I have examined the premises, which consist of a church about 53 feet by 75 feet, with a three-story brick extension in the rear of 12 feet 6 inches, also a three-story brick parsonage about 36 feet by 23 feet, all on a lot at the corner of South Fifth street and Driggs avenue.

In my opinion, the price named in the resolution—\$72,000—is considerably more than the property is worth, and I cannot recommend it for the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

In my view, where there is doubt as to the value of such property, such condemnation proceedings should be resorted to, only acquiring by purchase where there does not exist such doubt.

The plot contains a little over three city lots,

In my opinion the price named in the resolution, \$50,000, is considerably more than the property is worth, and I cannot recommend it for the approval or the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sir-I transmit to you herewith, for the approval by your Board of the terms and conditions thereof, pursuant to section 544 of the Charter, two forms of contract.

The first is for the privilege of loading and trimming deck scows of this Department in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and is substantially the same as the existing contract approved by your Board last year and which will expire next month.

The other is a contract for the privilege of picking over refuse in the yard of this department in Eighteenth street, between Avenues B and C, Borough of Manhattan, for the term beginning with the date of execution and ending with the 11th day of August, 1900. The reason for mak-

ing this contract terminate at that time is that the yard is held under a lease from the Consolidated Gas Company, which expires on the 15th day of August, 1900. This proposed contract for the picking over of refuse in the Eighteenth street yard covers a work that for several years has been

done by informal agreements.

In the case of both of these contracts the payments are made to the City and not by the City.

I desire to advertise these two contracts and receive proposals for them at the same time, and as an existing contract with Andrew Barbieri for the loading and trimming of deck scows expires within four weeks from now, and as the execution of any contract cannot take place until after first being approved by your Board, advertised for ten days and then the award again being approved by your Board, I request as early action as possible.

SIR—Hon. James McCartney, Commissioner, Department of Street Cleaning, in communica-tion of December 26, 1899, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmits for its approval of the terms and conditions, pursuant to section 544 of the Charter, two forms of contract.

FIRST:

For the privilege of loading and trimming deck scows in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, being substantially the same as the existing contract which expires this month.

The terms and conditions of the contract are-

The terms and conditions of the contract are—

1st. That the payments shall be made weekly, and the failure to pay shall, at the option of the Commissioner, be "deemed to be and shall be an abandonment of the contract."

2d. The contractor to furnish "all the labor, instruments and material" and to perform the work deemed necessary by the Commissioner, properly to load and trim all the deck scows and dumpers of the Department of Street Cleaning in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, at the dumps, which are specified in the contract—work minutely specified.

3d. Minute specifications as to the removal and final disposition of refuse material by the contractor; material not to be allowed to accumulate, but to be removed daily.

4th. The contract to continue for one year, beginning with the date of the first payment.

The form of contract appears to me very full and specific, and the terms and conditions may properly receive the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

#### SECOND:

For the privilege of picking over and assorting the refuse in the yard of the Department of Street Cleaning, situated between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets and Avenues B and C, in the Borough of Manhattan, delivered at said yard by vehicles of the Department of Street Cleaning, under section 544 of the Charter.

1st. The contract is to continue from the time of execution to August 11, 1900, but may be terminated by the Commissioner on ten days' notice to contractor.

2d. Payments by the contractor to be made weekly.

3d. The bids on this contract are to be made on the number of cart loads per week which shall be delivered by the Department at the plant vize:

shall be delivered by the Department, at the plant, viz.:

If less than 100 per week.

If more than 100 and less than 150 per week.

If 150 or more and less than 200 per week.

If 200 or more and less than 250 per week.

If 250 or more and less than 350 per week.

Failure to make any one of the payments shall, at the option of the Commissioner, "be deemed to be and shall be an abandonment of the contract."

4th. The contractor is to furnish all labor, instruments and implements, except as provided as to the plant belonging to the Department, and to perform the work required by the Commissioner, or by him deemed necessary to pick over and assort the refuse in the yard of the Department.

5th. The specifications fully describe what is to be done by contractor.

It appears to me that the "terms and conditions" of the contract may properly be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

As the Commissioner states in his communication, the first contract is similar to the existing contract, which will expire this month.

3. New Public School 178, One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Grant and Morris avenues, The Bronx.

4. New Public School 186, One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-sixth streets and Amsterdam avenue, Manhattan.

5. New Public School 183, Sixty-sixth and Sixty-seventh streets, east of First avenue, Manhattan.

6. Public School 22, addition, Nos. 112 to 116 Sheriff street, Manhattan.

7. Public School 51, addition, Nos. 206 to 214 East Seventy-sixth street, Manhattan.

8. Public School 51, addition, Nos. 23 West Forty-fourth street (in rear), Manhattan.

9. Public School 165, Anthony and Tremont avenues, The Bronx.

10. Public School 155, Anthony and Tremont avenues, The Bronx (erecting southerly half of building as originally planned and thereby completing it).

11. Public School 132, Wadsworth avenue and One Hundred and Eighty-second street, Manhattan (rock excavation).

1 would report as follows:

1. Public School 184, One Hundred and Sixteenth and One Hundred and Seventeenth streets, between Fifth and Lenox avenues, Manhattan.

It is proposed to erect a five-story building, containing 48 class-rooms; fifth floor to be fitted up for the use of the Harlem Evening High School, to contain chemical laboratory and lecture-room, gymnasium, etc. Estimated cost for the erection of building, not including steam or furnishing thereof, \$300,000.

The proposed school is in a neighborhood not now supplied with schools. The nearest schools are at One Hundred and Seventeenth street and St. Nicholas avenue and One Hundred

and Nineteenth street and Madison avenue. Both of these schools have pupils which are taught

2. Public School 182, Avenue C., between Eighth and Ninth streets, Unionport, The Bronx.
Building to be five stories high, containing eighteen class-rooms, gymnasium and manual training. Estimated cost, \$125,000.
In the neighborhood of the proposed school is a small school building with only two class-rooms; the nearest large school is Public School 97, at Westchester, a distance of about one and one-half miles, to which children are carried by stage furnished by the Board of Education.

3. Public School 178, One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Grant and Morris avenues,

The Bronx.

The proposed building is to be five stories high, eighteen class-rooms, gymnasium and manual training. Estimated cost, \$125,000.

This site is within nine blocks of Public School 62, at One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street and Courtlandt avenue, which school is not now full, hence the children in the neighborhood of the proposed new school can be accommodated at the old school for the present.

4. Public School 186, One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-sixth streets,

4. Public School 186, One Hundred and Forty-man in near Amsterdam avenue.

The building is to be five stories high, containing forty-eight class-rooms, gymnasium, manual training, etc. Estimated cost, \$300,000.

There is no public school on the line of Amsterdam avenue between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Fifty-sixth streets, a distance of over one and one-third miles. The classes in both of these schools are unduly large.

5. New Public School 183, Sixty-sixth and Sixty-seventh streets, east of First avenue.

The proposed building is to be five stories high, 48 class-rooms, gymnasium, manual training,

etc. Estimated cost, \$300,000.

This school is needed to relieve Public School 82, at Seventieth street and First avenue, where there are upwards of 650 children receiving part time instruction.

6. Public School 22, addition, Nos. 112 to 116 Sheriff street, Manhattan.

It is the intention to build an addition to Public School 22, five stories high, with accommodation for 15 class-rooms and make certain alterations in the old building. Estimated cost,

In the school for which this addition is proposed there are at present nearly 500 children taught in part time classe

7. Public School 70, addition, Nos. 206 to 214 East Seventy-sixth street, Manhattan.

The addition is to be a four-story and mansard building, containing 18 class-rooms, gymnasium and manual training; also alterations are proposed for the old school building. Estimated

cost, \$110,000.

In the immediate neighborhood (No. 170 East Seventy-seventh street) it has been found necessary to lease a large building for school purposes, which has been fitted up by the Board of Education at a considerable expense, the lease of which runs to 1927; hence an addition to Public School 70 is not urgent.

8. Public School 51, addition, West Forty-fourth street (in rear), Manhattan.

It is proposed to make alterations to old building and build an annex on West Forty-fifth street, four stories, with mansard, containing 18 class-rooms. Estimated cost, \$110,000.

This addition is proposed and needed to accommodate the children which attend Public School 51, as upward of 150 pupils are now taught in part time classes.

Public School 91, addition, Ogden avenue, Highbridge, The Bronx. Addition to be four stories high, containing 12 classrooms, library, physical and manual training; it is also the intention to make certain alterations to the old building. Total estimated cost

\$125,000.

The rooms of the present building are all in use, but it is not a growing neighborhood, and in my judgment an addition to this school is not urgent.

10. Public School 155, Anthony and Tremont avenues, The Bronx. It is proposed to complete the school building as originally designed, by the erection of the southerly half, consisting of 24 class-rooms, gymnasium and manual training. Estimated cost, \$150,000. The school attendance in the neighborhood has increased since the erection of the first part of this building, which has been completed about three years. But as the school is not crowded, in my judgment this addition is not urgent at present.

11. Public School 132, Wadsworth avenue and One Hundred and Eighty-second street, Manhattan (rock excavation). It is proposed to excavate the rock preparatory to erection of building. Estimated cost, \$15,000.

I do not think it necessary to remove the rock until it is proposed to build a school.

In my report the estimates given are for the erection of the buildings only; this total estimate I make \$1,770,000, or \$270,000 more than is asked for by the Board of Education, and this does not include steam, electric work and furniture.

I submit the following table giving an estimate of what it will cost to furnish each of the respective buildings and additions:

"This has been the law in this State for a decade and a verdict was therefore rendered against the plaintiff and judgment thereon entered up on the 26th of December, 1899, for \$4,227.54, which includes the two first quarters' rent with interest and costs.

"I have this day certified the judgment to the Comptroller and added that provision should be made by the Board of Education for payment.

"This latter statement is based upon the supposition that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated to your Board a sum of money sufficient to pay this rent, at least for six months, that being the period of time for which the lease was authorized to be made by the Sinking Fund Commissioners. I also stated in my letter to the Comptroller that the last two quarters' rent would have to be provided for; that there was no defense to the claim, and that provision had better be immediately made so as to avoid expense to the City.

"I do not know whether the last two quarters are capable of being paid out of your fund, or whether they will have to be paid out of the judgment fund, or in some other way.
