From P. J. Carlin & Co., Contractors—Proposal to do the following extra work required at New City Prison: Cut openings for dumb-waiters as shown on plans and do all mason work in connection with same for \$360. No bull-nose brick to be used. Also to cut the holes required for steam heating in steel walls of cells for 50 cents each; estimated number of holes, 96. Consent of sureties on contract of Carlin & Co. indorsed on above proposals. Proposal accepted under provisions set forth in resolution of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, March 31, 1902, which reads as follows:

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 3, chapter 626 of the Laws of 1896, as amended by chapter 642 of the Laws of 1897, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the extra work and changes in the contract of P. J. Carlin & Co., for the construction of steel cells in the new City Prison; for cutting out openings for dumb-waiters at the City Prison and all mason-work in connection with same, and for the cutting out of the holes required in steel walls of cells, in connection with steam heating, at a cost not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500), as requested by the Commissioner of Correction, under date of March 5, 1902. Subject, however, to the consent, in writing, of the contractors and their sureties. This approval is given on the express understanding that the question whether this work is called for and should be done, under the contract of P. J. Carlin & Co. for the construction of the steel cells, shall be determined at the completion of the contract, and if it is decided that it comes within the terms of the specification and plans of said contract then the cost of this work shall be deducted from the final payment of said contract of P. J. Carlin & Co.

At the meeting of the Prospect Heights Local Improvement Board, held April 11, 1902, the following resolutions for improvements were passed:

Eighth Street—Opening Eighth street between Eighth avenue and Prospect Park, West.

Eighth Street—Construction of sewer in Eighth street between Eighth avenue and Prospect Park, West.

Eighth Street—Grading and paving Eighth street between Eighth avenue and Prospect Park, West.

Flagging sidewalk about St. Thomas's Church, corner of Fourth avenue and Eighth street.

At the meeting of the Williamsburg Local Improvement Board, held April 11, 1902, the following resolutions for improvements were passed:

Bushwick Creek—Construction of main sewers in the following streets:

Quay street from East River to West street;

West street from Quay street to North Fifteenth street;

North Fifteenth street from West street to Engert avenue;

Engert avenue from North Fifteenth street to Humboldt street; and in

Engert avenue from Russell street to North Henry street; also in

Wythe avenue from Norman avenue to North Fifteenth street.

BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

Minutes of the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond.

The Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, met at the Borough Office in the First National Bank building at St. George, in said borough, on Tuesday, April 8, 1902, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

CONCORD, STAPLETON, ETC.

Sewerage System and Removal of Nuisance.

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby directs that a complete storm water and sanitary sewerage system be constructed in the section now drained by the old water course running from Concord street to Broad street, Stapleton, in the Fourth Ward, and that the Commissioner of Public Works report to the President of the Borough on the estimated cost and area of assessment.

Affirmative—Alderman Maloy, Alderman Shea, the President.

Negative—None.

AMBOY ROAD.

Storm Water, near Sharrott Avenue.

The following resolution was moved by Alderman Shea, and adopted:

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby directs that a proper bridge, pipe or culvert be laid across Amboy road, in the vicinity of Sharrott avenue, to divert the storm water.

Affirmative—Alderman Maloy, Alderman Shea, the President.

GRACE CHURCH PLACE.

Extension by Opening to Simonson Place.

President Cromwell laid before the Board a protest signed by residents and taxpayers, against the proposed extension of Grace Church place, in the Third Ward; and a preliminary report of the Commissioner of Public Works in accordance with the resolution adopted on March 11; and a letter from persons interested in adjacent property strongly urging the proposed extension.

Signers of the petition and of the protest addressed the Board, and the following resolution was moved by Alderman Shea, and adopted:

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, recommends that Grace Church place, in the Third Ward of this bor-

ough, be extended to Simonson place, as shown on the map or plan now on file in the office of the President of the Borough, entitled:

"Map showing proposed extension of Grace Church place, in the Third Ward, Borough of Richmond, City of New York; Wm. R. Hillyer, Surveyor, West New Brighton, N. Y., August, 1901."

—and that a copy of this resolution, and a copy of said map, be sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, and that said board be requested to institute proceedings for estimate and assessment for the condemnation of whatever private property may be necessary to said extension.

Affirmative—Alderman Maloy, Alderman Shea, the President.

Negative—None.

SUNKEN LOTS.

St. Mary's Avenue, Rosebank; Willow Avenue, Clifton.

President Cromwell laid before the Board a communication addressed to him by the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, inclosing a communication from the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent of the Borough of Richmond to the Sanitary Superintendent of the Department of Health, concerning two vacant lots on "St. Mary's avenue, Borough of Richmond," which were complained of as a nuisance. The President stated that, under the Charter, the Department of Health is required to initiate proceedings for the remedy of unsanitary conditions in vacant lots, and that the Charter authorizes the President of the Borough to order such remedy; but that he preferred to have the concurrence of the Local Board.

On motion of Alderman Maloy, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be directed to fill in with fresh earth, one foot above the level of the stagnant water, vacant Lots Nos. 72 and 89 on St. Mary's avenue, Rosebank, in the Fourth Ward.

President Cromwell stated that he had received a letter complaining of similar conditions at Willow avenue and Centre street, Clifton, and that he laid the matter before the Local Board as the body authorized by the Charter to hear complaints of nuisances; and the following resolution was moved by Alderman Shea, and adopted:

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby requests the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York to investigate a pond alleged to exist on lot or lots at or near Willow avenue and Centre street, Clifton, in the Fourth Ward of the borough, which is reported to be a nuisance and a menace to health, and to communicate thereon with the President of the Borough.

Affirmative—Alderman Maloy, Alderman Shea, the President.

Negative—None.

BEACH AVENUE.

Macadamizing.

Counsellor William M. Mullen addressed the Board for information concerning the petition for macadamizing Beach avenue, which was laid over at the meeting of March 11; and was informed by President Cromwell that on investigation he had learned that the macadamizing of Beach avenue for its entire length had been provided for in the issue of bonds of the former Town of Southfield, and that there is a sufficient balance in that fund to do this work.

Mr. Benjamin Brown and others having come in to support the petition for a Concord-Stapleton sewer, and the Commissioner of Public Works having taken a seat at the Board table, President Cromwell reopened the subject for discussion and produced several former petitions on the same subject which had not been finally acted on by the preceding city administration. At the close of the discussion,

First—That we have completed our estimate of damage, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, and having objections thereto, do present their said objections in writing, duly verified, to us at our office, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in the City of New York, on or before the 24th day of April, 1902, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on the 28th day of April, 1902, at 11 o'clock a. m.

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate of damage, together with our damage maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of the City of New York, Nos. 90 and 92 West Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, in said city, there to remain until the 5th day of May, 1902.

Third—That we propose to assess for benefit, which assessment will appear in our last partial and separate abstract of estimate and assessment, and will be contained in our last partial and separate report, all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate, lying and being in the Borough of Manhattan, in the City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz:

Beginning at a point where the easterly line of the right of way of the Hudson River Railroad Company is intersected by a line drawn through the center of the blocks between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets; thence running easterly along the center line of the blocks between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets to a point distant 100 feet easterly to the easterly side of Eighth avenue or Central Park, West, thence northerly and parallel with Eighth avenue or Central Park, West, and 100 feet easterly therefrom to the Harlem River Improvement line on the westerly side of the Harlem river; thence northerly, westerly, southerly, etc., along the westerly line of the Harlem River Improvement as the same winds and turns to the easterly line of the right of way of the Hudson River Railroad Company; thence southerly along the easterly line of the said right of way of the said company to the center line of the block between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets at the point or place of beginning.

Fourth—That our first partial and separate report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, First Department, at a Special Term thereof, Part I., to be held in the County Courthouse, in the Borough of Manhattan, in the City of New York, on the 15th day of July, 1902, at the opening of the court on that day.
