

The 933 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.38, against 24.82 for the previous week and 22.77 for the corresponding week of 1894.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 205, 65, 102, 10 and 3, against 155, 82, 93, 6 and 3 for the previous week, a total of 385 against 339. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Twelfth, Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Eighteenth Ward. The increase of measles was most marked in the Seventeenth Ward, and the decrease in the Eleventh Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Ninth, Eleventh, Nineteenth and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Seventeenth and Eighteenth Wards. Five of the 10 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 4 were below Fourteenth street, mostly east of Fourth avenue and the Bowery. The 3 cases of small-pox were between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, East and West.
