#### WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter ending September 30, 1900.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools:

The number of inspections and reinspections made was 467,783, classified as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens was 12,425, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instructions and authority of the Board, granted 1,443 permits to discharge cargoes, under proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, and 2,552 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

## OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY—NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the quarter ending September 30, 1900, the number of notices issued by the Board was 13,389. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repairs, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 355, Laws of 1873.

The subjects of the notices of the Board above referred to are as follows:

- Air shafts cleaned, disinfected, graded, paved, connected with sewer.
- Alleys cleaned, disinfected, graded, paved, connected with sewer.

- Chimneys repaired, extended, cleaned or obstructions removed.
- Cisterns disinfected, emptied, cleaned, covered or provided.
- Clothes-poles reset.
- Coops cleaned, disinfected or removed.
- Cows removed.
- Dogs removed.
- Drains cleaned, constructed, covered, repaired, removed, obstructions in removed, or connected with sewer.
- Excavations cleaned, repaired, relaid, graded, or connected with sewer.
- Fences repaired or constructed.
- Fire-escapes cleaned or obstructions removed.
- Fixtures trapped and waste-pipes therefrom connected on outlet side of water-closet traps.
- Flashings provided over woodwork or sinks.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out St. Francis place, from Degraw street to St. John's place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out the aforesaid place as follows:

Beginning at the southwest house corner of St. Francis place and St. John's place, distant 181.0 ± feet easterly from the southeast house corner of Franklin avenue and St. John's place; 1st. Thence southerly and parallel to the eastern house-line of Franklin avenue along the western house-line of St. Francis place to its intersection with the northern house-line of Degraw street;

2d. The eastern house-line of St. Francis place is 65 feet from and parallel to the previous course.

Adopted by the Council December 18, 1900, two-thirds of all the members elected voting in favor thereof, having been first advertised, as required by law.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen March 5, 1901, two-thirds of all the members elected voting in favor thereof, having been first advertised, as required by law.

#### LAYING OUT SLOCUM PLACE, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read, and the matter was referred to the President, Borough of Brooklyn:

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, in which he requests that the map showing the locating and laying out of Slocum place, from Coney Island avenue to East Fifteenth street, and showing change of grades in territory bounded by Beverly road, East Fifteenth street, Avenue C, and Coney Island avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, be referred back to the Topographical Engineer, I have to state as follows:

An examination of the map will show that the change of grades in Beverly road and Avenue C consists in placing the nearest tenth of a foot on the map in place of showing two decimals on the figures for the elevations. The greatest difference in these figures is  $\frac{1}{10}$  of a foot, and by actual survey it was found that these elevations are nearer to the true grades of the streets, as the same have been macadamized.

In relation to the grades on East Eleventh, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, no objections seem to be made, because the streets are not macadamized, and the grades are established on the submitted map, following, as nearly as possible, the surface and having the minimum gradient.

I do not believe, therefore, that a change on the submitted map should be made.

#### PARK, TWELFTH AVENUE AND FIFTY-SECOND STREET, MANHATTAN.

The following statement was received from the Corporation Counsel:

Since 1891 The City of New York has acquired lands for park purposes, in which the entire cost of such lands was borne by the City, namely:

1. Hamilton Fish Park, land bounded by Stanton, Houston, Pitt, Willett and Sheriff streets.

2. William H. Seward Park, three blocks on Hester, Division, East Broadway, Essex, Norfolk and Suffolk streets.

3. Riverside Park extension, from Seventy-second to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, west of the New York Central Railroad tracks.

4. St. Nicholas Park, from One Hundred and Thirtieth to One Hundred and Forty-first streets, St. Nicholas avenue and St. Nicholas terrace.

5. Colonial Park, One Hundred and Forty-fifth to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, Bradhurst to Edgcombe avenues.

6. Fort Washington Park.

7. Park known as "Little Italy Park," between One Hundred and Eleventh and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets, First avenue and the Harlem river.

8. Washington Bridge Park.

9. Fort George Park.

10. Corlears Hook Park.

In all of these proceedings the entire cost has been borne by the City.

In the Mulberry Bend Park an assessment of thirty per cent. was placed by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement upon adjacent property, but this was subsequently reduced to fifteen per cent., and the Legislature finally vacated the assessment entirely.

In the St. John's Park an assessment was imposed upon adjacent property, but the Legislature subsequently vacated it.

The proposed improvement being necessary, I recommend that it be authorized.

DEAR SIR—The roadway of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse is laid out to be 182 feet wide. It is intended to construct a central driveway for speeding purposes, with a smaller driveway on either side for general traffic. It is proposed to have sidewalks twenty feet in width along the side lines of the Concourse and it is the intention to flag these sidewalks 8 feet wide in the centre thereof, leaving a grass plot on either side of the flagging. If the general ordinances governing area, stoop and courtyard privileges are applied to the Concourse only 13 feet of the 20 feet proposed to be used for sidewalks will be available for that purpose. This reduced width would be entirely inadequate for sidewalks on a thoroughfare of this character.

With respect to the transverse roads only sufficient land has been taken to allow a width of 10 feet for the sidewalks when the construction of the roads is completed as originally planned.

If any part of this 10 feet is appropriated for area or stoop privileges, the remaining width will be absolutely inadequate.

Under these circumstances I respectfully recommend that action be taken to exempt the Grand Boulevard and Concourse with its transverse roads from the application of the general ordinances governing area, stoop and courtyard privileges.

I may add that as some of the small houses which have been removed from within the lines of the Concourse have been so placed that the steps project into the sidewalks, immediate action in the matter is desirable and necessary.

DEAR SIR—The contractor for regulating, grading, etc., Inwood avenue, from Cromwell avenue to Featherbed lane, Borough of The Bronx, has applied to this Department for the cancellation of the overtime of 296½ days under said contract.

Upon investigation I find that the contractor, W. J. Rodgers, is entitled to an allowance of 100 days on account of the increased amount of dry rubble masonry in the retaining-walls, said increase being about 5,954 cubic yards. The exact number of days which the contractor was delayed in the prosecution of his work in consequence of the debt-limit question cannot be determined, but I am satisfied that by the debt-limit question, and by the increased quantity of dry rubble masonry combined, the contractor was delayed for a period equal to the overtime of 296½ days.

I therefore recommend that authority be granted to cancel said overtime.

It is a fact, as claimed by the contractor, that there was a large increase in the amount of dry rubble masonry in retaining-walls, the property-owners having petitioned for walls on a large portion of the avenue. This increase in dry rubble masonry amounted to 5,954 cubic yards. The contract, however, does not provide for any specific allowance on this item as it does on the items of filling and excavation, and I think 100 days would be fair allowance therefor. As to the matter of the debt limit question, I would say that the contractor did very little work during the period when that was under discussion. Whatever money was earned by him, however, has been certified in accordance with the terms of the contract whenever the same became due thereunder.

Hon. JAMES KANE, Commissioner of Sewers:

DEAR SIR—I have read the communication of Mr. W. E. D. Stokes, addressed to his Honor the Mayor, upon the subject of rebuilding at a lower level the sewers along Broadway, from Seventieth to Eightieth streets, for the purpose of accommodating the deep foundations of buildings which may be built there in future.

In reference thereto, I beg to report that the work of changing sewers now in progress by the Rapid Transit Commission is for the purpose of conducting the same underneath the Rapid Transit Tunnel at two crossings, Seventy-third and Eighty-first streets.

At the first-named street the sewer was at a considerable depth, and it was only necessary to change the section from a circular to a rectangular section with a sloping bottom. At Eighty-first street the sewer had to be lowered several feet in order to pass under the Rapid Transit Tunnel.

In order to adjust the system at these two points much work had to be done to connecting sewers. The Rapid Transit Commission undertook this work for the purpose of adapting the sewer system to their plans, and they undertook no more than was absolutely necessary for that purpose; so, with the exception of the points named, the sewers remained upon about the same level as originally built.

All the sewers on Broadway were built in the years 1874, 1875 and 1876 along the sidewalk, and as a general thing are not disturbed by the Rapid Transit work, except at some few points where stations will be located.

It is quite true that modern buildings, built for certain purposes, have several stories below ground, so to speak, and it would be of great advantage to these buildings if they could drain the lowest sub-cellar directly into the sewers, and could the future have been forecasted thirty years ago it is quite probable that some of these sewers would have been put at a much greater depth; but having been built as they are, the drainage of buildings has generally been accommodated to them by pumping, when cellars are below grade of sewers; so that the reconstruction of sewers has not been undertaken for that reason alone.

This Department will be glad to undertake any improvements in the sewer system which may be suggested by the requirements of modern buildings. It does not, however, appear to me to be practicable to undertake a work of that kind now, as Mr. Stokes suggests, since the work of the Rapid Transit Commission covers about the whole of Broadway, and it would hardly be practicable for another contract to be in operation at the same time.

For that reason I do not agree with Mr. Stokes "that there is no time when it could be done so cheap and without extra inconvenience as now."

I would also state for the purpose of general information that the cost of this work would have to be assessed upon the property abutting and benefited, and, further, it requires a recommendation from the Local Board of Improvements and an ordinance by the Board of Public Improvements in order to empower this Department to enter into a contract for the work.

If Mr. Stokes and other persons interested with him in the public improvements in that locality will lay the matter before the Local Board in a way to convince that body of its necessity, and secure the recommendation thereof, so that the same may be put in proper shape before the Board of Public Improvements, this Department will be pleased to aid them in any way possible to accomplish the result which they aim at.

## THE ONWARD CONSTRUCTION COMPANY, March 18, 1901.

Local Board of Public Improvements:

GENTLEMEN—As you are aware, Broadway, the great thoroughfare of New York City, is being torn up by the Rapid Transit Commission in this section, and the entire sewerage system changed without any regard to the needs or rights of the public or property-owners, when with little extra expense the sewers could now be placed on a lower level, making them more sanitary and more efficient drains for the deep cellars of modern buildings.

We are all interested in having Broadway sanitary and modern in every respect. But the most eminent engineers have pointed out to me that, with tunnel on one side and deep cellars on the other, these old brick sewers, situated only thirteen feet below the curb-line, the sewerage is bound at places to percolate through the soil and find its way either into the tunnel or into the deep cellars of modern buildings.

Such authorities as Horace Loomis, Chief Engineer of Sewers, and William Blakely Parsons, Chief Engineer of the Rapid Transit Commission, and Lieut. Chrisman, retired, U.S.N., formerly Inspector-in-Chief of the Brooklyn Navy Yard, that the old time thirteen-foot level of the sewers of upper Broadway must give place to sewers situated at a much lower level, say thirty feet below the curb.

If this is the case, why not lower the sewers now while the street is torn up.

The extra excavation over and above that assumed by the Rapid Transit Commission could be let to another contractor and save the expense of another sewer, which will have to be built in the near future, as all the above engineers admit.

As an instance, I refer you to the one on Broadway, from Seventy-fourth to Seventy-third street. This sewer will be closed up where it closes subway, and instead a new sewer will pass down Broadway to Seventy-first street at 13 feet below the curb-line; here it will plunge down vertically 5 feet and join another new sewer passing under the subway and with this connect with an old sewer flowing south to Seventieth street and through Seventieth street to the Hudson river.

This sewer is only 3 feet 6 inches by 2 feet 4 inches in size, which seems small considering what it will be called upon to do in the future.

In this section, that is from Seventy-fourth street south along Broadway to Seventy-first street and thence to the Hudson river, if, instead of putting down a new sewer 13 feet below the curb-line, a depth of 30 feet was maintained at Seventy-third street and Broadway, making only 17 feet additional excavation at this point for a distance of about 500 feet, and as we now have sewer 24 feet below the curb from Seventy-first street and Broadway south to Seventieth street and thence to the Hudson river, it would only be necessary to deepen this old sewer about 12

feet more, and then, for this portion of this beautiful highway, we would have a sanitary pipe sewer to meet all the future requirements of the public and property-owners.

This would at once invite handsome and substantial improvements in this section.

We must meet this question. New York's sewerage system must in time be made equal to that of Paris. Why waste money on this temporary make-shift in the sewerage system? Why throw this money away? We are bound to face this problem; let us face it now and give this main street of New York at least a sewer that is up to date.

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of yours of the 14th instant, wherein acknowledgment is made of my claim that on November 15, 1899, upon my motion, the Board of Public Improvements requested the Corporation Counsel to inform said Board as to the powers of the "Flushing and Newtown Canal Company," and that the Law Department asked the Board for certain information therein, which, with its annual appropriation of nearly \$300,000, declared its inability to furnish same; whereupon it referred the matter to me, as President of the Borough of Queens, to furnish the facts desired (although the annual appropriation for my office, for all purposes, is but \$7,500), and which concludes with the declaration that you will not permit the action of your Board, had on the 13th, in the matter of the "Flushing and Newtown Canal Company" vs. The City of New York, to be transmitted to the Corporation Counsel until I first comply with the task thus imposed upon me by the Board some fifteen months ago. Recognizing as I do the great necessity that exists for the prompt rendition of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel therein, and not disposed to permit any obstacle, however insignificant, to stand in the way of its forthcoming, make reply by quoting from chapter 178, Laws of 1899, as follows:

"Section 1. The time for the beginning of the construction of the canal and work of the Newtown and Flushing Canal Company is hereby extended and continued for the period of one year, from April twenty-second, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine; and the time to finish the same is hereby extended and continued for the period of five years, from April twenty-second, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, and no prejudice to the corporate existence of the company under its charter shall arise from the non-commencement or non-completion of said canal and work within the time prescribed by the charter of said company.

It requires no special effort to perceive that the concluding clause of aforesaid section is an admission of the Canal Company that it had not complied with the requirements of its charter, and that by the passage of the act the Legislature absolved said private corporation from its omissions and remitted the penalty which it thereby incurred.

Furthermore, that the law requires such like corporation to file between the first and twentieth day of January in each year, in the office of the Secretary of State and in the office of the Clerk of the County to which their franchises relate, a sworn statement as to its compliance with the requirements of the provisions of its charter during the year just past.

All of which is subject to public inspection, and certified copies thereof can be readily obtained for a small fee.

Trusting that the aforesaid will suffice to enable the Board to make due response to the inquiries made of it by the Corporation Counsel, and hoping that no further delay will be interposed, remain,

THE FOLLOWING IS AN EXTRACT FROM the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held Tuesday, February 19, 1901:

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

CITY OF NEW YORK, DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,  
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, February 15, 1901.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the



City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII, of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand and five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

#### CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

#### ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 28, Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

JULY 1, 1917,

JULY 1, 1920, and  
JULY 1, 1921.

Stock so extended will be payable in gold and will bear interest from July 1, 1900, at the rate of three and one-tenth (3 1/10) per cent, per annum, payable, also in gold, semi-annually, on the first day of January and of July in each year. The stock which is to be extended in accordance with the terms of this circular must be delivered to the Comptroller upon demand, when the certificates will be stamped across their face with the terms of the extension, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, provided, however, that such stock now outstanding in coupon form when presented for extension will be extended in the form of registered stock. Thereafter transfers may be made of such stock on the books of the Corporation in accordance with the general provisions of law and the rules of the Department of Finance in regard thereto.
