The President submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York does hereby place on record an expression of deep regret at the death of Henry P. Loomis, M. D., formerly Consulting Pathologist of the Department of Health, and since January 2, 1902, a member of the Medical Advisory Board.

Supplementary communication from his Honor, the Mayor, instructing the head of the Department of Health not to open bids or award contracts except with his authority, until such time as the finances of the City shall warrant it, was received and ordered on file.

A plan for the resumption of business by the Knickerbocker Trust Company, dated New York, December 17, 1907, together with a circular dated December 18, 1907, addressed to the depositors of said Knickerbocker Trust Company, and an assignment of deposit account, were received from a committee of the depositors and stockholders of the trust company, of which Frederick G. Bourne is Chairman, and referred to the Board of Trustees of the Health Department Pension Fund, with the recommendation that said trustees consent to the plan for the resumption of business of the Knickerbocker Trust Company, and to assign the claim of the Board of Trustees of the Health Department Pension Fund against the said Knickerbocker Trust Company to the New York Trust Company, depository of the committee of which said Frederick G. Bourne is Chairman.

Report from the Sanitary Superintendent recommending that section 95 of the Sanitary Code be amended, was received, and on motion, it was

Resolved, That section 95 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 95. No fat, tallow or lard shall be melted or rendered, except when fresh from the slaughtered animal, and taken directly from the places of slaughter in The City of New York, and in a condition free from sourness and taint and all other causes of offense at the time of rendering, and all melting and rendering must be in steam-tight vessels, and the gases and odors therefrom must be destroyed by combustion or other means equally effective, and according to the best and most improved means and processes; and everything preceding, following, and in connection with such melting and rendering, and the premises where the same shall be conducted, must be free from all offensive odor, and other cause of detriment to the public health. No fat, lard, or tallow shall be brought into The City of New York to be rendered or melted, and none shall be rendered or melted that has come from any place outside of said City. The business of melting or rendering fat, tallow or lard shall not be carried on or conducted in The City of New York without a permit from the Board of Health.

Estimates for the installation of plumbing in the two shacks recently constructed by the Department of Health at the sanatorium, for the care and treatment of persons living in The City of New York suffering with tuberculosis, located at Otisville, Town of Mount Hope, Orange County, N. Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 6, 1907, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

“Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 507 of the Laws of 1903, as amended by chapter 603 of the Laws of 1904, and the requisition of the Brooklyn Grade Crossing Commission by resolution adopted July 16, 1907, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) for the purpose of providing means to meet the proportionate cost of the improvements to be borne by The City of New York in connection with the abolishing of grade crossings of highways and railroads, pursuant to said chapter 507 of the Laws of 1903, as amended by chapter 603 of the Laws of 1904, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter to an amount not exceeding five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.”

- Building will be of unlawful height for non-fireproof building.
- Walls in sixth story of unlawful thickness; show wall thickness on plan.
- Walls also have excessive openings.
- Fire escapes should be provided.
- Auxiliary fire apparatus should be provided.
- Provide fireproof shutters where necessary.
- Furnish detail drawing of proposed fireproof floor filling.
- Furnish details of roof garden construction, which should be fireproofed.

Awaiting Inspector's Report.

1. "Whenever a superintendent of buildings to whom such questions have been submitted shall reject or refuse to approve the mode, manner of constructions or materials proposed to be followed or used in the erection or alteration of any such building or structure;

2. "Or when it is claimed that the rules and regulations of the President of the Borough or the provisions of law or said ordinances do not apply."

Objection 1. The appellants desire to have a decision rendered upon the proposed improvement to the building which consists of squaring up the upper stories practically within the limits of height of peak roofs as they now stand, removing the present non-fireproof ceilings and roofs and substituting for them steel and concrete floor construction and carrying up the outer walls of brick and partition and dividing walls of brick or terra cotta as noted on plans.

The new roof will be built of steel and concrete construction and covered with copper and tile.

All the new structural work from the underside of the ceiling beams of fourth floor up to the highest point building will be fireproof.

1. The improvement as proposed is the squaring up of the upper stories of present building practically within the limits of height of peak roofs as they now stand, carrying up the two end portions of building one story and the centre pavilion two stories in height and finishing with flat roofs covered with tile and copper. A part of the roof over two end portions will be used as open roof garden.

The entire structure above the point of which new work begins, which is at the level of underside of ceiling of fourth floor, will be thoroughly fireproof.

The new floors and roof will be framed with steel I beams filled in with Roebling's concrete floor arches, System B, and the partitions will be of 12-inch brick or 4-inch terra cotta blocks, laid up in Portland cement mortar, as indicated on drawings.

The building is now equipped with two sets of outside iron stairs and these will be extended up to the roof with landings at new floor levels.

In addition to the outside iron stairs there are at present in building two stairways, one at each end of building, which are of fireproof construction and built between brick walls. These will also be extended up to roof.

There is now installed in building a system of auxiliary fire apparatus which will be extended up to roof level with stand pipe and outlets of regulation size and fitted with standard hose, nozzle, racks, etc., according to the requirements of the Department governing same.

The appellants wish to draw attention to the fact that the materials used in the construction of the present building are of the highest grade. The walls of foundations and superstructure are laid up in cement mortar and are of ample thickness and strength to sustain the added loads.

The building is subdivided into a series of rooms practically independent of each other by means of 12 and 16 inch brick walls continuous from cellar to top story, the floor beams of which are deafened at each story, and this arrangement of the building, together with the construction, we think should be given consideration in dealing with this question.

The following answers to other objections made by the Superintendent of Buildings:

2. New wall thicknesses are indicated on drawings.

3. See revised drawings.

4. Two sets of outside iron stairs now on rear of building where indicated on plans, will be extended up to roof.

5. Auxiliary fire apparatus is now installed in building and this will be extended up to roof level with stand pipe and outlet of regulation size and fitted with standard hose, nozzle, racks, etc., according to the requirements of the Department governing same.

6. Fireproof shutters are unnecessary, as openings in this building do not come within 30 feet of any adjoining building.

7. Detail of fireproof floor filling submitted herewith.

8. Detail of fireproof roof garden construction is indicated on drawing.

Appearance—Mr. Lindsay, for Schickel & Ditmars.

On motion, appeal 78 of 1907, approved on condition that all three sets of interior stairs be made thoroughly fireproof from top to bottom, with wire glass in all openings; and provided that the landings at each story of these stairs be cut off by fireproof partitions, with doors and trim in same of fireproof material.


