The 603 deaths represent a death-rate of 16.04 against 16.63 for the previous week and 20.86 for the corresponding week of 1895. Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked decrease, the number of cases reported of

Contagious and infectious discases show a marked decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 145, 121, 110, 37 and 0, against 209, 152, 152, 18 and 0 for the previous week, a total of 413 against 531. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Ninth and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Tweilth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Eighteenth and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Twelfth and Seventeenth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eighteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Tenth and Nineteenth Wards. Of the 28 cases of typhoid fever reported 24 were above Fortieth street and 4 were below Fourteenth street. No case of small-pox was reported. By order of the Board.


