WORK PERFORMED BY THE SANITARY BUREAU

During the Quarter ending December 31, 1904.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools;

The number of inspections and reinspections made was 423,990, classified as follows:

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M., on Wednesday, April 12, 1905.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain, and Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen.

The Mayor called for a hearing the matter of the proposed purchase and operation by the City of a municipal ferry between the foot of Whitehall street, Manhattan, and Thirty-ninth street, South Brooklyn. (See pages ; also minutes of 1903, pages 715, 1239, 1241, 1244, 1278.)

The following named gentlemen were heard at length in favor of the proposition:

Hon. William C. DeWitt in behalf of Dr. Joseph J. O'Connell, estate of Daniel Ryan and other property holders; Mr. Henry B. S. Hebert, President of the New York Produce Exchange; Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom; Mr. C. C. Shayne, President of the Merchants and Manufacturers' Board of Trade of New York; Mr. L. B. Seaver, representing the West End Board of Trade; Mr. Alexander Smith, Superintendent of the Maritime Exchange; Hon. William C. Redfield; Mr. H. D. Dumont, representing the Merchants' Association of New York; Mr. William T. Donnelly, representing the Manufacturers' Association; Mr. Elmer White, representing the Truck Owners of South Brooklyn; Rev. William N. Ackley; Rev. Dr. McDonald; Edward Hinman.

Mr. M. C. O'Sullivan spoke against the proposition.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, by the unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, That the interests of The City of New York will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of the ferry from the foot of Whitehall street, Manhattan, to Thirty-ninth street, South Brooklyn, in the manner provided in the Greater New York Charter; and it is

Resolved, by the unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, To acquire the necessary real estate, property, plant or equipment for such ferry, including the necessary terminal facilities and approaches upon the water front in the Borough of Manhattan, and to provide for the maintenance and operation thereof, under the supervision of the Commissioner of Docks, in the name of and for the benefit of The City of New York, upon a plan to be devised by him and approved by the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Which was laid on the table.

The Comptroller presented the following report relative to the manner of operation of the new Staten Island Ferry:

APRIL 8, 1905.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Within a few months, five, probably, The City of New York will be in complete possession of the boats, old and new, with the ferry terminals and houses of the Staten Island Ferry, which will then be complete and ready for operation. As yet, however, no plans have been made as to the manner in which the said ferry owned by The City of New York is to be operated. There are but two ways that I know of. Either the City may operate the boats directly, employing itself all the help necessary, or it may contract with some person or corporation for a longer or shorter period to operate and manage the ferries. In either event there

are many questions to be considered: The practical question as to what method will be more desirable as a matter of business; the question of what rules of the law will apply either in case of direct operation or the letting of contract, as to the employment of employees, the hours of labor, the rates of pay, etc.; in the case of a contract for operation of the ferry, which it is estimated cannot be operated except at a loss, there may be legal question as to the form of contract to be made, the City's power to reimburse the contractor for the loss, how the same is to be ascertained, and in what manner the contract is to be let.

There has been, I believe, neither any recommendation and report from the Dock Department as to its views upon the practical and business aspects of the questions presented, nor any opinion from the Law Department as to the legal aspects of the questions presented. I beg to suggest that it is time that we should communicate with both of these departments and get the fullest information possible as a preliminary to determining what is the best business course available for the City.

On motion, a copy of the report was ordered transmitted to the Commissioner of Docks and to the Corporation Counsel, with a request that they take up the matter as suggested in the report, and furnish the Board with the fullest information possible.

The Committee of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund appointed to recommend a policy to be followed by the City in future with reference to leases of unimproved water front property presented the following report:

APRIL 3, 1905.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—In regard to the leasing of the bulkheads at the foot of streets where there has been no improvement under the new plan for long terms, I would report:

The rent-rolls of the Dock Department for the years 1899, 1900, 1901 and 1902 show the leases for unimproved bulkheads on the North and East rivers as follows: 22 of 40 leases, or about 55 per cent., were revocable at the pleasure of the Board; 32, or 80 per cent., were either revocable at the pleasure of the Board or for a term of two years; 2 were for a term of three years each, 2 for five years, 3 for ten years, and 1 for twenty years. This shows that it has been the policy of the City heretofore to issue permits or short-term leases.

The leases of unimproved bulkheads in the vicinity of East Forty-seventh street, as shown by the rent-rolls of the Dock Department, are as follows:

East Thirtieth street, William Hastorf, \$250. Pleasure of Board.
East Fortieth street, John Fleming, \$600, \$630. Twenty years to 1921.
East Forty-third street, Lehigh Valley Railroad, \$400. Pleasure of Board.
East Forty-fourth street, Lehigh Valley Railroad, \$800. Pleasure of Board.
East Forty-fifth street, Schwarzschild & Co., \$600. Two years to 1907.
East Forty-seventh street, Owens & Co., and return, \$900. Permit to May 1, 1905.

East Forty-eighth street, New York City Milling Company, \$640. Two years to 1904.

When the City is obliged to rent bulkheads from private parties for the use of its departments a much larger rental is usually demanded than the City receives from similar property of its own in the vicinity.

The Commissioner of Street Cleaning, under date of October 22, 1904, applied to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the approval of a lease of a dumping board near the foot of East Fourteenth street, facing the southern bulkhead, for a term of six months at the rate of \$12 per day, or \$4,380 per annum. At this point, viz., at the foot of East Fourteenth street, the City owns 111 feet of bulkhead, which is leased for an annual rental of \$525, or about one-eighth of the rental in the proposed lease.

This was pointed out by the Engineer of the Finance Department in a report of December 9, 1904, wherein it was proposed to cancel the lease for the bulkhead at foot of East Fourteenth street and construct a dump between the present bulkhead and the pier and bulkhead-line as established. Such a method would have saved the City a considerable sum in rental.

In reply to this suggestion, a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, dated December 27, 1904, from Charles J. Collins, Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, stated:

"The Commissioner of Street Cleaning has stated that the same" (meaning the "bulkhead at the foot of East Fourteenth street") "would not meet his requirements" in that he needs a length of at least double the length of the said bulkhead, so that "two scows could be berthed at the dumping board at one time."

This objection could be removed if a platform were built out from the present bulkhead, giving room for two scows to be berthed at one time on either side.

Mr. Collins further says:

"The City as a landlord, it seems, would hardly be acting in good faith were it to cancel the lease made a few years ago with a tenant, who no doubt has established his business in the vicinity, and where the cancellation of the lease might put the City's tenant to considerable financial loss. Further than this, the intent of the clause which permits of the cancellation of the lease has been construed to mean that the cancellation can be made only where the premises are required for improvement under a new plan legally adopted."

The usual form of lease of the Dock Department contains the following clause, referred to in Mr. Collins' letter:

"And the said part of the second part further covenant and agree that if at any time during the term hereby created the said Board of Docks shall determine to proceed with the work of building or rebuilding wharves, piers, bulkheads, basins, docks or slips within a section or district of the water front which shall include the wharf property hereinbefore described, according to any plan or plans now adopted and approved, or which may hereafter be adopted and approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, and if the said Board shall determine that, for the purpose of such building or rebuilding, it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the part of the second part in the wharfage and crange to arise, accrue or become due from the said wharf property, or from any part thereof, or if at any time during the term hereby created, the said Board of Docks shall determine that the said wharf property, or any part thereof, shall be used for some other purpose than for the purpose of the collection of wharfage and crange, and that it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the part of the second part in such wharfage and crange, then upon the receipt by the said part of the second part of written notice of a resolution of the said Board of Docks to that effect, describing the wharf property, or the part thereof affected thereby, the interest of the said part of the second part in said wharfage and crange and in the said wharf property or part thereof under this lease shall be thereby terminated, and the rent hereby reserved shall cease from the date of the receipt of such notice, and no claim for damages or compensation in favor of said part of the second part by reason of the termination of such interest in said wharfage and crange or wharf property, or for damages or injury to any steam or sailing vessel or water craft moored thereto, or on, in or about the same, or to or on account of any structures or improvements that may have been erected or made by said part of the second part, shall at any time be made by the said part of the second part, or by any person or persons whomsoever."

It would appear, then, that the City might re-enter at any time, if it should decide to improve the water front or use the bulkhead so leased for other purposes than for the collection of wharfage, as, for instance, for the use of one of the departments of the City.

It has been found, however, that a lessee of such property will, if the property be valuable, use all possible means to prevent the City from canceling the lease, as in the case of the New York Contracting and Trucking Company, the lessee of the old pier at the foot of West Seventy-ninth street.

The value of bulkhead property may change very materially in the course of a few years, and as a rule it is enhancement in value rather than deterioration. Notable examples of this are:

East Forty-fifth street was occupied by Schwarzschild & Sulzberger Co. in 1900 for \$400 per annum. They now pay \$600 per annum for the same under a two-year lease.

East Forty-seventh street was leased by Owens & Co. for three years to December 1, 1904, for \$750 per annum. They are now paying \$900 per annum, under a permit, to May 1, 1905.

East Forty-eighth street was occupied by American Malting Company in 1900, under a permit, for \$475 per annum. It is now occupied by the New York City Malting Company, under a two-year lease, at \$640 per annum.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that in order to protect the City in case additional bulkhead at any time is required for its own use, to carry out the City's policy heretofore in this matter, and to be able to provide for an increase of rental as the property increases in value, the City should not grant long term leases but issue only permits, or at most two to three year leases.

Committee of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

April 7, 1905

The Dock Commissioner spoke against the advisability of carrying out the recommendation contained in the report.

Discussion of the matter followed.

On motion of the President of the Board of Aldermen, the report was accepted, ordered placed on file, and the Committee discharged.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, relative to a lease of the bulkhead at the foot of Forty-seventh street, East river, to Messrs. Owens & Company:

NEW YORK, March 14, 1905.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—The bulkhead at the foot of East Forty-seventh street, East river, has been occupied by Messrs. Owens & Co. for the past thirty-three years, the last lease of the premises having been granted in December, 1901, for a term of three years from December 1, 1901, at an annual rental of \$750, which lease expired on December 1, 1904.

Owens & Co. now occupy the premises under a temporary permit and are paying rental at the rate of \$900 per annum; this permit expires May 1, 1905.

I am in receipt of a communication from Owens & Co. asking a new lease of the premises, and hereby recommend that a new lease be granted for a term of five years from May 1, 1905, at a rental of \$1,000 per annum, the lease to contain the privilege of a renewal term of five years at an advance of ten per cent. over the rental for the first term. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease are to be similar in every respect to those contained in the form of lease now in use by this Department.

The premises at the foot of East Forty-seventh street occupied by Owens & Co. consist of a bulkhead platform erected thereat. This platform has a return along the southerly line of Forty-seventh street, East river, about 112 feet in length; an examination of the premises shows that in addition to small length of space available at the outer end of the platform, the violent currents practically preclude berthing thereat, and but one boat can be berthed along the return.

The following rentals are now being paid for bulkheads in that vicinity occupied under lease or permit from this Department:

Foot of East Fortieth street—Brown & Fleming, at \$640 per annum.

Foot of East Forty-third street—Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, at \$400 per annum.

Foot of East Forty-fourth street—Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, at \$800 per annum.

Foot of East Forty-fifth street—Schwarzschild & Sulzberger Company, at \$400 per annum.

Foot of East Forty-eighth street—New York City Milling Company, at \$640 per annum.

From the above it will be seen that the rental proposed to be charged Owens & Co. is much higher than those charged in the vicinity.

It is questionable to my mind if it be in the interest of the City to radically change the policy heretofore pursued and make a lease for a term of ten years of this bulkhead, and I would suggest that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease for two years at \$1,000 per annum.

The Chamberlain moved that the lease be authorized for a term of five years.

Which was not agreed to.

The Comptroller then offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to Messrs. Owens & Co. of the bulkhead at the foot of Forty-seventh street, East river, Borough of Manhattan, for a term of three years from May 1, 1905, at a rental of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per annum; the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar in every respect to those contained in the form of lease now in use by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a lease of the bulkhead at the foot of Forty-fifth street, East river, to the Schwarzschild & Sulzberger Company:

APRIL 1, 1905.

Hon. N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Secretary, Sinking Fund Commission, City Hall, New York City:

DEAR SIR—On behalf of my client, the Schwarzschild & Sulzberger Company, I recently made an application to the Department of Docks and Ferries for a five years lease, with the privilege of a five years renewal, of the bulkhead located at Forty-fifth street and the East river. Since that time I have been informed that the Dock Department recommended the giving of this lease, but that your Commission has approved a lease for two years only.

I would respectfully request that your Commission reconsider this matter, and grant a five years' lease. I base my request upon the following facts:

The Schwarzschild & Sulzberger Company is the owner of the two square blocks with the water front located between Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth streets, Forty-fifth and Forty-sixth streets, First avenue and the East river. The bulkhead in question lies between these two blocks. The company is willing at any time, provided the bulkhead is needed by The City of New York for any of its own purposes, to consent to cancel any lease which your body might make, and desires the five years as above requested, merely for the purpose of protecting it against any attempt on the part of competitors from interfering with or destroying its business.

The question of the rental as arranged for by the Dock Department is satisfactory to the company, and the company feels that, owing to its ownership, as above stated, of the property, The City of New York could well consent to this lease without injury to itself.

I hope that your body will consent to make this change by granting a five years lease, and am,

I am now informed that Mr. Cahn withdraws the request for a five-year lease, and asks that a three-year term be granted.

I see no objection to this course, and recommend that the resolution adopted March 22, 1905, be amended by substituting a three-year term for the two-year term as previously adopted.

In connection therewith the Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held March 22, 1904, approving of and consenting to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the Schwarzschild & Sulzberger Company, of the bulkhead at the foot of Forty-fifth street, East river, Borough of Manhattan, for a term of two years, from April 1, 1905, at an annual rental of six hundred dollars (\$600), the lease to contain the usual covenants and conditions embodied in leases of wharf property now in use by the Department of Docks and Ferries, be and the same is hereby amended by substituting "three years" as the term, in place of "two years."

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Auditor of Accounts, Investigations Division, Department of Finance, in the matter of the investigation relative to the receipts and disbursements of the Union Ferry Company from 1891 to 1905: (See page).

APRIL 11, 1905.

"INVESTIGATIONS."

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—I beg to transmit herewith certain statements showing generally the receipts and disbursements of the Union Ferry Company of New York and Brooklyn for the years ending October 31, 1902, October 31, 1903, October 31, 1904, and for the four months beginning November 1, 1904, and ending February 28, 1905; also, in detail, the receipts as collected by the various ferries from 1891 to 1904, inclusive, and the cost of repairs from 1891 to 1904, inclusive.

General Remarks.

The Union Ferry Company of New York and Brooklyn became possessed of the property, rights and franchises of the old Union Ferry Company in 1890. Early in 1891 the present company applied to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a renewal of its lease, which expired on April 30, 1891. Preliminary to this new lease the property was appraised at \$3,803,000. In the spring of 1891, E. G. McClave, of New York, brought suit to restrain the City from accepting the amount of \$3,803,000 as a proper appraisal of the ferry company's property. McClave's suit was later joined in by The City of New York, and Chief Justice Daly, in the Court of Common Pleas in June, 1892, handed down a decision in which the following was determined by the Courts to be a fair appraisal of the company's property:

The lease made with the ferry company by the City at this time fixed the rental to be paid to the City at 7 3/4 per cent. of the gross receipts of the ferry company from traffic. This lease expired in May, 1901. On May 17, 1901, the franchise of this company was offered for sale at auction by the Department of Docks and Ferries, but no bid was received. Previous to this sale, at a meeting of the Sinking Fund Commissioners, held May 3, 1901, the amount of \$3,229,401 was fixed as the amount which the successful bidder for the franchise should pay for the Union Ferry Company's property. At this auction sale the upset price fixed by the Board of Docks, and subsequently approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, was \$88,403.18 per annum, or 11.65 per cent. of the gross receipts from traffic during the previous year. This sum, as proposed by the Dock Board, was regarded by the Engineer of the Department of Finance in his report to the Comptroller as too high, and he predicted that no bids would be received if such terms were fixed. The matter was referred back to the Dock Department, but the sum was not changed, and at the sale no bids were received.

Since May 1, 1901, the ferry company has had no lease from the City, and the Corporation Counsel, in an opinion dated November 13, 1902, has held that the company was a hold-over tenant, and as such was liable for the rental at the rate of 7 3/4 per cent. per annum on its gross receipts since the expiration of its old lease.

SCHEDULE "A."

Receipts and Disbursements, November 1, 1901, to February 28, 1905.

The examination, the result of which is shown in Schedule A, has comprised a careful analysis of a number of accounts for each of the years noted on the side of the disbursements, and on the side both of receipts and disbursements an examination of cash book, check books and bank books of the company, used in its ordinary business. The accounts of the company, so far as examined, are kept in an extremely simple and clear form, in relation both to the receipts and disbursements, and close watch appears to have been kept as to prices paid for supplies purchased and as to the expense of skilled and other labor used in the maintenance and repair of the company's plant.

Disbursements—Maintenance.

Schedule A, items 1 to 12, shows an increase in the cost of maintenance due largely to the increased cost of wages of Pilots, Engineers and Firemen. The total increase in maintenance for the last two years over 1902 has amounted to about \$19,000 per annum, of which amount \$15,000 is due to increased wages, as previously noted.

Disbursements—Repairs.

The cost of repairs, items 13 to 23, of Schedule A, has increased as between 1902 and 1904 by about \$50,000. This increase is largely in item No. 13, which is the cost of the repair of boats. The increased cost in the repair of boats in 1904 is due to the large amount of ice in the river in the winter of that year. The heavy ice of the present winter is also reflected in a considerable charge for repair of boats during the four months since November 1, 1904, and it is safe to assume that the cost of repairs of boats for the fiscal year ending October 31, 1905, will be as large, if not larger, than the cost for the year ending October 31, 1904.

Disbursements—Accident and Damage.

Those charges which have been classified in Schedule A as accident and damage, Items Nos. 24, 25 and 26, were nominal in 1902, 1903 and 1904, but are made heavy for the four months ending February 28, 1905, by the "Columbia" collision, which has already cost the company in excess of \$200,000 and, when all paid, will probably approximate a charge of \$30,000 for this one accident alone. The ferry company carries its own marine insurance.

Disbursements—Fixed Charges.

It will be noted, Item No. 30 under this head, that the ferry company during the past three years and four months has charged itself with the full amount of its rental to the City, had it continued under the old rate of 7 3/4 per cent. on its gross receipts. This has been done by the ferry company as a precaution that the money might be in hand in the event of the contention of the City that the ferry company was a hold-over at its old rental being maintained in the courts.

I am informed by the Dock Department that since May 1, 1901, the date of the termination of the last lease of the ferry company, a payment of \$50,000 on account of rental to the City has been made. This payment was made under date of June 5,

1903. Schedule A of this report, showing the operation of the company for only part of the year 1901, namely, from November 1, 1901, does not show the total arrearage of the ferry company to the City for the interval. The balance sheet of the ferry company, furnished to me for the purpose of this examination, fixes the amount payable to the City as of date October 31, 1904, at \$163,608.32, so that this latter amount, instead of the three amounts for the three years ending October 31, 1904, as shown by Schedule A, Item No. 30, represents the amount at present due.

Item No. 27, representing the payment of interest on the bonded debt of the company, will be treated later in a paragraph relative generally to the amount properly chargeable by the company for the use of its plant.

Item No. 29 under this heading, namely, City tax on realty, shows a reduction in the year 1904 as compared with the year 1902 of approximately \$18,000. This is due largely to the readjustment of taxes in Brooklyn, the tax on the ferry company's property not having been increased, while the tax rate has been considerably reduced.

Item No. 30 is for property leased from private persons and used by the ferry company, the rents of which have been slightly increased.

Net Earnings.

The net earnings of the company, as shown by Item No. 34, have decreased from \$129,487.92 in 1902 to \$67,319.68 in 1904. As a result of operations of the company of the first four months of its fiscal year beginning November 1, 1904, the company shows a deficit of \$39,149.25, and this also in spite of the fact that at its last dividend period the company passed its usual dividend of 2 per cent. on its \$3,000,000 of stock.

Ferry Receipts.

There has been no material change in the receipts of the ferry company from operation during the years 1902, 1903 and 1904. In fact the receipts of 1903 were somewhat larger than those of the previous year. The receipts of 1904 were about \$9,000 less than those of 1902. Schedule B, attached to this report, shows the receipts of the ferry from operation for the years from 1891 to 1904, inclusive. According to this statement, the receipts of the fiscal year ending October 31, 1904, are only slightly less than nine per cent. below the receipts of the year ending October 31, 1891. The receipts of the four months beginning November 1, 1904, are \$6,811.54 less than the receipts for the same interval beginning November 1, 1903, and \$13,340.63 less than for the same period beginning November 1, 1902, and \$8,410.28 less than for the same period beginning November 1, 1901.

On the basis of the falling off in ferry receipts shown for the four months beginning November 1, 1904, it may be safely estimated that the total reduction for the year 1905 below that of 1904 will approximate \$25,000. If the reduction is not greater than this it will not constitute a material reduction in the revenue from this source so far as the present fiscal year is concerned. I think it is safe to assume that the receipts from ferry traffic during the present fiscal year of the company will not fall below \$750,000.

Miscellaneous Receipts.

Item No. 3, Charter account, is for the lease of boats to other ferry companies, and is by no means a fixed amount, averaging something over \$8,000 per year. This item was considerably more in 1904, namely, \$13,415.10.

Item No. 4, rents receivable, includes two considerable items and several small items. The largest item is \$22,500 a year, on contract with John J. Gilroy for the advertising and news privileges in the ferry houses of the company. This contract has about a year longer to run. The next largest item is the contract of V. A. & M. A. Catoggio, bootblackening privilege, \$6,000 per year, with about a year longer to run. I am informed by Secretary Hyatt that a considerable reduction in the value of these two privileges has occurred in the past few years and that if renewed the contract will be at a much lower figure. The other items making up the amount of \$38,896.96 of rents receivable for 1904 are for dock and house rents of various amounts from \$2,100 to \$156 per annum.

Investments and Cash Balances of the Company.

The trial balance of the ferry company for the year ending October 31, 1904, shows the following items of investments and cash:

I am informed by Secretary Hyatt that the present company received from its predecessors an amount approximating \$251,000, represented by holdings of Brooklyn City stock and cash. The two amounts of \$281,500, New York City Bond Account, and the \$110,000, Loan Account, approximately represent \$163,608.32 of moneys which may be due to The City of New York for rent during the three years ending October 31, 1904, and entered in Schedule A on the expense side as item No. 30, and an increase in profit and loss balance amounting to \$228,284.09, this said amount of \$228,284.09, representing a total surplus of the company for the years beginning October 31, 1894, and ending October 31, 1904.

The company began paying dividends of 4 per cent. on its \$3,000,000 of capital stock in 1894 and continued to do so until October 1, 1898, since which time 2 per cent. per annum has been paid on the capital stock (see Item No. 36, on the disbursement side of Schedule A). No dividend was declared or paid on April 1, 1905. Of the \$228,284.09 of surplus accumulated by the company since 1894, \$144,309.64 has been saved by the reduction of the dividend from four to two per cent., as previously noted.

In brief, therefore, the profit and loss surplus of the company at present appears to be approximately as follows, exclusive of moneys held as payable to The City of New York:

Conclusions.

As a result of the examination so far made, I am of the opinion that as a basis for continuing operation after May 1, 1905, the Judge Daly appraisal of \$3,229,401 should be accepted as representing the investment of the ferry company used in the operation of its ferries. It may be that some considerable reduction may have ensued since 1892 in the value of some part of the company's plant, but it is fair to assume that its valuable real estate holdings at Atlantic Ferry and Hamilton Ferry have increased in value. Moreover, the ferry company has annually made very large disbursements for the repair of its boats and ferry houses, an aggregate for the past fourteen years of over \$1,700,000, as shown in detail in Schedule C. Of this amount, a sum exceeding fifty per cent. of the appraised value of the boats in 1892 has been expended in maintaining the boats since that time.

Use of the Judge Daly appraisal in this connection should not be an estoppel upon the City to demanding a new appraisal in the event of the City deciding to buy the property of the ferry company at some future time.

First—Accepting the Judge Daly appraisal for the purpose of this accounting, a fair allowance for the use of the investment of the company would seem to be its interest of \$110,000 per annum on its bonds and a two per cent. allowance of dividends on its stock, representing in all a five per cent. allowance on \$2,200,000 of the company's bonds and an equivalent of six per cent. on \$1,000,000 value additional.

Second—It would seem to me only fair, in view of the receipts of the company for the three years ending October 31, 1904, and in view of the fact that in each of those three years a balance in favor of the company is shown, after paying two per cent. on its stock and all other charges, that the ferry company, as a condition precedent to continuing business after May 1, 1905, should, without further litigation, turn over to the City \$163,608.32, representing the balance of rent due at the rate of 7 3/4 per cent. for the interval from May 1, 1901, to October 31, 1904.

In making these recommendations I do not lose sight of the fact that the ferry company will use docks and wharves and wharfage privileges belonging to the City, which are of grant value and would return a large rent to the City if used for other than ferry purposes, but it would seem to be obvious that these ferries must be continued for the convenience of the public, irrespective of whatever gain might result to the City should the ferries be abandoned and the docks used for other purposes.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Mr. Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, in a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of April 4, 1905, says:

"I enclose herewith a copy of a communication received by me from Mr. Joseph Pickard, Property Clerk, relative to additional office accommodation for the engineering forces, which now occupies rooms in building Nos. 765 and 767 Tremont avenue, and suggesting that room No. 1, now vacant, on the same floor and immediately adjoining those now occupied by said Bureau, be secured at a rental of \$40 per month. I respect-

fully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the Comptroller to secure the lease of the room from the first day of May next."

Property Clerk Joseph Pickard, in his letter accompanying the communication, says that the room is asked for by Chief Engineer Briggs for additional office accommodations for the engineering force, which now occupies the adjoining rooms, and that the rent asked by the owner, Martin Walter, \$40 per month, is, in his opinion, not unreasonable. After an examination of the premises, I have to report as follows:

This is a front, ell-shaped room on the second floor of the Walter Building, Nos. 765-767 Tremont avenue, and measures 32.8 by 16.6 by 16.8 by 5.5 by 16 by 11.1, and contains 456½ square feet. The City already has under lease the remainder of this floor, 1,650 square feet, divided into three large rooms and occupied by three engineers of construction in the Bureau of Highways. In my opinion the present force has ample office space in the rooms already occupied. The rental paid by the City for the 1,650 square feet is \$1,200 a year, or at the rate of \$0.72 a square foot. Room No. 1 is at present occupied by Dr. F. E. Buckley, a dentist, who is to move out May 1; and who, I am informed, has been paying \$40 a month. I know of no reason, however, why the City should pay a higher rate for this room than it is paying for the remainder of the floor. If it is claimed that this is a front room it may be said that the City already has the larger and better front room adjoining. The rent of this room, figured at \$0.72 per square foot (the same rate as paid for the balance of the floor), would be \$330 a year, or \$27.50 a month, which, in my opinion, is its present full rental value.

I would respectfully recommend that, inasmuch as there is sufficient room at present for the force now in the building, the request of the President of the Borough of The Bronx be denied until his office force is so increased as to require additional accommodation.

SIR—Thomas Crimmins, in a communication under date of March 17, 1905, writes that he desires to purchase the property owned by the City which is located on the north side of Fifty-eighth street, 120 feet east of Broadway, upon which is now erected a building used as quarters by Engine Company 23, and offers as an upset price the sum of \$75,000. The Commissioner of the Fire Department, in a communication under date of March 30, states that he will turn over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the purpose of sale at public auction the premises desired by Mr. Crimmins when he is able to remove from this house to the new house further east, but desires that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall insert in the terms of the sale a clause to the effect that the premises are sold subject to the use, free of rent or other charges, of the Fire Department until such time as the new premises are ready for occupancy.

SIR—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund conclude a lease of premises owned by John Augustus Delany, at No. 212 East Twenty-sixth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, in the State of New York. The property is a plot of ground 28 feet wide by 100 feet deep, upon which is a three-story dwelling house with a three-story building in the rear, each building being approximately 28 feet wide by 40 feet deep. The term of the proposed lease is three years from May 1, 1905, with the privilege of renewal. The rental is to be \$1,600 per annum, payable monthly in advance. The alterations and repairs necessary in the two houses include the installation of a heating plant, the repairing of floors and windows and painting throughout, and will cost approximately \$3,000. Brannan, President of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, in a communication addressed to the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requests the consent and approval of the Commissioners to a lease of the premises owned by John Augustus Delany, No. 212 East Twenty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, for a period of three years from May 1, 1905, with the privilege of renewal at an annual rental of \$1,600, payable monthly, to provide the necessary accommodations for twenty additional nurses who are needed to care for the patients of Bellevue Hospital. He states that the premises are the most reasonable that can be secured, and that the rental is to be provided for by the issue of special revenue bonds authorized by the Board of Aldermen, February 7, 1905, and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, March 3, 1905. The owner is to deliver the property in good condition as to plumbing and gas fixtures, and keep the outside of the buildings in good repair during the term of the lease, the alterations and repairs necessary in the two houses (front and rear), which will include the installation of a heating plant, the repairing of floors and windows and painting throughout, to be done and paid for by the City. The owner is to pay the taxes, but the water rent, light, heat and janitor service are to be paid for by the City.

The original rent asked for this property was \$1,700 per annum. The owner has now consented to take \$1,600. The lot upon which the two buildings are erected is 28 by 98 feet 9 inches, on the south side of East Twenty-sixth street, 185 feet east of Third avenue. There is an old, three-story and basement brick, cold water tenement, 28 by 40, erected on the front of the lot, while a three-story brick factory building, used as a wicker chair and basket factory, is erected on the rear end of the lot. The front building has no improvements except gas and water. Whatever toilets there are are in the basement.

The rent asked, under the present conditions, is in my opinion full value, the property not being worth over \$17,000; but, inasmuch as it is impossible to secure the quarters desired by Dr. Brannan in this vicinity, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of these premises for a period of three years from May 1, 1905, with the privilege of renewal for a further period of three years, at an annual rental of \$1,600, payable monthly; the owner to pay the taxes, the City to pay the water rent, and for light, heat and janitor service. John Augustus Delany, owner.

Dr. Brannan, in his letter, states that the repairs required by the City will cost approximately \$3,000. I would respectfully recommend that, before this lease is entered into by the City, plans and specifications for the alterations and repairs be filed with the Engineers of the Department of Finance, for I am of the opinion that the cost will approximate nearer \$10,000, and it would be much cheaper for the City to buy the building, and at the completion of the term of six years, the City would be the owner of the land and all the improvements thereon, and would have something to show for its money.

"No. 3. Building will exceed 150 feet and twelve stories in height; same should conform to all the provisions of section 105 of the Code as to fireproofing."

The Superintendent of Buildings has refused to approve the mode and manner of construction and materials proposed to be followed or used in the erection and alteration of the building.

That the requirements of the law in section 105 of the Code are oppressive in this case, and if they may not be waived for all the building except the pent house on 13th floor. This pent house to be constructed to conform to the requirements of section 105 of the Code and not to exceed more than 50 per cent. of the lot area covered; this amount not to include stairs, elevator and tank inclosures which are in existence.

That in view of the fact that the appellant has left uncovered such proportion of the lot as would entitle him to the erection of a full 13th story over the entire building, it is just to allow him to obtain the space thus left vacant by permitting the erection of a pent house not exceeding 50 per cent. of the area of the building.

That it is impossible at this time to obtain wood properly fireproofed.

1. All wells surrounding the pent house will be carried up to their proper height.
2. Floor will be made of cement.
3. Wire glass will be used wherever glass is necessary.
4. Proper skylights will be provided.
5. All wood work for window frames, sash, doors, trim and base of the pent house will be thoroughly fireproof.
6. The highest point of the pent house roof will not exceed 150 feet from the curb level.

7. All wood work entering into the construction of the pent house will be fireproofed by the process which is fully accepted and approved by the Bureau of Buildings.

8. The entire pent house will be constructed entirely fireproof.

9. And that a standpipe with hose connection and outlet in hall of the pent house will be provided.

10. Pent house will not cover more than 50 per cent. of the roof area.

Mr. Gildersleeve appeared before the Board.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 450 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
