

Whereas, Lesher, Whitman & Co. are the owners and proprietors of all the land and land under water bounded westerly by the easterly line of Avenue A, northerly by the southerly line of East Ninety-first street, easterly by the bulkhead lines established in 1887, and southerly by the northerly line of East Ninetieth street, together with the rights of wharfage, cranage and emoluments connected with said premises; and

Whereas, The Department of Docks and Ferries desires to have the bulkhead wall built on the lines established in 1887 in said locality and to fill in intervening space to said bulkhead line, and to make, finish and pave the marginal street, wharf or place in accordance with the plan here-tofore adopted by the Department of Docks and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and

Resolved, That the Department of Docks and Ferries, for the purpose of reimbursing said private owners for the expense of said improvement, and as to the wharfage, cranage and other riparian rights therein, hereby agree, license and permit, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the said private owners of the hereinbefore described wharf property to make the said improvements as aforesaid, such work to be done by the Department of Docks and Ferries at the cost and expense of such private owners.

Resolved, That the terms and conditions upon which such permit, license and authority are

given and such agreement is made are as follows:

That the private owners shall relinquish to The City of New York, to form the said marginal street, wharf or place, all their right in said upland, land under water and made land comprising said marginal street, and all their right in and to the present bulkhead owned by them, and the wharfage, cranage and other emoluments thereto belonging.

That The City of New York, acting by said Department of Docks and Ferries, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, shall, upon the completion of the new bulkhead, grant and convey to the owners of the present bulkhead above named the same rights of wharfage, etc., in the new bulkhead; the same shall belong solely and exclusively to said owners of the existing bulkhead. And all wharfage, cranage, advantages and other emoluments arising or accruing to said new bulkhead shall be enjoyed and held by said owners in the same manner and by the same estate that they now hold and enjoy the old bulkhead.

#### DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES.

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES-CITY OF NEW YORK, Commissioner's Office, Stewart Building, Manhattan, New York City, N. Y., August 10, 1898.

Supervisor of the City Record:

SIR—On the 16th of June, 1898, certain bridges in the Borough of The Bronx were transferred to the Department of Highways. Upon these bridges the following persons were employed.
