

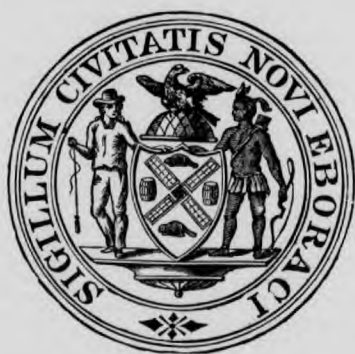

### BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, October 19, 1886.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at 2 P. M., at the office of his Honor, Mayor Grace.

Present—Mayor Grace; Commissioner Coleman of the Department of Taxes; General Newton of the Department of Public Works; Colonel Emmons Clark.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Proposals for paving about the Twelfth Regiment Armory having been duly advertised for, one bid only was deposited, John T. McDonald, \$5,700. There being no competition for the work and the proposal submitted being in excess of the Architect's estimate, on motion of Commissioner Coleman, seconded by Colonel Clark, the bid was unanimously rejected and the Secretary directed to readvertise the work.

The matter of payment to John Renehan, the plumbing contractor on the Twelfth Regiment Armory was brought up as deferred business.

Commissioner Coleman, to whom the matter had been referred, reported that the terms of the contract did not secure the City against damage to the work between the time of its completion and its delivery to the City, and that he had not been able to get drawings of the work in time to make an examination.

Mr. Renehan, the contractor, being present, voluntarily offered to allow ten per cent. to remain.

Col. Clark offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That a voucher be drawn for the additional plumbing work payment as per contract, less ten per cent.

Commissioner Coleman seconded the resolution, and it was unanimously passed.

A communication was received from Joseph J. Casey, Recording Secretary of the Harlem Democratic Club, and a communication with a petition from Charles H. Patrick, advocating the location of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory in Harlem. The papers were ordered on file.

A letter was also received and read, from Charles R. Coster, a member of the Real Estate Exchange, offering the new Coliseum Building for armory purposes. Ordered on file:

NEW YORK, September 25, 1886.

SIR—I have the honor to invite the attention of the Armory Board to the new Coliseum Building on Lexington avenue, between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets, as one suitable for the use of an infantry regiment or battery, as an armory.

The size of the building as shown by the inclosed diagram, is 100.11 by 400 feet, which gives ample space to drill by company or regiment, and without danger, as the floor is a very solid one, having been built for use as a skating rink. There is also a basement of the same size as the main floor which could be used for storage purposes, and in which are means for heating and to light the building by electricity, and at very little expense the premises could be made available for the above use.

The property is now in the hands of a receiver (Henry R. Lounsbery), but there is no question but that a long lease (ten or fifteen years) could be given or a purchase made of the property, both on most favorable terms, but the former is at present more directly presented to your Board as the receiver does not hold the property in fee, but only a seventeen-year lease thereof.

Should a favorable inspection be made of this property, any offer your Board might make would be submitted to the receiver, as no price has been definitely fixed upon, but it is thought \$8,000 per year for the Rink building, without the stores fronting on Lexington avenue, would be at present a fair rental.

A letter was received from Col. William Seward, Jr., commanding the Ninth Regiment, which was read and ordered on file:

M. COLEMAN, Esq., Secretary Armory Board, New York City:

SIR—I have the honor of calling the attention of the Armory Board to the plot of ground offered by Mr. A. Lusting, situated on Fourth avenue and Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, comprising twenty lots, and to say that, if selected, it would be perfectly satisfactory to the Ninth Regiment. Price, \$500,000.

I have also the honor of submitting for the consideration of the Board the plot of ground bounded by Eighth-sixth and Eighth-seventh streets and Eighth avenue (one-half of the whole block), comprising thirty-two lots. Price asked, \$400,000. This plot is owned by one individual, and my attention called to it by Mr. F. A. Gale, a real estate broker.

Either of the above plots will be acceptable to the Regiment in addition to the one already submitted, viz.: Bounded by New and Eighth avenues and One Hundred and Third and One Hundred and Fourth streets. I most respectfully urge the attention of the Board to the resolution passed nearly two years ago by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to the effect that immediate action be taken to provide an armory for the Ninth Regiment.

A communication was received from Captain Ferdinand P. Earle, commanding the Second Battery, which was read and ordered on file:

SECOND BATTERY, WASHINGTON LIGHT BATTERY,  
FIRST DIVISION, NATIONAL GUARD, S. N. Y.,  
NEW YORK, September 17, 1886.

Hon. WM. R. GRACE, Mayor and Chairman of the Armory Board, City and County of New York:

MY DEAR SIR—I wrote you a few days ago requesting that permission would be granted to the officers of the Second Battery to inspect plans submitted by the various architects for the armories of the Eighth Regiment and Second Battery, before any action was taken in regard to them by the Armory Board. I wrote you for the following reasons, as I understood at the last meeting of the sub-committee that they were inclined to favor the plans submitted by Mr. Thomas, Architect. The amendment to the Military Code, passed by the last Legislature, contains the following: "In the City and County of New York the demands of commandants of regiments, battalions, batteries or troops for suitable armories, or for alterations, enlargements or furnishing of armories" are herein provided for. The remainder of the paragraph simply directs and creates a Board for that purpose. The portion I wish to call your attention to is that the demands of a commandant of a battery for a suitable armory should have some weight with this Board. I went all over the plans of the different architects and submitted a report in writing, and if such report has any weight with the Board, as I think it should have, they would readily acknowledge that the plans of Mr. Thomas are entirely unsuitable for a mounted battery such as I have the honor to command. The composition of a Gatling battery is somewhat different from other batteries of this State; every man being mounted; the State supplying us with money for horse-hire, saddles and all necessary equipments for a mounted organization, which demonstrates the necessity for a menage or riding ring for mounted exercises. I am now armed with four Gatling guns, and have made a requisition for two more, and have every encouragement from the authorities that before long they will be supplied to the Second Battery. I have a larger number of men on the roll than ever before, and with every indication of one hundred and thirteen (113), the maximum of a Gatling battery.

Mr. Thomas claims that his plans were accepted by Gen. Shaler, some two years ago, but I think there must be some mistake as I do not think they are the same that were presented to me at that time. The plans so submitted simply allows us, through the courtesy of the commandant of the Eighth Regiment, the use of their large drill-room, which is entirely impracticable, as has been fully demonstrated in the quarters I now occupy. I have been in command of the battery nearly six years, and have only been able, through the courtesy of Col. Jones of the Twelfth Regiment, to use their drill-room in the neighborhood of six times during that period. The branch of the service which I command, in case of riot or trouble, would be one of the first to be called upon; and it is absolutely necessary, to make it an efficient branch, that I should have suitable quarters for mounted exercises and a large drill-room, not smaller than 100 by 200 feet, and a suitable pistol range, etc. The grounds selected for the Eighth Regiment and Second Battery is sufficiently large, if properly equalized, to give the Eighth Regiment quarters large enough for a regiment three times its size in numbers, as you will see by the report submitted by the officers of the Second Battery, which gives the Eighth Regiment larger quarters than the new armories of the Twelfth and Twenty-second Regiment.

All I ask is justice to the Second Battery and an opportunity to show the Armory Board that I am fully justified in making the statements above mentioned.

I am very much interested in this matter, and if I could have the privilege to call upon you personally, believe I could more fully demonstrate my idea in regard to this matter and convince you that the plans submitted by Mr. Thomas are entirely impracticable and unsuitable for an organization like the Second Battery.

The following letter was received from A. R. Whitney & Co., asking a payment on account of their contract work on the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building:

NEW YORK, October 19, 1886.

MICHAEL COLEMAN, Esq., Secretary:

DEAR SIR—There is due us on our first contract for the Twelfth Regiment Armory \$7,672; this contract was taken December 24, 1884. On our second contract there is due \$4,734.32, making \$12,406.32. It will not take \$500 to complete our contracts, and we would ask you to pay us \$10,000 on account.

A letter from Architect Ware was read supporting the claim and both were ordered on file. Commissioner Coleman said he understood that Messrs. Whitney expected to make a claim for some changes that had been made in the plans, and thought it proper that such claim should be adjusted before payment be made. Papers ordered on file.

DEAR SIR—As was suggested by yourself and Messrs. A. R. Whitney & Co., I would respectfully state as follows: The amounts of the two contracts for iron-work on Twelfth Regiment new armory, made by A. R. Whitney & Co., as follows, viz.:

One or two small items are yet to be executed to finish first contract, such as a few small iron shutters, hinges for entrance doors, coal-slide frame and cover—approximate value, say, \$300.

The following work is yet to be executed on second contract, viz.: Tablet (now under way), guards for front doors (must be made to suit carpenter's doors), hinges for front doors (must be made to suit carpenter's doors), iron railings for first story drill-room platforms (the above is delivered on ground but not set)—approximate value of work undone on second contract, say, \$500.

I would therefore state that the following payments on these contracts would be safe for the City, viz.:

First contract.....	\$6,500 00
Second contract.....	3,500 00

—leaving balance of \$2,406.32 on the two contracts.

Colonel Clark expressed the opinion that such a claim should have been arranged for before any expense was incurred. This opinion seemed to be concurred in by the Board, and as the same conditions exist as in the Messrs. Whitney's claim, the same disposition was made.

The Clerk was directed to notify the competing architects to remove the drawings that had been submitted.

Colonel Clark moved that the architect be directed to have a proper conductor arranged, in connection with the iron flag-staff, at an expense not exceeding fifty dollars.

Commissioner Coleman seconded the motion, and it was unanimously passed.

The meeting then adjourned.

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, NO. 300 MULBERRY STREET, }  
BUREAU OF ELECTIONS, NEW YORK, October 4, 1886. }

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, and by virtue of the authority therein conferred upon the Board of Police, the division of the several Assembly Districts in the City and County of New York into Election Districts, and the boundaries of said Election Districts are hereby fixed by said Board as follows:

*First Assembly District.*

The First Assembly District shall be divided into twenty-five election districts, the extent and limits of which shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Beaver street, Old slip, East river, Whitehall street, and Broadway.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Broadway, Battery place, and Greenwich street.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Morris street, Greenwich street, Battery place, and Washington street.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Washington street, Battery place, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Rector street, Greenwich street, Morris street, and Washington street.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Albany street, Greenwich street, Rector street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Greenwich street, Albany street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Broadway, Rector street, and Greenwich street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Maiden lane, East river, Old slip, Hanover square, William street, Beaver street, and Broadway, including Franklin Market.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Maiden lane, and Gold street.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spruce street, Gold street, Liberty street, Broadway, and Park row.

## BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York met in the Mayor's office in the City Hall, on Tuesday, September 28, 1886, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to adjournment and notice.

Present—John Newton, Commissioner of Public Works; Henry R. Beekman, President of the Department of Public Parks; Robert B. Nooney, President of the Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting of September 23 were read and approved.

The Secretary reported that on September 27 he transmitted to the Commissioner of Public Works a petition of property-owners for the opening of Dyckman street, from Harlem river to Kingsbridge road, which was referred to him for examination and report at the meeting of the Board held on September 23, 1886. That he transmitted to the Department of Public Parks, on September 27, a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board on September 23, fixing and establishing the grades of certain streets and avenues in that part of the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York bounded on the north by Fort Independence street and Montgomery avenue, on the east by Sedgwick avenue, on the south by Kingsbridge road and Emmerich place, and on the west by Bailey avenue, and requesting the Department of Public Parks to furnish the necessary maps for filing. That on September 27 he transmitted to the Department of Public Parks a petition of property-owners for the laying out upon the map of the city of a certain new street between Sixth avenue and Jerome avenue, and extending from Fordham Landing road to St. James street, which was referred to the said Department for examination and report at the meeting of the Board held on September 23, 1886. That on September 28 he transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board on September 23, 1886, amending so much of a resolution adopted on July 26, 1886, as related to acquiring title to East One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, by adding thereto the words, "and from Brook avenue to St. Ann's avenue," so as to read as follows:

4th. East One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, from Third avenue to Willis avenue, and from Brook avenue to St. Ann's avenue. Street of the first class.

The Secretary read the following communications:

From the Department of Public Parks, requesting the Board to initiate proceedings for acquiring title to the lands required for the opening of Vanderbilt avenue, from Twenty-third Ward line to One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, and One Hundred and Seventy-first, One Hundred and Seventy-second, One Hundred and Seventy-third, and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth streets and Wendover avenue, from Railroad avenue to Third avenue.

From the Health Department, upon the sanitary condition of the Mott Haven canal.

From the Department of Public Parks, requesting the initiation of proceedings for acquiring title to One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, between Vanderbilt or Railroad avenue and Third avenue, consideration of which was laid over.
