A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Thursday, July 31, 1913.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. O'Keeffe, Paulding, Robbins and Stern, Trustees; and Mr. Drummond, Commissioner of Public Charities. Excused—Messrs. Farley and Sachs.

Bids were received for (1) the construction of a new ward wing extension to Harlem Hospital, and for (2) the steamheating and ventilating and (3) plumbing and gasfitting in that building, respectively.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Amalia G. Hauser, Josephine Roth, and Honora Johnston, have completed their course of training at the School for Midwives, and authority for granting the usual diploma is requested.

The internal fire alarm system at Bellevue Hospital is out of order, and to place the same in proper working condition it will be necessary to employ an electrician for a temporary period.

Accommodations are needed at Fordham Hospital for the additional Nurses made necessary by the opening of the new ward. It is impossible to secure suitable accommodations in the immediate vicinity, and it is recommended that a portable house be secured at an expenditure of approximately \$500.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to award diplomas to the three Midwives who have completed their

course of training in the School for Midwives; the employment of an electrician for a temporary period to repair the internal fire alarm system at Bellevue Hospital was approved; the General Medical Superintendent was authorized to secure a portable house for use in connection with Fordham Hospital at an expenditure of about \$500.

Reports of Committees.

The Conference Committee of the First Division of Bellevue Hospital recommended the appointment of Dr. Samuel Lawson Burton, Dr. Joseph Previtali, and Dr. Miner Clifford Hill, as Assistant Physicians to Out-patients on the children's service. This report was approved and appointments made accordingly.

Communications.

A communication was presented from McKim, Mead & White, stating that they could not find sufficient reason for granting J. M. Knopp, contractor for the balances of Pavilions A and B, a further extension of time on his contract. After consideration, on the advice of the architects and the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded, and carried, to deny the request of J. M. Knopp for a further extension to his contract time.

A communication was presented from Daniel J. Ryan, contractor for the roof wards of Pavilions A and B, requesting permission, on account of financial difficulties, to transfer his contract to Piereson & Goodrich. A letter from McKim, Mead & White, stating that they were satisfied with the ability of this firm to complete the work in the shortest possible time, and strongly recommending, if legal, the acceptance of this proposal. The Secretary reported that he had communicated with the Corporation Counsel, and presented an opinion received under date of July 30 to the effect that the Trustees may consent to the assignment and transfer of this contract with the approval of the sureties; it was

Resolved, To approve of the assignment of the contract of Daniel J. Ryan to Piereson & Goodrich, should they request permission to become the assignees, and subject to the consent of the sureties.

A letter was presented from Joseph DiBenedetto, contractor for the roof ward at Fordham Hospital, requesting an extension of time for one month from the date of his communication, on account of the delay caused by the failure of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to pass on certain drawings and samples of fixtures submitted to them for approval. It was reported that the architect recommended that this request be approved.

Resolved, To grant Joseph DiBenedetto an extension of time to August 28, 1913.

A letter was presented from Joseph DiBenedetto, in regard to certain changes and alterations which had been made in the roof ward of Fordham Hospital. This communication was referred to the Building Committee for investigation and report.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the Building Committee.

A communication was presented from the Second Division, nominating Dr. Frank Stewart Park for appointment as Interne on that division for one year. This communication was approved, and Dr. Park appointed accordingly.

A letter was presented from the President of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital, stating that a satisfactory plan for keeping clinical records had been adopted, and requesting the appointment of two additional Internes for one year's service on the medical, obstetrical and laboratory services; it was

Resolved, To defer action on this communication.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board for July 23 were presented. The recommendation that the use of salvarsan in the Out-patient Department be discontinued, and that it be dispensed only on the requisition of the Visiting or Assistant Visiting Surgeon, was approved; and the recommendation that visitors shall not be excluded from the wards while the members of the attending staff are making rounds was approved.

Consideration was given to the recommendation, contained in the minutes of the Executive Committee of the Bellevue Medical Board of June 25, that a qualified Ambulance Surgeon be sent on each call received by the Psychopathic Department. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To deny the request, as this work can be more satisfactorily performed by a Nurse permanently in that service.

New Business.

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

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
