To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

At a meeting of this Board held on January 19, a communication from the Department of Charities and Correction was referred to the Comptroller, asking for the reapportionment of the appropriation for salaries under the different sub-heads to that Department in the Final Estimate ior

On December 14, 1891, this Board adopted a resolution declaring as its policy for the future that no transfers of appropriations would be sanctioned and authorized, "except to provide for some special emergency." some special emergency.

The appropriation for salaries to the Department of Public Charities and Correction has been made in former years in a lump sum, to be distributed as required among the various branches of service in that department, but for the present year the amounts appropriated were specified for these several objects, according to a statement of "salaries," for the Department, which, it appears, does not agree with the amounts actually called for by the pay-rolls existing on the 1st of January for the year 1892. The reapportionment of salaries is asked for by the Department of Public Charities and Correction for the purpose of distributing the appropriation for salaries according to the existing pay-rolls. As this object seems to come within the exception provided for by the resolution of the Board regarding "transfers," and no change is made in the total amount appropriated for salaries, while the distribution of it only is changed to adjust the several accounts for the year 1891, I recommend, therefore, that the changes in the appropriations asked for be allowed, and I submit a resolution for that purpose for such action as the Board may deem advisable.
