The Board of Aqueduct Commissioners having received with great regret the resignation of Alphonse Fteley, Esq., as Chief Engineer of this Commission, and feeling constrained by his earnest insistence to accept it, although they have done so with great reluctance, desire now to place formally upon the records of this Commission an expression of their high appreciation of his personal and professional characteristics.

Mr. Fteley has been associated with the work of the Aqueduct Commission almost from the beginning. On January 23, 1884, he was appointed Principal Assistant and Executive Engineer; on July 21, 1886, he was appointed Consulting Engineer; and on November 21, 1888, he became Chief Engineer. During this period, covering sixteen years, he has been constant and unremitting in his devotion to the work intrusted to the Commission; he has displayed professional and technical ability of the highest order; he has been vigilant in protecting the interests of the City, and at the same time has always been ready to deal fairly with the contractors employed on the work and with his subordinates in the Engineer Corps; he has been loyal to the Commissioners under whom he has served, never seeking to mislead them and never hesitating to speak freely and frankly whenever, in his opinion, the best interests of the work of the Commission required that he should so speak.

The magnificent dams and reservoirs and the substantial conduit which have resulted from the establishment of this Commission will always bear testimony to Mr. Fteley's integrity and capacity as a great engineer. We sever our official relations with him most regretfully, and wish him, in his retirement from public duty, a restoration to health and many years of honorable and useful activity.

Where more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.
