### BRIDGES OVER THE EAST RIVER.

No. 1-Brooklyn Bridge.

During the quarter the train and car service over the bridge has been main-ned free from serious delay or accident. It is estimated that over twenty million sengers were transported in trains on the bridge railway and about ten millions urface cars.

The operation of the surface trolley cars over the bridge has been bettered by installation of signals by which the motormen may determine the position and per spacing of their cars.

In the Manhattan terminal an additional stairway has been constructed from the terly side of William street to the bridge promenade.

Inclosing sashes and movable doors have been erected across the westerly end the Manhattan terminal for the protection and comfort of people waiting for sur-

The plans for the contemplated improvement at the Manhattan terminal are well vanced and bids for the first part of the work to be done under this improvement, nely, the construction of a temporary extension, will be immediately adverted for.

No. 2-Williamsburg Bridge.

Traffic on the bridge has been handled without special incident. On January 28, 7, a new line of New York City surface cars was put in operation over the bridge, ween the Grand Central Station at Forty-second street and the Brooklyn plaza of

In connection with the work to be done in order to open the bridge to elevated lway traffic, work on the construction of the sub-surface station in Manhattan has gressed as rapidly as the weather has permitted.

A contract for the construction of the elevated railroad connection on the Brooklyn

za was awarded to the Cooper & Evans Company on February 25, 1907, and a concert for the alteration of the Manhattan steel viaduct and masonry approach and the astruction of the tunnel entrance to the sub-surface station in Manhattan was arded on March 25, 1907, to the F. W. Carlin Construction Company.

A contract for the construction of a shelter house on the Brooklyn plaza was

arded March 28, 1907, to H. A. Rutan.

No. 3-Manhattan Bridge.

Work on the anchorages, laying the various classes of masonry and the placing of steel required for the anchor chains has progressed during favorable weather. The rate of progress in the mills and shops where the steel required for the towers suspended superstructure is being manufactured has been quite satisfactory.

No. 4-Blackwell's Island Bridge.

The construction of the river and island spans of the bridge has been continued thout interruption. The work on the construction of the steel viaduct of the Queens proach is under way. Contract for this work was awarded to the Buckley Realty instruction Company on January 8, 1907.

Borough Bridges.

The borough bridges in maintenance have been operated, cleaned, painted and paired by the usual forces in the employ of the Department for such purposes, with ry little assistance from outside of the Department, except for repairs of extraor-

The construction of approaches to a temporary bridge over the Harlem river at adison avenue is practically completed. The present draw span of the Madison venue Bridge now in use will be moved down to the site of these approaches for use a temporary bridge during the construction of a new permanent bridge. The temporary bridge will not be put into commission until such time as work on the conruction of the new bridge is ready to be begun.

The construction of the University Heights Bridge over the Harlem river has ade such progress as weather permitted, and it is expected that this bridge will be bened to the public before the close of the year.

Borings at the proposed site of the Henry Hudson Memorial Bridge over the arlem Ship Canal have been practically completed, and sufficient data collected to hable beginning now the preparation of plans for the proposed structure.

In the Borough of The Bronx work is in progress on the superstructure and asonry approaches of the Pelham Bridge.

Plans for a new bridge at the crossing of Boston Post road and Hutchinson river

Your committee cannot approve these decorative features, as they would have been ready to approve a strictly utilitarian construction, or better still, a scheme of ornamentation which would seem to them artistic and appropriate.
