

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT-CITY OF NEW YORK, MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, Friday, September 28, 1877—1 o'clock P. M.

The Board met in pursuance of the following call:

SIR—I respectfully transmit the following proceedings of the Board of Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction, adopted at a meeting held this day:

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board address a communication to the Honorable Board of Apportionment, requesting a transfer of \$4,000 from the unexpended balance for "Repairs to Buildings and Apparatus," 1876, to be used for the payment of salaries of Guards, Keepers, etc.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

A resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to ascertain and report what steps, if any, can be taken, to appropriate a sum of money for the relief of the poor families who have lost all their effects by the late fire at Tenth avenue and Thirty-fifth street, having been referred to the Comptroller at the last meeting, I respectfully report, that no fund exists out of which such an appropriation can be made.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is restricted by the Charter from making any appropriation except for certain specific purposes, and the amounts required for conducting the business of the city by the various Departments, and therefore cannot appropriate money for this purpose, whatever sympathy may be felt for the unfortunate sufferers from fire.

SIR—Your communication of 11th inst., in regard to the widening of the Boulevard, between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets, is received.

The law under which the Commissioners acted in this matter, in assessing the city for one-half of the improvement, is section 1, chapter 920, Laws of 1869. The same act, section 2, also provides for the payment of the assessment upon the city, by issuing stock to be denominated "City Improvement Stock," which shall be redeemable within twenty years, and bear interest at a rate not to exceed seven per cent, per annum. seven per cent. per annum.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment appointed by the Supreme Court for opening and widening certain streets and avenues, having assessed the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York for one-half the expense of said improvements, and the reports of the Commissioners thereon having been confirmed by the said court, the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is now required for the issue of bonds to provide for the payment of assessments on the city.

The improvements referred to are as follows:

Widening the Boulevard, between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets. Commissioners appointed May 2, 1874. Report confirmed May 19, 1877. Amount of Assessment on the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.

Widening One Hundred and Tenth street, from Eighth avenue, 250 feet west; Commissioners appointed May 2, 1874; report confirmed April 17, 1877; amount of assessment on the Mayor, Alderman and Commonalty of the city of New

York.

Opening One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, from Kingsbridge road to Tenth avenue; Commissioners appointed October 28, 1875; report confirmed April 18, 1877; amount of assessment on the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the city of New York.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held October 1, 1877.

Street Ferry, James Slip Ferry, and Houston Street Ferry, were received and ordered on file.

The Comptroller submitted a report relative to leases of ferry franchises, which, on motion, was

The Comptroller submitted the following preamble and resolution, adopted by the Common Council September 3, 1877, which, on motion, were referred to the Comptroller, viz.:

Whereas, The importance to this city, and many of its inhabitants, of direct communication by water between the upper, lower, and intermediate portions of this city cannot be over estimated;

Be it therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby directed, in advertising the sale of the franchise for a ferry between Harlem and Peck slip, and from Mott Haven to Fulton Market slip, to stipulate for a landing at or near the foot of Eighty-fourth street, East river, by the boats used by both ferries, each way, as often as the public convenience may require, but not less than once every hour, between the hours of 7 and 9 A. M., and 3 and 7 P. M.; and the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are hereby directed not to execute any lease for either of said ferries unless the stipulation above mentioned is included in such lease.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized and empowered to take the necessary measures to lease, at public auction, to the highest bidder, the franchises of the following ferries, for a period not exceeding ten years, said leases to be prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, and to be executed by the Comptroller on behalf of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Ferry from Peck slip to the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, at Third avenue, Harlem.

Ferry from Peck slip to the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, at Third avenue, Harlem, with an intermediate landing at or near Eighty-fourth street, East river.

Ferry from Fulton Market slip, New York City, to Mott Haven, with an intermediate landing at or near Eighty-fourth street, East river.

Ferry from Roosevelt street, East river, to South Seventh street, Brooklyn, E. D.

A communication was received from Vincent C. King, Esq., President of the Commissioners of the Fire Department, transmitting to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a copy of the preamble and resolution adopted by the said Commissioners of the Fire Department, September 29, 1877, as

"Whereas, The building located twenty-five (25) feet north of the northeasterly corner of One Hundred and Fortieth street and Third avenue, recently occupied by Hook and Ladder Company No. 17, is the property of the city, and the lot upon which the said building is located being the property of George Smith, from whom the said premises were leased; and "Whereas, This Department has no further use for the said premises; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the said building be and it is hereby transferred over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and that they be and are hereby requested to have the said building disposed of in such a manner as to relieve this Department from all obligation to pay the rent of said premises, as soon as practicable."
