MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

Hon. WM. H. WICKHAM,

Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—For several years past this Department has been prevented from the performance of its duties with regard to the removal of encumbrances, by the refusal of the Comptroller to honor its requisitions against the appropriation for that purpose, drawn in accordance with section 23, article 2, chapter 4, of the Revised Ordinances. The Comptroller refuses to provide funds from the appropriation, unless the moneys that may have been previously advanced on account of "Contingencies, Department of Public Works," are accounted for, although the two appropriations are separate and distinct from each other, and it would not be lawful to pay the expenditures under one of them from the funds of the other. In consequence of this action of the Comptroller the Department must either be without funds for contingencies, or without funds for the removal of encumbrances.

I inclose herewith a draft of an amendment to the ordinance referred to, which will remove all possible grounds for further objections by the Comptroller to provide the necessary funds, and at the same time determine the responsibility and accountability of the Department as fully as is now the case.

Will you have the kindness to bring this matter before the Board of Aldermen for speedy action thereon, and oblige,

AN ORDINANCE to amend sections 23 and 24 of article 2, chapter 4, of the Revised Ordinances of 1866.

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, as follows:

Section 1. Section 23, article 2, chapter 4, of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 23. For the purpose of defraying any expense which may be incurred in pursuance of the last section, the Commissioner of Public Works may, by a requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars. He may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as may be said Commissioner of Public Works be deemed necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for that specific purpose; but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified by the Commissioner of Public Works, covering the expenditure of the money paid thereon.

For the further purpose of defraying any other minor or incidental expenses contingent to the Department of Public Works, as cannot be conveniently accounted for on separate vouchers, the Commissioner of Public Works may, by a requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, which shall be deemed separate and independent of the appropriation for removing obstructions.

The Commissioner of Public Works may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as may be deemed necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for the contingencies of the Department of Public Works; but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified by the Commissioner of Public Works, covering the expenditure of the money paid thereon.

Sec. 2. Section 24, article 2, chapter 4, of the Revised Ordinances of 1866 is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 24. The Commissioner of Public Works shall keep separate accounts with the two appropriations, one for the removal of encumbrances, and the other for contingencies of the Department of Public Works, and the several drafts shall be made upon the Comptroller charging each appropriation with the respective drafts designated in section 23, and the Comptroller shall draw his warrant in each case in favor of the Commissioner of Public Works for the amounts thereof.

The bill for engrossing and framing the resolutions amount to the sum of \$450, and as it is certified to by the late Clerk of the Common Council, under whose direction the work was done, your Committee believe it should be paid.

Havemeyer; and the Comptroller, after such transfer shall have been made, is hereby authorized and directed to draw warrants in favor of Benjamin F. Brady for engrossing and framing resolutions for presentation to the family of Mayor Havemeyer, for the sum of four hundred and fifty dollars; and of Koster & Green, decorators, for the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars, and charge the same to the appropriation for that purpose when made, as above requested, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.
