We respectfully ask that such special privileges be residents of the neighborhood. We respectfully ask that such special privileges be disallowed them in future, for the reason that they already congregate on the sidewalks and streets to such an extent that they have become an intolerable nuisance there. Their business in this place at all times is most objectionable to the store-keepers, as the streets and sidewalks opposite their stores are constantly obstructed, and are always kept in a filthy and unpleasant condition, with decayed vegetable, fruit and other refuse that are thrown on the streets and sidewalks there. Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Sir—On February 4 your Honorable Board passed an ordinance approving of and concurring in a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 8, 1907, for the issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of two hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000), to provide means for the improvement and development of the water supply system at or near Bayside pumping station, in the Third Ward, Borough of Queens.

The plan of development prepared by this Department and submitted to your Honorable Board for examination comprises:

Honorable Board for examination, comprises:

The cleaning, repairing or remodeling of the existing wells at the Bayside station.

Driving additional wells north of Broadway, to increase the supply.

In order to drive these wells to the best advantage and, in fact, in order to determine whether they should be driven at all, it is necessary to ascertain the formation of the underlying soil and the location of the water bearing strata at various deaths.

For this current or more test wells must be driven to various deaths.

tion of the underlying soil and the location of the water bearing strata at various depths. For this purpose one or more test wells must be driven to various depths, perhaps reaching 500 feet, which cannot be determined beforehand, depending on the character of the ground and location of the water strata. Furthermore, during the progress of the work tests will have to be made, from time to time, by different methods of pumping, to determine the yield to be expected from the proposed driven wells, and the proper design and spacing of the latter. It is apparent that it would not be practicable to do this work by contract, as the conditions, mode of procedure and extent of the work have to be determined on the ground from day to day.

I therefore respectfully request your Honorable Board to grant to the Commissioner of this Department, the privilege of expending a sum not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for these preliminary tests; permission having been obtained to make the same from the owners of the land on which it is proposed to locate the additional wells if the result of this preliminary test is satisfactory. If it be found that the ground is not favorable for that mode of development, the land will not be purchased and we shall be under no obligation to the owners for the use of the same, as above stated.

as above stated.

The cleaning, repairing, and, in certain cases perhaps, remodeling of wells at the existing station, is also a work, the exact nature and extent of which cannot readily be determined, for the same reasons given in regard to the establishment of a new driven well station. Examinations of the individual wells have to be made and the proper method of cleaning, repairing or remodeling in each case determined as the work progresses; so that it is impracticable to prepare a contract and specifications for that work for that work.

I, therefore, respectfully request that your honorable body authorize the Commissioner of this Department to expend the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), without advertising for competitive bids for the purpose of cleaning, repairing or remodeling the existing wells at the Bayside station, as already stated.

These licenses and the certificates of marriage are returned to the Clerk by whom the license was issued, entered upon his records, and the original applications, affidavits, licenses and marriage certificates are filed monthly in the

office of the Clerk of the county in which is located the office of the Clerk granting the license.

To meet the expense incurred by the provisions of section 15 of this act, the County Clerk asks for the establishment of the following positions:

One Clerk, Chief of Marriage License Bureau, who is to index records and supervise work of this Bureau, under direction of County Clerk.

The number of licenses issued in the Brooklyn office of the City Clerk up to February 20, was 1,785, indicating a possible total of 15,000 for the year. Dear Sir—We would respectfully request that you pass an ordinance or something to protect us from men who want to get acquainted with us and wait around the stage door to do so. We think it would be good if you punished any man who was found loitering within say twenty feet of the stage entrance of Wallack's Theatre. Every night when we are going in or coming out there is a crowd of men around, young ones and old ones, and it is very annoying, and ought to be stopped. We do all we can to discourage them, but they keep coming, and when we send them away they come back again. To avoid them, we have been going away from the theatre through the front door. But Mr. Burnham, the manager of the theatre, stopped us from leaving the theatre by the front way. Now the only way we can get out or get in is through the stage door, and always there are the men waiting going and coming. It won't do any stage door, and always there are the men waiting, going and coming. It won't do any good to tell us if we speak rough to the men they will go away, because we have spoken rough, and still they stay, and even when we threaten to get some one to punish them, they only laugh. It is so bad sometimes we have to leave the theatre in sixes spoken rough, and still they stay, and even when we threaten to get some one to punish them, they only laugh. It is so bad sometimes we have to leave the theatre in sixes and sevens, and even then, when we get on the car some of the men get on, too, and when we tell the conductors they only laugh, and think it is funny, and it is not funny to us. We think if you passed a law and made it a misdemeanor, or something like that, to speak to an actress near the stage door, unless the speaker knows her or has some real business with her, we would not be troubled so much. We think the law would work all right, because when some of us had our brothers or our cousins waiting to take us home we could give him a card saying it was all right for him to wait. We hope this request won't be treated as if it did not merit attention, for it does, and if the Aldermen were charge girls themselves and had to come and go to their business. if the Aldermen were chorus girls themselves and had to come and go to their business every night and be spoken to by a lot of loitering young and old women they didn't know, they would know how it feels and would do something for us.

Dear Sir-I desire to call your attention to the fact that nightly inspections should be made of passenger elevators, to see that the same are in safe working order and

be made of passenger elevators, to see that the same are in safe working order and ready for use in case of emergency, in compliance with section 102 of the Building Code of The City of New York.

In conjunction with the above, the ever increasing number of elevators in use in the various buildings in the Borough of Manhattan (which now number about five thousand), makes it absolutely impossible for the small force of Inspectors to examine same at frequent intervals; a period of three months or more sometimes elapses before we are able to visit an elevator once inspected.

It is essential that these elevators be brought under closer scruting by the In-

It is essential that these elevators be brought under closer scrutiny by the Inspectors of this Bureau, and to accomplish this effectively I will require at least fifteen (15) additional Inspectors of Elevators; also four (4) Clerks to keep records of such

On account of the controversy that has arisen with reference to bills for emergency work which is done at the direction of this Bureau, it is very necessary that the time of the different workmen employed and a record of the material used be kept in all unsafe building emergency cases. For this purpose I will require at least six (6)

The appropriation made to this Bureau for the current year is inadequate for this purpose, and I would respectfully request that you ask the Board of Aldermen to pass a resolution directing the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000), for the purpose of carrying out these important requirements.

Condition of cables.
What safety attachments are on the cars.

Condition of safety attachments. Rate of speed.

Manufactured by. 11. General condition.

Such an inspection requires considerable time and care, and the same is supposed

Such an inspection requires considerable time and care, and the same is supposed to be made of every passenger elevator in the City.

Section 102 of the Building Code requires that in all buildings exceeding 150 feet in height there shall be "at least one passenger elevator which shall be kept in readiness for immediate use by the Fire Department, during all hours of the night and day, including holidays and Sundays."

I have but twelve (12) Inspectors of Elevators, and with this force it is impossible to comply with the foregoing requirements. There are now 6,700 passenger elevators in the City and the number is constantly increasing, and my force should be large enough to make inspections of all day elevators at least once a month, and an inspection of the night elevators every night. It is estimated that at least 2,000,000 persons ride in these elevators daily which shows the great responsibility resting upon me as

tion of the night elevators every night. It is estimated that at least 2,000,000 persons ride in these elevators daily, which shows the great responsibility resting upon me as Superintendent of Buildings.

With my present force I was enabled to make but 11,010 inspections last year, as a result of which 440 elevators were found to be defective. It will be seen that 11,010 inspections of the 6,700 elevators is at the rate of less than two inspections yearly of each elevator.

With the additional force of Inspectors which I need, as per my statement attached, it is essential that I employ at least four (4) Clerks to transact the business which would naturally ensue from the large number of inspections that would be made

The six (6) additional Clerks are to be made Timekeepers in the matter of unsafe building cases where emergency work is done through this Bureau, to keep a record of the time, labor and materials used.

Memorandum.

In relation to communication to the Board of Aldermen, requesting that a resolution be adopted authorizing and empowering the Commissioner of Docks, without advertising for bids or contracting for same, to do the following work: Repairs to piers at West Fortieth street, East Twentieth and East One Hundred and Tenth streets, it being understood that all work of dredging shall be done and all material and supplies present to do such work shall be purchased by contract as provided

and supplies necessary to do such work shall be purchased by contract, as provided under section 419 of the Greater New York Charter.

Section 821 of the Greater New York Charter, as at present constituted, permits the Department of Docks and Ferries to construct wharves, piers and bulkheads, etc., in accordance with what is known as the new plan for the improvement of the waterfront of The City of New York, the work to be done by the force of the Department.

front of The City of New York, the work to be done by the force of the Department, and otherwise than by contract.

Prior to January 1, 1902, the Department was also authorized to make repairs to wharf property under its jurisdiction by the force of the Department, but this was subsequently amended so that at present the Department is only permitted to make repairs to the extent of \$1,000. This limitation of \$1,000 has been found to be entirely inadequate, as the amount of repairs which can be made within this limit is of no use to the Department, and entirely too small to be of any service.

In case of fire, collision or for any other reason, the pier is damaged to any extent, it is necessary at the present time to perform the work of repair or rebuilding by contract under the provisions of section 419 of the Charter, which necessitates a loss of at least sixty days, which time is consumed in the preparation of plans and specification.

of at least sixty days, which time is consumed in the preparation of plans and specifications, the printing of the contract, the approval of the contract as to form by the Corporation Counsel, the advertising for bids, the approval of the sureties, and the certification by the Comptroller that there is money available for the purpose.

In the meantime the pier is practically out of commission, entailing in many cases extreme hardship in busy sections of the City upon owners, shippers and consignees of vessels doing business in that vicinity, to say nothing of the loss of revenue to the

of vessels doing business in that vicinity, to say nothing of the loss of revenue to the City.

If a resolution is passed by the Board of Aldermen, as requested, there will be no interference with that portion of section 821 of the Charter, which provides that no dredging shall be contracted for and no material or supplies for work shall be purchased, except as provided in section 419 of the Charter, namely: Under contract, and the only authorization that the Department seeks to receive will be for the labor used in work of repairs by the employees of the Department.

The work of keeping the piers in repairs has always been the duty of the Department since its organization, and up to the time of the adoption of the amended Charter in 1901, practically all the work of repairs of the Department was done by day's work by the force of the Department.

In cases where efforts have been made to do the work by contract, it has been found to be impracticable to secure what might be called fair bids, owing to the fact that the contract must be so elastic as to permit of additional or less work to be done; in fact it is impossible to tell how much repairs are required to the pier or to make specifications for its rebuilding unless it is entirely taken apart and the substructure exposed.

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 5, article 10, subdivision 5 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, in relation to "Balustrades and Awnings.'

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: That chapter 5, article 10, subdivision 5 of the General Ordinances of The City of New York be further amended by inserting at the end thereof another section to be known as section 259a, to read as follows:

Section 259a. Nothing contained in the preceding sections of this article shall be deemed to prohibit the temporary erection and use of an awning with or without side coverings across the sidewalks of any of the streets of the Borough of Manhattan for protection during inclement weather only, provided, however, that such awning shall be made of canvas or cloth and shall be supported by upright posts of iron not exceeding six inches in diameter, and not less than eight nor more than ten feet in height above the sidewalk, and shall not be wider than the entrance of the building in connection with which it is to be used, and shall leave sufficient space for the passage of pedestrians.

Sec. 2. Article 3, title 2, chapter 7, part 1, of the Code of Ordinances of the City is hereby amended by adding at the end of subdivision 3 a new subdivision, as follows:

3A. Automobiles.

Sec. 326a. The Mayor of The City of New York shall, from time to time, issue licenses, under his hand and seal, to so many and such persons as he shall think proper, to keep for hire, in the said City, horseless coaches, carriages and cabs, not seating more than four persons in all, designed for propulsion by electricity, gasolene or other motive power, and may revoke any and all of said licenses for cause.

The provisions and penalties of the ordinances of said City of New York relating to the licensing of hackney coaches or cabs and of drivers thereof, and to rates and prices of fares, so far as the same may be consistent, shall apply to coaches, carriages and cabs to be licensed hereunder, and to the owners and drivers thereof.

Every such horseless coach, carriage or cab shall be equipped with a bell or horn, to be used to signal its approach to pedestrians and to other vehicles.

Sec. 326b. No automobile carrying more than four passengers for hire, including sightseeing automobiles and power vehicles of every description, shall take up or carry any passenger for hire, unless duly licensed so to do. The Mayor, through the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, shall issue a license to the driver or chauffeur of any such automobile, upon payment of a license fee, the amount of which shall be estimated upon the basis of the seating capacity of such automobile, as provided in section 308 of these ordinances.

Every application for such license shall be endorsed in writing by two reputables.

Every application for such license shall be endorsed in writing by two reputable residents of The City of New York, certifying to the competency of the chauffeur or person so licensed to drive such automobile.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sir—The undersigned having been appointed an Auditing Committee by your Honor, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 8, section 789, title 5, chapter 15, of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901 (the Greater New York Charter), to examine the condition of the New York Fire Department. Relief Fund and to audit the account of Hon. Francis J. Lantry, former Fire Commissioner and Trustee of said fund, beg leave to submit the following report, viz.:

We have examined the books, papers, vouchers, checks, receipts, accounts and all other data relating to the receipts and disbursements of all moneys of said fund for the year 1907, and have carefully tabulated same, and find that the accounts of receipts, disbursements and balance on hand, as set forth by the said Trustee in his annual report of the New York Fire Department Relief Fund for the year 1907, is substantially true and correct, and in conformity with the receipts, disbursements and balance on hand as set forth and shown by the books and accounts of said fund in the possession of said Trustee in the headquarters of the Fire Department of The City of New York, and examined by your Committee.

We have examined and find the bonds and corporate stock, as set forth and described in Schedule "A" of the report of the Trustee, to be correct and on deposit in the safe deposit vaults of the Garfield Safe Deposit Company, northeast corner of Twenty-third street and Sixth avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

We have examined and find the real estate bonds and mortgages, as set forth and described in Schedule "B" of the report of the Trustee, to be correct, in the possession of the Trustee and in the safe of the Fire Department, in the headquarters of that Department.

We further find on examination that the cash on hand as set forth in the report of the Trustee in the Casfeld National Department.

We further find on examination that the cash on hand as set forth in the report of the Trustee in the Garfield National Bank, Nineteenth Ward Bank, Fidelity Bank, Bank of Washington Heights and Windsor Trust Company, is true and correct, and that the amounts so set forth were the balances on deposit in said banks to the credit of the Relief Fund on December 31, 1907.
