COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Corporation Counsel.

No. 329.

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, February 17, 1914.

Hon. HENRY H. CURRAN, Chairman, Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen:

Sir—I have received your communication under date of January 29, 1914, which reads as follows:

"By direction of the Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen, I desire your opinion as to whether the President of the Borough of Manhattan or the Board of Aldermen itself has the authority to grant permission to committees and bodies not connected with the Board of Aldermen to use the Aldermanic Chamber or the Board's Committee room in the City Hall for hearings, meetings, etc. The query is prompted by the recent occupancy, at the same time, of both of these rooms by outside bodies, whereby one of the Board's own committees, in order not to inconvenience these other bodies already in session, retired to another room in the City Hall and held its own meeting there, with great inconvenience to itself. The feeling among many of the members of the Board is that the committee room should never be given up to outside bodies and that the Aldermanic Chamber should be so loaned only by formal resolution of the Board of Aldermen itself, adopted in advance, for each particular case. It is suggested that the jurisdiction of the Borough President extends only to the care of this part of the City Hall and not to handing it over to outside bodies for their use. If it is the Board of Aldermen that has this authority, the feeling is that the Board show all possible courtesy in the accommodation of such outside bodies, but do so with some system and regard for its own necessities, such as would be obtained by the adoption of a resolution in each case. To save further confusion, may I ask your early opinion as to whether this authority is not vested in the Board of Aldermen?"

While I have found no positive authority under which the use of the Aldermanic Chamber or the committee room of the Board of Aldermen by others than the Board of Aldermen or its committees may be permitted, I incline to the view that a temporary use of these places by public or quasi-public bodies, for public or quasi-public purposes, at such times and in such manner as not to interfere with their use by the Board of Aldermen and its Committees may be permitted. The practice has been so long and uniformly pursued here, as elsewhere in this country, as in a sense to have acquired the sanction, if not the quality, of law.

With respect to the source from which such permission should proceed, I am of opinion that the Board of Aldermen is the proper authority and that it may act directly upon each case, as you suggest, or prescribe some other method which it may deem sufficient to serve the purpose and at the same time guard against interference with the public business. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Pursuant to an amendment of section 150 of the Greater New York Charter, the amendment being chapter 8 of the Laws of 1914, the Comptroller is authorized to appoint three instead of two Deputy Comptrollers.

The need for an additional Deputy in the Department of Finance is due to a very large annual increase in the business of the department, which places constantly added administrative burdens upon its head. There has been no increase in the number of Deputies provided for the department since the term of the first Comptroller immediately following consolidation, when the number of Deputies was increased from one to two. In the thirteen years following, the employees of the department have more than doubled and the department's business has increased at least fourfold. The general financial problems of the City have taken an increasingly larger part of the time of the Comptroller himself which originally was devoted to the department.

We therefore ask that action be taken under the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter for increasing the number of incumbents of the position of Deputy Comptroller in the Department of Finance from two to three at the present salary of the Deputies, namely, \$7,500 per annum.

The funds to meet the added cost of this position will be provided for out of the present appropriations of the Department of Finance.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 27, 1914, the Board of Health requested establishment in the Department of Health of the grade of position of Chemist, at \$1,500 per annum, for two incumbents, in addition to those heretofore established. In connection therewith we report as follows:

There are at present eight Chemists in the Chemical Laboratory of the Department, one acting as Director in Charge. In 1913, 12,817 analyses were made of milk, cream, water and foods, and 2,221 analyses for the Police Department. The time spent by the Chemists as witnesses in various courts amounted to 794 half days. The police work has been steadily increasing; in January, 1913, there were 142 analyses made, with 20 half days spent in court; in December 468 analyses, with 56 half days in court. Owing to this increase it has been impossible to complete all the analyses within forty-eight hours, the maximum period for which a prisoner can be held on short affidavit. It has also caused delay in analyzing food specimens submitted by Health Inspectors. On January 30, 1914, about 90 food specimens awaited analysis, owing to the press of police work.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request.

Dear Sir—I have received copy of a resolution introduced by you in the Board of Aldermen February 17th, 1914, regarding the employment of extra men on snow removal.

The men used to supplement the regular street cleaning force have been employed as in past years, preference being given, as I understand it, to residents of the district where work is going on. In one case that I know of a street cleaning foreman discharged some of the residents and replaced them with men from the City Employment Bureau. This was done through a misunderstanding of orders, and when the matter was brought to my attention it was rectified. There is no intention on my part to give preference to non-residents of the City, and if you have any suggestions covering the creation of a preferred list, or other means of securing the employment of residents for snow removal purposes, I would be glad to hear from you thereon in case further snow removal work becomes necessary.

Section 1. Section 260, of subdivision 6, of article 10, of Part I, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to "Signs and Showbills," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 260. Signs, showbills and showboards may be placed on the fronts and sides of buildings, with the consent of the owner thereof, and shall be securely fastened, and shall not project more than one foot from the house wall, except that signs may be hung or attached at right angles to any building, and extend not to exceed three feet therefrom in the space between the second floor, the ground floor being considered the first floor, and a point [eight] ten feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk in front and on the sides of such building. Signs may be attached to the sides of stoops, but not to extend above the railing or beyond the stoop line of any stoop. No sign, showbill or showboard shall be placed, hung or maintained except as in this section prescribed, under penalty of \$10 for each offense, and a further penalty of \$10 for each day or part of a day the same shall continue, now read and exhibited and made part of this complaint.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen, to whom was referred the assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York for the year 1914, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated February 21, 1914, transmitting the Budget in detail for the year 1914, accompanied by his certificates of: first, the aggregate amount of the Budget for the year 1914; second, amount of County charges and expenses for the respective counties included in the Budget for the year 1914; third, amount of County charges and expenses for the respective counties paid during the year 1913 from the proceeds of special revenue bonds; fourth, estimated revenues of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation during the current year, respectfully submits the following

REPORT:

The aggregate amount of the Budget for the year 1914 is one hundred and ninety two million nine hundred and ninety-five thousand five hundred and fifty-one dollars and sixty-two cents (\$192,995,551.62), which includes County charges and expenses for the counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating six million six hundred and thirty thousand one hundred and sixty-five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$6,630,165.66), and five hundred and twenty thousand and fifteen dollars and six cents (\$520,015.06), expense of widening Roebling street, Borough of Brooklyn, chargeable, in accordance with Section 247 of the Greater New York Charter and pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment against the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn; leaving one hundred and eighty-five million eight hundred and forty-five thousand three hundred and seventy dollars and ninety cents (\$185,845,370.90) as the amount of the Budget, which affects the general tax rates of The City of New York.

In addition to the amount of six million six hundred and thirty thousand one hundred and sixty-five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$6,630,165.66), included in the Budget for County charges and expenses, the following amounts disbursed during the year 1913 from the proceeds of special revenue bonds for judgments and claims for County charges or liabilities, for the counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond, are to be raised by tax in the year 1914, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the revised Greater New York Charter, amounting in the aggregate to three hundred and eighty-seven thousand three hundred and nine dollars and seven cents (\$387,309.07).

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all County charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each one of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for County purposes as distinguished from City purposes. Compliance with this provision of the law prevents a uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law in and for the year 1914.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, TO BE COLLECTED WITH THE ANNUAL TAXES.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements in the Thirty-first Ward of said Borough (former Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892 as amended.

The amount to be raised for the payment of the principal and interest on the New Lots bonds is forty-nine thousand four hundred and eighty-five dollars and thirty-five cents (\$49,485.35); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is thirty-nine thousand nine hundred and forty-one dollars and ninety-four cents (\$39,941.94).

The law requires that these assessments and installments be included in the tax levy ordinance to be levied and collected with the annual taxes.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York and the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1914.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of one hundred and forty-two million six hundred and nine thousand four hundred and thirty-five dollars and fifty-five cents (\$142,609,435.55), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1914, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each Department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and an amount provided for deficiencies in taxes, pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and ninety-two million nine hundred and ninety-five thousand five hundred and fifty-one dollars and sixty-two cents (\$192,995,551.62), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of six million six hundred and thirty thousand one hundred and sixty-five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$6,630,165.66), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of five hundred and twenty thousand and fifteen dollars and six cents (\$520,015.06), being the aggregate amount of borough assessments or special tax, in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 679 of the Laws of 1911 (section 247 of the Greater New York Charter); and after also deducting the sum of forty-three million two hundred and thirty-five thousand nine hundred and thirty-five dollars and thirty-five cents (\$43,235,935.35), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication to this Board dated February 21, 1914, transmitting his certificates of the amount of the appropriations made for the year 1914, copies of which communication and certificates and of the said Budget are as follows:

BUDGET FOR 1914.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this, the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, the total amount appropriated being:

One hundred and ninety-two million nine hundred and ninety-five thousand five hundred and fifty-one dollars and sixty-two cents (\$192,995,551.62), divided as follows:

First—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business, to meet the debt charges of said City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and to meet a direct State tax levied upon the City for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

One hundred and eighty-three million three hundred and forty-five thousand three hundred and seventy dollars and ninety cents (\$183,345,370.90).

Second—The amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1913, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, being section 248 of the Greater New York Charter:

Two million five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000).

Third—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the assessments levied against the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

Five hundred and twenty thousand and fifteen dollars and six cents (\$520,015.06).

Fourth—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

Six million six hundred and thirty thousand one hundred and sixty-five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$6,630,165.66).

Resolved, That this, the Budget of The City of New York, as hereby made in pursuance of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—

(a) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries Regular Employees."

(b) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries Temporary Employees."

(c) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages Regular Employees."

(d) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages Temporary Employees."

(e) That no transfers shall be made from or to appropriations classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers" or "Hire of Automobiles," except to or from an appropriation classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers," or "Hire of Automobiles."

(f) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Fees and Commissions," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Fees and Commissions."

(g) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification other than "Personal Service" to any appropriation classified as "Personal Service," except in cases where the title of appropriation specifically provides for transfers herein forbidden, or in cases where appropriations were made under the classification of "General Repairs," if, upon the written statement of the Department Head, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment finds that the repair work can be done more economically by departmental labor.

(h) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification where the title of the appropriation prohibits such transfer or when the appropriation is made conditional upon the purchase of some stated article or articles or for the payment of insurance or taxes, although otherwise the transfer might be proper under the Budget resolutions in the Budget for 1914.

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County governments in the schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees"; "Salaries Temporary Employees"; "Wages Regular Employees"; "Wages Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no requests for changes shall be considered except as follows:

(a) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Salaries Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any month to more than one-twelfth of the total amount herein appropriated for "Salaries Regular Employees."

(b) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Wages Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any week to more than the pro rata of the number of working days in such week to the total number of working days provided for such schedule line for the whole year.

Third—That in case of modifications of schedules or transfers within appropriations classified as "Personal Service," where one of the appropriations is a Tax Levy part appropriation, the full amount of cash necessary to pay the total salaries or wages of the incumbents transferred for the balance of the year 1914 shall be transferred to the appropriation to which the incumbents are transferred.

Fourth—

(a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries Regular Employees"; "Salaries Temporary Employees"; "Wages Regular Employees"; "Wages Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and that no payroll shall be passed by the Department of Finance unless the incumbents and the rate of individual compensation agree with such schedule lines as originally adopted or as hereafter modified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(b) That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payrolls is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedule supporting any such appropriations or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the full schedules as changed.

(c) That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially, beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the fact, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said number.

(d) That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.

(e) That on all payrolls against schedules entitled, "Salaries Regular Employees," and "Wages Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.

(f) That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payroll to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons, except heads of departments, and excepting bureau and division heads relieved by the head of their department from the duty of keeping such record on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

—Be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies," "Purchase of Equipment," "Materials," "Contract or Open Order Service," "Contingencies" or "Fixed Charges and Contributions" is supported by a schedule, all expenditures against such appropriation shall be made in accordance with such schedule and no voucher shall be passed by the Department of Finance for a sum exceeding the amount shown in said schedule, except when such schedule shall have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall transmit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing, firstly, the aggregate liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have been transmitted to the Department of Finance, and, secondly, all additional liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have not as yet been transmitted.

—Be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies," "Purchase of Equipment," "Materials," "Contract or Open Order Service," "Contingencies" or "Fixed Charges and Contributions" is supported by a schedule, such schedule shall be conclusive as to the amount allowed for each function or subdivision, and the heads of departments shall submit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing the amounts consumed the previous month chargeable against each supporting schedule line of the appropriation, which monthly amount, in the aggregate, shall not exceed the amount specified in the schedule, unless modified by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

—Be it further

Resolved, That all appropriations under a classification other than "Personal Service," to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First—That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for purchases to be charged against such appropriation shall be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials, fuel and forage already approved or hereafter to be approved by this Board.

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which such contracts are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials, fuel or forage or other articles for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies and materials, for which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform to such standard specifications.

—Be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of Greater New York Charter:

First—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification "Personal Service," and entitled "Salaries Regular Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents, or for a number of incumbents greater than the number shown in said schedule, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification "Personal Service," and entitled "Wages Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees" and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Regular Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees," and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen.

—Be it further

Resolved, That all departments of City and County Government, for which appropriations for food supplies have been made in the Budget for 1914, shall make an inventory on January 1, 1914, to determine the number of units of each article of food in stock, either in stores or in the institution and the cost value thereof, and shall thereafter keep an accurate record showing the cost price per unit, the number of units purchased and the total cost of all articles of food purchased in each month; that such departments shall keep an accurate record of the quantities of food supplies consumed by patients or inmates, such record to be entirely separate and distinct from the consumption of food supplies by employees or persons other than patients and inmates; and such departments shall keep an accurate record of the number of units of food supplies and the cost thereof consumed by the employees, such record to be entirely distinct from the record of food consumption by patients and inmates and such departments are directed to submit to the Comptroller at the first of each month, a statement on budget accounting forms to be submitted by the Comptroller showing the stock on hand at the beginning of the preceding month, the number of units and price per unit and cost amount of the supplies delivered to the department within the preceding month, the number of units and cost amount of food supplies consumed by patients or inmates within the preceding month, the number of units and cost amount of food supplies consumed by employees within the preceding month, the aggregate number of patients or inmate days within the preceding month, the aggregate number of employee days within the preceding month, the daily per capita consumption of food supplies in pounds and the cost amount thereof by patients or inmates in the preceding month, the daily, per capita, consumption of food supplies in pounds and the cost thereof by employees in the preceding month, and the total number of units consumed and the cost thereof within the preceding month, the stock on hand at the end of the month and such other information as may be required upon the budget accounting forms, provided, however, that this resolution shall not apply to administrative departments to which food supply appropriations have been made to be used in payment for meals of employees properly entitled to such meals by reason of overtime work.

Resolved, That all departments receiving appropriations for wearing apparel in the 1914 Budget shall make an inventory on January 1, 1914, to determine the number of units of each article of wearing apparel in stock or available for use in the institutions and shall keep a record thereafter of all wearing apparel purchased and delivered to the department; and shall keep a record showing the name of each patient, inmate and employee receiving wearing apparel, the character and cost of the wearing apparel issued to each employee, patient or inmate and a record showing in each case whether the wearing apparel issued was taken away from the institution or was returned to be reissued to other patients, inmates or employees; that such information shall be submitted to the Comptroller at the end of each quarter upon budget accounting forms furnished by the Comptroller.

Resolved, That the several boards, departments, offices and bureaus of the City and County Government are hereby directed to keep records showing the number of units and the cost amount of stock on hand at the beginning of each quarter, the cost price per unit, the number of units purchased and the total and cost of the number of units, the price per unit and the cost amount of all articles of equipment, supplies and materials purchased in 1914 and charged against appropriations made in this budget and such boards, departments, offices and bureaus are directed to submit to the Comptroller at the end of each quarter a statement of stock on hand, purchases, deliveries and consumption, with the number of units, cost price per unit and the cost amount of all articles of equipment, supplies and materials purchased, delivered and consumed within the quarter, provided, however, that this resolution shall not apply to appropriations for food supplies and wearing apparel.

—Be it further

Resolved, That nothing in the foregoing resolutions shall be construed as nullifying the resolutions preceding the so-called "cost data appropriation" for the Bureau of Highways, the Bureau of Sewers and the Bureau of Street Cleaning in the Department of the President of the Borough of Richmond.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board is hereby directed to send certified copies of the preceding resolution to each department, board, office and bureau of the City and County Government.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Fixed Charges and Contributions—

Care of Dependents in Private Institutions—

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

Preamble—

All appropriations made in this budget to charitable institutions are hereby declared to be subject to the following regulations:

1. The accounts and records of all such institutions shall be kept so as to show their receipts and expenditures pertaining to all institutional activities, and a record shall be maintained in which their expenses shall be recorded under the following classifications:

A. Expenses incurred in the operation of institution as follows:

- Food stuffs.
- Clothing.
- Linen and bedding.
- Fuel.
- Magazines and newspapers.
- Education (Instruction and Educational Supplies).
- Other supplies.
- Salaries and wages.
- Professional services.
- Light.
- Forage and care of animals.
- Telephone.
- Printing, stationery and advertising.
- Postage and telegrams.
- Hospital and Sanitarium charges.
- Funerals.
- Recreation expense.
- Miscellaneous expenses.
- Expense for boarded-out children.

B. Expenses incurred in the maintenance of plant and equipment, as follows:

- Repairs and renewals of plant and fixed equipment.
- Repairs and renewals of furniture and movable equipment.
- Interest on bonds and mortgages on corporate real estate, used exclusively for the charitable purposes of the institution, taxes and water rates, if any, thereon, fire insurance premiums on buildings on such real estate, together with their contents.

In all other respects such accounts and records shall be in the form required by the Comptroller of The City of New York, and as far as practicable, such accounts shall be kept on an income and expense basis.

2. All payments made to charitable institutions in pursuance of the said appropriations shall be used by such institutions only for expenses incurred by the institution for the care, support, maintenance and education of inmates duly committed by the courts or the Commissioner of Charities or accepted by said Commissioner as public charges, but they shall not include any expense for improvements or additions to plant or equipment, except as stated, or any payments on account of principal of mortgages. Expenses for education shall be taken to mean expenses incurred in providing suitable education for properly committed or accepted inmates, and shall include the salaries of instructors and expenses incurred for supplies for use in instruction.

3. All institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York and their books of record and account, so far as they relate to institutional activities, shall be open at reasonable times to the visitation, inspection and examination of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Department of Finance and the Department of Public Charities, by their duly authorized Commissioners, officers or inspectors, excepting, however, that the accounts pertaining to the activities of any religious order which may be in charge of any such institution shall be segregated from the other accounts and shall not be subject to this regulation.

4. All such institutions shall prepare and file with the Department of Finance as of a date to be fixed by said department, a report of the condition of the institution and its operations during the previous fiscal year upon forms prescribed and furnished for the purpose under the provisions of these regulations by the Department of Finance.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments out of any appropriation made to any charitable institution, he may, in his discretion, withhold the same, immediately giving written notice thereof to such institution and of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease further payments. Upon the determination of said board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment from any such appropriations shall thereupon end.

6. The names and ages of inmates with a statement of the period for which payment is claimed must be placed on all bills rendered by such institutions for their care, support and maintenance prior to the presentation of such account for payment to the Department of Finance. The certificate of the Commissioner of Public Charities under regulation two hereof must also be attached to such bills. Except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Public Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in the public hospitals. No case shall be regarded as an emergency case unless there shall have been made a certificate to that effect by a properly authorized and informed representative of the institution by which such case was received.

7. The City shall not be liable for any claim by any charitable institution which shall be in excess of the amount apportioned to such institution in this budget, notwithstanding the acceptance of the Commissioner of Public Charities of any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for various classes of inmates thereof.

8. No money shall be paid to any institution which pays any salary to,

gives any consideration for services (financial or otherwise) by, has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise (directly or indirectly) from any officer or trustee or member of its board of managers, or where any such person otherwise receives any pecuniary profit from the operation of such institution.

9. Child-caring institutions not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the corporate school fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institution for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day for five (5) school days in the week, for each child of five years of age and over receiving such instruction except that for abnormal or atypical children a special rate in excess of this amount may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving a per capita allowance for the education of their inmates shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, provided in section 1154 of the Charter of The City of New York.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money shall be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children and being under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and which has been placed in this budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

11. The Department of Health shall maintain in all child-caring institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York for each inmate accepted as a public charge under the rules of the State Board of Charities, and as herein provided, a complete physical and health record in which shall be recorded the name, age, sex, height and weight, time of admission, general physical condition, including the presence or absence of defects in eyesight, breathing, teeth or any organic defect, in a manner to conform as nearly as practicable with the records maintained by the Department of Health for children in the public schools in The City of New York. It shall also record the dietary actually employed in such institutions for the feeding of its inmates. Such statistics and records shall be made and revised by the Board of Health once in each six months.

12. Each institution shall give to the Comptroller on forms prescribed by him notice of the reception or discharge of any person for whose care City or county funds are to be received within twenty-four hours after his arrival at or discharge from the institution.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specifically provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that any per capita rate hereinafter stated is too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate for any or all institutions.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 458 of Article III of Chapter 12 of Part I of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to "Lights upon vehicles using the public streets."

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 458 of article 3 of chapter 12 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended so that the same shall read as follows:

Section 458—Lights—Each and every vehicle using the public streets or highways of this city (except vehicles of licensed truckmen) shall show, between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, a light or lights so placed as to be seen from the front, rear and each side; if dash lantern is carried it shall be placed on the left hand side; such light or lights to be of sufficient illuminating power to be visible at a distance of 200 feet; said light or lights shall show white in front, but may be colored on the sides and rear [excepting licensed truckmen]. Every automobile using the public streets or highways of this city shall exhibit during the same period two lamps showing white lights visible at a distance of 300 feet in the direction toward which the automobile is proceeding, and shall also exhibit a red light visible in the reverse direction. The lamps shall be so placed as to be free from obstruction to light from other parts of said automobile. No operator of any automobile or other motor vehicle while operating the same upon the public streets or highways of this city shall use any acetylene, electric or other headlight unless properly shaded so as not to blind or dazzle other users of the highway or make it difficult or unsafe for them to ride, drive or walk thereon. [In the Borough of The Bronx, excepting south of Tremont avenue and 177th street, east of Jerome avenue and west of the Bronx River, and in the Boroughs of Richmond and Queens, and in the 26th, 30th, 31st and 32d Wards of the Borough of Brooklyn, every car or other vehicle between said hours, while moving on, along, or standing upon the portion of streets in said boroughs or parts of boroughs, shall also carry a light or lights of such illuminating power as to be plainly visible 200 feet, both ahead and behind said car or vehicle.]

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE amending an ordinance relating to motion picture theatres.

Be It Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 352c of article 3, title 2, chapter 7, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to motion picture theatres, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following paragraph:

5. Motion picture theatre licenses and open air motion picture theatre licenses shall expire on the 30th day of June next succeeding the date of issuance thereof and may be renewed for another term at their expiration, or within thirty days thereafter upon payment of one-half the original license fee.

License fee shall be as follows:

For each motion picture theatre (original), \$100.

For each open air motion picture theatre (original), \$50.

For motion picture theatre licenses, and open air motion picture theatre licenses issued on or prior to the 30th day of June of any year, one-half the above mentioned fee shall be paid.

All motion picture theatre licenses, and all open air motion picture theatre licenses now in force shall expire on the 30th day of June, 1914. The renewal license fee for the period of July 1st, 1914, to June 30th, 1915, upon all licenses now in force and which shall be renewed on or before July 30th, 1915, shall be as follows:



The City of New York (hereinafter called the "City") and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company will both be parties to the contract; the Interborough Rapid Transit Company being a party for the purpose of disbursing part of its contribution toward the cost of construction as provided in the contract dated March 19, 1913, between the City, acting by the Commission, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company for the equipment, maintenance and operation of additional rapid transit railroads. The liability of Interborough Rapid Transit Company under the contract will be limited to an amount equal to ninety-five per centum (95%) of the total estimated amount to be paid to the Contractor under the contract.

Partial payments to the Contractor will be made monthly as the work proceeds.

The Contractor must complete the work within thirty-three (33) months from the delivery of the contract.

As further security fifteen (15) per centum of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor will be deducted until the amounts so deducted and retained shall equal ten (10) per centum of the total estimated amount to be paid to the Contractor under the Contract. Thereafter there shall be so deducted and retained for such purpose ten (10) per centum of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the Contractor.

Deposits made by bidders whose proposals are not accepted will be returned within five (5) days after the contract is executed and delivered. The deposit of the successful bidder will be returned when the contract is executed and its provisions in respect of the bond or deposit are complied with.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Manhattan Fire Alarm Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

This Contract, made and executed in duplicate this day of February, 1914, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Manhattan Fire Alarm Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors under the streets and avenues within the Borough of Manhattan and the portion of the Borough of The Bronx lying west of the Bronx River, and to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors and the necessary conduits for the same under the streets and avenues within that portion of the Borough of The Bronx lying east of the Bronx River, the Borough of Brooklyn, the Borough of Queens and the Borough of Richmond for the purpose of electrically connecting detecting and signalling apparatus to be located upon the premises of subscribers with signal recording apparatus located or to be located at some suitable point or points where such signals are to be received and thereby maintaining and operating a fire protection signalling service system for the protection of the premises of subscribers and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the purpose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor to and until December 31, 1928, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders, selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board, one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations

so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate, theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

1. The sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

3. The further sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) in cash, for use and occupation of the streets of the City since October 4, 1911, to be paid within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor.

3. During the first period of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

4. During the second period of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000).

5. During the remaining period of this original contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than eighty-five hundred dollars (\$8,500), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of eighty-five hundred dollars (\$8,500).

The annual charges shall commence from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the moneys due when this contract is signed by the Mayor shall be paid into the Treasury of the City within thirty (30) days immediately following such date, and provided further that the first annual payment thereafter shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract, within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall so order, by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its electric system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances or departmental rules and regulations now in force or which may be adopted affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City.

No construction or repair of said electric system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permit so issued such officials may impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and the proper restoration of the surface of such streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Upon the completion of any work of construction the Company shall furnish to the President of the Borough a plan of such character as he may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structures erected, installed or constructed under this contract and the location and dimensions of all substructures encountered during the progress of the work.

The depth below the street surface of the new structure and of the substructures encountered must be shown; also their location with reference to the nearest curb line and the nearest curb-line intersection.

The electrical and other equipment to be installed by the Company, whether the same be under streets and avenues, in any Department of the City or in private property, shall be constructed and maintained subject to the approval and under the supervision and control of the Fire Commissioner.

Seventh—The plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and all appurtenances thereto shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest approved manner and with the most modern and improved appliances, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to its plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and appurtenances from time to time, as such additions or improvements are necessary in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

All equipment installed and used by the Company shall be under continual test and be systematically inspected in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Fire Department. The Company shall keep accurate records of these tests and inspections and furnish verified statements of the same to the Fire Commissioner upon ten (10) days' request therefor.

Eighth—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). In the Borough of Manhattan and that portion of the Borough of The Bronx west of the Bronx River such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City, should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. In the other territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by virtue of this contract it may construct sufficient subways for the accommodation of its cables and wires and no more. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors of the character or tension of those used by the Company or similar companies in any or all of the Boroughs, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be necessary and available for the operation of the alarm system hereby authorized. No cables or wires shall in the future be strung above the surface of the streets and avenues by the Company, and those at present in existence shall be removed and placed underground when and where required by the Board or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Ninth—The Company shall not in the future connect any of its auxiliary boxes or apparatus of any kind with the street boxes or City box circuits of the Fire Department, and the connections now in existence shall be discontinued within one year from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, provided, however, that before the expiration of the said year the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Fire Commissioner, discontinue such connections as he shall so order.

Tenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant. Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the underground conduits herein authorized to be placed in the streets shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to lay and maintain conduits shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move its conduits and their appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate be changed at any time during the term of this contract or any renewal thereof, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets or avenues the Company shall take care of and protect its conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is operating, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish protection service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Fourteenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the 1st day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which are in use by the Company on September 30 preceding, and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the Fire Commissioner on or before the 10th day of each month a map or plan of the locations in which wires have been placed by it during the preceding month.

Fifteenth—The rates to be charged by the Company shall not be in excess of the following, without the consent of the Board, and it is agreed that the same may be altered or changed by the Board, as hereinafter provided:

(a) For ordinary fire alarm service by means of manual boxes installed in buildings or premises of any description a yearly rental of fifty dollars (\$50) for the first box installed and an additional yearly rental of ten dollars (\$10) for each additional box installed in the same building or premises.

(b) For Combination Fire Drill and Fire Alarm Service, with boxes and gongs arranged to give employees or other occupants of buildings or premises designated signals, a yearly rental of fifty dollars (\$50) for the first box and gong installed and an additional yearly rental of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for each additional box and gong so installed in the same building or premises, provided, however, that these rates shall be effective only where the subscriber contracts for a minimum installation of five such boxes and gongs.

(c) For Combination Fire Alarm and Watchman Supervisory service a yearly rental of sixty dollars (\$60) for the first box installed and an additional yearly rental of eighteen dollars (\$18) for each additional box installed in the same building or premises.

(d) For any other service furnished or to be furnished by the Company the rates charged shall be reasonable and fair, and before being put into effect shall be submitted to the Board for its approval.

The Company shall file with the Board on February 1 of each year a verified schedule of the rates charged by it for each class of service which it furnishes, and certified forms of the contracts used by it with subscribers for its various classes of service.

The Company agrees, upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City Government, to furnish service to any and all buildings under the control of such Board, Department or Bureau at one-half the rates above authorized to be charged by it for whatever class or classes of service may be required.

Sixteenth—During the term of this contract or any renewal thereof the Board shall have the power to regulate and fix the maximum and minimum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Seventeenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Eighteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purpose than those explicitly set forth herein and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places. Except with the express consent of the Fire Commissioner no circuit installed or maintained by the Company over which alarms of fire are to be transmitted shall be used for the transmission of other than fire alarm signals.

Nineteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twentieth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory covered by this contract, or any part thereof.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—If for a period of twelve consecutive months the fire alarm system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of eighteen months out of any consecutive twenty-four months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity.

Twenty-third—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the system here by authorized from all subscribers served by the Company within the City of New York, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors and officers elected at the last meeting of the corporation, held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company, as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number and location of premises served by the Company.
16. Total receipts of the Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-fifth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within ninety (90) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privileges hereby granted, in default of which payment of the annual charges the City shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund, after ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements, furnishing of service to applicants as herein provided, the installation or maintenance of its structures and equipment, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws, ordinances or departmental regulations now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any

of these events, the Company, except as herein otherwise provided, shall pay to the City a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-sixth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the City or by the Comptroller on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board, by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the system constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-seventh—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such cases such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-eighth—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City, delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-ninth—The words "streets and avenues" or "streets or avenues" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement, included within the limits of the territory in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Thirtieth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues of the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by this contract.

Thirty-first—Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to grant any right or privilege to the Company to make or continue any installation of its apparatus in the Headquarters or Fire Alarm Telegraph Bureau of the Fire Department, or to connect or continue to connect in any way with the City's Fire Telegraph system, and no such installation or connection shall be made or continued without the separate additional consents of the Board and of the Fire Commissioner. The Company agrees that any consent so granted shall be a mere temporary and revocable license to make such installations or such connections, which may be revoked by resolution of the Board, approved by the Mayor, at any time, and when so revoked the Company holds and will hold the City harmless from any loss or damage sustained or which may be sustained by the Company or any of its subscribers on account of such revocation.

The Company further agrees that if permitted to make such installations or connections it will comply with all rules and regulations now in force or which may hereafter be made by the Fire Commissioner, and will pay such reasonable sum or sums as may be fixed by the Board on the recommendation of the Fire Commissioner for the space in such places where it makes its installations or for the use of such portions of the City's telegraph systems as it may use in making such connections, or for such other facilities as may be afforded to it by the City, and will pay such reasonable sum or sums as may be imposed by the Fire Commissioner as a penalty for each and every false alarm transmitted by its apparatus.

Nothing herein contained, however, shall be deemed to, nor shall the same affect in any manner the provision contained in section 2-Ninth of this contract, and no consent granted under this clause shall authorize or permit the making or the continued use of the connections therein prohibited.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officer thereto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on December 24, 1913, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as January 23, 1914, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in the "New York Times" and the "New York Press," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to The Loomis Cold Storage Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by The Loomis Cold Storage Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to The Loomis Cold Storage Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this day of 1914, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Loomis Cold Storage Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate certain pipes or conduits with the necessary branches and extensions therefrom, leading directly into private property, for the sole purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, provided that no pipe or conduit be of a greater outside diameter than twelve (12) inches, including insulation or other covering; the same to be constructed and operated only beneath the surface of such of the streets, avenues and highways situate within the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, as are included within the districts bounded and described as follows:

District No. 1.

Bounded on the north by the centre line of Park place, on the west by the westerly line of West street, on the south by the centre line of Vesey street, and on the east by the centre line of Washington street.

Provided, however, that upon written application to the Board by the Company the Board may, by resolution, extend the lines of District No. 1 hereinafter described to all or any part of a district bounded and described as follows:

District No. 2.

Bounded on the north by the centre line of Murray street, on the west by the westerly line of West street, on the south by the centre line of Fulton street, and on the east by the centre line of Greenwich street.

Both of which districts being more particularly shown—District No. 1 by full red lines and District No. 2 by dashed red lines—on a map entitled—

"Map showing districts applied for by the Loomis Cold Storage Company, to accompany petition dated December 10, 1913, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York."

—signed by Edward N. Loomis, President, a copy of which is hereto annexed and made a part of this contract.

Should District No. 1 be extended, as hereinbefore provided, then the terms and conditions of this contract shall apply to such extended district.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said pipes and conduits shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from January 1, 1914, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair reevaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the reevaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders, selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the reevaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum

shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash within one (1) month after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), and which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).

During the second term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350).

During the third term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five hundred dollars (\$500), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers.

(c) An annual payment of twenty-five cents (\$0.25) for each linear foot of pipe (where separately constructed) or conduit constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway, excepting, however, such pipes or conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business.

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway.

The annual charges shall commence from January 1, 1914.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and December 31 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before February 1 in each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding.

(d) Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company and within one (1) month from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall pay to the City the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500); said amount being due the City by reason of the unauthorized occupation of the streets by the Company or its predecessors.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for refrigerating rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the streets and avenues mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual, firm or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues, or within the districts hereinbefore described.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the pipes, conduits and appurtenances of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its pipes, conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter

to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said pipes or conduits, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the pipes or conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said pipes or conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the pipes, conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the pipes or conduits and the appurtenances thereof.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes hereby authorized whether laid within conduits or separately whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates:

(a) Consumers making monthly contracts:

Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet.

Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1,500 cubic feet.

One (1) cent per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over.

(b) Consumers making yearly contracts:

Fifteen (15) cents per year per cubic foot of box.

These rates shall not apply to boxes located above the first floor of any building, nor to boxes located within the Washington Market. Should District No. 1 be extended to include Washington Market, the Company shall furnish refrigeration to consumers located within the market at reasonable rates to be fixed by the Board.

During the term of this contract the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Fifteenth—The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corporation whose premises are located within District No. 1, or if such district be extended, as hereinbefore provided, then within such extended district shall extend its pipes or conduits to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at the rates herein prescribed, or at such rates as may be hereafter fixed by the Board, as herein provided. The Company shall not be required, however, to furnish refrigeration to applicants whose premises are located above the first floor of any building.

Sixteenth—A correct map shall be furnished to the Board by the Company on the first day of February, 1915, showing the exact location of all pipes, conduits and manholes constructed, with reference to the street lines, the curb lines and the street surface, together with a statement of the total length of such pipes and conduits. On the same date of each succeeding year, during the term of this contract, a supplementary map shall be furnished the Board, showing all pipes and conduits laid during the preceding year.

Seventeenth—The pipes and conduits hereby authorized shall be used only by the Loomis Cold Storage Company and for no other purpose than supplying refrigeration.

Eighteenth—The Company shall submit a report to the Board not later than February 1 in each year, for the year ending December 31 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued; for cash; for property.

2. The amount paid in, as by last report.

3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.

4. The funded debt, by last report.

5. The total amount of funded debt.

6. The floating debt, as by last report.

7. The total amount of floating debt.

8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.

9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.

10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.

11. Number of feet of pipe and conduit now laid.

12. The total amount expended for same.

13. Amount, kind and capacity of machinery now in use and required for operation.

14. The total amount expended for same.

15. Quantity of refrigeration produced during the year and the average price received for same.

16. Quantity used in Company's own warehouses.

17. Quantity furnished to outside consumers.

18. Number and location of warehouses occupied by the Company, exclusively or in part, and the extent of such occupation by the Company.

19. Number of outside consumers supplied.

20. Amounts paid by Company for damages to persons or property on account of construction and operation.

21. Total expenses of operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of pipe and conduit laid and the number of manholes

constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twentieth—In case of any violation or breach of failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise of consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days, to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the pipes and conduits constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its pipes, conduits and appurtenances as herein provided, in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of fifty dollars (\$50), as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such pipes, conduits or appurtenances which may affect the surface of the streets, shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the pipes or conduits authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-third—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after the default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any notice or direction of the Board, or other municipal officials, given or made, pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force in such case and in any of these events, the Company shall pay to the City a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each violation, which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That while said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contractor, party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally, upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
