STORAGE and sale of fireworks and other explosive compounds in the City of New York, established by the Board of Fire Commissioners, pursuant to section 456, chapter 410, Laws of 1880.

Permits for the sale at retail of fireworks, consisting of Chinese crackers, rockets, blue lights, candles, colored pots, lance-wheels and other works of brilliant colored fires, between the 10th day of June and the 10th day of July, in each year, will be issued under the following

regulations:

1st. Applications for permits must be made, in writing, to the Inspector of Combusibles prior to the 20th day of May, in each year. Such applications must give the name of the person or persons by whom the permit desired; the location of the premises at which the goods are to be kept and sold; the nature of the bus ness in which such person or persons are engaged at sad premises, and the quantity and description of fireworks intended to be kept and offered for sale.

ad. No permit will be issued for such sales to be made at any building or pemises where either of the following kinds of business is conducted or carried on: Where carried on the control of the control

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.
