BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
NEW YORK, October 30, 1894.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at eleven o'clock A. M., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Works, Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald and Colonel William Seward.

The minutes of the meeting held on October 11 were read and approved.

A communication was received from the Comptroller transmitting the following resolutions:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
October 12, 1894.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held October 12, 1894, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Armory Commissioners, at a meeting held October 11, 1894, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That Lewis M. Sweet be and he is hereby appointed from the eligible civil service list as Stenographer and Typewriter, at a salary of twelve hundred dollars per annum, and that the

Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to approve of the same, and authorize the issue of bonds to the extent of five thousand dollars to be devoted to the payment of salaries of employees and contingencies of the Armory Board."

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 3, chapter 91 of the Laws of 1884, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby concur in and approve of the said resolution; and

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 299 of the Laws of 1883, and the laws amendatory thereto and supplementary thereof, the Comptroller be and hereby is authorized and directed to issue from time to time, as may be required, redeemable in not less than ten nor more than twenty years from the date of issue thereof, and at such rate of interest as he may determine, not exceeding three per cent. per annum, "Consolidated Stock of the City of New York," which shall also be designated "Armory Bonds," to the amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), the proceeds of which stock or bonds shall be applied to the purposes mentioned in the aforesaid resolution of the Armory Board; and

Resolved, That said stock or bonds are hereby exempted from taxation by the City and County of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 and an ordinance of the Common Council approved by the Mayor October 2, 1880.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held October 12, 1894, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held March 1, 1894, concurred in a resolution of the Board of Armory Commissioners adopted February 26, 1894, adopting the plans of Messrs. Cable & Sargent for an armory for the Ninth Regiment, N. G., S. N. Y., provided that the cost of constructing said armory under said plans, including Architect's fees, should not exceed the sum of two hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars (\$285,000), and authorized the Comptroller to issue bonds to the amount of two hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars (\$285,000) to provide for the payment of the same; and

Whereas, The Board of Armory Commissioners, at a meeting held October 11, 1894, adopted a resolution awarding the contract for erecting said armory to James D. Murphy, the lowest bidder therefor, his bid amounting to two hundred and ninety-seven thousand eight hundred dollars (\$297,800); and

Whereas, The Board of Armory Commissioners, at a meeting held October 11, 1894, adopted preambles and a resolution from which it appears that the increased cost of erecting the said armory was due to the provisions of chapter 277 of the Laws of 1894, requiring all stone to be dressed within the State or municipality, and in which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to authorize the additional issue of bonds to the amount of twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$27,000), to be added to the amount already authorized, making the total sum required to be issued for the purposes aforesaid three hundred and twelve thousand dollars (\$312,000); therefore, be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 3, chapter 91 of the Laws of 1884, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund concur in the said resolutions and do hereby approve of said award of contract to James D. Murphy, for the erection of an armory for the Ninth Regiment, N. G., S. N. Y., on the north side of Fourteenth street, west of Sixth avenue, amounting to two hundred and ninety-seven thousand eight hundred dollars (\$297,800); and

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 299 of the Laws of 1883, and the Laws amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized and directed to issue from time to time, as may be required, redeemable in not less than ten nor more than twenty years from the date of issue thereof, and at such rate of interest as he may determine, not exceeding three per cent., "Consolidated Stock of the City of New York," which shall also be designated "Armory Bonds," to the amount of twenty-seven thousand dollars, (\$27,000), the proceeds of which stock or bonds shall be applied in payment of the contract for erecting an armory for the Ninth Regiment, N. G., S. N. Y., on the north side of Fourteenth street, west of Sixth avenue, and for the Architect's fees connected therewith, in addition to the amount heretofore authorized to be issued for said purpose by a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted March 1, 1894; and

Resolved, That the said stock be and hereby is exempted from taxation by the City and County of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 and the ordinances of the Common Council approved by the Mayor October 2, 1880.

James D. Murphy submitted a sample of gray granite for the construction of the Ninth Regiment Armory, and presented the following communication:

DEAR SIR—The granite of which a sample was submitted to your honorable Board, is one of the best grades of Maine granite. The quarries are located near Green's Landing, Maine, and the crushing strength is estimated at 15,000 pounds per square inch.

This granite has been extensively used by the Dock Department for the past ten years and has been very satisfactory.

Some of the buildings in which it has been used are the following:

Parapet work on Morningside Park, from One Hundred and Tenth to One Hundred and Twenty-third street; fire-engine house, West Tenth street, near Greenwich avenue; fire-engine house, One Hundred and Fifteenth street, near Lenox avenue; fire-engine house, One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, near Seventh avenue; fire-engine house, One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street and Park avenue; fire-engine house, Twenty-eighth street, between Second and Third avenues; George Ringler's Brewery, Ninety second street, between Second and Third avenues; P. Doelger's Brewery, Fifty-fifth street, between First avenue and Avenue A; foundation for Have-meyer Building; foundation for Hotel Netherland, Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue; Curtiss Building in Stone street; James Everard's Brewery, One Hundred and Thirty-third and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Madison avenue, Storage Building, Hudson and Light streets, and many others.

The Architects, being present, submitted a design for the corner-stone for the Ninth Regiment Armory. Colonel Seward moved that the design as submitted be approved.

DEAR SIRS—I beg to call the attention of your Board to the bill of Grissler & Son for balance due upon contract for carpenter work, etc., furnished at the Seventy-first Regiment Armory.

There was a dispute as to whether the locks were in compliance with the contract, and out of it arose a circumstance most disagreeable to me, and to which it is now needless to refer, except to say that it was without just basis. As to the locks, I am told they are not in strict compliance with the contract, and have reason to believe my information correct. I am, therefore, willing to accept such a reduction from the amount of the bill as may be deemed proper by your Board.

SIR—I respectfully protest, on behalf of the Seventy-first Regiment, against the acceptance of the locks which have been placed on the lockers of the Seventy-first Regiment Armory, for the

reason that the same are not in accordance with the contract, but are much inferior to those required by contract. The contract calls for double cylinder locks, whereas single cylinder locks have been used. The master key for one company will unlock all the lockers in all the other companies. In fact one master key will unlock every lock in the armory. The metal of which the keys are made appears to be very inferior, and a great number of keys have already been broken. It is also found that in several of the companies the key of one locker will unlock several other lockers.

I respectfully protest against the acceptance of these locks on any compromise as to price, and request that the Armory Board will require new locks to be supplied strictly in accordance with the terms of the contract.

SIR—I ask the consent and approval of the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners to lease for a term of ten years, at an annual rental of \$6,000, a stable, to be built for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning, at Nos. 44 and 46 Hamilton street.

I ask the consent and approval of the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners for the cancellation of the lease now existing for the stable used by this Department at the above-named place (Nos. 44 and 46 Hamilton street), and known as Stable "G." That lease was made on May 1, 1893, for a term of five years, at an annual rental of \$5,500.

The present stable is inadequate, and, in my opinion, unfit for the use of this Department. A large number of horses are required to be kept in a cellar without drainage, and, during the past summer, it was necessary to remove them from that place and put them in the yard. The stable is composed of a jumble of buildings, the greater part of which are of wood. It is a fire-trap, the existence of which endangers all property in that vicinity, and from which it would be impossible to rescue the horses in case of fire.

For the reasons stated I had determined to take every possible means to relieve this Department from the necessity of continuing to use these premises for stable purposes. Such intention having come to the knowledge of Mr. Philip Collins, the owner and lessor of the property, he has made an offer to build a suitable stable, fitted with all modern appliances, and constructed in the best manner upon plans to be approved by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning; the building to be 173 feet deep by 40 feet wide, with a yard 35 feet by 96 feet, containing a blacksmith's shop

and to rent the same to the City upon completion for ten years at an annual rental of \$6,000. If that is done, the department will be in possession of a stable, suitable and adequate, in a part of the city where it will be very difficult to procure any other location for a stable of such dimensions, and it will be relieved from the continuance of the obligation now existing to occupy premises wholly unfit for the purpose.

The Supervisor explained that the requisition from the District Attorney's Office was for as much carbon paper for the remainder of the year as the office had used during 1892, 1893, and the first nine months of 1894. The Mayor said that the paper should be supplied as needed and no large

stock should be laid in, as the paper becomes brittle. On his motion, and by a concurrent vote of the three officers, the Supervisor was directed to supply three hundred sheets of carbon paper on the requisition.

On motion of the Mayor, the requisition from the Bureau of Lamps and Gas in the Department of Public Works was amended so as to call for 1,000 blanks instead of 100, as the cost of composition and ruling on them would be almost as great for 100 as for 1,000, and the additional cost of paper and presswork would be but slightly increased.

By a concurrent vote of the three officers, the Supervisor was instructed to procure, by direct order—that is, without contract let after advertisement—the articles called for by the requisitions allowed, that course being deemed to be for the best interests of the city.

The Supervisor reported that requisitions for the books needed during 1895, which should have been received prior to October 1, had not yet come from the Armory Board, Finance Department, Counsel to the Corporation, Public Administrator, Corporation Attorney, Attorney to Commissioner of Street Improvements, Bureau of Street Opening, Health Department, and the First, Second, Ninth and Tenth District Courts. On motion of the Mayor, the Supervisor was directed to inform the heads of the several departments and bureaus mentioned that if requisitions were not received from them by October 17 it would be assumed that they needed no books for the year 1895. The Supervisor was instructed by a concurrent vote of the three officers to prepare the contract specifications for books and have them printed.

On motion of the Mayor, the Supervisor of the City Record was, by a concurrent vote of the three officers, directed to make an agreement with the printer of the CITY RECORD for the compilation of the registry lists.

Bills were approved as follows: M. B. Brown, \$1,619.15 (Voucher 278); \$1,281.87 (Voucher 279); and \$5,393.67 (Voucher 284); the New York Law Journal Publishing Company, \$333.33 (Voucher 271); M. F. Conway, \$1.25 (Voucher 280); the American District Telegraph Company, \$8.40 (Voucher 281); National Press Intelligence Company, \$5.45 (Voucher 282); Washington H. Hettler \$5 (Voucher 283), and American Bank Note Company, \$35 (Voucher 285).

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thereupon be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
