VOTER REGISTRATION		HOW IT GETS DONE
1	Allowing pre-registration for 16 and 17-year olds, which will become active when they turn 18.	State Legislation (Kavanagh <a href="#">A2529</a> , Carlucci <a href="#">S857</a> )
2	Permitting voters to register on Election Day (i.e. same-day registration), as 11 other states already do.	State Constitutional Amendment + Legislation (Kavanagh <a href="#">A5891</a> , Gianaris <a href="#">S2391</a> )
3	Expanding automatic voter registration using a variety of State and City databases, including, but not limited to, the Department of Motor Vehicles.	State Legislation (Kavanagh <a href="#">A5972</a> , Gianaris <a href="#">S2538</a> )

4	Enacting no-excuse absentee voting, which lets any voter request an absentee ballot for any reason.	State Constitutional Amendment + Legislation (Kavanagh <a href="#">A2644</a> , Brennan <a href="#">A3874B</a> )
5	Ensuring absentee ballots are accessible for all voters – including those with vision impairment.	State Legislation (Weprin <a href="#">A2104A</a> , Griffo <a href="#">S5085</a> )
6	Permitting early in-person voting for at least seven days prior to Election Day, including on weekends.	State Legislation (Kavanagh <a href="#">A8582A</a> , Stewart-Cousins <a href="#">S3813B</a> )
7	Exploring a vote-by-mail system, which has already been adopted in Oregon, Washington, and Colorado.	State Legislation (Krueger <a href="#">S2739</a> )
8	Requiring the New York State Department of Corrections and Community Supervision to inform formerly incarcerated New Yorkers of the need to re-register to vote and giving New Yorkers convicted of felonies the right to vote while on parole. 9	Instructing the City Board of Elections to notify New Yorkers about upcoming elections more than once per year and employ modern methods of communication, including email and text message.	City Council Legislation + Board of Elections Initiative
10	Improving training, recruitment, and compensation for New York City poll workers.	Board of Elections Initiative
11	Expanding poll inspections to ensure compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and surveying voters about their experience at the polls.	Board of Elections Initiative
12	Passing the Voter Friendly Ballot Act, which will allow for clearer, more understandable ballots.	State Legislation (Kavanagh <a href="#">A3389</a> )

13	Expanding access for Limited English Proficiency New Yorkers by publishing voting materials in additional languages and ensuring availability of telephonic “Language Line” service at poll sites.	State/City Legislation (Colton <a href="#">A4749</a> , Golden <a href="#">S1703</a> , Eugene (Int. <a href="#">0255-2014</a> ) + BOE Initiative
14	Instituting Instant Runoff Voting, which allows voters to rank candidates in order of preference, instead of holding costly runoff elections two weeks after primaries.	State Legislation (Kavanagh <a href="#">A5571</a> , Lanza <a href="#">S4586</a> )
15	Consolidating federal and state primary elections in New York instead of holding two separate primaries in even years, and three primaries in presidential years.	State Legislation
16	Strengthening laws against deceptive practices to prohibit the intentional dissemination of false or misleading information with the intent to prevent an eligible voter from casting a ballot.	State Legislation (Kavanagh <a href="#">A5841</a> , Stewart-Cousins <a href="#">S2352</a> )
