CITY PRISON (TOMBS), March 31, 1890.

#### Improvements and Repairs at City Prison (Tombs) from January 1 to March 31, 1890.

Painters—Painted 80 cells in new prison (each cell being eight feet two inches long, five feet four inches wide and eight feet three inches high), and halls of prison, iron grating and railings on cellar around new prison, 3 storm houses and fence in prison yard; calcimined walls and ceilings of 6 large rooms in female prison.

Plumbers—Placed 29 faucets in water-pipes; repaired 46 water-closets, bath tub, 2 pumps and 3 stoves, also repaired water-pipes and gas-pipes.

Tinsmiths—Placed new bottoms in 14 boilers and 3 ash cans for kitchen; made galvanized iron-pipe for chimneys on Magdalen, 30 feet stove-pipe for counsel room, sheet-iron ash can for boiler room; repaired speaking tube, gongs and bell.

It is impossible for me to give the total attendance for the quarter, as prior to my taking charge of the school, on February 11, only a record of the averages was kept of the same. The total attendance for the month of March, it will be seen, was 1,610.

The "Evening Class for All," which had been holding three weekly sessions, I divided on February 18, into the "Boys' Evening Class" and the "Adult Evening Class," the former having three and the latter two sessions weekly.

The "Senior Class" is substantially the former "Day Class," its sessions being held in the afternoon. In it there are three classes in arithmetic, studying respectively, the first four rules, fractions and decimal fractions and reduction, besides penmanship, reading, spelling, history and geography.

The "Primary Class" is held in the forenoon for inmates desiring to learn the alphabet, as well as reading and writing.

The "Teachers' Class" was organized for the purpose of getting the inmates out of their dormitories, when not working in their gangs. Singing is had, moral instruction given, together with readings and recitations, in which the inmates take part.

In the "Reading Class" the boys are allowed the use, in the school-room, of illustrated and other papers, books, etc., from the Reading Room, as a reward for general good conduct. During the month of March I have been able to supply the meritorious ones with sufficient illustrated papers, etc., and with books from the School Library (which has been catalogued for the purpose), to read in their dormitories, as well as holding two sessions of this class.

Black-board exercises, temperance, arithmetic, physiology and hygiene, with illustrated charts, together with civil government, are among the studies of the evening sessions.

The men have been employed as follows: One as a plumber, the others as carpenters, painters, drivers, or in carrying coal and meals to the wards and keeping the grounds clean.

The painters have, in addition to the usual jobbing in painting and glazing, done the following work: Painted Pavilion L and Pavilion J and the House for Feeble-minded throughout, the dining-room, kitchen and bath-room of Pavilion E, the Nurses' rooms in Wards 15 and 16, the Workhouse men's dining-room and the boys' dormitory in Pavilion F, also Ward 19.

The carpenters have been mainly engaged in doing the jobbing work that is constantly required to be done. Special mention may be made of the following: Considerable work has been done on the new Conservatory, which is now well advanced towards completion. The floor of Ward 17 has been repaired; new floors have been laid in the dining-room, bath-room and pantry of Pavilion E; partitions have been put up in the new Workhouse dormitory; the ice-house and the store have been refitted throughout; guard railings and closets have been put up in the new laundry, and some repairing has been done there. New floors have been laid in two wards of the Infants' Hospital. Of the five or six carpenters here during the quarter, two have worked under the supervision of the Superintendent of Schools.

LABOR REPORT.

Of the male patients, a daily average of 126 have been employed during the quarter as follows: 19 in kitchen, 18 in pavilions, 2 in engine room, 1 in carpenter shop, 86 at shoveling and unloading coal, removing freight from dock, also lumber, digging and covering in trenches, shoveling snow, assisting mechanics round new buildings, assisting at sea-wall, taking clothes to and from laundry, etc.

Of the female patients, a daily average of 375 have been engaged in the following manner: Housework, sewing and knitting, 320; in the laundry, 41; scrubbing offices, store, drug-store, employees' rooms, etc., 7; as help for medical staff and officers, 7.

126,113 pieces have been laundered.

43,395 articles of clothing and bedding have been repaired and 3,233 made. Following is an itemized statement:

The Engineer, Fireman and assistants have pumped water to pavilions; have attended to steam-boilers, steam heating, and general repairs to steam, water, waste, and sewer pipes; assisted in running electric-light plant during the ten days test, and during repairs to steam-boilers; put in new hot-water tank in Pavilion 3; have done all plumbing in Medical Superintendent's new residence, and kept all tools, etc., in repair.

The Tinsmith has repaired ventilators on Pavilion 3; put in new stoves and stove-pipe in pavilions; made and put up stove-pipe and elbows and put up stoves in electric station and Laundry; put new roof on pump house; made 10 galvanized-iron ash cans for pavilions; made 194 feet leaders for pavilions; made 36 gallon pitchers and 24 tea-pots; made 4 garbage cans and 6 ventilators; made dippers and strainers for kitchen; lined gutters on Pavilion 4 and kept all tinware in repair.

The Carpenter and assistants have made new ceilings for electric station; made circles for ceilings in pavilions; wainscoted water-closets in Pavilion 3; put new doors in electric-light house; made 6 benches, and new door for office; been building new rooms for Attendants; made new closets in Female Attendants' dining room; put oil cloth on tables; made new step-ladders; made new pantry; put strips on floors; altered entrance to Drug Store; made door and put up rail; made water-closets and wash-tubs in new residence for Medical Superintendent; prepared for steam-pipes in Pavilions 2, 3 and Drug Store, and done all necessary repairs to furniture, sash, roofs, floors, etc.

The Painter and assistants have painted and decorated the dining-room, pantry and access hall, varnished and painted ceiling and walls of bath-room and bath-tubs of Pavilion 3; have painted and decorated the dining-room, varnished walls and ceiling of access hall and bath-room, painted bath-tubs, and painted Attendants' room and vestibule of Pavilion 1; have oiled and varnished ceiling and partitions and painted the walls of electric-light house; have painted dining-room, Attendants' room, pantry and new closet in Pavilion C; have painted the dish closets in Pavilion D; have oiled, varnished and painted doors and fire-places in new residence; painted small row-boat; painted new employees' rooms, door and storm house of Drug Store, new leaders on all pavilions, put in window lights where required and kept paint work in repair, and are now painting outside of Pavilion 4.

The Plasterer has kept walls and ceilings of pavilions in repair.

(2.) Bidders will be required to complete the entire work to the satisfaction of the Department of Docks, and in substantial accordance with the specifications of the contract and the plans therein referred to. No extra compensation, beyond the amount payable for each class of the work before mentioned, which shall be actually performed, at the prices therefor, to be specified by the lowest bidder, shall be due or payable for the entire work.

The work to be done under this contract is to be commenced within five days after the date of the contract, and all work to be done under the contract (except about 118 feet of the shore end of the pier, which will not be constructed until the bulkhead-wall is constructed by the Department of Docks), is to be fully completed on or before the 1st day of October, 1890; and the said about 118 feet is to be completed within sixty days after notice shall be given to the Contractor by said Department of Docks that work on the said about 118 feet may be begun; and the damages to be paid by the Contractor for each day that the contract may be unfulfilled after the time fixed for the fulfillment thereof has expired, are, by a clause in the contract, determined, fixed and liquidated at Fifty Dollars per day.

All the old material taken from the said old pier at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street, to be removed under this contract, will be relinquished to the contractor, and bidders must estimate the value of such material when considering the price for which they will do the work under the contract.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, if unpaid, will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States jurors, are not exempt.

### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

### PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 922 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
