Hon. GEORGE C. CLAUSEN, Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond:

SIR—I return herewith report of Mr. E. McLean, Engineer of the Finance Department, relating to the plans and estimates for the construction of Jefferson Park, in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, as well as a revised estimate of cost.

I have carefully considered the objections contained in the report, and have accordingly reduced the estimates as far as possible.

Mr. McLean reviews the estimate and makes several recommendations, doubtless with a view of reducing the cost of construction rather than from a desire to criticise the ornamental features embodied in the plan.

His first objection relates to the small artificial lake, and he recommends that fountains be substituted in order to save the City water. The lake does not, however, require a greater supply than would be needed for a single fountain with a half-inch supply pipe. This will be sufficient at all times to keep the water in a perfectly clear and healthy condition and cannot be considered an excessive use of water. For ornamental purposes the lake will be of great value, and it will also cool the atmosphere and keep it more equitable and pleasant for visitors. It is therefore desirable to retain this feature of the design.

Mr. McLean objects to the Esplanade, another purely ornamental feature, which I consider of great importance. It will be of great use as a shady promenade. The centre plots of the Esplanade are to be covered with grass. It does not therefore reduce the grass area. The same objection could with as much propriety have been raised against the Mall in Central Park, which is now so highly appreciated as a promenade. I would, therefore, not consider a modification desirable in this respect, as experience shows that shady promenades are not too plentiful in the Borough of Manhattan. The feature was, moreover, carefully considered and finally adopted as satisfactory.

Mr. McLean further says that he sees no reason for the removal of the Recreation Pier. The cost of the removal of this pier was not included in the estimate, and it was merely hinted at in the report that it would be better if it was located at the foot of One Hundred and Eleventh street. I still believe this to be so, although for the time being it is incorporated in the design of the park and will not be disturbed.

Mr. McLean further objects to the two-rail fence which it was proposed to put around all the lawns. These fences were intended exclusively to protect the edges of the walks and would save a considerable annual outlay in sodding, and was for that reason included in the estimate. This item may, however, be left out, and is accordingly left out of the revised estimate submitted herewith.

The building Mr. McLean objects to on account of the material proposed to be used in its construction. The building is intended to be erected of red brick, with marble trimmings, and

as neither brick nor marble is more expensive than stone of any other kind, but rather cheaper, I do not see that much can be saved. Some liberty must assuredly be left to the designer of so important a piece of work, and I would most earnestly object to a frame building, which would need constant repair, and which, in case of fire, would endanger the lives of women and children. Possibly some \$10,000 could be saved by substituting wood for brick and iron, but the latter construction would be cheaper in the end as well as more satisfactory from a landscape point of view. The building will harmonize with the plantations and other landscape work, and I would therefore request that it be retained as a most useful feature of the park.

The location of the building is now shown on the plan as far from the river as it is possible to place it.

Mr. McLean further says that the old bulkhead-line must be preserved. I believe the Park Department has jurisdiction to the new bulkhead-line.

I would, however, recommend that the work now under consideration be carried to the old bulkhead-line only, in case there should be any legal doubt as to the City's ownership of the water-front, and a small modification, which will not affect the cost, will be necessary. Such a modification can be made at any time before the commencement of the work. I have left out of the revised estimate the cost of stone filling on the river front which was contained in the original estimate. The estimate has, therefore, been reduced by the sum of \$30,150.

Owing to the urgency of the work, I trust that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will find the plans and the revised estimates satisfactory. The cost has been reduced to a minimum, and no further reduction is possible without seriously affecting the beauty of the park.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with the request of your Honorable Board of June 17 last, as communicated to me on the 18th ultimo, in the matter of the request of this Department for an appropriation for the improvement of Thomas Jefferson Park, in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, the report of the Engineer of the Finance Department has been carefully considered, and the views therein expressed have been met in the preparation of the revised estimate, which is forwarded herewith, as far as it would seem consistent to do so, considering the wisdom of preserving features which, from a park standpoint, it is deemed most desirable to retain. Such modification of the plans as can be thus made, however, will reduce the cost of proposed improvement to \$215,669.38—a reduction of \$30,150 in the estimate of the plans as first submitted.

I inclose herewith a report of the Landscape Gardener, answering the objections set forth in the report of the Engineer of the Finance Department, and giving a more detailed description of the reduction in the estimate resulting from the modification.

I beg to return herewith the report of the Engineer herein referred to.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. George C. Clausen, Commissioner of Parks, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, in communication June 12, 1901, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, submits a "set of plans showing the proposed improvement and completion of Thomas Jefferson Park, in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, together with a carefully-prepared estimate of the cost of construction, amounting to \$245,819.38," and requests the Board "to approve of the proposed improvement, and authorize a bond issue to the amount named pursuant to the provisions of section 48 of the Charter, to provide for the work shown by these plans."

He incloses a report of the Landscape Gardener, giving the argument in favor of the plans, explaining the several features incorporated therein, and also the elements of consideration employed in designing a park of this character, with a comparison of cost.

The Landscape Gardener's discussion and arguments are very elaborate, but I will only refer to them generally. I consider his idea of making the surface of the park slightly undulatory is a good one, and his arrangement of trees and shrubbery I would not undertake to discuss.

I do not agree with him in the introduction of an artificial lake, for the reason that such a feature, though beautiful, would be a source of constant waste of water, which the City cannot afford. All the water that can be properly supplied should be in fountains, watering-spouts, etc.

I do not agree with him in the Pleasant Avenue esplanade. I think that this space could be more profitably devoted to lawns.

I see no reason for removing the recreation pier, as the entrance to it could be well combined as a favorable feature of the park.

I do not agree with the idea of putting a two-railed fence around all the lawns, as shown in the estimate, inasmuch as I think these lawns should be open to all, being only restricted by such police regulation as may from time to time be necessary.

I consider that there is no necessity for so expensive a building as that which he has designed, to be built mostly of marble; the dome—an expensive feature—is entirely useless, and of doubtful architectural beauty in such a locality.

I would recommend an artistic frame building, with lavatories in the basement or first story, one end for men and the other for women, and the centre section arranged for tools and storage purposes. The upper or second story to be used as a play-room for children; a pavilion giving a fine outlook on the river, and to be so constructed that a portion of it can be used for a music stand on certain days.

The location of this building should be back from the river, so as not to interfere with the esplanade on the river front, and to give space to the crowd congregated to hear the music.

The plans presented show a picturesque line on the river front, formed apparently by placing rip-rap outside of the established bulkhead-line. This bulkhead-line must be preserved, and the only work that can be done on it is its completion by erecting bulkheads where they do not now exist.

The river front being the most attractive portion of this park, there should be directly back of the bulkhead-line a broad esplanade, forming a playground for children and location for seats for those wishing to enjoy the river views.

I consider the width of walks recommended to be sufficient.

The entire park, except the river front, as shown on the plans, will be inclosed by a rubble-masonry wall, as explained by the Landscape Gardener, about three feet high, with heavy coping, surmounted by an iron fence four feet in height. There appears to me no objection to this construction.

If the views I have given above meet the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the estimate submitted must be considerably changed.

I would recommend that the whole matter be returned to the Department of Parks for such consideration as it may consider advisable.

SIR—Hon. George C. Clausen, Commissioner of Parks, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, by communication under date of September 16, 1901, returns to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the plans for the improvement of Thomas Jefferson Park, accompanied by a copy of a report by the Landscape Gardener answering the objections set forth in my report of July 13, 1901, and the Commissioner requests the Board to approve of the proposed improvement and to authorize a bond issue to the amount of \$215,669.38, pursuant to the provisions of section 48 of the Charter, to provide for the work shown on the revised plans.

In reply I will consider the report and estimate of the Landscape Gardener.
First—He states that in my former report I made "several recommendations doubtless with a view of reducing the cost of construction, rather than from a desire to criticise the ornamental features embodied in the plan."

It is true I had in mind the total requisition of \$245,819.38, and made recommendations for the omission of certain features, such as the artificial lake, esplanade on line of Pleasant avenue, rip-rap outside of established bulkhead-line, fences around grass plots, etc. I intended to, and think I did, clearly set forth my objections to these features, not only from a financial point of view, but from what I considered should be the treatment of this plot for park purposes, taking into consideration the location of the property and the character of the neighborhood.

Second—The Landscape Gardener states that I objected to "the small artificial lake and recommended that fountains be substituted in order to save the city's water," and says "the lake will not require a greater supply than would be needed for a single fountain with a half-inch supply pipe," and that "this will be sufficient at all times to keep the water in a perfectly clear and healthy condition;" for ornamental purposes he claims "the lake will be of great value and it will also cool the atmosphere and keep it more equitable and pleasant for visitors. It is therefore desirable to retain this feature of the design."

I do not agree with the Landscape Gardener in the statement that this lake can be supplied by a half inch pipe. Calculating the area of this lake from the plans, I find it covers an area of about 15,440 square feet, and, at an average depth of 2½ feet, it will hold about 289,500 gallons of water. A ½-inch supply pipe (100 feet in length), with a head of 73 feet (the approximate head at this point), will give an approximate discharge of 7,500 gallons per day; hence it will take about thirty-eight days to fill the lake, not, in my opinion, sufficient to keep the water in a perfectly clear and healthy condition. Apart from this view of the matter, I consider it useless and unnecessary to have a lake in this park, since the park itself is on the East river, and the proposed lake is within 400 feet of the river front, and would add very little cooling effect in comparison to the larger sheet of water. It is admitted that a lake or pond of any size is always an ornamental feature in any park, but, on account of its nearness to the East river, the habits and character of the people who will frequent this park and the quantity of water necessary to keep it in a sanitary condition, I am still of the opinion that the artificial lake should be omitted from the design, being both inappropriate and expensive. The introduction of a fountain, as suggested in the original plans, would be a very handsome feature, and it is the water necessary to supply such a fountain that I referred to. I did not recommend the substitution of a fountain for a lake.

Third—Esplanade on line of Prospect avenue. As expressed in my former report, I cannot see the necessity nor appropriateness of such an elaborate esplanade, with its marble edging, etc.

A mall such as is in Central Park in a park in this neighborhood would be entirely inappropriate and out of place. As suggested in my previous report, since the river front is the most attractive portion of this park and the section that will be mostly frequented, it should be arranged to accommodate the visitors—not used as a landscape ornamental feature. The question of utility should be considered before the beautiful and ornamental. To accomplish this end there should be directly back of the established bulkhead-line a broad esplanade forming a playground for children and place for seats for those wishing to enjoy the river view and the fresh breezes from the waters of the East river. The present crib-bulkhead which nearly coincides with the established bulkhead-line can be repaired and additional crib built at the foot of One Hundred and Eleventh, One Hundred and Thirteenth and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets. This crib-bulkhead will be sufficiently strong to support the ground walk or esplanade along the river front; eventually a sea-wall should be built along the entire river front, but as this is very expensive and not required at present, it is not necessary to provide for it in this appropriation.

Fourth—Public Comfort Building.
In my former report I not only objected to the material of the proposed building as being too elaborate, but suggested and recommended a building which would give lavatory accommodations in the basement or first story, one end for men and the other for women (the entrances to each being at the extreme ends), and the centre section of this story could be arranged for tools and storage. The upper or second story to be used as a shelter play room for children, a pavilion giving a fine outlook on the river, and to be so constructed that the central portion can be used for a music stand on certain days. A building similar in design to the "Outlook Building" in Corlears Hook Park is my idea of an appropriate structure.

I also suggested that this building be a short distance back from the river, so as not to interfere with the esplanade on the river front, but sufficiently near in order to permit a good view of the river and to allow the crowd congregated on the river front to hear the music. To me it is a useless expense to erect a building with an elaborate dome, providing only accommodations for lavatories; the "grand hall" shown on the plan can only be considered as a waiting-room for the toilets on either side.

In relation to the materials of the proposed building, I would add that, since a wooden structure is objected to so strongly by Mr. Rose, I would suggest that the building recommended by me be built of stone to the top of the basement or first story and the columns and roof of the upper or second story be of yellow pine. By this combination a very artistic effect can be worked out by the architect.

Mr. Rose is in error when he states that in my former report I said "the old bulkhead-line must be preserved." What I did say was that the established bulkhead-line must be preserved. I would add that this line is what is known as the line of solid filling, established by the Department of Docks, and no work or filling can be done outside of this line, and the Department of Parks has only jurisdiction to this line.

The estimate of quantities as furnished by Mr. Rose, Landscape Gardener, I have been unable to check in all cases, and would submit the following estimates, amounting to \$145,120.13, which I consider will be sufficient to make the improvements as recommended by me. Therefore, I would advise that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$145,000 for the improvement of Thomas Jefferson Park, in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, between One Hundred and Tenth and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets, First avenue and the East river.

BIRD S. COLER, Esq., Comptroller, City of New York, New York :

DEAR SIR—We are advised by the Park Department that proposed Contract No. 1-A on New York Public Library work, covering proposed rock excavation at bottom of the boiler-room excavation on the fortieth side of the site has been referred, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to you, and we address you in connection with this.

The correspondence and reports pertaining to this matter are already voluminous, and we have no desire to add to them, but we believe that in the discussions which have been had concerning this contract that one or two very important considerations have been somewhat neglected.

The difference of opinion which exists between the Corporation Counsel and the Engineer of your department turns, as we understand it, upon the propriety of requiring that the proposed rock excavation be done by the contractor for the "Removal of the Forty-second Street Reservoir and Other Work," who has already done the earth excavation and a portion of the rubblework and other works in connection with boiler-room.

We believe that this question is fully disposed of by the stipulation of the specifications under which this contractor has executed the work. This contract and the specifications provides for the "benching off" of exposed rock surfaces in the trenches, but it does not provide for the excavation of rock in bulk, nor was it intended to cover any such work. Any attempt to force this contractor to do this proposed rock excavation would fail on this ground alone, if for no other reason.

The Park Department is entirely willing that the work should be done under this contract, if possible, and at the suggestion of the Park Department we have asked Mr. Lentilhon, the contractor, to do the work. This he has formally refused to do. Under these conditions, nothing but an order from the courts would have any effect on the contractor, and we are certain that if the issue were brought to trial that the Court would hold that the specifications did not cover the class of rock excavation now intended. In view of these considerations we urge that this contract be approved and that the Park Department be authorized to ask for proposals for the work.

Owing to the complications arising from the holding up of this contract, the work at the library site is entirely suspended and cannot be carried on until this rock is removed. The north side of Fortieth street is opened by the excavation and is much obstructed. The whole of the library work is therefore entirely blocked on account of this work, and it is of the very greatest

importance that arrangements be made so that the excavation may be proceeded with during the month of November.

If we have not made our position in the matter entirely clear to you, we will appreciate it very much if you will give us the opportunity for a brief conference to go into the matter more fully.

In addition to the foregoing statements I also present statements of all bonds maturing during the year 1902 and payable from the Sinking Fund or from assessments ; and statements showing item by item the detail of the manner in which the Sinking Fund installments have been calculated.

I also present a statement showing the condition of the Fund for Street and Park Openings. On October 1, 1901, the excess of the liability of this fund over the cash balance was \$644,353.76, and under the provisions of sections 175 of the Charter, it is necessary to insert this amount in the Budget for the ensuing year, being \$540,199.30 less than the amount so included in the Budget for the current year.

I also present communications from the State Comptroller showing that the amounts required to be inserted in the Budget for State taxes aggregate \$4,515,509.29, being a decrease from the amounts required for 1901 of \$2,443,527.83.

I also present a statement of premises leased by the City, the rentals whereof are not chargeable against the rent appropriations made to the several departments of the City Government, and which should be provided for under appropriate accounts in the Budget for 1902, the aggregate amount thereof being \$363,411.41, an increase of \$1,611.85 over the amount of the same appropriation in the Budget for 1901.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—I am in receipt of a communication bearing date October 18, from Edgar J. Levey, Esq., Deputy Comptroller, which is in part as follows:

"On August 1, 1900, Mr. Theodore Connolly, Acting Corporation Counsel, advised this office that in the framing of the tax levy ordinance the various items for State taxes should be included in the several county budgets so that the amounts thereof should be raised respectively from the taxable property within the limits of each county.

"This opinion dealt with an apparent conflict in the Charter between sections 902 and 1595. The opinion stated that if the situation consisted merely of a conflict between these two sections, Mr. Connolly would hold that the provisions of said section 1595 would control, and that the levy to meet the State tax must be made as in that section provided, but that the situation had been entirely changed by the enactment of chapter 74, Laws of 1899, that added to section 1593 a new provision having no especial relation to the other provisions of section 1593, but being clear and complete in itself.

"I call your attention to the fact that section 1593 has been repealed by the new Charter; also to the fact that section 1595 has been re-enacted so that its weight in respect to the time of its promulgation is equal to that of any other section of the Charter, and request your advice as to whether the conclusions reached in the opinion of your Department, dated August 1, 1900, still hold good or whether a contrary conclusion must be reached in view of the law as it will stand after January 1, 1902."

Mr. Levey further states that he attempted, unsuccessfully, to procure from the Charter Revision Commission a repeal of section 1595 of the Charter for the purpose of leaving the provisions of section 902 to control the question.

Appreciating the importance of Mr. Levey's inquiry, I have again considered carefully the two sections of the Charter in question in connection with the repeal of section 1393 by the new charter of the present year, and also have carefully considered again the opinion rendered by this Department last year and referred to by Mr. Levey.

After this re-examination, I am strongly impelled to the conclusion that the opinion referred to correctly states the law, and should be followed by you at this time. The conclusion in that opinion was quite sharply that in the absence of the amendatory act, chapter 74 of the Laws of 1899, section 1595 should control.

Chapter 74 of the Laws of 1899, amended section 1393 of the Charter, having now been repealed, I think it is clear that section 1595 of the Charter must control the question asked, and that the State tax should be levied as therein directed.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The Flushing Association, representing the people of the late Village and Town of Flushing, and enrolling between one hundred and fifty and two hundred members, has authorized and requested its committee to appear before your Honorable Board to urge the appropriation of the full amounts required for the maintenance of macadamized roads and highways in the Borough of Queens, having obtained expert advice to the effect that the whole amount so demanded is yet inadequate to properly maintain the same and to avoid the continual deterioration resulting from the usual wear and tear, as well as the attacks of the weather.

The roads in question were installed at large expense, and evoked from all sides high commendation, and brought many persons into the neighborhood to enjoy its advantages. For the past three or four years, however, the roads have been so neglected, and treated in such niggardly and parsimonious manner, as not only to detract materially from the enjoyment of using them, but also to seriously endanger the road-beds and involve extraordinary outlay, which judicious care and watchfulness would have avoided.

The people of that neighborhood feel that the investment which they have made in the roads was of the wisest character, but that it has been deliberately sacrificed and neglected by the officials in whose care it has been placed since the formation of Greater New York.

This Association, at its own expense, has caused an investigation to be made by the Engineer under whose supervision many of the roads were constructed, and presents his report herewith, to show how inadequately previous appropriations have served to maintain this public property.

The committee, therefore, urges that no deduction in the amount requested for such roads be countenanced by your Board for the coming year.

The Association, through its committee, also calls attention to the fact that the Borough of Queens has in the past been treated with insufficient generosity in the appropriation for street cleaning and the disposal of ashes and garbage, since it has been necessary in the past to obtain from other boroughs transfers of money and assistance in material and labor, in order to meet absolutely unavoidable requirements.

With the increase of population and the separation of the boroughs under the new amendments to the Charter, it is especially important that sufficient be appropriated to meet the needs of the district, and to keep pace with the progress of the Department of Health, which in the past has been obliged to withdraw from its requirements, because there were no means to meet the same.

The Association, through its committee, also urges liberal treatment of the appropriation requested for the maintenance and extension of the fire-alarm system, so that the same may be efficient, even though limited in extent, and that it may be extended at the earliest opportunity.

The Association also urges the Board to resume adequate appropriation for the support of the Flushing Library, which was obliged to call upon the people of the immediate neighborhood for that support which it was justified in expecting from the City, and which was omitted for the current year, in what the Association considers an unwise exercise of discretion. It should receive the full amount allowed by law to be appropriated for its support.

The Association also recommends most strongly that the Flushing Hospital and Dispensary, in the Town of Flushing, should receive the highest amount of support that can be justified by the circumstances, that its work may continue unhampered and the sufferings of those who are obliged to resort to its shelter may continue to be alleviated.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—Herewith I beg to forward, for the consideration of your Honorable Board, an estimate of the cost of maintaining the two in-door gymnasiums in Hamilton Fish Park and the out-door gymnasium and playground in DeWitt Clinton Park during the year 1902.

This estimate has been prepared by the Out-door Recreation League, by whom the gymnasium, etc., in the last-named park was established and equipped and by whom it has been conducted and maintained up to the present time. Being thus based upon the experience of the past several years the estimate is deemed to be a proper one for the coming year, if paid by the Department.

If thus assumed by the City, the Out-door Recreation League offers to turn over to the City all the paraphernalia and equipment of these gymnasiums, now the property of the League.

Considering both the spirit and the letter of the law under which these parks were established, particularly Hamilton Fish Park, in whose construction was included a handsome and costly gymnasium building, now idle, and also the good results which have been shown by the League's operations, I deem it both desirable and advisable that these gymnasiums should be maintained, and therefore recommend to your Honorable Board that an item of the amount of the estimate, eight thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$8,750), be included in the final estimate for conducting the business of this Department for the year 1902.

DEAR SIR—I represent various parties who own real estate in Richmond Hill terrace, Borough of Queens, situated on Garfield avenue, from Jamaica Plank road to Forest Park; on Grant avenue, from Cleveland avenue to Forest Park; on Cleveland avenue, from Grant avenue to Forest Park, and on Orchard avenue, from Garfield avenue to Forest Park, as shown on the inclosed sketch.

The streets mentioned, before the consolidation of the Village of Jamaica into the present City of New York, have been laid out with sidewalks, macadamized, trees planted and gas placed therein at a large expense, and at the time of the consolidation application was about to be made to the Town of Jamaica to have the water-mains laid and hydrants set on said streets.

I represent five property-owners on said streets, taxpayers, who are desirous of building houses thereon, and have all their plans prepared for the construction of twenty-two houses, and one of them has gone so far as to build the foundation of his house. They have been prevented from constructing their houses by reason of the fact that there was no water in the streets and no hydrants therein from which water could be obtained for their protection in case of fire.

There is a contract outstanding between the Woodhaven Water Supply Company and the Town of Jamaica, which is binding on its successors, which contract is on file in the County Clerk's office in the County of Queens, which gives the said Woodhaven Water Supply Company the sole and exclusive right of laying mains and hydrants and supplying water over a large territory in which the streets above named are included.

There is a provision in the said contract that the said Woodhaven Water Supply Company shall not be required to lay mains unless an order is given to erect hydrants along the streets, which shall be not less than fifteen to the mile, for which they are to be paid the sum of \$20 a year each. The streets concerning which we write are less than half a mile in length.

The Water Commissioner of The City of New York, under section 517 of the Charter, is the success or ininterest to the Town of Jamaica, with whom the Woodhaven Water Supply Company made this contract.

On behalf of my clients, an application was made and presented more than a year ago to the President of the Borough of Queens to have water put in these streets; he reported the matter favorably, and sent the same to the Water Commissioner of The City of New York.

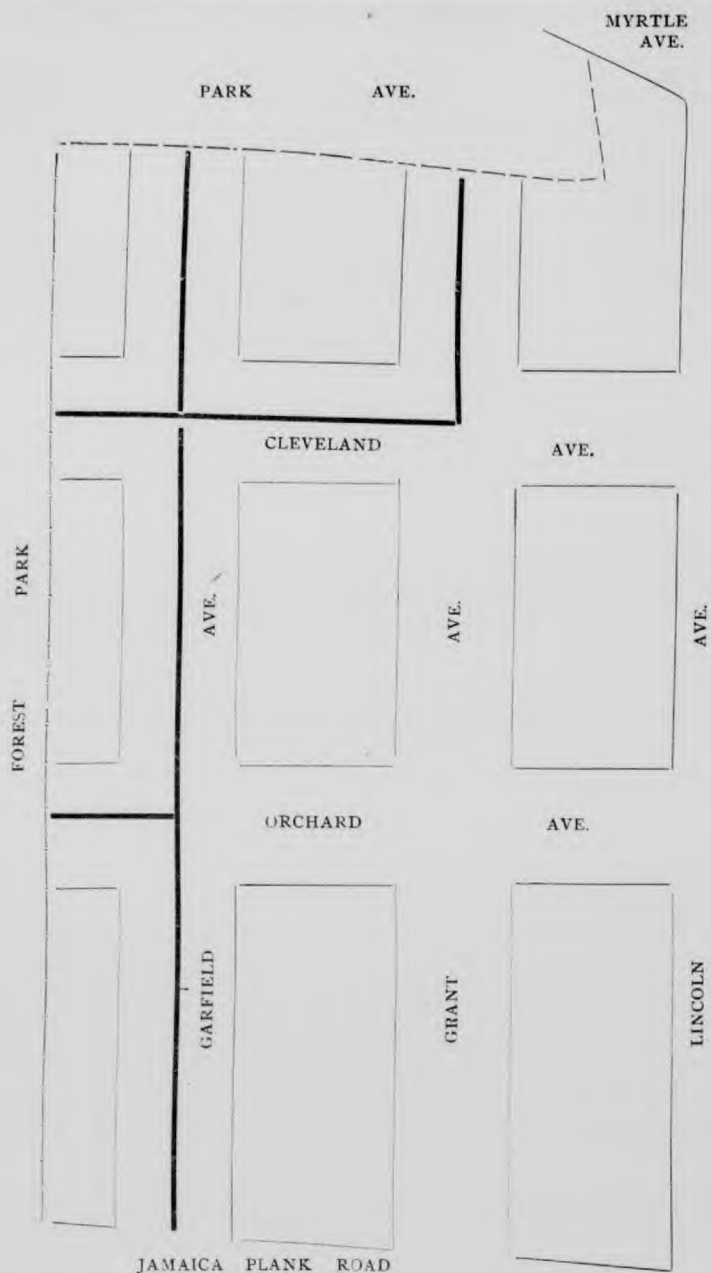
The Water Commissioner of The City of New York, through Mr. Birdsall, its Chief Engineer, with whom I have had several interviews, has explained to me that the Water Commissioner, under the advice of the Corporation Counsel, would refuse to give orders for the erection of hydrants.

It seems that when applications have been made with respect to other property, the Water Commissioner had submitted the question to the Corporation Counsel as to whether he could give orders to the water companies to lay hydrants if he did not have sufficient money from his appropriation to pay for the same, and the Corporation Counsel had advised him that unless he had such moneys from his appropriation he would be committing a misdemeanor if he should give any such order, and Mr. Birdsall stated that that applied to our case.

The Woodhaven Water Supply Company, through its officers, has told me that it is ready and willing to lay the pipes and erect the hydrants; that it has the material on hand and the money with which to perform the work.

Mr. Birdsall has informed me that in his opinion the pipes should be laid and the hydrants erected, but that the Water Commissioner was powerless to give the necessary orders under which the work could be done.

I therefore, on behalf of my clients, respectfully petition the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York to make a sufficient appropriation for the year 1902 to the Water Department of The City of New York to enable it to pay for the necessary hydrants, which will involve an expense for that year of not more than \$160, so that the pipes may be laid and the hydrants erected and my clients obtain beneficial use of their property.

Hon. M. C. MURPHY, *Commissioner and Chief of Police:*

SIR—I beg to call your attention to the appropriation asked in the Police Department Estimate for 1902, entitled, "Extra Telephone Expenses," and more particularly to the item, \$30,000, required for the construction of new lines, extension of old lines and for additional underground and aerial cables.

This amount has been asked for every year since consolidation, but has not been allowed. The telephone work of the Department has been transacted without serious complaint, but when the underground cables of the Police Department were laid, beginning 1893, ending 1895, they were intended to carry only the business of the Department at that time, covering the territory of Manhattan and The Bronx, providing for the usual normal increase within such territory. Owing to consolidation these cables have been used to their uttermost capacity, all spare wires being used, and in time these wires deteriorate and have to be abandoned.

It is now absolutely essential to obtain an appropriation to enable the Department to renew, repair, and extend underground cables, and to furnish new cables in the Borough of The Bronx, where subways have been built. We have been unable to do anything in this direction, owing to the need of funds, consequently the Police wires have to be maintained on poles, many of which are old and liable to fall, and cause damage suits against the City. There are also many complaints, owing to this Department failing to do its share of the work, in the removal of poles from the streets. This appropriation is also to be used to place a cable on the Brooklyn Bridge, where at present we have only two police-lines, which lines were placed there in 1897, and were only intended for temporary use, and should be replaced during the coming year with new lines inclosed in cables.

The second item, appropriation of \$40,000, for underground cables, Borough of Brooklyn. In this borough the telegraph and telephone companies are rapidly placing their lines underground. Almost all such lines in the principal streets are already so provided for, and yet the poles cannot be taken down, as they carry important police-wires, which is the cause of endless complaint from the Department having charge in that borough. It is also a great inconvenience and expense to the telegraph and telephone companies, who are obliged to maintain these poles to accommodate the City Departments, and at the same time are compelled themselves, by the city, to place wires underground.

The third item, "Telephone Signal System, \$146,640." The requirements of an adequate telephone and signal system for the Department has been fully reported on for several years. My object in sending you a communication at this time is for the reason that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may take final action on the Department's estimate not later than the 31st inst. I most respectfully request that you strongly urge on the Mayor and the other members of said Board the fact that the first item, \$30,000, is absolutely essential for the proper maintenance of the Police Telephone System, and that we cannot, with prudence, do another year without it.

The second item, \$40,000, is of the utmost importance in order to allow the Department to provide new lines, in cables, underground in Brooklyn, instead of constructing and maintaining overhead lines, which must, in the near future, be provided for underground, thus saving a considerable sum, and it will also enable us to co-operate with other City Departments in removing poles from the streets.

The third item, \$146,640, Telephone Signal System, I leave for your future determination and action.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:
