REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1906.

Office of the President of the Borough of Queens, Long Island City, February 20, 1907.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, City of New York:

Sir—In accordance with the provisions of section 383 of the Greater New York Charter, I respectfully beg to submit herewith a report of the business and transactions of this department for the year ending December 31, 1906.

I take advantage of the opportunity offered to bring to your attention, among other matters, the enormous increase in population of the Borough of Queens, and how to adequately provide for the still greater numbers that will undoubtedly come with the completion of the Blackwell's Island Bridge and tunnels now in course of construction. construction.

One of the greatest problems confronting the borough government is to keep pace, in the matter of improvements, with the phenomenal increase in population, an idea of which can be secured from the fact that 4,070 plans for new buildings, showing an estimated cost of construction of \$17,003,216, were filed in the Bureau of Buildings during the year 1906; alterations aggregating \$1,297,763, bringing the total of new work planned to \$18,300,979.

Many new sections have been laid out and developed, the majority of which work was done in a manner suited to the needs of the property, but without regard to the official topographical layout, and it has been found practically impossible that every new section thus opened up be given necessary improvements, yet I feel that in all future public matters relating to the Borough of Queens, it would be only fair and just that the matters above mentioned be borne in mind.

In this connection I might add that while in the natural course of official business numerous complaints and delegations of citizens and taxpayers have vividly emphasized the absolute necessity of improvements which, if circumstances permitted, should be made, the various bureaus under my jurisdiction have invariably placed the fact before the general public in a careful and tactful manner, and thus demonstrated to them that no efforts were being spared to do everything possible to ameliorate conditions.

The Topographical Bureau, as may be noted from its report, is making great advances towards the completion of a topographical map for the entire borough, and it is hoped to have such a map completed early in the year 1908; this will eventually result in the ability to initiate improvements for those sections of the borough which at the present time are retarded in securing public improvements by the lack of the necessary authority which the map in question will give.

The Bureau of Highways has done commendable work in maintenance, repairs and reconstruction of paved, macadamized and unpaved streets, particularly in sections where the lack of sewers to carry off storm water necessitated the greatest amount of skill to keep the streets in a passable and safe condition after storms.

Experiments have been made to lay the dust on certain macadamized roads extensively used by vehicles of all descriptions, and it is hoped that some system will be perfected during the coming year whereby this evil can be overcome.

The Bureau of Sewers has been during the past year, and will continue to be, one of the most important branches of our borough government, and while a great many of the problems presented to it have been disposed of to the entire satisfaction of the general public, there is still a stupendous amount of work to be accomplished to meet the unusual conditions at present prevailing in this borough.

The Bureau of Buildings has been conducted with skill and dispatch; however it is self-apparent that to meet the conditions already referred to in this report, its working force will have to be reasonably increased at an early date.

The Bureau of Street Cleaning has accomplished very creditable work, notwithstanding the peculiar conditions it is subjected to at times by the extreme burdens placed upon it, particularly during the summer months, when the floating population at summer resorts in the Borough of Queens has added greatly to its labors.

The Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, which has to contend with the conditions, in my estimation, peculiar and true of this Borough alone, among a widely scattered location of the various public buildings within its jurisdiction, has endeavored and fully succeeded in making a fine showing.

In connection with the last preceding paragraph, too much stress cannot be laid upon the absolute necessity of a borough hall for this borough, a matter of vital importance, and one which would add materially to the greater despatch and efficiency of co-operation of the various bureaus.

A reference to the report of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices will show at a glance why certain bureaus which are now located in private and public buildings widely scattered throughout the borough should be under one roof.

The following is a statement of the buildings under the control of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Borough of Queens, and a brief summary of how occupied, repairs made, etc., during the year of 1906:

Queens County Court House (Owned), Court Square, First Ward, Long Island City—The portions of this building not destroyed by fire have been protected from the weather and plans have been approved for the reconstruction of the building. The jail and administration building have received considerable attention during the the weather and plans have been approved for the reconstruction of the building. The jail and administration building have received considerable attention during the year. Extensive repairs have been made to the plumbing and the interior of the jail thoroughly painted. This building is occupied by the Sheriff, District Attorney and Commissioner of Jurors.

Hackett Building (Borough Hall), Jackson and Fifth Streets, Long Island City—Occupied by the Department of Taxes and Assessments, Assessments and Arrears, Deputy Receiver of Taxes, offices of the President of the Borough of Queens, Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers, Bureau of Buildings, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, office of the Bureau of Licenses and offices of the Commissioner of Public Works.

This building is leased by the City. During the past year the interior of the building has been thoroughly renovated and new office partitions and considerable new office furniture and fixtures have been installed, adding to the comfort and convenience of the public and occupants.

St. Mary's Lyceum, Long Island City (Leased), Fifth Street, Long Island City—Occupied by the First District Municipal Court and by the First District Magistrate's Court.

A courtroom has been arranged in the building during the year for the use of

A courtroom has been arranged in the building during the year for the use of the First District Municipal Court. Interior repairs have been made as required and necessary supplies furnished.

Building No. 48 Jackson Avenue, Long Island City (Leased)—Occupied by the Bureau of Street Cleaning. Necessary interior repairs have been made and Janitors supplies furnished.

Building, Jackson Avenue and Court Square, Long Island City (Leased)—Occupied by the Topographical Bureau.

Drawing tables and filing cases have been erected in this office and small sup-

plies furnished.

Old Court Building, Broadway and Court Streets, Astoria, Long Island City— Owned by the City and occupied by a caretaker. Unfit for public use. Town Hall, Newtown (Owned)—Occupied by the Municipal Court, Second District, and the Police Department.

All exterior and interior repairs have been made as required, including quite extensive repairs to the plumbing and the heating apparatus.

Town Hall, Flushing, Long Island (Owned), Broadway and Linden Street, Flushing—Occupied by Parts 1 and 2 of the Supreme Court, by the Second District Magistrate's Court and the local Superintendent of Highways. The building has been thoroughly repaired and two courtrooms have been fitted up at considerable expense for the use of the Supreme Court. All necessary furnishings and supplies have been provided

have been provided.

Town Hall, Jamaica, Long Island (Owned), Fulton Street and Flushing Avenue, Jamaica—Occupied by the Court of Special Sessions, Municipal Court of the Third District, Coroner's Court and offices, Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Local Superintendent of Highways, Fire Alarm Station and the Police Department.

This building is in good condition, having recently been thoroughly overhauled. Supplies have been furnished the various offices as required; also Jamitors' supplies.

County Clerk and Surrogate's Office Building (Owned), Fulton Street, Jamaica—Occupied by the County Clerk and Surrogate.

The building, both interior and exterior, is in fair repair. Owing to the great volume of business now transacted in the office of the County Clerk, the portion of the building set aside for his office is entirely inadequate, and action should be taken at once to enlarge this office, as at present it is a source of great inconvenience to persons having business to transact. During the past year several filing cases and book racks have been removed to the top floor of the building in order to gain more room on the main floor.

City Magistrate's Court Building, Far Rockaway (Owned), Central Avenue near Mott Avenue, Far Rockaway, N. Y.—Occupied by the Third District Magistrate's Court and the local Superintendent of Highways.

This building requires extensive repairs and the exterior is badly in need o paint. Temporary repairs have been made during the year as required and all neces

sary supplies furnished. In addition to the above, since the destruction of the Queens County Cour House by fire, a court room has been fitted up on the upper floor of the Long Island City Police Station House for the use of the County Court. The courtroom is cared

The necessity of a suitable borough building, where all branches of the City government under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough, etc., may be located under one roof, is apparent to all, not alone as a matter of convenience, but from an economical standpoint. The fitting up of offices in leased buildings is expensive and unsatisfactory, and where bureaus under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough are remote from each other it is a source of great appropriate to a large number. ough are remote from each other it is a source of great annoyance to a large number

This bureau has been seriously handicapped on account of insufficient appropriations, and it has been almost impossible to make necessary repairs to buildings, kee the same clean and furnish the supplies required.
