Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending August 21, 1886.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 18.—STATED MEETING—11 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Beekman (President), Crimmins, Powers, and Borden.
Messrs. Bowie Dash, Waldo Hutchins and George H. Stephens appeared before the Board and were heard in relation to the improvement of the Spuyten Duyvil Parkway.

The following communications were received :

From the Topographical Engineer :
1st. Reporting upon the works in progress under his charge. Filed.
2d. Submitting a plan of drainage for Sewerage District No. 33 F., showing the Webster avenue sewer connections and basins on the west side of that avenue, from East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to Kingsbridge road in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

On motion, said plan was approved, and copies thereof were ordered filed, according to law, in the offices of the Common Council, the Comptroller of the City of New York, the Health Department, the Department of Public Works, and the Department of Public Parks.

From the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards :
1st. Reporting upon the works in progress under his charge. Filed.
2d. Reporting the temporary suspension of men and teams on account of stormy weather. Approved.

From the Engineer of Construction, submitting a plan showing the proposed widening of the sidewalks on the northerly and southerly sides of Coenties Slip, between Front and South streets, in connection with the improvements of Jeannette Park.

On motion, the curb lines, as shown on said map, were adapted and fixed, and a copy of the map was ordered transmitted to the Commissioner of Public Works.

From the Secretary of the Harlem River Bridge Commission, applying for permission to excavate between the centre and easterly lines of a portion of Sedgwick avenue, for the purpose of founding Pier 3 of the proposed new Harlem River Bridge, and also to change temporarily the roadway at that point, as shown on a plan submitted by him.

On motion, the President was authorized to grant the application of the Harlem River Bridge Commission upon such terms and conditions as he may deem proper.

From the Superintendent of Parks, recommending that the pay of Foreman John Phalen be increased.

On motion, the pay of John Phalen, Foreman, was fixed at \$4 per day, to take effect with the pay-roll commencing on 15th instant.

From the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, recommending the promotion of Thomas O'Donald and Patrick Shandley from Laborers to Rockmen.

On motion, Thomas O'Donald and Patrick Shandley were promoted from Laborers to the grade and pay of Rockmen.

From Louis A. Risse, resigning his position as Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards. Accepted.

Thomas A. Emmet, General Inspector, was designated to perform the duties of Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards pending the appointment of a person to that position.

The resolution adopted on 12th December, 1879, allowing John Watkins, Janitor, pay for Sundays at the same rate as week days, was rescinded.

The owners of the Mott Haven canal were requested to open the flood-gate at the lock near One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street at low tide at least once each day.

In accordance with Regulation 35, of the Civil Service Regulations, the following-named persons were reappointed to the positions set opposite their names respectively, subject to the further pleasure of this Board :
