

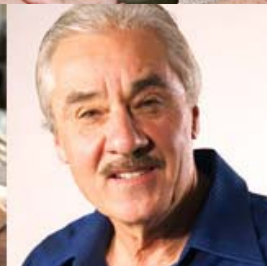

INTRODUCTION

There are currently 1.3 million older adults over the age of 60 in New York City, and future predictions indicate that the City will face a 44% increase in the 65 and over population within the next 25 years, representing one-fifth of the City's overall population and outnumbering school-aged children. New York City is one of the most racially/ethnically, culturally, and economically diverse cities in the world, requiring our institutions and policy leaders to have reliable information to predict and prioritize the type and quantity of health and social services most needed by older adults. Moreover, chronic conditions among older adults impose a serious toll on the health of older New Yorkers – diminished quality of life due to pain, disability and loss of function – and a tremendous financial burden on NYC as a whole.

To meet the demands of the burgeoning older adult population and manage the chronic diseases associated with older adulthood, the New York City Department for the Aging (NYC DFTA) must be able to design, deliver, and evaluate the types of service programs that most effectively assist New York's senior citizens to age in their communities with the greatest degree of personal choice and support for communal interdependence. To that end, the Healthy Indicators Project (HIP), a 3-year study to collect health-related and social well-being data, design and implement evidence-based practices, and evaluate effectiveness and cost-effectiveness was funded by the Mayor's Office to extend our initial efforts based on a successful pilot project to its logical next step: to determine how NYC can transform senior centers to become viable alternatives to traditional health care settings for the delivery of evidence-based health promotion, disease prevention, and chronic disease self-management programs.

In the first year of the HIP, a comprehensive structured survey instrument was adapted from the pilot study, and consisted of standardized questionnaire items from validated national and local surveys including measures of functional status, mental and physical health status, co-morbidities, social networks, perceptions about neighborhoods, cancer screenings, as well as several demographic and socioeconomic items. The face-to-face interviews with older adults attending senior centers were conducted during late-April to late-November 2008. The survey was translated into several languages, including Spanish, Chinese, Italian, and Russian. Over 1800 older adults attending a representative sample of 56 randomly selected senior centers – 10 in the Bronx, 16 in Brooklyn, 13 in Manhattan, 14 in Queens, and 3 in Staten Island were interviewed. The response rate was 76.7.

The following pages show preliminary results from the baseline HIP survey, and make comparisons to several local and national surveys.

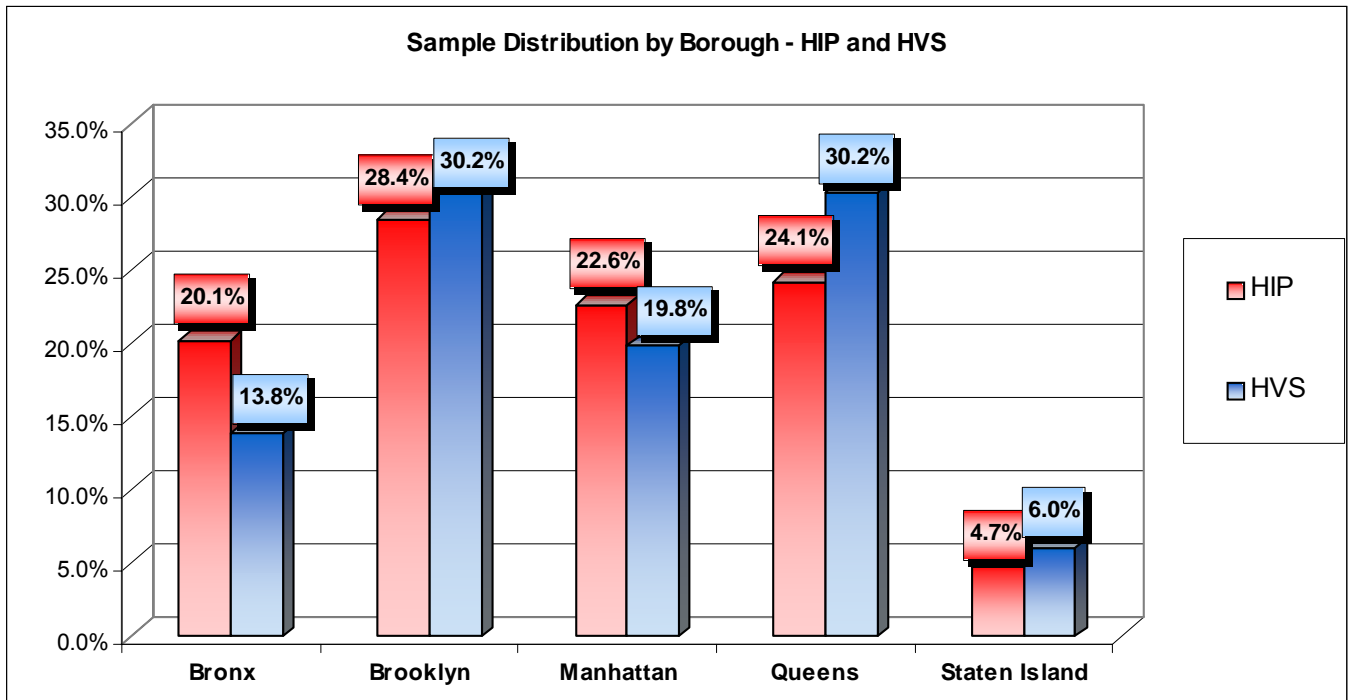

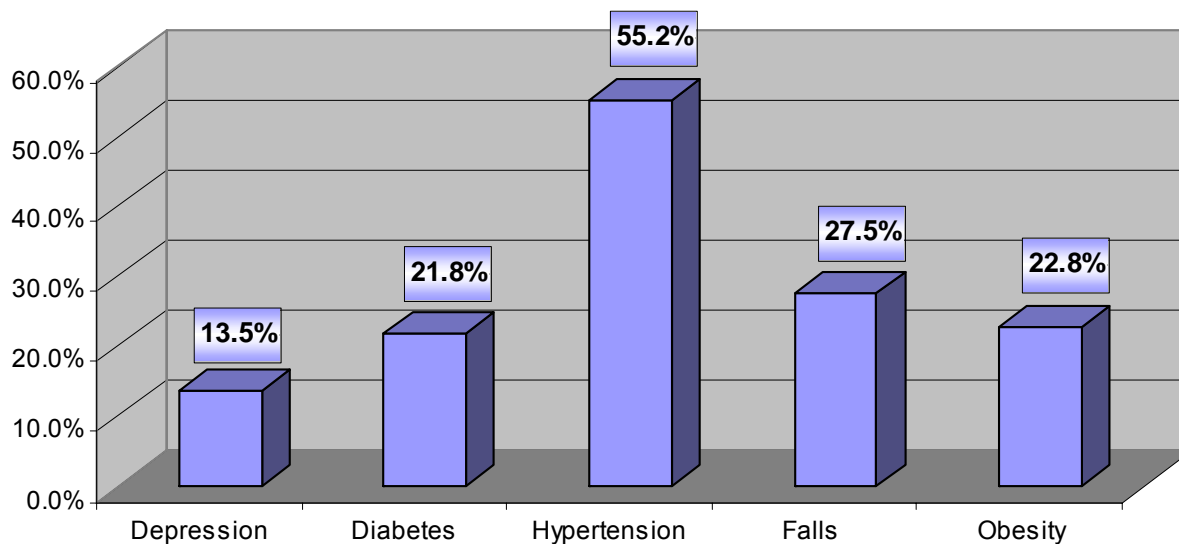

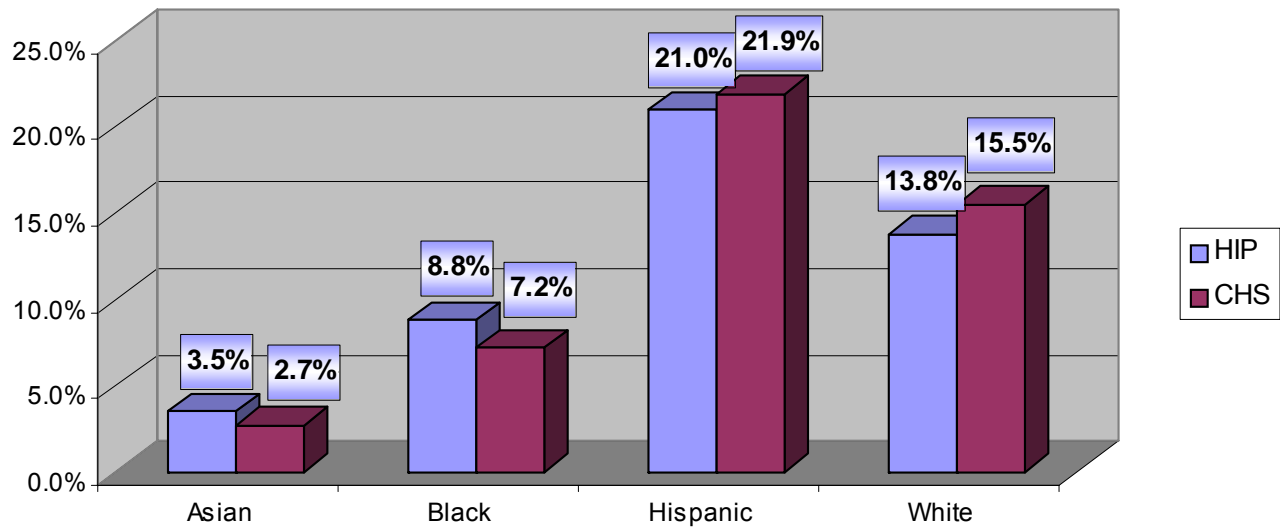
**Professional Diagnosis of Medical Conditions in New York City

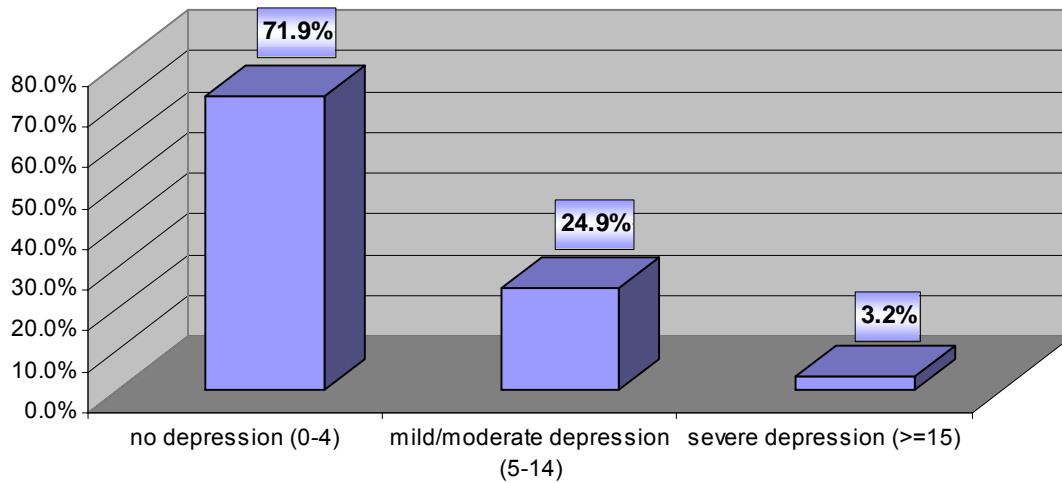
**Professional Diagnosis of Hypertension in NYC by Race/Ethnicity
Survey Sample vs. CHS 2007**



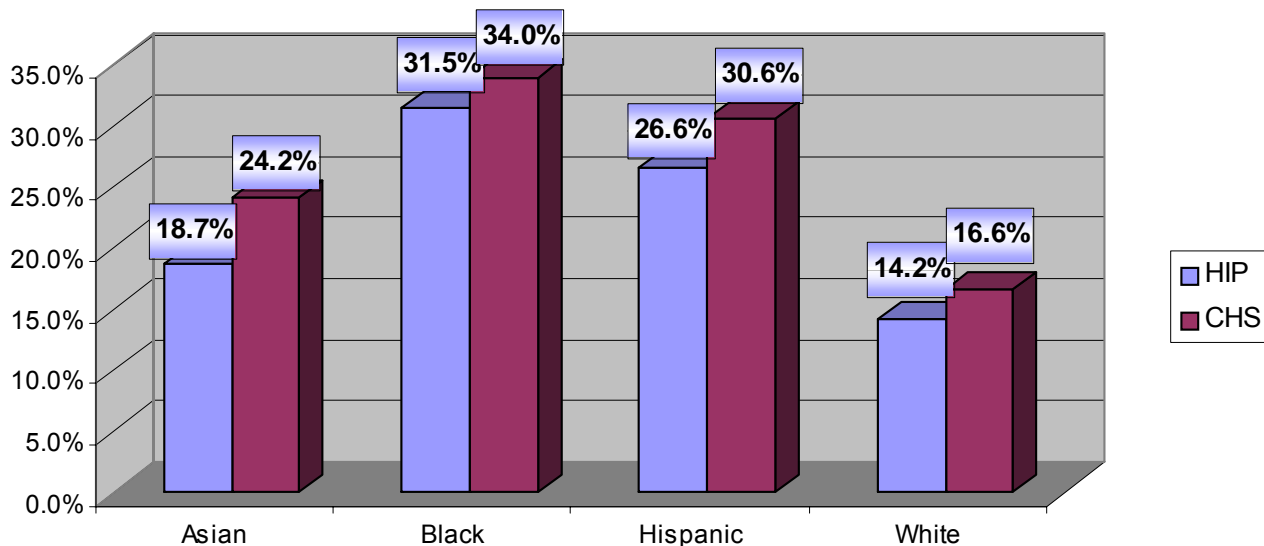
**Professional Diagnosis of Depression in NYC by Race/Ethnicity
Survey Sample vs. CHS 2007**



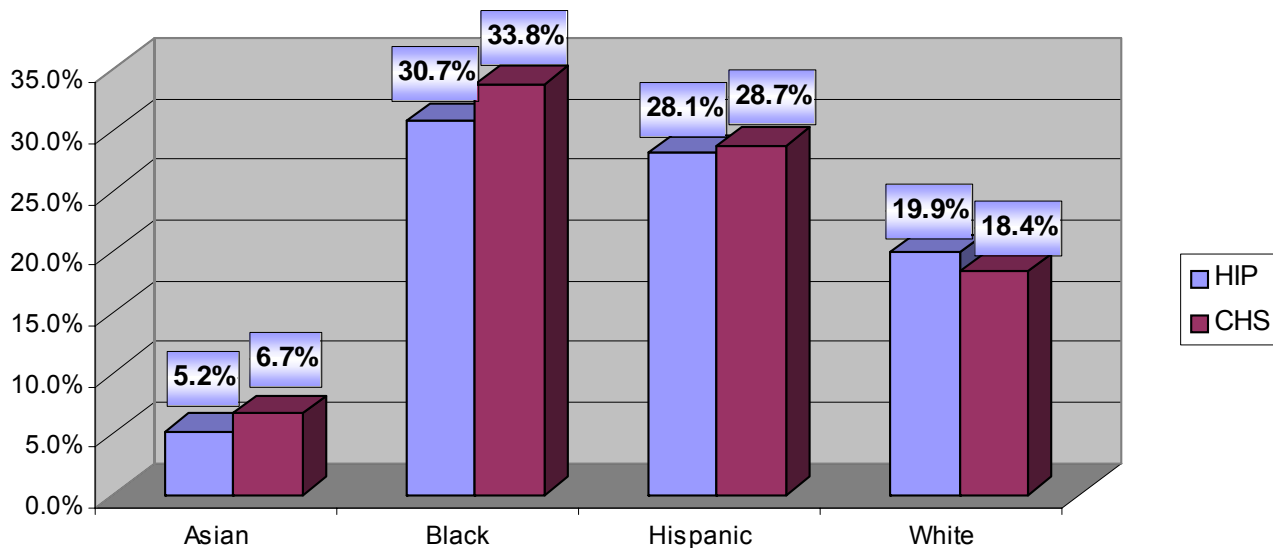
**Depression Severity (per PHQ-9)
Among Older Adults Attending NYC Senior Centers**



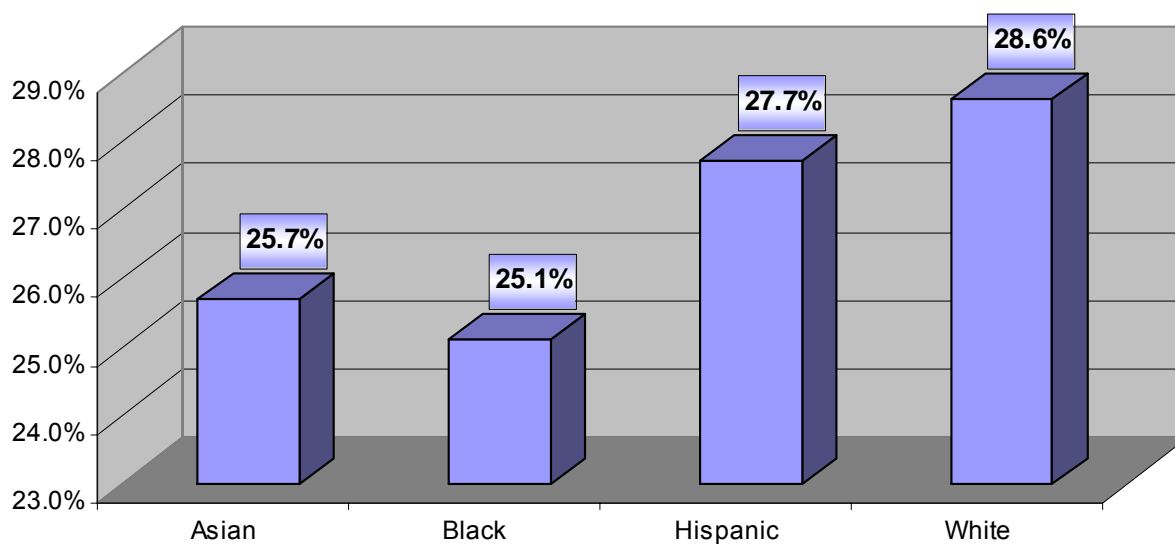
**Professional Diagnosis of Diabetes in NYC by Race/Ethnicity
Survey Sample vs. CHS 2007**



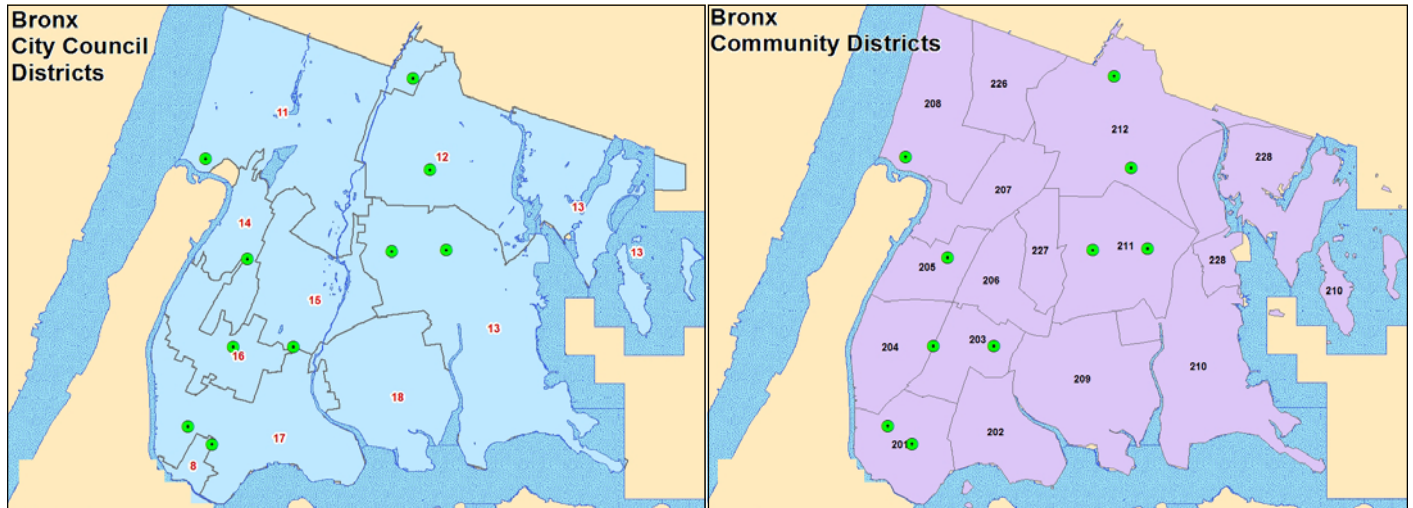
**Obesity in NYC by Race/Ethnicity

- ☑ Those participants reporting an age of 75 or more accounted for over half of the study population.
- ☑ More than half of the respondents have been diagnosed with hypertension.
- ☑ Nearly thirty percent of the respondents have been diagnosed with diabetes.
- ☑ Over twenty percent of the Hispanic population surveyed have been diagnosed with depression.

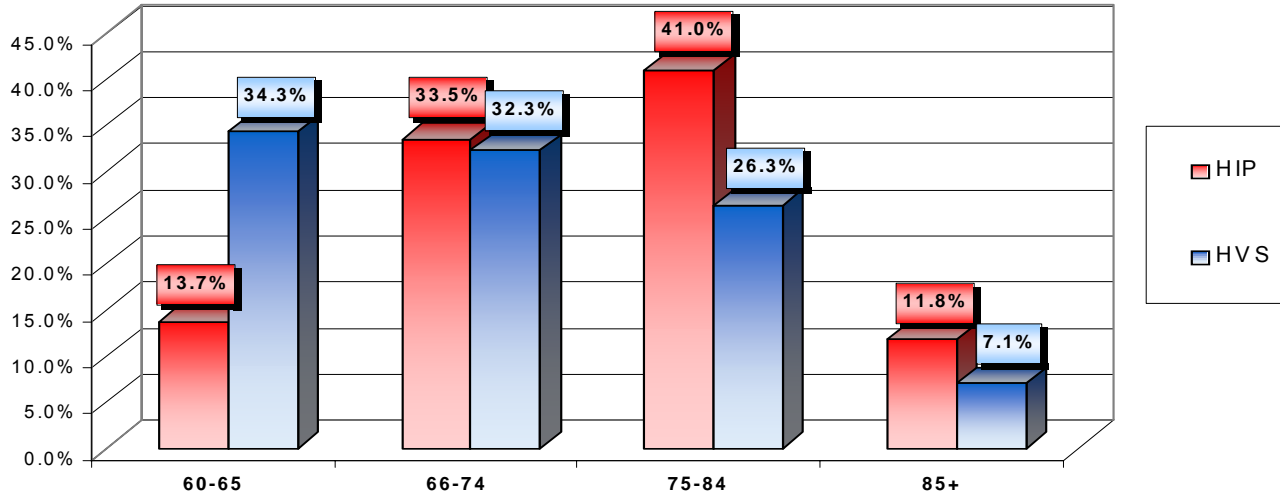

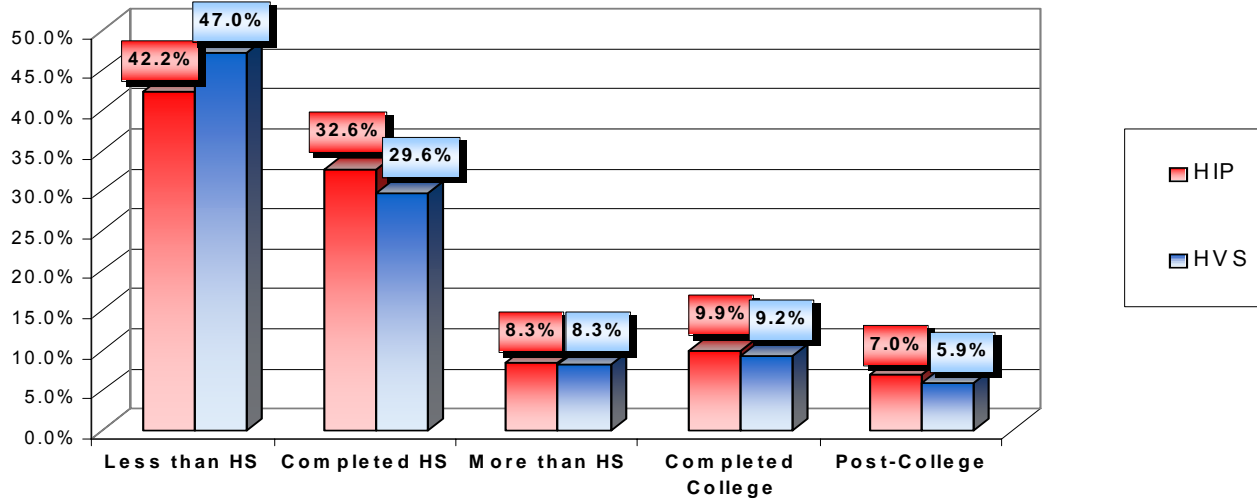

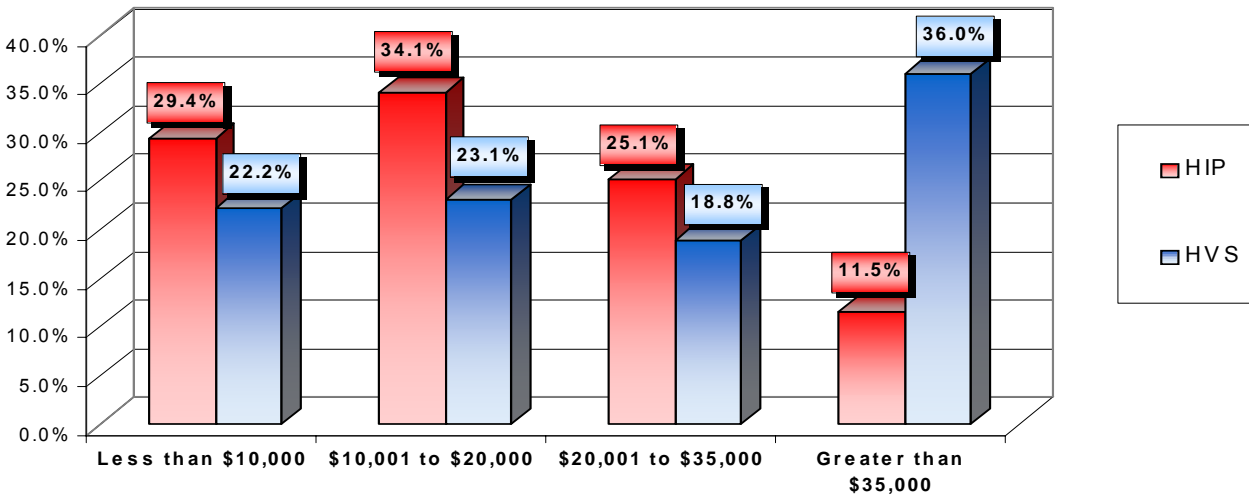
Age Categories of HIP and HVS Respondents



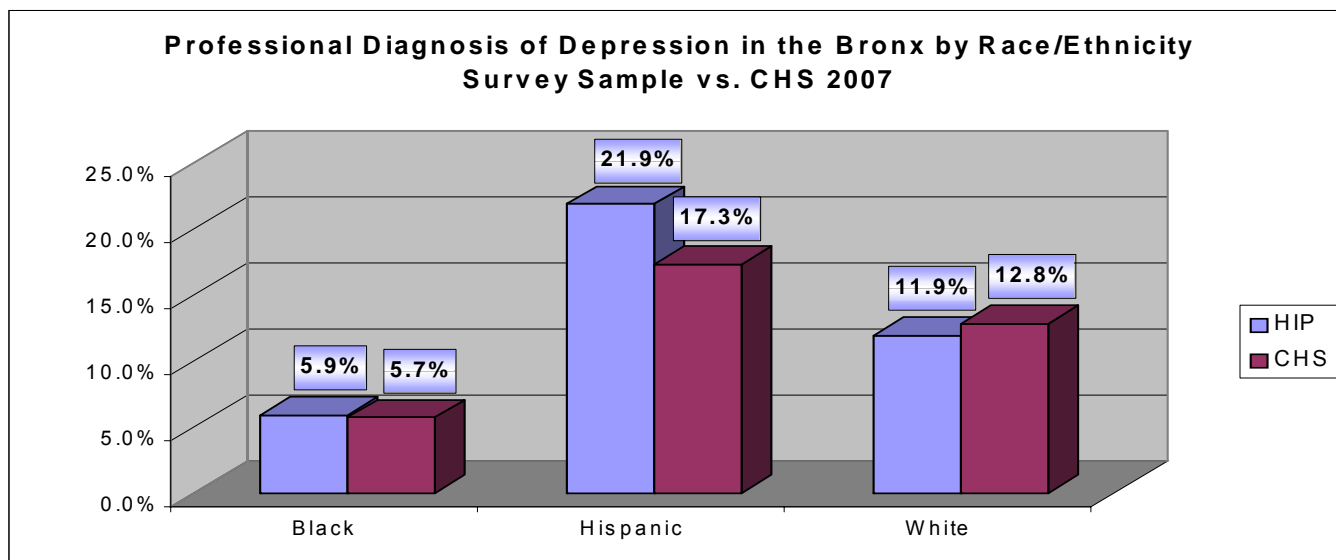
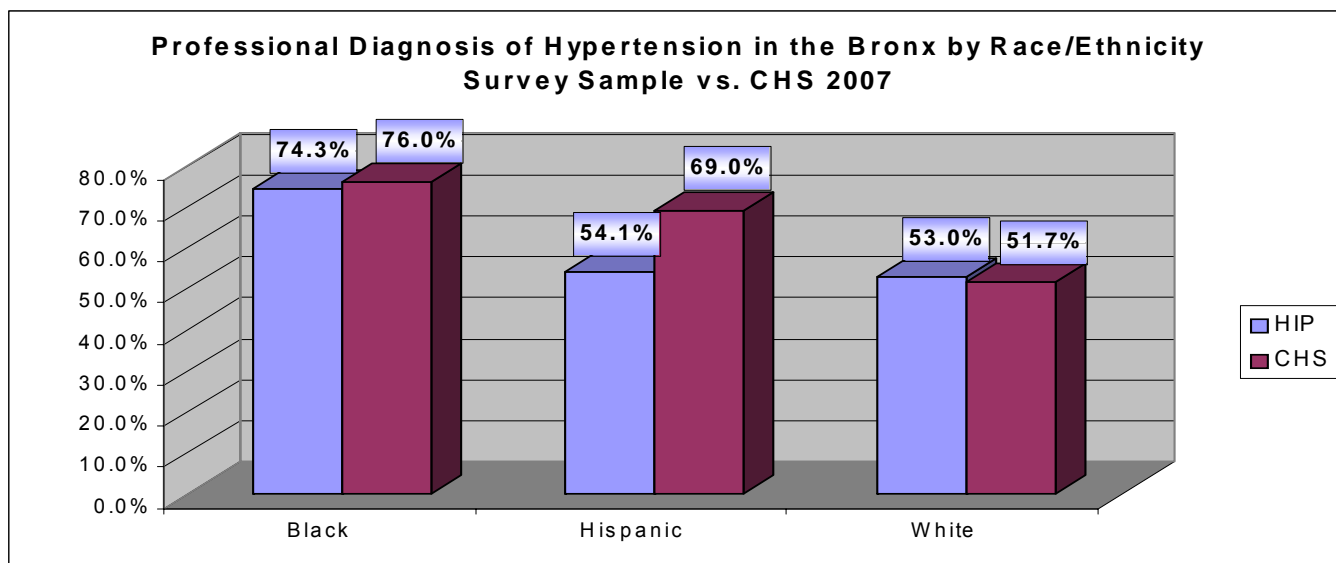
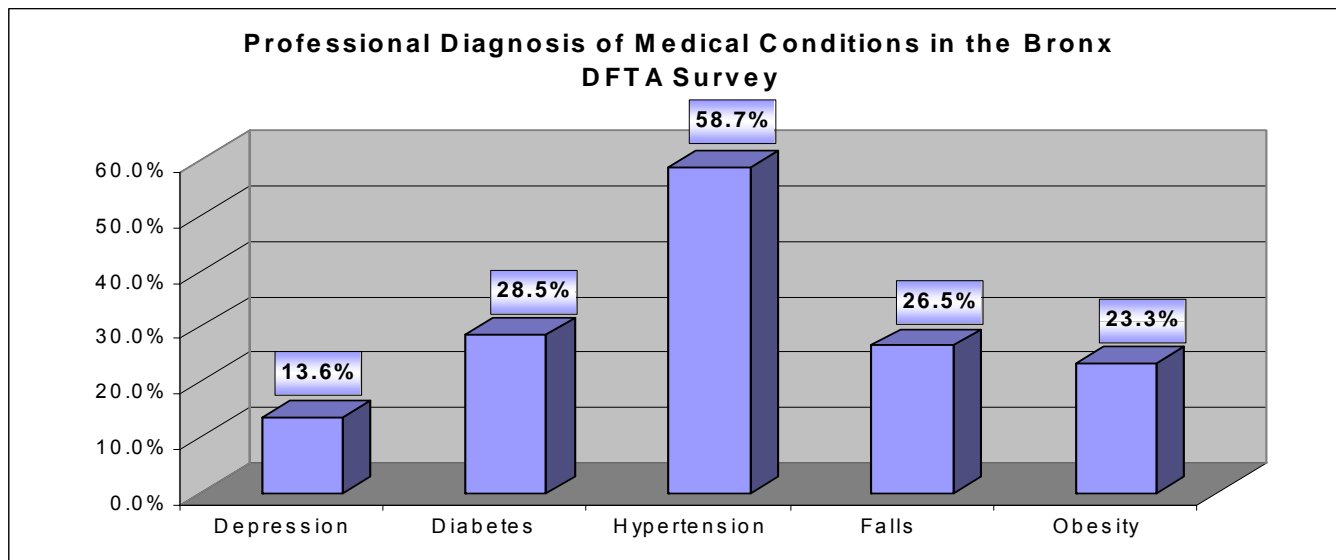
Educational Attainment of HIP and HVS Respondents



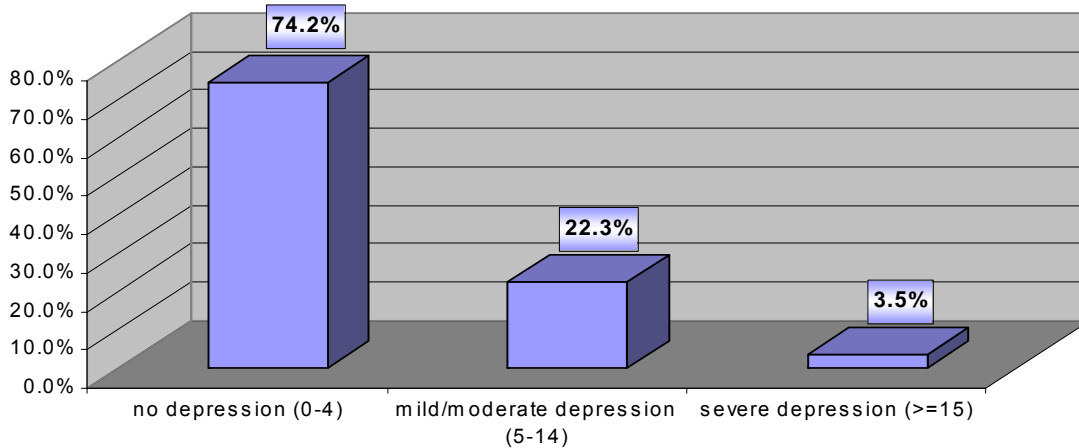
Income Categories of HIP and HVS Respondents



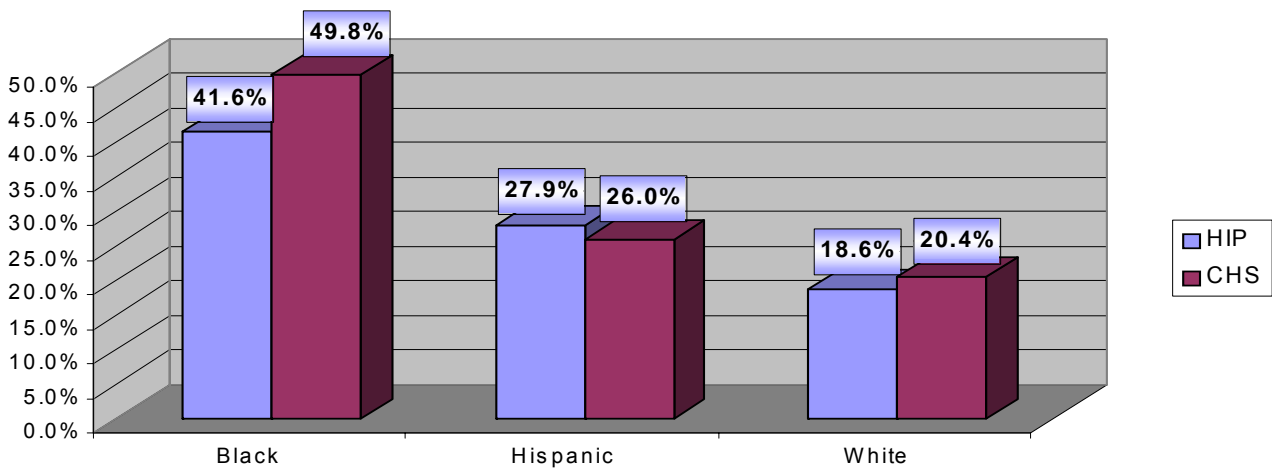

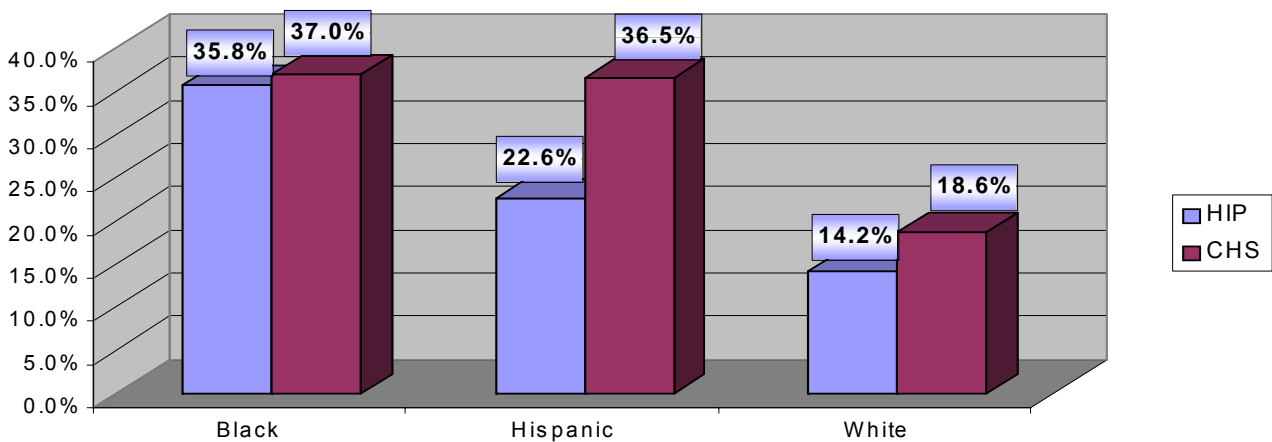
**Depression Severity (per PHQ-9)
Among Older Adults Attending Bronx Senior Centers**

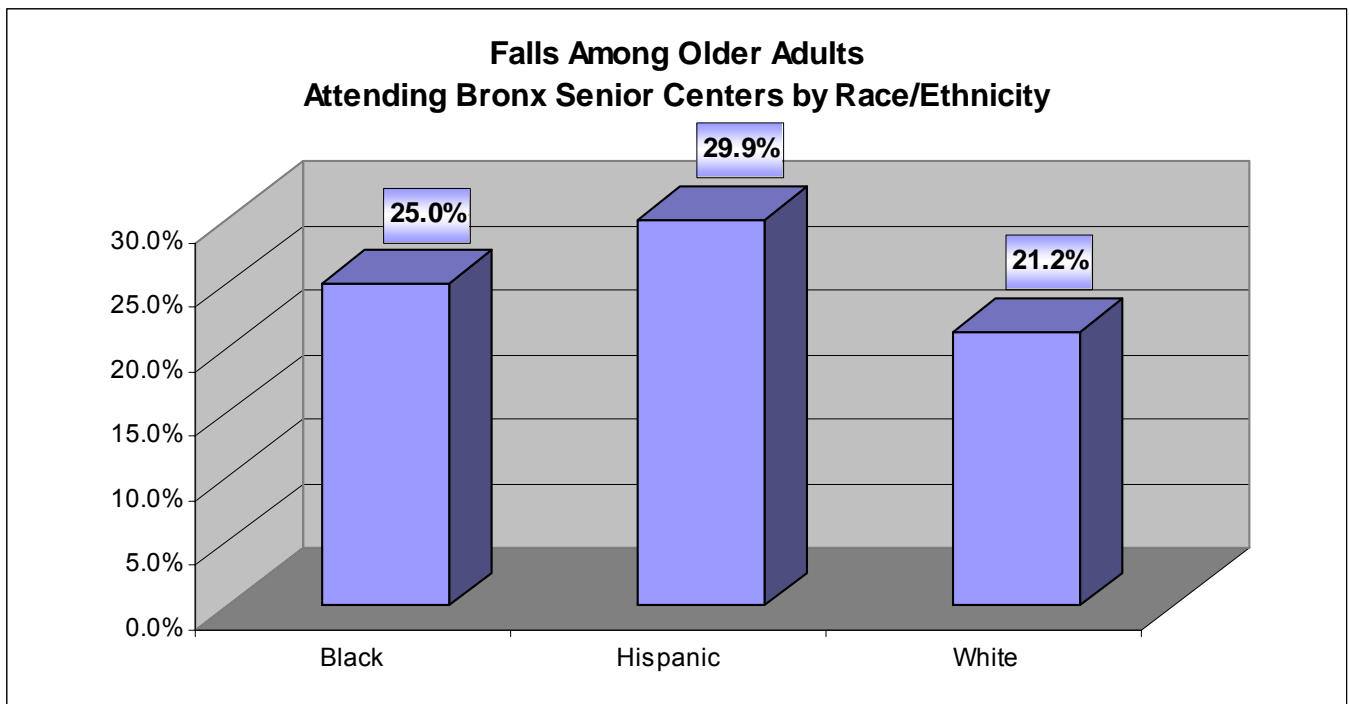


**Professional Diagnosis of Diabetes in the Bronx by Race/Ethnicity

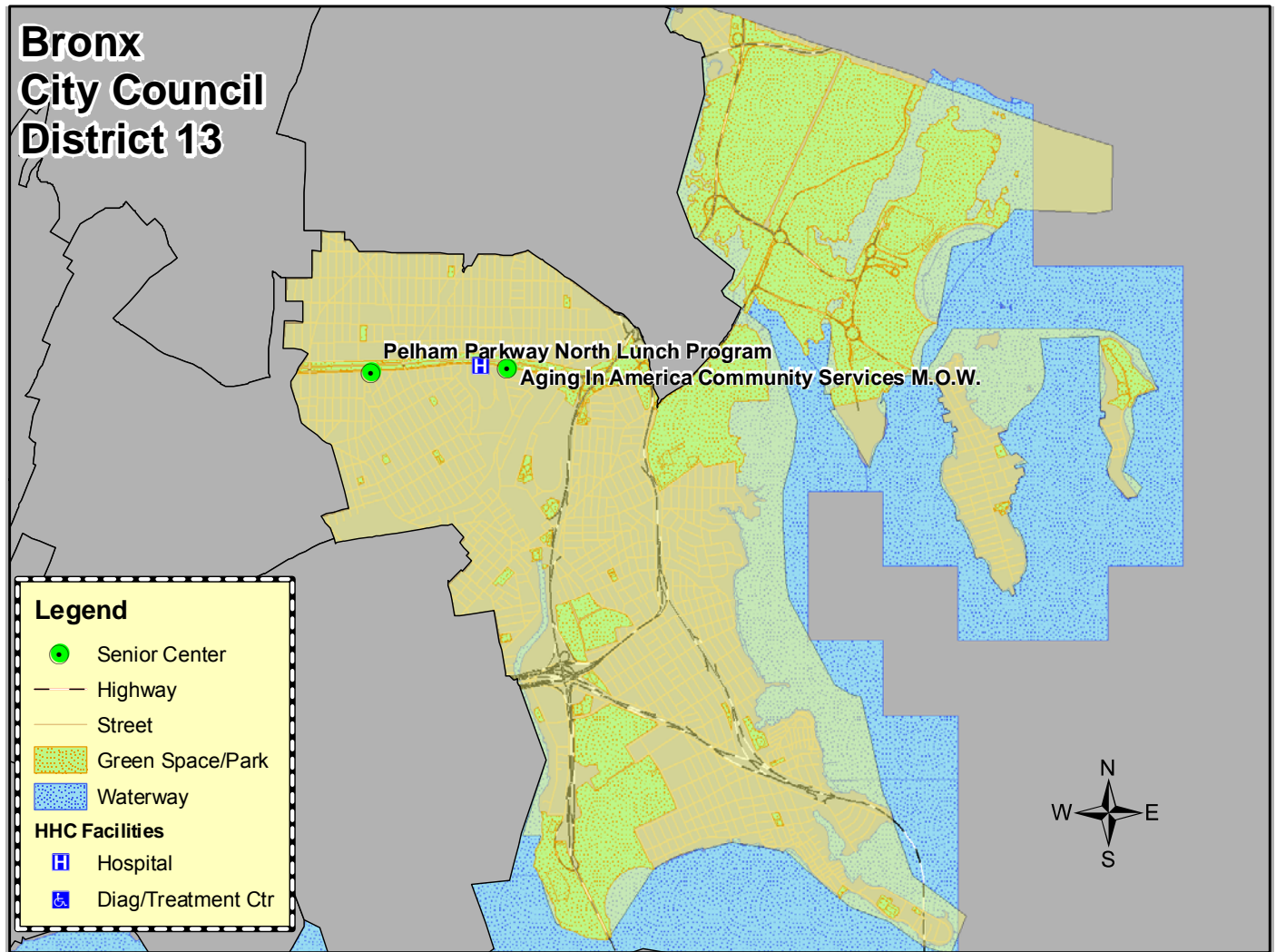

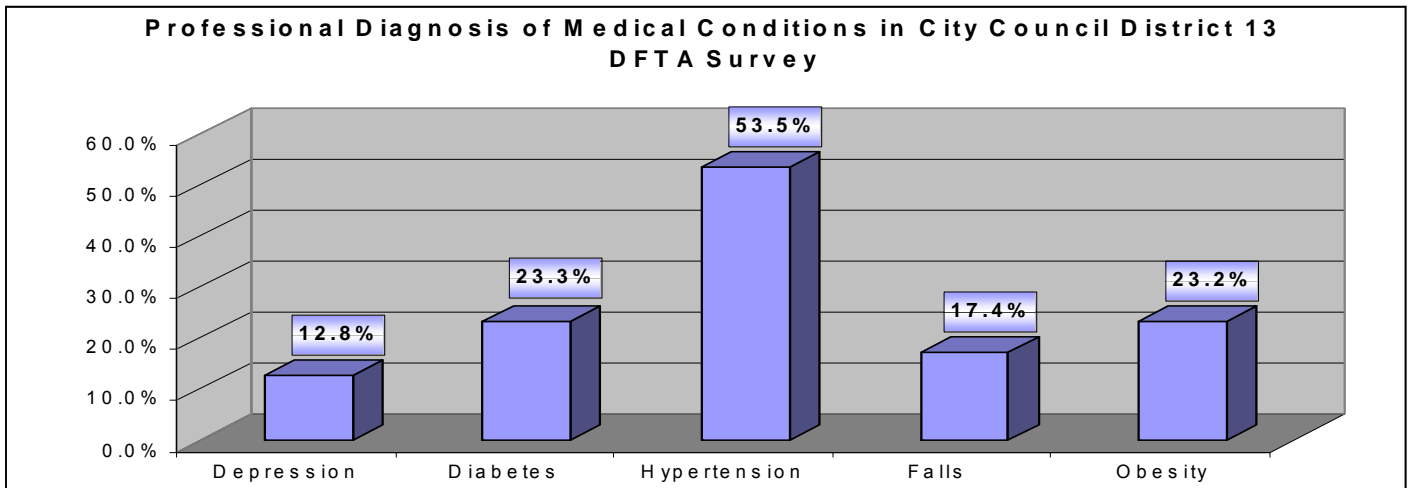

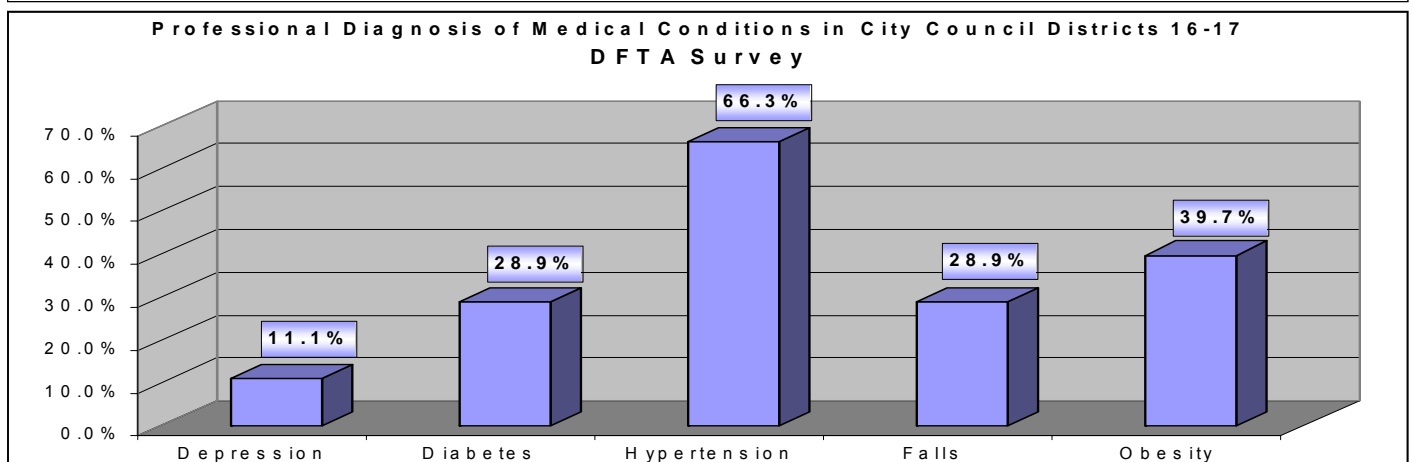


BRONX SNAPSHOT - CITY COUNCIL DISTRICTS 16 & 17

Southwest Bronx City Council Districts 16 & 17 (includes northeast CC-8)

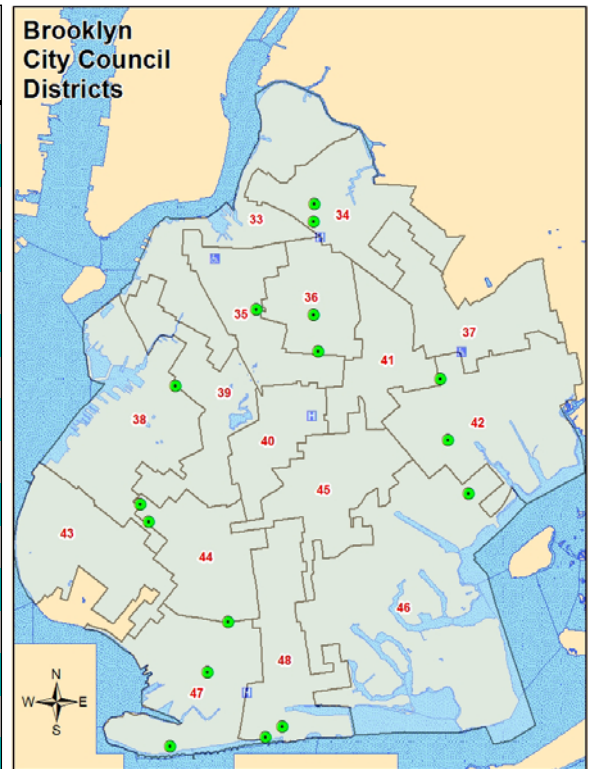

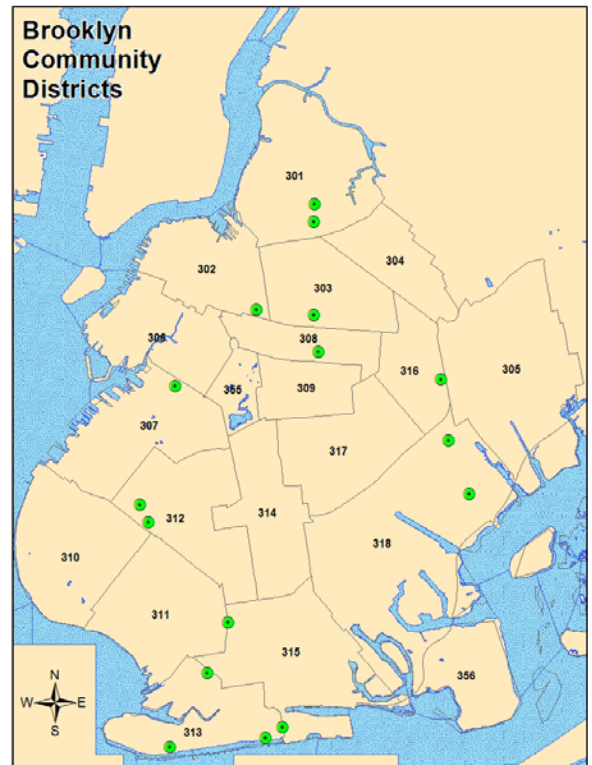
SENIOR CENTER HEALTH INDICATORS PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS: BROOKLYN

- ☑ The majority of respondents are at or below high school grade level.

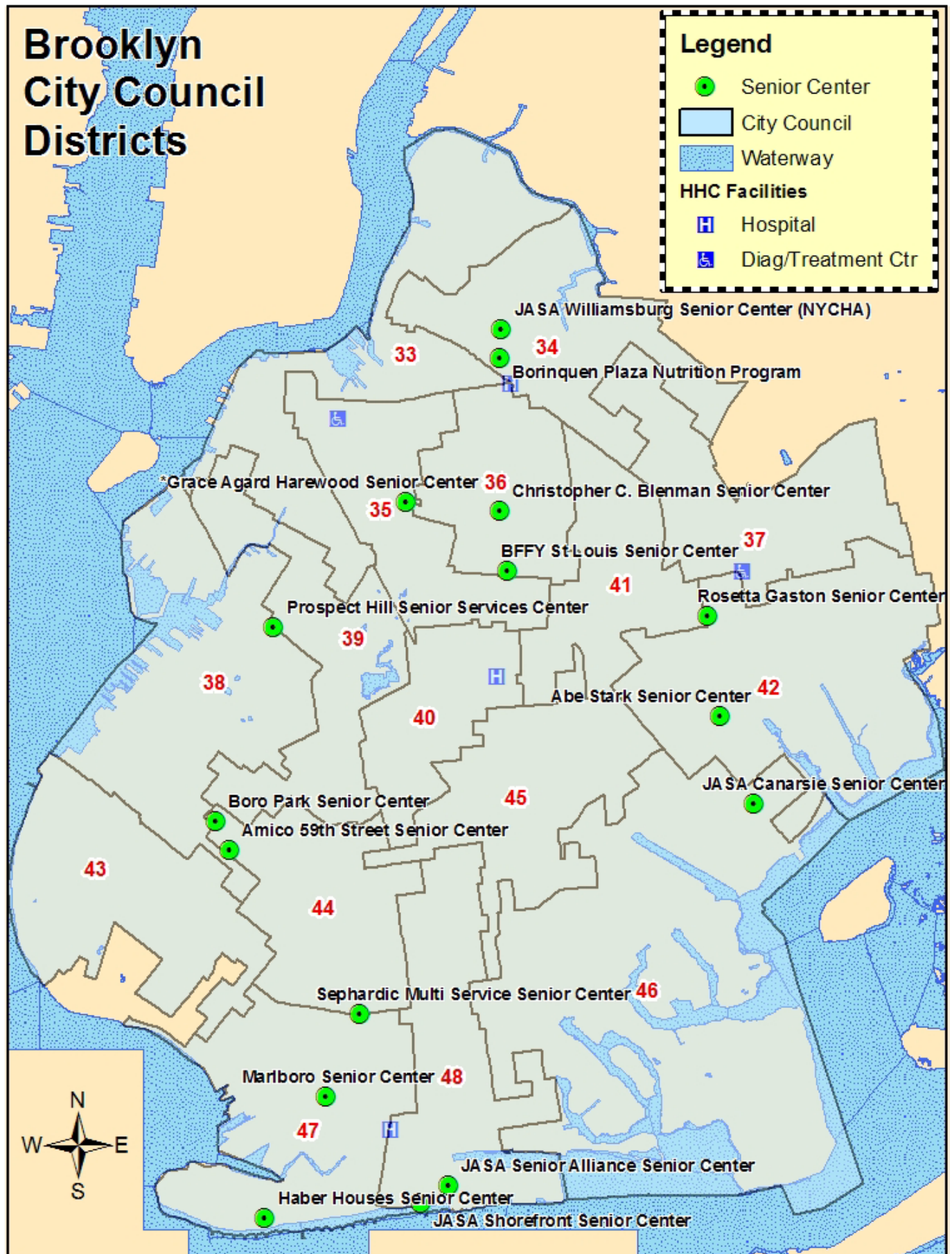
