The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

The Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of ten thousand dollars is hereby transferred from the appropriation, "Commissioners of Records—Expenditure of," made prior to 1871, the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation, "Contingencies—Law Department, 1874," the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.

Whereupon the Mayor suggested an amendment, as follows:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by section 2 of chapter 308 of the Laws of 1874, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to transfer twenty thousand dollars of any excess of appropriation remaining to the credit of "Salaries—Department of Finance," of any previous year or years, to any insufficient appropriation for the same purpose in any other year or years.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman) and the Comptroller of the City of New York—2.

Negative—The President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by provisions of section 112, of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue from time to time as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, assessment bonds of the City of New York, as authorized by chapter 397, Laws of 1852, and chapter 580, Laws of 1872, two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000).

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman)—1.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue bonds of the City of New York, authorized by chapter 545, Laws of 1872, as provided by section 9, of chapter 329, Laws of 1874, the amount of said bonds not to exceed the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), said bonds to be designated "Bonds of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York," and bear interest not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, and payable at such time from the date thereof as the Comptroller may determine.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman)—1.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by provisions of section 112, of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, Croton Water Main Stock of the City of New York, as authorized by chapter 865, Laws of 1873, and in accordance with a requisition of the Department of Public Works, dated March 20, 1874, one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000).

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman)—1.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue bonds of the City of New York, as provided in chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, for the purpose of providing moneys for the payment of judgments which have been, or may be, obtained against the said city, the amount of said bonds not to exceed the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), said bonds to be designated "New York City Bonds for Liquidation of Claims and Judgments," and bear interest, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, and payable at such time, within three years from the date thereof, as the Comptroller may determine.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby required to furnish to this Board as early as possible a statement of—

1st—All unexpended appropriations for the years 1871, 1872 and 1873, and showing all claims, if any, filed in the Department of Finance, made against or payable from said appropriations.

2d—The judgments paid from appropriation of \$200,000 made in 1873, and

3d—The judgments paid from appropriation of \$200,000, made in 1874.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Resolutions.

That the pay-rolls of this Department for the month of August, 1874, when approved by the Chairman of the Finance Committee, shall be duly certified by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Whereas, The locomotives of the New Haven, Harlem and Hudson River Railroads, on Fourth avenue, above Forty-second street, are a source of most serious annoyance to the residents on the avenue and on the cross streets to Lexington and Madison avenues, and of the Hudson River Railroad Company on the west side of the city, on account of the constant use of steam whistles, and the dense volumes of smoke and cinders which issue from the smoke pipes; and

Whereas, In the opinion of this Board, these nuisances are detrimental to public health; and

Whereas, This Board is of the opinion that the use of the steam whistles, except as danger signals, is unnecessary, and the production of the smoke and cinders is caused by the use of inferior semi-bituminous coal, and the neglect to use the coal consuming contrivances adopted in Europe; therefore

Resolved, That the President and Chairman of the Sanitary Committee be and hereby are appointed a Committee to confer with the Superintendents of the above mentioned railroads, and secure relief from these intolerable and unnecessary nuisances.

That the Register be directed to furnish such information to the several county medical societies in the performance of their duties, as prescribed by Chapter Laws of 1874, as he may be able, not inconsistent with the rules governing the Bureau of Vital Statistics.

That the Board of Health requires a new registration of physicians in this city to be made, and the Register is directed to prepare and report the necessary books of registry, and rules to be observed in registration.

That the Secretary be directed to obtain estimates for printing charts for the annual report of 1873.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 22, 1874:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,079, as follows:

2 public buildings, 1,115 tenement houses, 174 private dwellings, 133 other dwellings, 10 manufacturing and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 86 stables, 25 slaughter houses, 1 pier and dock, 11 fat-rendering establishments, 2 dumping-grounds, 4 public sewers and drains, 6 breweries, 1 gut-cleaning establishment, 32 sunken and vacant lots, 46 yards, courts and areas, 63 cellars and basements, 68 waste-pipes and drains, 175 privies and water-closets, 97 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 6 cisterns and cesspools, 22 other nuisances, 4 piggeries, and 20 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 832.

During the past week 79 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 68 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 52 houses, 52 privy-sinks, clothing, bedding, etc.

In addition to the regular work performed, they have disinfected Washington and Spring Street Markets once, and Catharine and Fulton Markets twice. They have also disinfected 682 privies and water-closets, 153 yards, courts, and areas, and 106 cellars and basements.

Ten cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital and 1 dead body to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits have been granted consignees of 67 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

102 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks.

26; measles, 7; diphtheria, 40; Small-pox, 18; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 4.

335 loads of night-soil were removed by night scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers, as unfit for human food, viz.: calves (bob), 1 carcass; sheep (case) 11 carcasses, lambs, 23 carcasses; beef, 40 pounds; poultry, 433 pounds; and 2,780 pounds of fish.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending August 22, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 681 burial permits for city deaths, 36 for bodies in transit, and 52 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 681 deaths, 110 marriages, 518 births, 52 still-births, 36 applications for transit permits, and 70 returns from Coroners. There were 26 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage and 19 of death were issued from this Bureau; 3 cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

Sir—In the week ending on Saturday, the 22d inst., there were 681 deaths reported in the city,

against the 722 reported, and 725 actually verified during the previous week. The gain to life, comparing the two weeks, is found to consist in the decrease in deaths, by diarrhoeal diseases, 12; by pulmonary phthisis, 19; by convulsions, and diseases of the nervous system, 6; deaths of persons over 70 years of age, 15; and infants under a year old, 5.

It was a healthful week for the season, and the decrease of mortality from diarrhoeal diseases, and in the first year of infancy, are favorable indications. The mean temperature last week was 73.9 degrees Fahr., the average humidity 57-100 of total saturation, and the mean rate of movement of the winds a little less than 100 miles daily. In this calm and dry week only 251 persons, 5 years of age and upwards, are in the list of deaths. The death-rate in the children of the city, under five years of age, was equal to 182.20 in the 1,000 annually, while for the 88.2 per cent. of the inhabitants, 5 years old and upwards, it was equivalent to 14.22 per 1,000. The death-rate in this city, the week ending on the 15th inst., was equal to 36.25 in the 1,000 yearly, and last week it was at 34.05 per 1,000. The rates of mortality and kinds of diseases reported in the cities of the United States the past six weeks, show that the present is an unusually healthful summer. In no city is any epidemic reported.

The twenty-one cities and large towns of Great Britain reported through the Registrar-General, for the week ending the 8th of August, an average death rate equal to 27 in the 1,000 yearly, but in London the rate was at 23 per 1,000; and in Liverpool at 38 per 1,000. In Paris the same week the rate was at 21, and in Berlin in the

week ending July 25, the death rate was at 50 per 1,000, and of the deaths in the latter city 69 per cent. were of infants under one year of age. This far exceeds the infantile death rate of New York, but the causes of the excess in these two cities are the same.

The Sanitary Committee respectfully report that, by a law passed May 11, 1874, it becomes the duty of County medical societies to require that "Every practitioner of medicine or surgery in this State, excepting licentiates or graduates of some medical society or chartered school, shall be required and they are hereby commanded to a certificate from the censors of some one of the several medical societies of this State, either from the County, District, or State society; which certificate shall set forth that said censors have found the person to whom it was issued qualified to practice all of the branches of the medical art mentioned in it. And such certificate must be recorded in a book provided and kept for the purpose by the County Clerk of each County in the State."

If the several County Medical Societies of the County of New York proceed in good faith to carry out the purposes of this law, an important step will be taken towards the suppression of that large class of medically uneducated practitioners, who now impose themselves upon the community to the infinite detriment of the public health. By section 5, of the Sanitary Code, it is required that "every physician in said city shall at all times cause his or her name, office and residence, and also his or her kind and class of practice, to be registered within the Bureau of Vital Statistics, and in a manner according to the regulations prescribed by this Board." The registration here required has been maintained by the register with as much completeness as possible under existing laws. This register shows that returns of deaths are made by large numbers of so called doctors who have no recognition by any class of medically educated practitioners. Though those returns of deaths had to be accredited under previous laws, equally with the returns of the most thoroughly educated practitioners, yet they had no absolute value. Under the new law it is made a misdemeanor to practice without a diploma or license from a County Medical Society. It becomes a matter therefore of the first importance that the several County Medical Societies perform their duties as required by law, and summon all practitioners of the particular to which they belong, to register their diplomas or licenses, and if they have none, to submit to the required examination. In the action of the County Medical Societies it is desirable that this Board should co-operate as far as possible by furnishing lists of practitioners registered in the Bureau of Vital Statistics. It will also become necessary for this Board to cause a new registration of physicians to be made in the Bureau of Vital Statistics after the County Medical Societies have completed their registers. The Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Register be and is hereby directed to furnish such information to the several County Medical Societies in the performance of their duties, as prescribed by chapter Laws of 1874, as he may be able, not inconsistent with the rules governing the Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Resolved, That the Board of Health requires a new registration of physicians in this city to be made, and the Register is hereby directed to prepare and report the necessary books of registry, and rules to be observed in registration.
