R. Sheehan, treasurer of said corporation, appeared and were heard with reference to the delay in completing the contract. William E. Austin of the firm of Smith, Westervelt & Austin, architects, also appeared and was heard. After consideration of the matter, it was laid over for one week for further investigation.

A communication was received from John H. Parker Company, contractors for the erection of the Administration Building of the Department of Health, located on the grounds of the Willard Parker and Reception Hospitals, foot East Sixteenth street, Borough of Manhattan, in which said company agree to allow the Department of Health the sum of \$25 per week for necessary heat to be furnished in said building, and on recommendation of Smith, Westervelt & Austin, the architects, it was

Resolved, That the offer of John H. Parker Company, contractors for the erection of the Administration Building of this Department, located on the grounds of the Willard Parker and Reception Hospitals, foot East Sixteenth street, Borough of Manhattan, to pay the sum of \$25 per week for the necessary heat to be furnished in said building, be and is hereby accepted.

A communication was received from Smith, Westervelt & Austin, architects of the plans and specifications for the isolation wards of the Department of Health, located at Riverside Hospital, North Brother Island, in the Borough of The Bronx, contract for the erection of which was awarded to Foster & Alford, at No. 181 Broadway, recommending the substitution of blue (black) slate for the roofs of the isolation cottage, instead of red slate called for in the contract, and the acceptance of the offer of Foster & Alford to allow \$100 to be deducted from said contract was received, and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the substitution of blue (black) slate on the roofs of the isolation cottages in course of erection at Riverside Hospital, North Brother Island, Borough of The Bronx, by Foster & Alford, contractors, in place and stead of the red slate called for in the contract, be and is hereby approved, and the offer of said contractors to allow the sum of \$100 to be deducted from the price of the contract for such substitution is accepted.

An estimate was received from Joseph Johnson's Sons, to whom was awarded the contract to ditch, drain, fill or otherwise improve certain areas in the Salt Marsh Lands, located within the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, with a view to their destruction as breeding places for mosquitoes, agreeing to furnish all the labor and materials necessary to fill in with earth to force and keep out the water of certain places in the Cat-tail Marsh, located at Sand Lane, corner of old Southside Boulevard, South Beach, Borough of Richmond, an area of about 10,000 square feet, and in the Cat-tail Marsh, located on the South Side Boulevard, near the property formerly known as Brown's Hotel, an area of about 20,000 square feet; also to furnish the labor and material for forty piles, more or less, each ten to fifteen feet long, six inches apart, to prevent driftwood from floating through the inlet under the car tracks of the South Beach and Midland Beach Trolley Line, for the sum of nine hundred and ninety-five dollars (\$995.00), and on recommendation of Commissioner Doty, it was

Resolved, That the contract for furnishing all the labor and material necessary to fill in certain places in the Cat-tail Marshes located at points near Midland and South Beaches, in the Borough of Richmond, containing about 30,000 square feet and the driving of the necessary piles at the inlet located under the tracks of the South Beach and Midland Beach Trolley Line, as provided in an estimate dated January 3, 1906, be and the same is hereby awarded to Joseph Johnson's Sons, of No. 193 Broadway, West New Brighton, Borough of Richmond, for the sum of \$995.

Hugo Hirsh, of Hirsh & Rasquin, attorney, presented the application of Benjamin May for the approval of the site located on the south side of Oak street and the East River, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the location of a slaughter house to slaughter cattle, sheep, lambs and calves, and the plans and specifications for the erection of said building, and the Sanitary Superintendent recommended that same

be approved. Thomas F. Magner, George W. Palmer, and numerous other persons, residents of the Borough of Brooklyn, appeared in opposition to the approval of said site and were heard. After consideration the matter of a hearing upon said application was adjourned until Tuesday, January 23, 1906, at 11 o'clock a. m.

Report of the violation of the terms of a permit issued to Max Rothberg to sell game poultry for breeding purposes only, at No. 80 Bayard street, by the Board of Health, November 22, 1905, with the recommendation that the same be revoked, was received, and the Secretary was directed to notify said Max Rothberg to appear before the Board of Health at its meeting to be held Wednesday, January 17, 1906, and show cause why said permit should not be revoked.

On recommendation of the Sanitary Superintendent, it was

The explanation submitted being unsatisfactory to the Board of Health, the Secretary was directed to refer the matter to the Corporation Counsel with the request that he will cause criminal prosecution of Dr. Friedler to be instituted.

John Doe, M. D., who was subpoenaed to appear before the Board of Health to explain his failure to report the case of Richard McAleer, a man twenty-nine years of age, residing in the tenement house located at No. 415 West Thirty-fifth street, and who was removed to the Contagious Disease Hospital of the Department of Health January 6, 1906, suffering from small-pox, after having been ill with said disease since December 23, 1905, as required by section 133 of the Sanitary Code, having failed to appear, and the officer of the Sanitary Police Squad who had the serving of the subpoena in hand, having been unable to find said physician, the Secretary was directed to issue an additional subpoena requiring him to appear before the Board at its meeting to be held Wednesday, January 17, 1906, at 11 o'clock a. m.

Certain applications for certificates of employment were received and the evidence submitted as to the age of the applicants being in accordance with the requirements of the law relating to the employment of women and children in mercantile and other establishments as amended, it was

In addition to the above, clean snow and ice may be dumped from any other bulkhead on the waterfront, or the outer end of any pier in The City of New York, provided that said bulkhead or piers is not shedded, and provided also that the consent of the owner, lessee or occupant of the premises is first obtained.

## Regulations.

Dumping of snow or ice from a pier must be off its outer end.

In all cases the snow and ice must be dumped into the river and not upon the surface of the premises.

The dumping of material other than clean snow and ice is strictly forbidden.

The Police Department has been requested to enforce these regulations.

## BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the Staff Room of Bellevue Hospital on Tuesday, January 2, 1906, at 4 o'clock. Present—Doctor Brannan, the president, in the chair; Messrs. Tack, Robbins, Tierney, Sachs and Paulding, trustees.

Doctor S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: Regulations governing students in the hospital wards, which have been formulated as a result of a conference between the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital and the General Medical Superintendent, are herewith submitted. The only difference of opinion between said committee and the Superintendent is in the hours of the admission of students in the wards. They have been admitted from 9 to 11.30 and from 1 to 4. In order to facilitate the work of the hospital it is recommended that the hours be from 10 to 11.30 or from 9.30 to 11.30, and that the rules go into effect at the ensuing scholastic year and apply to all hospitals in the Department.

Concerning the installation of the vacuum cleaning system in Bellevue Hospital, at an expense of \$6,750, there are 81 employees in Bellevue Hospital proper who are engaged in cleaning work, and who are paid about \$15 a month. Counting 10 per cent. of the expense of the plant as a sum adequate for interest, cost of maintenance and depreciation, there would be enough saving effected by diminishing the number of employees to equal the charge above referred to and the cleaning would be much more efficient.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees advertise specifications for the installation of the vacuum cleaning system in the present Bellevue Hospital, the same to be so constructed as to be available for use in the new building when completed; it was also

Resolved to advertise for the same for the new Fordham Hospital.

### Communications.

A communication, under date of December 29, 1905, was received from Doctor W. H. Luckett transmitting the minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for the meeting held on Tuesday evening, December 26, 1905.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That, in accordance with the recommendation of the Medical Board, Doctor D. D. Campbell be appointed House Surgeon at Harlem Hospital for the coming six months.

A communication under date of January 1 was received from Mr. Joseph H. Cohen, President of the Beth Israel Hospital, inviting the Board of Trustees to the annual meeting of the Beth Israel Hospital Association on Wednesday, January 10, 1906.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was acknowledged and placed on file.

### Reports of Committees.

Mr. Tierney of the Building Committee reported the receipt of a letter from Mr. Raymond F. Almirall, architect, relating to the proposed change in the doorway of Fordham Hospital on the end of the ward wings to the second window from the end, and submitted an estimate from the John H. Parker Company agreeing to carry out the same for the sum of two hundred and thirty-five dollars. Mr. Tierney reported in favor of accepting the estimate, and it was, on motion, duly seconded.

Resolved, That this expenditure be approved.

Dr. Brannan reported upon the receipt of a communication from Messrs. Parish & Schroeder, architects, No. 5 West Thirty-first street, submitting a list of buildings erected by them.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the President and Mr. Tierney for further investigation and report.


