Sir—In accordance with the requirements of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, the following report is submitted, showing the operations of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the quarter ending September 30, 1904:

As authorized by sections 909 and 910 of the Charter, the Commissioners caused the work of extending the tax for the year 1904 to be performed by the clerical force of the Department, without additional expense to the City. The total assessed valuations of real and personal estate in the several boroughs constituting The City of New York for 1904, as transmitted by the Board of Taxes and Assessments to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July, under section 907 of the Charter, were \$5,640,542,657. Of this amount the assessed valuation of real estate was \$5,015,463,779, and personal estate \$625,078,878, divided among the several boroughs as follows:

State Tax

The State tax rate for the years 1899 to 1904, inclusive, and included in the total tax rate given by boroughs, as above shown, and expressed in mills, was: In 1899, 2.49; in 1900, .96; in 1901, 1.20; in 1902, 0.13; in 1903, 0.13; in 1904, 0.13. It will thus be seen that the direct tax of the State, on one dollar of assessed valuation, has fallen from two mills and forty-nine hundredths of a mill in 1899 to thirteen hundredths of a mill in 1904.

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) from the Special School Fund for the current year, and from the item contained therein entitled "Fuel," Borough of Manhattan, which item is in excess of its requirements, to the item also contained within the Special School Fund for the current year entitled "Fuel," Borough of The Bronx, which item is insufficient for its purposes.

The following preambles, resolutions and reports were also adopted:

Whereas, The one-hundredth anniversary of the inauguration of the movement for free public schools in The City of New York will occur on the 19th day of February, 1905;

Resolved, That a special committee of five be appointed to make arrangements for the proper celebration of said anniversary, on or about the date above mentioned.

The Committee on Elementary Schools, to which was referred for consideration and report, if possible, at this meeting of the Board, the communication from his Honor the Mayor, dated September 21, 1904, presenting "some suggestions for the solution of the part-time problem in the public schools," respectfully reports that lack of time and other circumstances preclude anything more than a report of progress at present.

Since the last meeting of the Board this Committee and the Department of Education have suffered a serious loss through the resignation of Hon. Jacob W. Mack. Your Committee has thus been deprived of the invaluable counsel and mature judgment of its Chairman, who had given to the subject presented by the Mayor prolonged and careful consideration.

The matter of overcrowding in the schools and of part-time classes has long occupied the attention of the Committee on Elementary Schools and of the Board of Superintendents. While the suggestions offered by the Mayor are not new, your Committee welcomes his interest in the matter, and is glad to place on record its opinion that he has given the subject serious and sympathetic consideration. The plans proposed by him are among those which have been under consideration by the Committee for a number of months. Consolidation of upper-grade classes has been instituted to a considerable extent in various parts of the City, especially since the opening of the school on the 12th instant.

The problem of giving a full day's schooling to every child in the City would be comparatively easy of solution if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Department of Finance and the Law Department would co-operate promptly and energetically with the Board of Education in the acquisition of sites for school buildings. The last mentioned matter is one to which we desire to call the Mayor's especial attention.

Under existing circumstances there are numerous and obvious difficulties to be overcome. Toward the solution of these your Committee is laboring earnestly, and it is receiving valuable aid from the Board of Superintendents. Members of this Committee have been making a careful and personal investigation of the school conditions in this and other cities, and the Committee will use its best endeavors to present a full report within the shortest possible time. If necessary, your Committee, when its report is completed, will take steps to have a special meeting of the Board of Education called for the consideration of the same.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby requested to transmit immediately to his Honor the Mayor a copy of the foregoing report.

Whereas, It has been proven to this Committee that C. M. Early, to whom the Executive Committee of the Board of Education on November 18, 1903, awarded a contract for furnishing certain supplies for the use of the Department of Education for the year 1904, has not complied with the terms of said contract in that he has refused to furnish one item contained therein, and has not furnished other items within a reasonable time when called for; and

Whereas, The Superintendent of School Supplies has certified to this Committee that the said C. M. Early has failed to comply with the terms of his contract, as aforesaid; therefore be it

Resolved, That the contract entered into between the Board of Education and said C. M. Early, dated December 23, 1903, be abandoned and canceled, subject to the approval of the Board of Education; and be it further

Resolved, That the contractor, the said C. M. Early, be notified to discontinue all work under said contract, said notice to be served upon the contractor either personally or by leaving the same with him or with his agent in charge of the work.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the action of the Committee on Supplies in adopting the foregoing preamble and resolutions be and the same is hereby approved and ratified, and the contract entered into between the Board of Education and said C. M. Early, dated December 23, 1903, be and it is hereby abandoned and canceled.

Whereas, It appears that it is proposed to erect a garbage disposal plant in the immediate neighborhood of Public School 43, Rockaway Park, Borough of Queens, and that a permit has been granted by the Board of Health or other City authorities authorizing such erection;

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that the granting of such permit, if one has been granted, should be reconsidered and the permit revoked if the facts are as stated; and

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be instructed to communicate this resolution to the Health Board or other proper authorities of the City, with the request that any permit so granted be revoked, or as an alternative that District Superintendent Chickering, on behalf of this Board, be granted a hearing on the subject before work under said permit is begun.

Resolved, That William Lot, Janitor of Public School 115, Borough of Brooklyn, be and he is hereby fined three months' pay.

Resolved, That the action of the President in suspending George Wade, Janitor of Public School 22, Borough of Manhattan, on May 14, 1904, pending action by the Board of Education in the matter of charges preferred, be and the same is hereby approved and ratified until such time as said George Wade shall be reassigned to duty by the Committee on Care of Buildings.

Resolved, That George Wade, Janitor of Public School 22, Borough of Manhattan, be and he is hereby fined six months' pay, said six months to be considered as beginning on the date of his suspension.

On motion, all absent members were excused for non-attendance at this meeting.

On motion, the Board adjourned at 6:50 o'clock P. M.

thence easterly along said easterly line of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse to its intersection with the westerly prolongation of the middle line of the block between East One Hundred and Ninety-fifth street and East One Hundred and Ninety-sixth street; thence easterly along said easterly line of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse to its intersection with the westerly prolongation of the middle line of the block between East One Hundred and Ninety-sixth street and East One Hundred and Ninety-seventh street; thence easterly along said easterly line of the Grand Boulevard and Concourse to its intersection with the westerly prolongation of the middle line of the block between East One Hundred and Ninety-seventh street and East One Hundred and Ninety-eighth street;
