ABSTRACT OF THE MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF STATEN ISLAND.

The Local Board of Staten Island met at the Borough Office in the First National Bank building at St. George, in the Borough of Richmond, on Tuesday, May 6, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

There were present Alderman Gillies, Alderman Shea and President Cromwell.

Hamilton Avenue, Ward 1, Regulate, Macadamize, etc.

It was resolved to rescind the resolution adopted April 22 to regulate, grade and macadamize Hamilton avenue, between Westervelt avenue and St. Mark's place, and it was resolved in place thereof, that Hamilton avenue, between St. Mark's place and Westervelt avenue, in the First Ward of the Borough of Richmond, be regulated, graded and macadamized; that it be curbed and guttered where not already curbed and guttered; that such curbing and guttering as have already been laid be reset where necessary; and that cross walks be laid where necessary.

A petition to extend Palmer avenue, in the Third Ward, was laid over for report to President Cromwell by the Commissioner of Public Works.

First Street, Ward 1, Sanitary Sewer.

It was resolved that a sanitary sewer be laid in First street, in the First Ward of the Borough of Richmond, to connect with the sanitary sewer in Clinton avenue, and extending about 290 feet, more or less, eastward from said Clinton avenue, said 290 feet, more or less, being approximately the entire distance to which said First street is open as a public street in that part of the street extending eastward from Clinton avenue.

Resolved, By the Local Board of the Staten Island District, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, that the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

That a storm water sewer, with the necessary manholes and receiving basins, be constructed from Richmond terrace to tidewater, between Water and Taylor streets, and that it be constructed as a temporary sewer, according to the provisions contained in section 394 of the Greater New York Charter, as revised; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Amos Street, Ward 4, Improvement.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following resolution, adopted by the Local Board of Staten Island, on March 11, 1902, be and the same hereby is rescinded:

Resolved, That the Local Board, First District, Borough of Richmond, The City of New York, hereby recommends that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment direct the Corporation Counsel to take the necessary steps to acquire for use as a public street a strip of land about 200 feet by 50 feet adjoining Tompkins avenue, as shown on the map of Amos street, now on file in the office of the County Clerk of the County of Richmond; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the following resolution, adopted by the Local Board of Staten Island on March 11, 1902, be and the same hereby is rescinded:

Whereas, That part of Amos street in the Fourth Ward, which lies between Bay street and Cross street is named for improvement in the road bond issue of the former town of Southfield, and

Whereas, There is a balance in this fund sufficient to do the work, and the plans and specifications are ready for letting, be it

Resolved, That the work of the regulating, grading of Amos street in the Fourth Ward, etc., be paid by assessment as petitioned for, shall extend from Cross street to Tompkins avenue only. And it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Amos Street, Ward 4, Change of Grade.

The following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, etc.,

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To regrade Amos street, in the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Richmond, to conform to the revised or corrected map or plan filed in the office of the President of the Borough, entitled "(Amended) Map and Profile of Amos Street, from Bay to Centre street, as per resolution of the Board of Public Improvements," said regrading to include said Amos street from Cross street westward so far as it is now open for improvement as a public street, namely to within 200 feet, more or less, of the line of Centre street, otherwise known as Tompkins avenue; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Amos Street, Ward 4, Extension.

The following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, etc.,

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To extend Amos street, in the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Richmond, westerly to Tompkins avenue, otherwise known as Centre street; and to this end,

To acquire title for a street to a piece or parcel of land about 200 feet by about 25 feet, more or less, lying easterly from Tompkins avenue, otherwise known as

Centre street, for about 200 feet, more or less, being the northerly half of the extension of Amos street petitioned for; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby respectfully request the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, there being no buildings on said piece or parcel of land, to direct that the title thereto shall be vested in the City of New York at as early a date as possible, in accordance with the provisions of section 990 of the Greater New York Charter; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval

An inquirer concerning the coming expiration of the former town of Edgewater contract with the Crystal Water Company was referred by President Cromwell to the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Alderman Maloy asked about an electric light petitioned for by the German Evangelical Lutheran Emanuel Church of St. John, and was referred to the same Deputy Commissioner.

The Master Plumbers' Association of Richmond Borough asked to have sewer connection charges equalized in the various wards, and was instructed to draw up a statement, a plan for equalization having already been begun by the President of the borough.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.**(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)**

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in the Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, on Friday, May 23, 1902, at 2.30 p. m.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. Seth Low, presided.

LAYING OUT AN APPROACH TO THE WILLINK ENTRANCE TO PROSPECT PARK, BROOKLYN.

In the matter of the proposed laying out of an entrance to the Willink entrance to Prospect Park, in the Borough of Brooklyn, the Secretary presented his report, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing, as required by law.

Mr. William R. Willcox, President of the Park Board; Mr. Richard Young, Park Commissioner for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; Mr. Carroll, President of the Manufacturers' Association; Professor Hooper, of the Brooklyn Institute or Arts and Science; Mr. Weston, President of the Board of Trade of the Twenty-sixth Ward; ex-Congressman Howe and others appeared in favor of the proposition.

Judge Neu appeared in opposition to acquiring so much property for the entrance.

The following resolutions, adopted by the Twenty-ninth Ward Taxpayers' Association, were placed on file:

Twenty-ninth Ward Taxpayers' Association, Borough of Brooklyn, New York.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this association, the present Willink entrance to Prospect Park is dangerous and the surroundings disgraceful. More people use this entrance than any other, especially on the most crowded days. Five important surface car lines cross or terminate here, producing great congestion. Conditions are growing worse instead of better, as the population increases. The opening of Bedford avenue will greatly increase the need of more room at this entrance.

Resolved, That Park Commissioner Young's plan to purchase the land lying between Flatbush avenue and Washington avenue should be carried out before more buildings are erected. This necessary and permanent improvement can now be obtained at small cost.

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be mailed to the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the President appoint a committee of twenty-five members, to have charge of this matter with power to act.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed change of grades, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 9th day of May, 1902, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade of East Fourteenth street, between Caton avenue and Church avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 23d day of May, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m., at which meeting such proposed change of grade would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed change of grade would be considered, to be published in the "City Record" and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 23d day of May, 1902; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record, and of the publishers of the corporation newspapers, that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the "City Record" and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 23d day of May, 1902; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed change of grade who have appeared, and such proposed change of grade was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade of East Fourteenth street, between Caton avenue and Church avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to change the grade of the aforesaid street as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of East Fourteenth street and Caton avenue, the elevation to be 49.62 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore.

1. Thence southerly to a point 220 feet south of the centre line of Caton avenue, the elevation to be 50.29 feet above mean high-water datum;

2. Thence southerly to the intersection of East Fourteenth street and Caton avenue, the elevation to be 44.54 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York, by changing the grade of East Fourteenth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for its action thereon.

"A"—Ten Eyck Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Ten Eyck street and Stewart avenue, the elevation to be 6.55 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore;

1st. Thence westerly to the intersection of Varick avenue, the elevation to be 9.96 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence westerly to the intersection of the canal, the elevation to be 5.07 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore.

"B"—Meadow Street.

1st. Thence westerly to a point distant 215 feet easterly from the eastern curb-line of Varick avenue, the elevation to be 12.26 feet above mean high-water datum;

2d. Thence westerly to the intersection of Varick avenue, the elevation to be 11.18 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore;

3d. Thence westerly to a point distant 215 feet westerly from the western curb-line of Varick avenue, the elevation to be 12.26 feet above mean high-water datum;

4th. Thence westerly to the intersection of Johnson avenue and Porter avenue, the elevation to be 11.18 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore.

"I"—Varick Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Varick avenue and Metropolitan avenue, the elevation to be 7.81 feet above mean high-water datum as heretofore;

1st. Thence southerly to the intersection of Varick avenue and Ten Eyck street the elevation to be 9.96 feet above mean high-water datum.

All elevations refer to mean high-water datum as established by the Department of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades in the territory bounded by Stewart avenue, Johnson avenue, the canal and Metropolitan avenue, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for its action thereon.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of The Bronx and President of the Borough of Queens—15.

LAND FOR BLACKWELL'S ISLAND BRIDGE.

The hearing in the matter of the purchase of the property of the New York Steam Heating Company's plant in connection with the construction of the Blackwell's Island Bridge, was laid over.

SEWERS IN AVENUE G, PAERDEGAT AVENUE, ETC., BROOKLYN.

In accordance with the action taken by the Board on the 16th instant, hearing was opened in the matter of the proposed construction of sewers in Avenue G, Flatbush avenue, Nostrand avenue, Avenue F, Paerdegat avenue and East Forty-fifth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Mr. Ditmars, representing the estate of James Ditmars, and Mr. W. H. Kowenhoven, appeared in opposition to the proposed sewers; and Mr. Driggs, representing the Twenty-ninth Ward Taxpayers' Association, Mr. Meyer and others appeared in favor of the same.

The hearing was closed, and the matter laid over for future consideration.

The Board then took up the consideration of financial matters.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the week ending March 13, 1902.

A petition was received from several of the oyster dealers in the vicinity of Gansevoort Market, North River, requesting that permission be granted to berth an additional shell boat in the oyster basin at the foot of Gansevoort street, on the north side of the Gansevoort Market pier. A hearing on the application was held March 13, 1902, and the application was then laid over for consideration.

A request was received from Wing, Putnam & Burlingham, attorneys for the Anchor Line, asking that the question of the powers of the Commissioner of Docks and of the former Board of Docks to grant permission to the Penn-

sylvania Railroad Company to place a ferry rack within a portion of the northerly half of the slip between the West Twenty-third street and West Twenty-fourth street piers, North River, be referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion, said attorneys questioning the validity of the lease granted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company in 1895, in so far as the lease granted to said company the right to use a portion of the lands under water in the northerly half of said slip. In accordance with such request, a detailed statement of facts was transmitted to the Corporation Counsel in order that he might, if he so desired, communicate with the Department as to the right to locate a rack over such lands under water; and the Corporation Counsel was requested to prepare an agreement to be executed by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company providing that said company will, if it removes the West Twenty-third street pier, pursuant to the permission granted by the former Board of Docks, December 6, 1901, rebuild said pier at the expiration of the lease of the franchise to operate a ferry at the foot of West Twenty-third street, and he was also requested to advise the Commissioner whether the non-revocation of the portion of the permit of December 6, 1901, authorizing the removal of the pier, is a valid consideration for the execution of such an agreement.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund having, on March 5, 1902, adopted a resolution approving of the establishment by the Commissioner of Docks of a ferry from and to the foot of East Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn, said ferry was, on March 8, 1902, established by the Commissioner, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to approve the terms and conditions for the sale of the franchise of said ferry at an annual rental of \$10,000.

At the request of the Comptroller, the agreement executed by the New York Dock Company, in connection with its application for permission to construct a shed on Pier No. 37, Atlantic Basin, Brooklyn, was transmitted to the Corporation Counsel for amendment by inserting a clause in the agreement providing that the said company will furnish to the Department of Docks and Ferries, upon the completion of the shed, a statement of the cost of its construction.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to advise whether, in order to secure lower insurance rates, the Department would be justified in insuring city property in a foreign company not maintaining a regular office in the United States, and whose transactions are not under the supervision of the State authorities.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were, on March 13, 1902, requested to consent to the purchase of a locomobile for the use of the Superintendent of Docks of this Department.

The La Veloce Navigazione Italiana a Vapore and the Navigazione Generale Italiana were notified March 12, 1902, that the Department will recommend to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the granting of a lease of the West Thirty-fourth street pier to said company, for a term of five years at a rental of \$30,000 for the first year, and an increase of \$1,000 for each succeeding year.

The form of renewal lease of the West Twenty-first Street Pier to H. & A. Allan for a term of ten years from February 1, 1902, at an annual rental of \$27,500, was transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

In accordance with the suggestion of the Corporation Counsel, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to amend their resolution asking for detailed information in connection with leases sent to them for approval, by striking out that portion of the resolution asking for data as to the value of the property.

An opinion having been received from the Corporation Counsel that the Commissioner of Docks has no power to grant free wharfage on water front property owned by the City, but that privileges may be granted for a nominal consideration, by and with the consent and approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Sanitarium for Hebrew Children was notified that, in view of such opinion, their application for permission to land at the East Third Street Pier will be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, when the rate of compensation can be determined.

The consent of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of the Municipal Civil Service Commission having been received, George W. Weir was transferred to this Department as Clerk, March 11, 1902, with compensation at the rate of \$900 per annum, to take effect when he reports for duty.

James G. McMurray was, on March 11, 1902, appointed temporarily as Roundsman, pending the preparation of an eligible list for such position, and the Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to consent to such temporary appointment, the compensation to be at the rate of \$1,200 per annum from the date on which said McMurray reports and is assigned to duty.

The following claims were ordered collected in accordance with reports of the Engineer-in-Chief on the following orders:

Secretary's Order No. 20,353, cost of removing rock from bulkhead wall between Seventy-fourth and Seventy-fifth streets, East River, to permit the placing of pipes thereat, amounting to \$13,351.80 for collection from the Manhattan Railway Company.

Secretary's Order No. 21,036, cost of dredging and removing sheet piles on site of suction tunnel at the foot of Thirty-eighth street, East River, \$1,964.87, for collection from Ryan & Parker.

Secretary's Order No. 21,478, cost of replacing cleats on the south side of the East Twentieth Street Pier, \$73.70, for collection from H. L. Herbert & Co.

Secretary's Order No. 21,509, cost of relaying pavement taken up to permit repairs to water pipe leading to Morton Street Pier, No. 42, North river, \$117.26, for collection from the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique.

Secretary's Order No. 21,529, cost of replacing anchor and rope lost from Twelve Ton Derrick No. 2, \$39.83, for collection from the Hudson River Lighterage Co.

Commissioner's Order No. 3, cost of hiring tug to remove dumper from Sherman's Creek, Harlem River, to East Nineteenth street, \$22.50, for collection from the Department of Street Cleaning.

Commissioner's Order No. 14, cost of repairing Scow "W" where damaged by scows, \$128.62, for collection from Brown & Fleming.

Commissioner's Order No. 42, cost of erecting fence on Pier, old 36, East River, \$32.85, for collection from the Penniman Estate.

The specifications and form of contract submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief for dredging between the Battery and West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, North River, were approved March 6, 1902, and ordered printed and advertised.

Permission was granted March 11, 1902, to James Monahan to maintain a swimming bath at the bulkhead between Jackson and Corlears streets, East River, the bath to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

Permission was granted the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry Company to make general repairs during the ensuing six months to the ferry racks at pier 2, East River, and at the foot of Thirty-ninth street, Brooklyn, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and to be kept within existing lines.

At the request of the Board of Armory Commissioners, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed, March 13, 1902, to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for the construction of a bulkhead wall, etc., between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, Brooklyn.

In response to the request received from John B. McDonald and the Union Stockyard and Market Company for a lease of the new pier to be constructed at the foot of Fifty-eighth street, North River, and for the construction of a bulkhead wall north of said pier, the applicants were notified that the Department is prepared to consider an offer from them upon any of the following propositions:

First—The Department will grant permission to the owner of the bulkhead rights to erect a bulkhead between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, North River, in accordance with the new plan adopted by this department, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, provided that said owner shall relinquish to the City of New York, to form part of the exterior street, all of his rights in and to the bulkhead between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, North River, together with the land under water covered by a grant, in front thereof, and other emoluments thereto appertaining, together with all rights appurtenant thereto, lying between the existing bulkhead and the new bulkhead line adopted by the Department of Docks. And the city, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, will, upon the completion of the new bulkhead, grant and convey to the owner in lieu of and exchange for said relinquished premises, and for reim-

bursing the private owner for the cost of the improvement made by him at his own expense, the same rights of wharfage, cramage and other emoluments in the new bulkhead as are appurtenant to the bulkhead as now constructed, and such rights shall attach to and apply to the new bulkhead to be built.

Second—The Department will erect the bulkhead between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, North River, by its employees and charge the cost thereof to the owner provided the owner shall relinquish his rights to the bulkhead upon the same conditions as are contained in the first proposition.

Third—The Department to build a pier at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street by its own employees or to contract for same, and to lease the north side and outer end of said pier, together with the surface thereof, to the applicants, charging them with the cost of changes as shown on the plans beyond that of an ordinary pier, in the way of additional foundations and accommodation for the conduits; or to fix an additional rent based upon the enhanced cost incident to the changes required.

Fourth—To lease the land under water covered by said pier, with the right to erect a pier thereon, with the necessary appurtenances required for carrying on the business, at the cost and expense of the applicants, reserving the south side of said pier when built.

It being understood that the first and second propositions are subject to the following conditions, namely: That in case at any time in the future The City of New York shall seek to acquire the rights referred to by process of law, or by private agreement according to law, that it shall pay said owner such an amount as may be determined upon in the proceedings for the acquisition of said rights, or to be agreed upon by said owner and the Department of Docks and Ferries to be the value of the rights of wharfage, cramage and other emoluments appertaining to the new bulkhead constructed by said parties under this permission upon the new lines, as the same exists at the date of this agreement.

The permit granted the Electric Fireproof Company to use and occupy the south half of the bulkhead between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, East River, was revoked as of February 1, 1902, the Assistant Dock Superintendent having reported that said company has not occupied the premises since that date.

In accordance with the request of the Corporation Counsel a requisition was ordered drawn in favor of William W. Fogg, for \$100 for services rendered as expert in the proceedings for the acquisition of water front property along Riverside Park.

In accordance with the recommendations of the Engineer-in-Chief, the lessees were directed to repair the bulkhead at the foot of Ninety-third street, East River; and the Commander of the Schoolship "St. Mary's" was directed to remove the old electric light poles formerly used by the Schoolship "St. Mary's" while berthed at the East Twenty-eighth street pier.

The following orders were issued to the Engineer-in-Chief:

To repair the bulkhead between Pier "A" and Pier, new 1, North River.
To repair the sheathing on the platform between Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, East River.
To prepare plans, specifications and forms of contract for the construction of a platform east of the easterly side of the approach to Piers, new 46 and 47, North River.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Mayor:
1st. Transmitting letter from Henry B. Davenport suggesting the desirability of The City of New York purchasing and operating the ferries between the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn.

2d. Transmitting copy of report of the Commissioners of Accounts in relation to the distribution to various funds of the moneys received by this Department. The Comptroller was requested to consent to the placing of moneys received from the sale of old material to the credit of the "Dock Fund" instead of to the "General Fund."

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting certified copies of resolutions approving proofs of Contracts Nos. 720, 727, 728 and 729, and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a renewal of the lease of Pier, new 58, North river, to John H. Starin for a term of ten years from May 1, 1902.

From the Comptroller:
1st. Requesting information in relation to the construction of the recreation ground between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river. Information furnished.

2d. Advising that this Department may make copies of maps of water grants now in his office when desired.

3d. Transmitting copy of report of his expert Accountant relative to the issuance of Treasurer's Orders by the former Board of Docks.

From the Corporation Counsel:
1st. Stating that the Commissioner of Docks has power to order work and supplies under Treasurer's Orders issued by the former Board of Docks prior to January 1, 1902, upon which some work has been done, provided such order was valid when made, but suggesting that in view of the radical changes made in the new Charter, orders so issued, but upon which no work has as yet been done, be canceled, where nothing has been done by the person to whom the order was given.

2d. Stating that if Treasurer's Orders issued by the former Board of Docks were for work of construction under the new plan and were made upon unanimous vote of the Board they cannot be cancelled without loss to the city if the persons to whom the orders were issued could show damage by reason of such cancellation.

3d. Stating that contracts for dredging awarded prior to January 1, 1902, are valid contracts and that the Commissioner of Docks has power to order dredging thereunder.

4th. Stating that the claim against Naughton & Co for wharfage for berth occupied by scow "Brooklyn" at the East Twenty-eighth street pier has been withdrawn and canceled as requested.

5th. In relation to the employment of Horgan & Slattery as Consulting Architects for this Department.

6th. Suggesting the adoption of a definite policy by the city with reference to the course to be pursued in the matter of applications made by private persons for grants of land under water. The Corporation Counsel was notified that the Attorney General has been requested to set a date for a conference upon the matter in question.

7th. Approving forms of Contracts Nos. 721, 722 and 723.

8th. Approving form of lease of Pier, new 12, East river, to the War Department.

9th. Requesting information and maps in connection with the work done by this Department between Ninetieth and Ninety-first streets, East river, for use in the suit brought by Whitman and others against the city to determine title to certain lands thereat. Maps and information furnished as requested.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission, stating that examination has been ordered for promotion of Freeman F. Huntington from position of Laborer to Messenger.

From the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, requesting that the slip approaches at locations where hydrants are now maintained for supplying tug boats be kept clear. Said Department notified that the slips have been and will be kept clear.

From the Commissioners of the Land Office, transmitting notice of application made by Ezra B. Tuttle for a grant of land under water at Newtown Creek, Borough of Brooklyn. Corporation Counsel requested to protest against the granting of said application.

From the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce, transmitting suggestions for consideration in connection with the subject of ferry facilities between the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

From John W. Weed, attorney, stating that his client, Mr. E. Platt Stratton, in the event of the establishment of a ferry between the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, East river, Borough of The Bronx, and the foot of Eighth avenue, College Point, Borough of Queens, will deed to the City a strip of land south of Eighth avenue sufficient to give the City free access to the proposed ferry.

From Bird S. Coler, transmitting pamphlet prepared by him on the question of "Municipal Ownership of Docks."

From steamboat owners on the East river, requesting that a pier on the East river be set aside for the use of steamboats carrying freight and passengers to and from the city of New York, and suggesting that the city construct a new pier on the

site of Pier, old 36, East river. Copy of the petition sent to the Corporation Counsel and his attention called to the necessity for the acquisition of said Pier, old 36, East river.

From Francis H. Leggett & Co., commending Dockmaster Donohue for services rendered by him in connection with the recovery of merchandise from sunken lighter between Piers, new 42 and 43, North river.

From the International Navigation Company, requesting a lease of three or more of the new piers to be constructed between Gansevoort and West Twenty-third streets, North river.

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting the completion of the work of constructing the extension to Pier, new 23, North river, March 5, 1902.

2d. Submitting cost of installing an electric light plant on the tug "Manhattan."
3d. Stating that the North German Lloyd Steamship Company have vacated the West Thirty-fourth street pier.

The following communications were laid over:

From the Corporation Counsel, in relation to the ownership of the bulkhead at the foot of Degraw street, Brooklyn, and suggesting that the lease of said bulkhead to John F. Walsh be canceled, and that the rental already paid by him be returned, after approval by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From the President of the Borough of Manhattan, requesting that berth be assigned for the free floating baths for the season of 1902.

From John B. McDonald, Contractor for the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, requesting permission to construct and maintain conduits through the marginal street and under the pier at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street.

From the American Malting Company, requesting renewal leases of the bulkheads foot of East Sixty-third street and between East Sixty-third and East Sixty-fourth streets.

From John A. Philbrick, in relation to the charges made by the lessees of the West Ninety-sixth street pier for the unloading of vessels thereat.

From Alexander Crawford Chenoweth, requesting permission to erect dumping boards on bulkhead north of West Forty-ninth street and on the bulkhead south of East Twenty-ninth street. Applicant notified that the consent of the owners of the property must first be obtained.

From Joseph May, requesting permission to maintain two boat floats on the north side of the West Thirty-fifth street pier.

From Idle Hour Boat and Gun Club, requesting permission to erect boat house and float at the foot of Bungay street, Borough of The Bronx.

From Goodwin Brothers, requesting a lease of the bulkhead between Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth streets, North River, with the privilege of maintaining a dumping board thereon.

From Martin H. Healey & Co., requesting permission to erect dumping boards south of Wall street, East River, at the foot of East Twenty-ninth street, and at the foot of Charles street, North river.

From Joseph Lieson, requesting permission to maintain a boathouse at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, Harlem river.

From P. J. Moran, requesting a lease of the premises now occupied by him, for bath houses, between One Hundred and Fiftieth and One Hundred and Fifty-first streets, North River.

From the Secretary, submitting report in relation to the applications for the establishment of ferry franchises between the Boroughs of The Bronx and Queens, and recommending the establishment of ferries between the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Borough of The Bronx, and Eighth avenue, College Point; and between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Borough of The Bronx, and First street, College Point.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Week Ending March 20, 1902.

At the request of the Taxpayers' Alliance of the Borough of The Bronx, a hearing was held March 20, 1902, in relation to the application for the establishment of a ferry from the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Port Morris, to College Point, Borough of Queens. A committee from said Alliance was present at the hearing and requested that in the construction of any ferry slips at the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, provision be made for the landing of steamboats thereat, or that a new pier be constructed in the vicinity.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Anchor Line (Henderson Brothers, Limited), to make general repairs during the ensuing six months to the West Twenty-fourth Street Pier.

Occident Dock Company, to repair the water pipe leading to the West Twenty-ninth Street Pier; all pavement to be taken up and relaid by this Department at the expense of said company.

Adolph Kern, to repair the pile platform between Fifty-second and Fifty-third streets, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Merritt & Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Company, to unload blocks of marble at the bulkhead foot of East Sixty-fourth street, the pavement if damaged by such unloading, to be repaired by said company at its expense.

Robert Jacob, to construct a plank walk and marine railway and to repair existing bulkhead at his property at City Island.

Edward Rosenberger, to rebuild runway and float at City Island, north of the new City Island Bridge.

Standard Oil Company of New York, to drive piles in the vicinity of Vreeland avenue and Marion street, Westchester Creek, the piles to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

New York Dock Company, to repair the bulkhead between Piers 36 and 38, Atlantic Basin, Brooklyn, and to construct a pile platform in front of said bulkhead, in accordance with plans and specifications submitted.

The New York Horse Manure Transportation Company, in response to their application, was notified March 19, 1902, that the Commissioner of Docks will lease, assign and farm let unto said company all and singular the West Forty-fifth Street Pier, North River, with the privilege of maintaining a dumping board on the southerly side of said pier, for a period of five years from May 1, 1902, at a rental of \$4,400 per annum, payable quarterly in advance, it being understood and agreed that said offer shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted by the said company within ten days, and unless the same shall have been first approved by resolution, in writing, passed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to approve such proposed lease.

An application was received from J. Wesley Smith for permission to construct an ice bridge at the bulkhead north of Charles street, North river, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to consent to the granting of such permission at a rental of \$45 per week.

Upon the recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Brooklyn was requested to repair the pavement at the foot of North Second street, Brooklyn.

A communication having been received from John C. Rodgers declining to pay rent for land under water covered by platform at the foot of Farragut street, Borough of The Bronx, on the ground that the platform is used by him in connection with the construction of a sewer along said street, the work being done for the City, the matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to approve of the purchase of one time stamp, one telephone booth and one Remington typewriter, with desk and chair.

An offer was received from C. D. Burrus to furnish the Department with copies of maps of water grants in Queens County for the sum of \$200, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to consent to the purchase of the maps.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to oppose the granting of the applications of the National Sugar Refining Company of New Jersey for a grant of land under water on the East river, in the First Ward of the Borough of Queens, and of the Bowery Bay Building and Improvement Company for a grant of land under water in Bowery Bay, Borough of Queens.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to advise whether stationery, printing and advertising should be ordered by this Department direct or through the Board of City Record.

The permit granted the Erie Railroad Company to use and occupy the bulkhead between Piers, new 6 and 7, East river, was revoked, to take effect as of March 1, 1902, and said company notified that the premises cannot be used until arrangements shall have been made therefor after the completion of the new bulkhead now being constructed thereat.

Charles A. Berrian, auctioneer, was authorized to sell at public auction old material now on hand in the Department, as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief.

On March 17, 1902, James J. Fleming, Dockmaster, was charged with neglect of duty and malfeasance in office and was notified that an opportunity would be given him to be heard before the Commissioner for the purpose of making an explanation.

James J. Sullivan, Foreman Dockbuilder, against whom charges were preferred and to whom a hearing was given February 21, 1902, was discharged from the service of the Department March 14, 1902.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Week Ending March 27, 1902.

On March 24, 1902, estimates were opened on Contracts Nos. 721, 722 and 723, a representative of the Comptroller being present:

Contract No. 721, for Furnishing and Delivering Manila Rope.

Two estimates were received, as follows:

Contract No. 723 was awarded to Naughton & Co. at \$12.90 per pile, that being the lowest bid, subject to the approval of the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company and John H. McKay, as sureties, by the Comptroller, and subject also to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The security deposits submitted by the bidders under Contracts Nos. 721, 722 and 723 were transmitted to the Comptroller.

A hearing was held March 27, 1902, in relation to the request for the construction of public docks between Twenty-seventh and Sixty-seventh streets, South Brooklyn, at which a committee of the South Brooklyn Board of Trade appeared and urged the necessity for the construction of such docks.

A hearing was also held March 27, 1902, at the request of the East Side Citizens and Taxpayers' Association, at which a committee of said association appeared and requested that additional dock facilities be provided between East One Hundred and Fifteenth and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets on the Harlem river.

James J. Fleming, Dockmaster, accompanied by Thomas J. O'Neill as counsel, appeared before the Commissioner March 22, 1902, and denied the charges against him of having neglected his duty as Dockmaster or of having received any moneys from the W. W. Brauer Steamship Company for the berthing of the ships of said company at Pier, new 33, East river, other than the sums turned into the Department. The Commissioner reserved decision in the case.

The following permits were granted, work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, to construct a subsidiary connection to the Christopher Street Pier, No. 44, North river, the pavement to be taken up and relaid by this Department at the cost of said company.

The Pennsylvania-New York Extension Railroad Company, to make boring at the marginal street, foot of West Thirty-second street, North river.

The Bush Company, Limited, to dredge in their slips at the foot of Fortieth, Forty-third, Forty-fourth and Forty-sixth streets, Brooklyn.

Clarence H. Eagle, to construct a bulkhead at his property at Sea Gate, Coney Island.

Pursuant to the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen and approved by the Mayor, the offices of the Department were ordered closed on Good Friday, March 28, 1902.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to protest against the granting of the application of the Burlee Dry Dock Company for a grant of land under water at Newark Bay, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were, on March 25, 1902, requested to consent to the cancellation of the lease of the bulkhead at the foot of Degraw street, Borough of Brooklyn, to John E. Walsh, and to refund to said Walsh the rental paid by him for the bulkhead, amounting to \$60, in accordance with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel.

The plans, specifications and form of contract submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief, on Commissioner's Order No. 116, for building a platform along the easterly side of the approach to the Charles Street Pier, No. 46, North river, were approved March 25, 1902, and ordered printed and advertised.

The specifications submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief for furnishing Portland cement were approved March 21, 1902, and ordered printed and advertised, and the plans, specifications and forms of contracts submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief for repairing the West Forty-eighth Street Pier, and for building a new pier near the foot of Forty-third street, North river, were approved March 26, 1902, and ordered printed and advertised.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief to the effect that it is impossible to ascertain positively the ownership of the tugboat causing damage to the East One Hundred and Twelfth Street Pier, Harlem river, and the recent order directing the collection of \$214.29 from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company was therefore canceled.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, the President of the Borough of Manhattan was requested to have a sidewalk approach to the Recreation Ground between East Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, along the easterly side of Avenue C, properly flagged and the curbing and roadway pavement repaired.

Lowther Brothers were, in accordance with the recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief, notified that, unless repairs are immediately commenced to the coal pockets between East Thirty-first and East Thirty-second streets, East river, the premises would be fenced off from use, the same being in a dangerous condition.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief stating that the fence recently constructed on Pier, old 36, East river, has been removed by the Central Vermont Railroad Company, and said company was notified that, unless said fence is immediately replaced, this Department will remove the outer one-third of the pier, it being in a dangerous condition.

The following orders were issued in accordance with recommendations of the Engineer-in-Chief:

To the lessees, to repair West Twenty-second Street Pier.

To the lessee, to repair East Eighteenth Street Pier.

To Terry & Tench Construction Company, to remove sunken lighter and cargo of rip rap lying at the outer end of East Ninety-fifth Street Pier.

The following orders were issued to the Engineer-in-Chief:

To repair the revenue cutter "Manhattan" where damaged by collision with the tug "Richmond," as requested by William J. Herring, the Captain of said revenue cutter.

To dredge in the slip between Piers, new 21 and 22, North river, to a depth of 15 feet at mean low water, as requested by Charles Mulford.

To repair two piers at Hart's Island at a cost not to exceed \$1,000, the order of December 13, 1901, to repair cribs and piers at said island being canceled.

To dredge under Contract No. 707 to a depth of 10 feet at mean low water at the foot of West avenue, Stanton creek, Long Island City.

To remove derelict scow moored at the West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth Street pier to the Department property foot of Fifty-second street, Brooklyn, the cost of removal to be collected from the owner of the scow, if found.

To repair bulkhead foot of East Sixty-fourth street.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted by said Commissioners, March 19, 1902, as follows:

"Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held February 5, 1902, and amended February 13, 1902, requesting the Commissioner of Docks to accompany with every recommendation for the lease of a pier, detailed information as to the cost of the pier, etc., be and the same is hereby further amended so as to read as follows:

"Resolved, That every recommendation for the lease of a pier shall be accompanied by such detailed information as to the cost of the pier, the rate of rentals on the piers adjoining, and, in general, such matter of detail as will enable the Sinking Fund Commissioners to form an independent judgment as to the propriety of the lease proposed; and that such information should be sent by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries to each member of the Sinking Fund Commission at least seventy-two hours before the meeting of the Commission;

"Resolved, That when more than one application is made for the same pier, the Commissioners shall be furnished with full information upon this head.

"Resolved, That similar detailed information be furnished as to all contracts calling for action by the Commission."

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 816A of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the purchase by the Commissioner of Docks of a locomobile survey manufactured by the Locomobile Company of America, style No. 05, with a top and side curtains, extra heavy running gear and wheels, seating capacity four passengers, seats panel back, capacity of water tank thirty gallons, capacity of fuel tank seven gallons, size of boiler and burner sixteen inches in diameter, together with following equipment: Two rubber buckets, rubber blankets, side lamps, gong, cyclometer, full set of tools, etc., at a cost not to exceed \$1,200."

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a renewal of the lease to H. & A. Allan, of pier at the foot of West Twenty-first street, North river, and approach thereto, for a term of ten years from February 1, 1902, at an annual rental of twenty-seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$27,500), payable quarterly, in advance, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease."

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 816A of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the terms and conditions of proposed Contract No. 726, for furnishing and delivering steam fitting, wrought iron and steel tools, pier iron, oils, etc."

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the granting, by the Commissioner of Docks, of permission to J. Wesley Smith to use and occupy during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, a bulkhead on the North river, commencing on the northerly side of the approach to Pier, new 40, North river, and running thence northerly a distance of 125 feet, with the privilege of maintaining an ice bridge, scales and tally house thereat, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of forty-five dollars (\$45) a week, payable weekly in advance to the Commissioner of Docks."

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the following terms and conditions of sale of the ferry franchise from and to the foot of East Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn, together with certain wharf property, land and land under water belonging to the city at or near the foot of East Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan, as presented by the Commissioner of Docks, viz.:

"The franchise of the ferry, as more particularly hereinafter described, will be offered for sale by the Commissioner of Docks at public auction to the highest bidder, at Pier "A," Battery place, on , 1902, for a term of years from December 1, 1901, to and from the foot of Forty-second street, East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, from and to the foot of Broadway, East river, in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with all that certain wharf property, land and land under water belonging to the city, beginning at a point where the northerly line of East Forty-second street intersects the established bulkhead line at the foot of said street; thence running southerly along said bulkhead line a distance of about 296 feet to the northerly line of East Forty-first street; thence easterly along said northerly line of East Forty-first street a distance of about 150 feet to the established pierhead line; thence northerly along said pierhead line a distance of about 296 feet to the northerly line of East Forty-second street extended; thence westerly along the northerly line of East Forty-second street a distance of about 150 feet to the point or place of beginning, in the Borough of Manhattan.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SALE.

"The lease will be sold subject to the approval of the terms thereof by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

"No bids will be received which shall be less than the upset price, viz.: Ten thousand dollars per annum; rent to be payable quarterly.

"The purchaser will be required at the time of sale to pay, in addition to the auctioneer's fee, to the Department of Docks and Ferries, twenty-five per cent. of the amount of the annual rent bid, as security for the execution of the lease, which twenty-five per cent. will be applied to the payment of the rent first accruing under the lease when executed, or will be forfeited to the Department if the purchaser refuses or neglects to execute the lease, with good and sufficient security, to be approved by the Commissioner of Docks, within ten days after being notified that the lease is prepared and ready for execution at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries, Pier "A," North river, foot of Battery place.

"Two sufficient sureties, to be approved by the Commissioner of Docks, will be required under the lease to enter into a bond or obligation, jointly and severally with the lessees, in the sum of double the annual rent, for the faithful performance of all the covenants and conditions of the lease.

"The lease will contain the usual covenants and conditions, in conformity with the provisions of law and the ordinances of the Board of Aldermen relative to ferries, and shall provide that the lessees will maintain and operate the ferry during the whole term, and will provide ample accommodations in the way of safe and capacious boats and sufficiency of trips, as to the sufficiency of which accommodations the decision of the Commissioner of Docks shall be final; also, conditions that the lessees shall dredge the ferry slip, etc., as required by the Commissioner of

Docks; that during the term of the lease, they will erect and build, at their own expense, and will at all times well and sufficiently repair, maintain and keep in good order, all and singular the floats, racks, fenders, bridges and other fixtures of the landing places, and in the event of any damage to the bulkheads or piers from collision by the ferryboats, or otherwise, from any accident or negligence on their part, they will immediately repair and restore said property to its previous conditions free of cost to The City of New York; that if at any time during the term of the lease the Commissioner of Docks shall require any of the wharf property used for ferry purposes in order to proceed with the water-front improvements in the vicinity of the ferry landings, the said lessees shall surrender and vacate the premises without any claim upon the city for any damages whatever, upon written notice being given to the lessees three months in advance of the intention of said Commissioner; that such notice shall specify, by the general terms of description or by reference to the plans and specifications of the proposed work of improvement, the character of the alterations and improvements to be made in regard to said water-front, affecting the property and rights hereby authorized to be demised, and upon receiving such notice the lessee may elect to terminate the lease of said ferry privileges or franchise by serving notice of such election upon the Commissioner of Docks within one month after receiving the notice from the Commissioner of Docks of its intention to improve the waterfront in the vicinity of the ferry landing; also, that in case only a portion of said wharf property shall be required for the purposes aforesaid, then a reasonable reduction will be made from the rent reserved by said lease; that sworn returns of the amounts of ferry receipts shall be made to the Commissioner of Docks, when required by said Commissioner, and that the books of accounts of the ferry shall be subject to the inspection of said Commissioner.

"The lease will contain a covenant providing for the purchase, at a fair valuation, of the boats, buildings and other property of the lessees, used in and actually necessary for the operation of said ferry, upon the termination and surrender and delivery of the premises by the lessees, if the lessees shall not become the purchasers for another term, provided that The City of New York shall not be deemed thereby to purchase said property in any event.

"The rates of ferriage and charges for vehicles and freight shall not exceed the rates now charged on the ferry to and from the foot of East Twenty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, from and to the foot of Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn.

"The lessee shall provide such life boats, floats, rafts and life preservers as may be directed by the Commissioner of Docks.

"The form of lease which the purchaser will be required to execute can be seen at the office of the Commissioner of Docks.

"The right to reject any bid is reserved if deemed by the Commissioner of Docks to be for the best interests of the city."

On March 21, 1902, permission was granted J. Wesley Smith to use and occupy a bulkhead on the North river commencing at the northerly side of the approach to Pier, new 46, and running thence northerly a distance of 125 feet, with the privilege of maintaining an ice bridge, scales and tally-house thereon, the privilege to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks and compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$45 per week, payable weekly in advance.

Charles A. Berrian was authorized to sell at public auction at Pier "A," North river, on Monday, April 14, 1902, at 10 o'clock a. m., the franchise of the East Forty-second Street Ferry, in accordance with the terms and conditions as approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
