### PUBLIC HEARINGS BY COMMISSION ON BUILDING DISTRICTS AND RESTRICTIONS.

*Districting the City of New York for the Purpose of Regulating the Height of Buildings, the Area of Courts and Yards, the Location of Trades and Industries and the Location of Buildings Designed for Specified Uses.*

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Commission on Building Districts and Restrictions will hold public hearings at 10.30 A. M. in ROOM 16, CITY HALL, Borough of Manhattan, on the dates specified below on its tentative report submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 10, 1916, in relation to districting the City for the purpose of regulating the height of buildings, the area of courts and yards, the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified uses.

## DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

## BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

## REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1915.

## Bronx Park.

In the greenhouses 6,000 tropical plants were cared for; 95,000 summer flowering plants were propagated, potted and cared for; 20,000 ornamental evergreen cuttings were placed in the propagating bench, and 30,000 tulips were planted in beds around and adjacent to the greenhouses.

The tennis courts, the walks and the area near the band stand were cared for.

On the Botanical Garden roads, a section about 2,000 feet long, north of the Museum, was resurfaced to a depth of six inches with 1 1/2 inch native stone taken from Jerome Park Reservoir, and top dressed with screenings.

The entrance at Southern Boulevard, for a distance of 200 feet, as well as the entrance at the 200th Street Bridge, were treated in the same manner.

Also in Bronx Park, 1,240 feet of roadway were patched with 3-4 inch stone and road binder.

The work begun during the second quarter on the contract for the erection and completion of an animal hospital in the Zoological Park were superintended by the Department.

## Bronx and Pelham Parkway.

The flower beds on this Parkway were rearranged and planted with 49,000 early flowering Tulip, Narcissus and Lily bulbs, which will, in the spring, make one of the best showings in this section of the country.

All rhododendrons and evergreen plantations were carefully gone over and given a coat of winter covering to protect them through the winter. The bulb and herbaceous beds were covered with stable manure to protect them through the winter.

About 400 square feet of roadway in Bronx and Pelham Parkway were patched with 3-4 inch stone and road binder.

## Pelham Bay Park.

The roads around the Athletic Field, Shore Road to City Island, and Split Rock Road were cleaned and a coating of Tarvia B and grits applied, 20,000 gallons of tar and 500 cubic yards of grits being used.

Inasmuch as the old rustic fence around the running track was beyond repair, it was taken down and removed.

On the golf links the putting greens were mulched for the winter with prepared compost.

By strengthening the embankment near Orchard Beach and opening a ditch so that the surface water could flood a section of the lawn a skating pond 400 feet long and 100 feet wide was provided for the residents of City Island.

In this park 2,000 Oriental Plane trees were cared for.

## Van Cortlandt Park.

All the summer flowering plants were removed from the flower beds in the Colonial Garden, and the garden ploughed, harrowed, leveled and planted with 100,000 tulip bulbs of various colors, which, when in bloom, during the early spring, will make a handsome showing, being the largest set planting of tulip bulbs in this country.

The golf links in this Park became badly infested with worms during the early fall, and in order to exterminate them a solution of soap and water was employed, 25,600 gallons of the mixture being used, and the number of worms removed proved that it was very effective. Fifty loads of sod were cut and laid on the bare spots caused by indifferent players cutting the turf with golf clubs in trying to hit the ball; also re-measured the golf links.

The road from the Subway station to the Police Booth at Grand Avenue was cleaned and covered with Tarvia B, 4,000 gallons of tar and 40 cubic yards of grits being used for the purpose.

Surveys and calculations were made to determine the quantity of fill delivered under contract in the southwest part of the park.

Calculations of quantities of additional fill required in Van Cortlandt Park to reclaim the swamp lands were made and incorporated in an application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for additional funds.

Superintended the construction of water supply system in the Van Cortlandt Park Nursery, filling of swamp lands and the disposal of road materials.

On account of the open weather during this Quarter and the amount of outside work which had to be done very little has been done in the Nursery in this Park. We have, however, cared for 20,000 pansies and 20,000 daisies; pruned 3,000 shrubs and 200 trees; covered and prepared for winter all herbaceous plants and young evergreens.

## Parkways.

On the North side of Mosholu Parkway there were 1,200 cubic yards of topsoil delivered and spread by a contractor free of cost to the department. Trees were planted in this section.

On the roadway west of Jerome Avenue bridge 4,000 gallons of Tarvia B and 35 cubic yards of grits were spread, while 900 square feet of road patching was done, using three-quarter inch stone and road binder.

The Bainbridge Avenue entrance on the north side of this Parkway was resurfaced to a depth of 6 inches with 1 1/2 inch stone, obtained from the Jerome Park reservoir.

Spuytan Duyvil Parkway: The roadway of this Parkway from the Spuyten Duyvil depot to Broadway was patched with Tarvia B and grits, 300 gallons of tar being used. A two-rail pipe fence, 680 feet long, with four "I" beam iron posts was constructed.

Crotona Parkway: The resurfacing of this Parkway was completed, 11,000 gallons of Tarvia B and 100 cubic yards of grits being applied for wearing surface. Re-soiled and graded 122,200 square feet in center plots. In these plots 8 flower beds, each 20 feet in diameter, and 4 flower beds, each 30 feet by 18 feet, were constructed and prepared for planting. Five thousand tulip bulbs were planted in these beds. There were also 400 evergreen and deciduous trees and shrubs planted along this Parkway. A two-rail pipe fence, 6,000 feet long, with wooden posts, was placed around the plots. Seventy-two stationary benches, 8 feet long, each seating 5 persons, were made and placed at the ends of these plots.

## Crotona Park.

A plantation 600 feet long and varying from 60 feet to 150 feet in width was regulated and graded and planted with 5,000 evergreen and deciduous trees and shrubs. This work was done around the Indian Lake and comfort house, making a very pleasing landscape out of what had been a rough, unfinished piece of land. When the adjacent lands around the lake and tennis courts have been graded and planted in the spring, it will leave this portion of the park in a finished condition.

In the flower beds around the Municipal Building 1,250 tulip bulbs were planted.

There were 350 cubic yards of grits and 500 cubic yards of screenings piled and stored in this park for use in the early spring in repairing roads and walks. The old tool house at the south end was taken down and removed.

## McComb's Dam Park.

The usual maintenance of grounds and recreational features were kept up.

Around the athletic field 500 California Privet, 3 feet to 4 feet high, were planted to replace plants that were destroyed and broken. There were also planted 1,450 tulip bulbs.

## St. Mary's Park.

The usual care and maintenance. The road through this park, running from 143rd to 149th Street, was resurfaced with 600 cubic yards of 1 1/2 inch stone and

200 cubic yards of screenings; 1,800 gallons of Tarvia B and 50 cubic yards of grits were applied to the wearing surface.

## Claremont Park.

The usual care and maintenance. In the flower beds around the office building in this park 2,500 tulip bulbs were planted.

## Devoe Park.

The usual care and maintenance; 2,535 tulip bulbs were planted in the flower beds in this park.

## Rodman Drake Park.

One thousand cubic yards of fill were received and put in swamp hole by the contractors, free of cost to the Department.

## Street Trees.

During the past quarter 97 trees have been pruned on the request of property owners, while 2,221 trees have been pruned on various streets and 23 dangerous trees cut down and removed; 730 dead and dangerous trees were removed from the various parks and parkways, and broken and decayed branches removed from 2,435 trees.

The fact that the Climbers and Pruners were engaged in cutting down and removing dead and dangerous trees in the various parks and parkways accounts for the small showing in street tree work.

## Special Work.

The Bronx Borough Christmas Tree Committee supplied six trees for the Christmas celebrations held in various sections of the Borough. These trees were erected and decorated by this Department's employees, the lumber for the stands being loaned by the Department of Highways.

An indoor Christmas tree was erected in the Second Battery Armory, and 12 shoot-the-chutes and 40 baby swings were also placed at either end of the building by Park Department labor. The public schools were invited to participate in the celebration, which they did, and the attendance on the several days was beyond expectation, 7,000 to 10,000 persons being in the hall each day.

## General Park Maintenance.

During this quarter the general maintenance work consisted of the care of golf links, replacing sod, rolling greens, etc., marking and cleaning tennis courts; cleaning lakes daily for the use of skaters; removing snow and ice from all the paths, steps and roadways; cleaning rubbish, paper, litter, etc., from all the roads, paths and gutters; cleaning buildings; cleaning catch basins and filling in small washouts; raking and burning dead leaves; putting away park benches and playground equipment; care of comfort stations.

Remeasured Van Cortlandt, Mosholu and Pelham Bay golf links. Investigated condition of irrigation work done under contract and prepared payment vouchers for maintenance of same.

Estimates of quantities of supplies needed for year 1916 were made and forwarded to the Central Purchasing Bureau. Specifications for these supplies were prepared whenever the standard specifications of the Central Purchasing Bureau did not cover same.

All applications for permits filed by Telephone and Lighting Companies for the erection of poles, laying of conduits and stringing of wires were investigated and reported upon. Plans for lighting in various parks and parkways were investigated and locations of lamps staked out.

Applications for street opening and house connection permits were investigated and reported upon. Deliveries of coal were weighed and deliveries of screenings and grits were measured.

Estimates, orders and payment vouchers were prepared for all supplies delivered on contract during the quarter, and for all construction work under contract.

Tentative estimates for the following work were prepared and incorporated in applications to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for Corporate Stock funds. These funds were appropriated by resolution of the Board on December 17, 1915:

Paving existing walks in Echo Park, \$1,680; constructing cement sidewalk along the Jerome Avenue side of St. James Park, \$1,335; construction of sidewalk adjoining an existing walk along 177th Street, adjacent to Crotona Park, \$1,740; removal of rock at McComb's Dam Park, \$6,000; construction of Comfort Station at Athletic Field in Pelham Bay Park, \$8,000; repaving with asphaltic concrete on the present foundation of that portion of the central roadway of Bronx and Pelham Parkway between Butler Street and Old White Plains Road, \$6,000; construction of addition to Golf House in Van Cortlandt Park, \$7,000; construction of new roads and walks and re-surfacing present roads and walks in Crotona Park, \$3,000.

## Construction Work Under Way or Completed.

Filling in swamp lands in the southwest corner of Van Cortlandt Park; repairing and keeping in repair the motor, horse and hand lawn mowers; furnishing all the labor and materials (except plumbing and heating) for the erection and completion of an animal hospital in the Zoological Park; furnishing all the labor and materials for the installation of a hot water heating plant in the animal hospital in the Zoological Park; furnishing all the labor and materials for installing the plumbing, drainage and water systems in the animal hospital in the Zoological Park; furnishing and delivering apparatus for water supply system in the Nursery, Van Cortlandt Park.

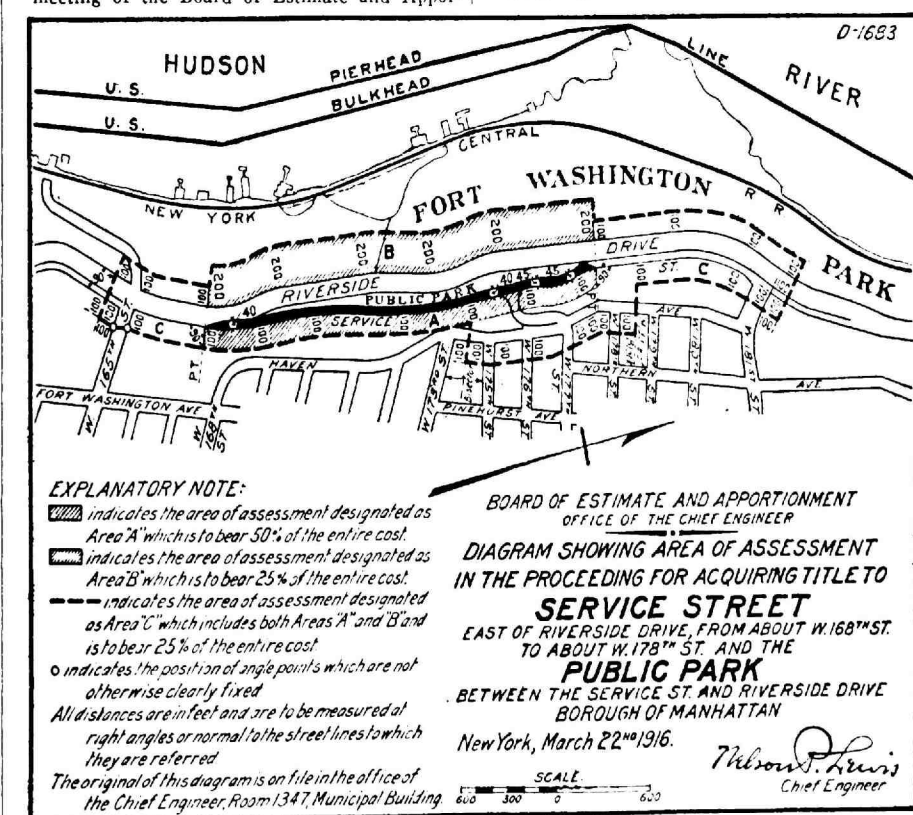

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a re-sale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

## PROPOSALS FOR BIDS AND ESTIMATES FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President, or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
