## ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

No. 27 CHAMBERS STREET,  
TUESDAY, July 25, 1882—2.30 o'clock P. M. }

The Commission, created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

Commissioners Edward Cooper (Chairman), John Kelly, Allan Campbell, George H. Andrews, and Daniel Lord, Jr.

The Clerk presented copies of the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register" of July 24 and 25, 1882, showing due publication of notices of the meeting.

The minutes of the meeting held on July 11, 1882, were read and approved.

The Clerk reported that he had filed in the Finance Department on July 12, 1882, certificates reducing assessments in the cases specified in resolution adopted by the Commission on July 11, 1882.

After hearing the Clerk, on motion of Commissioner Campbell, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That so much of the resolution adopted by the Commissioners on June 30, 1882, making an award of \$704.65 to Jacob Scholle and William Scholle (No. 3233), on account of the payment by them of assessments on certain property for the macadamizing, etc., of Sixth avenue, from One Hundred and Tenth street to Harlem river, be and the same is hereby rescinded and repealed, for the reason that an award was made by the Commissioners on April 11, 1882, for the payment of said assessment on lots known as Block No 623, Ward Nos. 68½, 69 and 70; and the Clerk is hereby directed to recall and cancel the certificate of award in this case, filed in the Finance Department on July 1, 1882.

Commissioner Andrews offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the decisions, rendered by the Commissioners on May 10 and September 15, 1881, vacating or reducing the assessments for One Hundred and Tenth to One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street underground drains, from Fifth to Eighth avenue, and sewers in Seventh avenue, from One Hundred and Twenty-first street to One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, be made the decisions of the Commissioners in the following similar cases, in which petitions have been filed, as required by chapter 550, Laws of 1880, and chapter 239, Laws of 1882, and where title to the property has been proven by the petitioners, viz.:

*Assessment for Sixty-third to Sixty-seventh street Underground Drains, between Fourth and Fifth avenues; confirmed April 16, 1873.*

Commissioner Kelly offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the decisions, rendered by the Commissioners on January 31 and February 9, 1882, reducing the assessments for Seventh avenue regulating, grading, etc., from One Hundred and Tenth street to Harlem river, and Seventh avenue paving, etc., from One Hundred and Tenth street to Harlem river, be made the decisions of the Commissioners in the following similar cases, in which petitions have been filed, as required by chapter 550, Laws of 1880, and chapter 239, Laws of 1882, and where title to the property has been proven by the petitioners, viz.:

Affirmative—Commissioners Kelly, Campbell, Andrews, and Lord—4.

Negative—Commissioner Cooper—1.

Commissioner Lord offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 10, chapter 550, Laws of 1880, and under the decisions rendered by the Commissioners in matter of Sherwood, on September 15, 1881, and January 31 and February 9, 1882, the following amounts are hereby awarded and adjudged to the following persons who had paid, prior to June 9, 1880, assessments on their property for the following improvements, the said persons having complied with the rules established by the Commission in such cases, viz.:

The question being taken, the resolution was adopted by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cooper, Kelly, Campbell, Andrews, and Lord—5.

Commissioner Cooper presented the following decision, viz.:

In matter of Robert McCafferty (No. 2425), assessment for regulating, grading, etc., Ninetieth street, from Eighth to Tenth avenue, confirmed December 29, 1876.

We decide, after hearing the case, that the price for filling, namely, 85 cents per cubic yard, agreed upon by counsel, is a fair price for the work, and that the assessment should be reduced by the difference between 85 cents and \$1.49 per cubic yard of filling, being a reduction of 30 per cent. on the whole assessment. The other items in the assessment list should stand.

The Chairman put the question whether the decision as presented shall stand as the decision of the Commissioners.

Which was decided in the affirmative, a majority of all the Commissioners voting in favor thereof, viz.:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cooper, Kelly, Campbell, Andrews, and Lord—5.

Commissioner Campbell presented the following decision, viz.:

In matter of John Paine (No. 3315), assessment for Eleventh avenue paving, from Fifth-ninth to Sixty-fifth street, confirmed April 18, 1879.

We think that no substantial injustice has been done the petitioner by the assessment, inasmuch as the petitioner does not appear to have been assessed more than the fair cost for laying the pavement in front of his property. The application must therefore be denied.

The Chairman put the question whether the decision as presented shall stand as the decision of the Commissioners.

Which was decided in the affirmative, a majority of all the petitioners voting in favor thereof, viz.:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cooper, Campbell, and Andrews—3.

Negative—Commissioners Kelly and Lord—2.

(Commissioner Kelly, in explanation of his vote said: "My opinion of the matter is, that it is one general improvement, and any reduction of the assessment for the reason that the Railroad Company should, under its agreement with the city, pay the expense of paving twenty-five feet of the avenue, should apply to each lot assessed for the pavement. All the owners of property along the line of the street should be assessed equally.")

(Commissioner Lord, in explanation of his vote said: "The owners of the property beyond the line of the railroad were certainly injured to a certain extent, for the reason that the assessment was distributed by the Assessors pro rata over the entire area of the improvement and not in accordance with the work done in front of each lot. I therefore think that all the lots along the line of the street should share pro rata in any reduction.")

Commissioner Andrews presented the following decision, viz.:

In matter of William C. Lester (No. 382), assessment for Second avenue paving, from Eighty-sixth to One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, confirmed August 25, 1873.

We think that this case comes clearly within the principle of the decision made by the Commissioners in matter of Mott, April 11, 1882, and that substantial injustice has been done the petitioner by charging him with the cost of "paving in and about the tracks," which, under the resolution of the Common Council granting the right to lay tracks in Second avenue, should have been paid by the Railroad Company; therefore the assessment should be reduced by an amount equal to the cost of the pavement "in and about the tracks," being \$27,577.40, or 12.89 per cent. of the assessment.

The Chairman put the question whether the decision as presented shall stand as the decision of the Commissioners.

Which was decided in the affirmative, a majority of all the Commissioners voting in favor thereof, viz.:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cooper, Kelly, Campbell, Andrews, and Lord—5.

Commissioner Campbell presented the following decision, viz.:

In matter of Amos R. Eno (No. 3221), assessment for Fifty-sixth street Nicholson pavement, from Seventh to Ninth avenue, confirmed May 4, 1871.

We think that this case comes within the principle of the decision in matter of Bacon, rendered May 24, 1881, page 73, and matter of Pinchot, decided July 13, 1881, page 93.

The average cost of contracts for Belgian pavement at about the time this pavement was laid appears from the proofs to have been \$3.45 per square yard, and 97 cents per square foot for bridge-stone; the assessment should therefore be reduced from the price of \$5.00 per square yard for wooden pavement, and \$1.50 for bridge-stone, to \$3.45 per square yard for pavement, and 97 cents per square foot for bridge-stone, making a reduction of \$8,308.89, or 29.18 per cent. of the assessment.

The Chairman put the question whether the decision as presented shall stand as the decision of the Commissioners.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, a majority of all the Commissioners voting in favor thereof, viz.:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cooper, Campbell, Andrews and Lord—4.

Negative—Commissioner Kelly—1.

(Commissioner Kelly, in explanation of his vote, said: "I vote 'no,' because no application had been made by the property-owners to the Common Council to pave the street with wooden pavement, and there was no real necessity for paving the street in the year 1870, and the owners of the property should only be forced to pay the cost of the pavement put down in the year 1874, and not the cost of Belgian pavement put down in 1870.")

On motion of Commissioner Cooper the Commission then adjourned.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK. BY ORDER OF HUBERT O. THOMPSON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

"The said Commissioner of Public Works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of Croton water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law."—Chap. 574, Sec. 5, Session Laws of 1871.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

Croton Water Rates for Buildings from 16 to 50 feet, all others not specified subject to Special Rates, as established by Ordinance of the Common Council, March, 1851.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family the sum of one dollar per year shall be charged.

Each flat or suit of rooms for one family shall be charged ten dollars per year where they have hot and cold water, stationary wash-tubs, bath, and water-closet, with the privilege of using meter.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be follows, to wit:

BAKERIES—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, the sum of three dollars per annum.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding houses, bathing establishments, and barber shops.

BOARDING SCHOOLS shall be charged at the rate of from fifteen to fifty dollars each; and school houses at the rate of from ten to twenty dollars each per annum.

BUILDING PURPOSES—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COW STABLES—For each and every cow, the sum of seventy-five cents per annum.

FOUNTAINS or jets are prohibited.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

HORSES, PRIVATE—For two horses there shall be charged the sum of six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, the sum of two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, the sum of one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, the sum of one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART—For each horse, the sum of one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS—For each trough on sidewalks the sum of twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste, this must be kept in order.

HOTELS and BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PORTER HOUSES, TAVERNS and GROCERIES shall be charged an extra rate of either ten to twenty-five dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works, LAGER BEER SALOONS, with no water fixtures in the saloon, five dollars per annum.

PRINTING OFFICES and RECTORIES shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SLAUGHTER HOUSES shall be charged at the rate of five cents for every bullock slaughtered.

STEAM ENGINES shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: for each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; or each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, and about stables, is prohibited, because it is absolutely necessary to save water for more necessary purposes. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the Police or Inspectors may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

WATER-CLOSETS and URINALS—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge, each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets or urinals in which the Croton water from any service pipe or hydrant connecting with a privy vault or man-hole shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

WATER-CLOSET RATES—For hoppers, of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each per year twenty dollars.

For any pan-closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe waste, as provided by the Board of Health Regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

#### METERS.

Under the provisions of section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873 (City Charter), water meters, of the pattern approved in accordance with said section 73 of the Charter, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, a wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet for all manufacturing or other purposes.

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

SIR—From your letter of this date, in reference to certain rates included in the scale of water rents established by me on the 1st instant, it appears that there is a misapprehension in regard to their application. In order that the matter may be clearly understood, I have to inform and instruct you that the new rates in reference to water-closets are not intended to and do not apply to existing houses and fixtures, but will be applied to all new houses hereafter erected or completed, and to all existing houses where the water-closets and fixtures therein referred may hereafter be put in. These water-closet rate are to go into general effect May 1, 1883.
