MESSAGE FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The following message was received from his Honor the Mayor, announcing the death ot the Hon. Azariah C. Flagg :

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, November 26, 1873.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

GENTLEMEN: It is with profound sorrow that I communicate to you officially the intelligence that Azariah C. Flagg died at his residence in this city on the evening of the 24th inst. At the close of next month it will be fifteen years since the public correst of this emission was terminated. In career of this eminent citizen was terminated. In that interval, totally bereft of eye-sight, but with that interval, totally bereft of eye-sight, but with an intellect clear and strong, and a spirit cour-agous and serene, he has lived in complete retire-ment, fulfilling some private trusts, and ever thoughtful of all public interests. At last, when a few days would have completed an age of eighty-three years, he has passed from among us. There are peculiarities in the public career and public character of Mr. Flagg which make it specially fit that the people of this State, and the people of this city, should pause a moment in their busy life to render a conspicious homage to him while his mortal remains are passing to the tomb.

tomb. He was born in Orwell, in the State of Ver-mont, on the 28th day of November, 1790. In early youth he migrated to Plattsburg, in this State. He had an honorable share in the defence early youth he migrated to riactsong, in this State. He had an honorable share in the defence of that place against the British invasion in the war of 1812-15 He sought a frugal livelihood as editor and printer of the Plattsburg Republi-can, a Democratic newspaper. In November, 1822, he was elected by the county of Clinton to the Assembly. He served in that body with dis-tinction during the sessions of 1823 and 1824. In February, 1826, he was elected Secretary of State by the Legislature, and he held that office until January, 1833, when he was elected Comp-troller. He held the latter office until 1839. He was restored to it in 1842, and continued to hold it until the close of 1847. His official service consisted of two years in the Assembly, and nine-teen years in the Canal Board as Comptroller or Secretary of State, and his unofficial service was teen years in the Canal Board as Comproher or Secretary of State, and his unofficial service was even more valuable during the three years, from 1839 to 1842. His career in State administra-tion may be considered as comprising twenty-five

years. In this career of a quarter of a century in the administrations of the State, Mr. Flagg's merit and renown will be found, not in the catalogue of the great offices he held, but in the wise meas-ures and honest policy he originated or maintain-ed—in the ability, vigor and courage with which the great offices he held, but in the wise measures and honest policy he originated or maintained—in the ability, vigor and courage with which he sustained the right and confronted the wrong —and in the great fact that he invariably wielded official power and party leadership for the cause of good government—for purity in legislation and in the great fact that he invariably wielded official power and party leadership for the cause of good government—for purity in legislation and in the great fact that he invariably wielded official power and party leadership for the cause of good government—for purity in legislation and in administration ; that he used these great influences—not for the purposes of individual ambition or personal gain, but exclusively and undeviatingly for the public good ; that he contributed and the tone of official and political morals in both parties, and in the whole public, during this long period, in the greatest State in the Union. Mr. Flagg was united with Martin Van Buren, whose organizing genius and masterly abilities created the association ; with Silas Wright and William L. Marcy, also statesmen of the first class. They were all men of probity, frugality, and personal virtue, and they attracted to their side similar characters in all parts of the State. Mr. Flagg made the State finances his speciality, and surpassed all his associates in enterprise.

The principles of economy practiced by him in the affairs of the State were continued in the affairs of the city and county of New York. His administration, though sharply criticised, stands in bright relief, a lasting monu-ment of economy and integrity.
