Chief Medical Examiner—Request of, for Assignment of Space in the Bergen Building, Corner of Arthur and Tremont Aves., Bronx, and Also Two Rooms in the Premises Leased for the Department of Health at the Corner of Bay and Sands Sts., Richmond.

The Comptroller presented the following report:

To the Honorable The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On December 20, 1917, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assigned to the Court of Special Sessions space on the seventh floor of the Bergen Building at the southeast corner of Tremont and Arthur Avenues, Borough of The Bronx, and the question of the use after January 1, 1918, of the space on the third floor of the Bergen Building, given up by the Court of Special Sessions, was referred to the Comptroller to determine the best use to which it can be put during the unexpired term of the lease.

On December 28 the Chief Clerk of the Coroner's office addressed a letter to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requesting that space on the third floor of the Bergen Building be assigned to the Medical Examiner. On January 4, 1918, the Chief Medical Examiner made a request in writing for the assignment of this space.

The Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund informs me that he was informed by a representative of the Medical Examiner that they were now occupying this space.

The communication of the Chief Medical Examiner also relates to quarters for use of the Medical Examiner in the Borough of Richmond.

I am informed that Dr. Shipley, Secretary of the Department of Health, will attend the meeting of the Commission and advise whether or not the space can be spared by the Department of Health. Respectfully,

Dr. Frank J. Monaghan, Secretary, Department of Health, was heard in opposition to the proposed assignment of the two rooms in the premises leased for the Department of Health at the corner of Bay and Sands Sts., Richmond, on the ground that they were necessary for the needs of the Department.

A representative of the office of the Commissioner of Accounts stated that an examination made last fall of the premises occupied by the Department of Health in the Borough of Richmond showed at that time that more space was occupied than the needs of the Department required.

On motion, the matter was referred back to the Comptroller.

Public Service Commission—In the Matter of the Proposed Sale by, of Certain Real Estate.

The following was received from the Public Service Commission:

New York, November 14, 1917.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York, Municipal Building, New York City:

Sirs—The Public Service Commission for the First District contemplates selling in the near future, subject in many cases to easements and rights of way to be retained by the City for the maintenance and operation of rapid transit railroads, several parcels of property or portions thereof heretofore acquired by the City in various parts of the City for rapid transit purposes but which, upon the completion of such railroads, are now found to be no longer necessary for the maintenance and operation of such railroads.

Under the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act it becomes the duty of the Commission whenever any property so acquired shall have become unnecessary for rapid transit purposes to sell and convey the same in behalf of the City, but the Rapid Transit Act also provides that no sale or conveyance shall be made except with the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The total value of the properties and interests therein which are no longer necessary for rapid transit purposes and which the Commission contemplates offering for sale in the near future is large and the Commission considers it highly important to the City's interests that the upset prices for which the respective properties and interests therein which are no longer necessary for rapid transit purposes should be offered for sale should be the subject of very careful consideration jointly by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and by the Commission. In order that such consideration may be conducted with convenience, thoroughness and dispatch, the Commission suggests that, if agreeable to you, you appoint at an early date a committee composed of members of your Commission to confer with a committee to be appointed by the Public Service Commission for the First District as to these various properties and the proposed sale thereof.

Under subdivision 4-a of section 39 of the Rapid Transit Act property acquired by the City for rapid transit purposes, if it be no longer required for rapid transit purposes and if in the judgment of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund it be suitable for use by the City or one or more of its departments, may be accepted in payment or in part payment for property turned over to the Commission by the Sinking Fund or by any department of the City with the approval of the Sinking Fund. Such committees if appointed by you and by the Commission might consider whether it would be better for the Commission to turn over certain of the properties to the City rather than sell them.
