

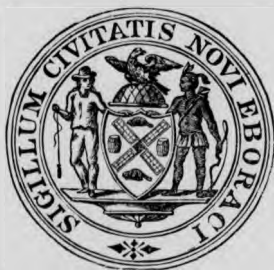

### SANITARY BUREAU.

#### Work of the Sanitary Inspectors.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases, for the quarter ending December 31, 1885 :

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 85,934.

The number of complaints made was 9,466.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 2,516, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 722 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port ; 84 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds ; 1,072 permits to scavengers to empty privies ; and 103 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending December 31, 1885, seven thousand four hundred and seventy three (7,473) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and eight (208) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; eight hundred and ten (810) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; nine hundred and five (905) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; one thousand four hundred and seventy-five (1,475) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and eight hundred and twenty-three (823) transcripts of the records of deaths, one hundred and two (102) of marriages, and ninety-eight (98) of births from said records were issued. There were six thousand seven hundred and fourteen (6,714) persons registered as married during the quarter, and seven thousand nine hundred and ninety-three (7,993) children were born during the same period.

The Department has no means to stop this enormous waste, which is caused by consumers keeping faucets open day and night to prevent freezing in the service-pipes, and can only make this most urgent appeal to them to stop it, and notify their neighbors unless it is stopped the pressures in the water-mains will be so much reduced that in a few days the water will not rise to the basements and cellars in thousands of buildings.

If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption, if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. Good conduct will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable jurors, and equalize the duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment.
