BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Local Board Meetings.

WASHINGTON HEIGHTS DISTRICT.

A meeting of the Board of Local Improvements of the Washington Heights District was held in the Council Chamber of the City Hall on Tuesday, March 15, 1910, at 11 a. m.

Present—Aldermen Bolles, Boschen, Marx and Willard and President McAneny.

The minutes of the meeting held on March 1, 1910, were approved, as printed.

The President presented for the consideration of the Board a petition for regulating, grading, paving, curbing and flagging West One Hundred and Forty-first street, between Broadway and Riverside drive.

The report of the Engineer showed that sewers and water mains have not been provided the entire distance from Broadway to Riverside drive.

A communication from the Garnet Hall Realty Company, withdrawing the application for the improvement of the street, was read.

The papers were thereupon ordered on file.

The President presented for the consideration of the Board a petition for a sewer in West One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, from Broadway to St. Nicholas avenue.

The report of the Engineer recommended the construction of a sewer in this street, between Wadsworth and St. Nicholas avenues.

Mr. Stephen J. Egan appeared in support of the petition.

The following resolution was offered by Alderman Boschen: Whereas, A petition for a local improvement, described below, has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan, etc.

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To construct sewer in One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, between Wadsworth and St. Nicholas avenues; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Which was adopted.

The President presented for the consideration of the Board the matter of laying out for use as a public park the land lying between Edgecombe and St. Nicholas avenues, One Hundred and Thirty-sixth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets.

The following appeared in opposition:

J. B. Roe, representing the Germania Life Insurance Company; Mr. James P. Powers; Mr. David M. Neuburger, representing the Edgecombe and St. Nicholas Avenues Taxpayers' Association, appeared in support of the petition and submitted a brief in favor of the project.

Mr. James D. Freeman also appeared in favor, and stated that he would not object to paying an assessment in the event of the entire cost of the improvement being placed upon the property benefited.

On motion, the matter was laid over for four weeks.

The President presented for the consideration of the Board a petition for changing the grades of portions of West Two Hundred and Eighteenth street, Park Terrace East, Park Terrace West, Seaman avenue and West Two Hundred and Seventeenth street.

The following appeared in opposition to any plan that would delay the physical improvement of the streets in this section:

Mr. Thomas Dwyer appeared in support of the plan presented by the petitioners.

Mr. John Whalen appeared in opposition to the plan of the petitioners and in favor of the plan prepared by the Engineer of Street Openings.

Alderman Boschen offered the following resolution recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the adoption of the plan submitted by the petitioners:

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Minutes of Meeting Held Wednesday, February 23, 1910.

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital on Wednesday, February 23, 1910, at 4 o'clock.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe, Paulding, Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees, and Mr. Drummond, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of February 1, a copy of which had been sent to each member, were held as read and approved.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:
From February 13 to February 19, inclusive, the following operations were performed, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present: Bellevue Hospital, 66; Gouverneur Hospital, 11; Harlem Hospital, 25; Fordham Hospital, 25.

In accordance with the rules, a fire drill was held at Harlem and Fordham Hospitals on February 16, at Bellevue Hospital on February 17 and at Gouverneur Hospital on February 19, 1910.

The Acting General Medical Superintendent of the Blackwells Island Hospitals, Dr. C. B. Bacon, requested that a representative of that Department be allowed to study the medical record system in Bellevue Hospital, with a view to adopting that system in the island hospitals. This request was granted.

William Metz was transferred from Fordham Hospital and died within twenty-four hours after admission. The facts were reported to the Coroner. After investigation, it appears that there was no contra-indication to transfer at the time, and that the doctors were justified in making the transfer.

Seven special nurses have been authorized in emergencies, and at the request of the attending physicians and surgeons. The total number of days' employment of these seven nurses was thirteen. Approval is asked for.

Miss Marion Rottman, a Nurse, was sent to the Minto Hospital with diphtheria on February 19.

The estimated amount required for nurses in Bellevue Hospital was cut down about \$8,000 in the 1910 Budget. At the present rate we are using about all of the money allowed. It will in all probability be necessary to request more money in order to provide a sufficient number of nurses to adequately cover the wards of the hospital.

A social service nurse at Harlem Hospital was authorized by the Board at a previous meeting. There was no appropriation for this purpose. It is recommended that money to cover this position be included in the Special Revenue Bond Budget which is shortly to be sent to the Board of Aldermen.

A revision of the salaries and wages schedules of the Budget is necessary before the payrolls can be passed. This revision has been prepared. It does not involve any extra money other than provided in the schedules, and the only increases are as follows:

Sylvia Barteau, \$540 to \$600, record room Clerk, Bellevue Hospital.
Eugene Newton, \$240 to \$300, Telephone Operator, Gouverneur Hospital.
Emma Murray, \$600 to \$750, Clerk, Fordham Hospital.
Elizabeth Wilson, \$600 to \$750, Clerk, Fordham Hospital.
Janet Hynes, \$720 to \$800, Housekeeper, Bellevue Hospital.

It is recommended that this revision be authorized and forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at once.

It is recommended that a marble partition be built in the bathroom and a dividing fireproof partition be built in the ward room at the new nurses' residence.

A letter received from the Supervising Nurse, Gouverneur Hospital, requests a rearrangement of the accident wards at Gouverneur. It is recommended that this be referred to the Building Committee.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the General Medical Superintendent in permitting a representative of the Department of Public Charities to study the record system at Bellevue Hospital was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the General Medical Superintendent in regard to the transfer of William Metz was approved, and it was

Resolved, To notify the Fordham Hospital Medical Board that it is the sense of the Trustees that no patient should be transferred, irrespective of the nature of the complaint, unless perfectly able for the journey, and no suffering or injury will result therefrom.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointment of special nurses reported by the General Medical Superintendent was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the removal of Miss Marion Rottman to the Minto Hospital was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, That the necessary appropriation to provide a sufficient number of nurses should be included in the statement of revenue bond requirements for the year 1910, to be forwarded to the Board of Aldermen.

Resolved, That provision should be made in the special revenue bond Budget for the appointment of a social service nurse at Harlem Hospital.

To the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to submit the following report of the work of the Bellevue Hospital Tuberculosis Clinic during the year, January 1, 1909, to December 31, 1909.

Since the establishment of this clinic in December, 1903, a monthly statistical report has been submitted regularly, but a more comprehensive annual report has never been compiled from these statistics because of the lack of clerical assistance. This lack has been supplied during the past year, and it has therefore seemed desirable that a complete report for the year be submitted, which may establish a precedent for the future.

The development of the tuberculosis service has been so marked that it now forms a not inconsiderable portion of the work of the hospital, and thus furnishes an added reason for placing a report before you which will offer more complete information in regard to the details of this service.

THE TUBERCULOSIS CLINIC.

General Description.

In December, 1903, the tuberculosis clinic was organized by direction of the Board of Trustees as a separate division of the Out-patient Department, with a Director in charge, four Attending Physicians representing the four divisions of the hospital, and one Visiting Nurse. The object was to study cases of pulmonary tuberculosis more carefully than was possible in the general medical clinic, and to exercise supervision of their homes through the visiting Nurse, thus recognizing the medical and social aspects of the disease as they combine to make one problem.

The attainment of this main object has led to a gradual extension of the sphere of activity of the clinic during the six years of its existence. A cursory review of this development may aid toward a better appreciation of the data which are presented in this report for the past year which is herewith presented.

For convenience, this review is rather arbitrarily divided into the more obvious divisions of the work.

1. The Size and Scope of the Clinic.

The clinic began as an experiment with a handful of patients, and with some doubt among many Physicians of the Out-patient Department of its necessity and practicability. One room which was used by genito-urinary patients in the morning was set aside for its use, and in this room patients of both sexes had to be treated. The first year, 1904, there were 577 new patients treated, with 3,092 visits to the clinic by them.

Each year has seen a marked increase, until in 1909, there have been 1,399 new patients, with 11,646 visits to the clinic by all patients.

In 1906, another small room was provided for the use of the women, and in November, 1907, the children were assigned to a separate class in charge of one of the Assistant Physicians, Dr. Woodruff, this class meeting twice a week in another small room in the dispensary. It is the rule of the clinic to have as far as possible all children in the families of adult patients referred to this clinic for examination, and a large percentage of them are found to have tuberculosis which was entirely unsuspected.

In 1904, a small tent cottage for twelve patients was opened in the hospital grounds in connection with the clinic, for special cases, or for those needing temporary observation for diagnosis or treatment. This was a valuable assistance to the work of the clinic, but it interfered with the general administration of the hospital, and was closed in 1905. During this period 150 patients were treated in this tent.

In January, 1908, the Association of Tuberculosis Clinics recommended the division of the city into districts among the various tuberculosis clinics, of which there were then seven. The district east of the Bowery and Fourth avenue, and south of Fifth street to Grand street, was assigned to the Bellevue clinic.

By a system of card transfers each case applying for treatment to a clinic outside of the district in which the patient lived, was referred to the proper clinic for his district, and a follow-up system of visiting by the Nurses made sure that he was kept under supervision. This system has been remarkably successful, and none of the theoretical objections urged against it have materialized.

The advantage to both patients and clinic is very great, as is also the saving of time and efficiency to the Visiting Nurses by having their patients confined to a limited area.

The Association of Tuberculosis Clinics has grown within these two years so rapidly that there are now twenty-one of these clinics, necessitating a further narrowing of district boundaries. During the past year, the Bellevue district has been from Thirty-fourth street to Houston, and this next year it is to be from Thirty-fourth street to Twelfth street. The decrease in size of the district has not affected the size of this clinic, as the greater efficiency of the home supervision has brought more and more patients under the control of the special tuberculosis clinics, and the smaller and more compact district has many evident advantages.

In May, 1908, the clinic was affiliated with the tuberculosis wards of the hospital by the appointment of the four Attending Physicians to the clinic as adjunct Attending Physicians to the hospital service for their respective divisions. This change has been of material advantage to the clinic by offering an inducement to men of high qualifications to take these positions, and also by facilitating the use of the wards for the temporary care of suitable clinic patients. To the ward service it has the advantage of securing the undivided attention of one physician who is interested in tuberculosis, also of insuring closer co-operation with the social service department through the Women's Auxiliary, and by facilitating supervision for patients discharged to their homes by referring them to the proper district clinic.

On May 28, 1908, a day camp for the Bellevue clinic was opened upon the old ferryboat "Southfield," moored in the East River off the hospital grounds. The day camp idea had already passed beyond the experimental stage, and the success of such camps in Boston and elsewhere led to the establishment of the one at Bellevue.

The day camp stands midway between the hospital and the sanatorium, and affords opportunities for "taking the cure" to those who for various reasons cannot leave their homes. It is not intended for very sick cases, nor for incipient cases who can go to the sanatoria, but for a large number of the improvable cases between these two extremes it has filled satisfactorily a very real need.

The water-front of New York affords the best available space for open air treatment, and as no piers have been available, the use of double decked ferryboats for this purpose has proven very satisfactory for what is admittedly a make-shift born of necessity.

The ferryboat "Southfield" has been remodeled to a considerable extent inside. The lower deck is used partly as the resting place for the male patients, and the other half is inclosed for use as a dining room and a small kitchen. Two of the cabins are used as dressing rooms, each one having a shower bath, and the other two cabins are used as accessory dining rooms. On one end of the lower deck the out-of-door school room for crippled children has been built. Upon the upper deck, the outside space offers a splendid opportunity for the rest cure for the women and children, and one end has been partly partitioned off to make the open-air school for the children with pulmonary tuberculosis. The large inside cabin has been divided so as to afford an examining room for the Physicians, offices for the Nurses and a meeting room for general purposes; all of these rooms are heated.

The actual results obtained as shown by the report for 1909 are extremely good. Moreover, by affording temporary accommodation for many patients who are on the all too long waiting list for sanatoria, it has prevented the progress of their disease and usually gives them a good start toward their ultimate cure.

For the children especially, however, the day camp has been particularly valuable. In December, 1908, an open-air school was equipped upon the boat, and has been conducted ever since that time by the Department of Education, with a roll of 35 scholars. This has offered simultaneous opportunity for health and education, and has been successful from both points of view.

In December, 1909, another open-air school was opened on the boat for tuberculosis cripples. This school has a roll of 17 scholars, and is supported by the Spence School Society.

In addition to these schools for the children, a vegetable and flower garden was prepared for them in June, 1909, through the active co-operation of the School Farm Garden League. This garden is in a corner of the hospital grounds adjoining the boat, and besides affording occupation, recreation and education in natural history for the children, the beauty and freshness of the plants and flowers afforded much pleasure to all patients, adults and children alike.

Still further instructive occupation for the children has been afforded by classes in sewing, weaving, basketry, raffia work, etc., held twice a week under a competent instructor.

The results of all this effort have been gratifying, both in the improved health of the children and the beneficial moral and mental influence upon their developing characters.

One of the more recent developments in the work of the clinic has been the organization of classes or groups of patients for especial supervision and treatment. This was begun in March, 1909. The selection of cases for these classes has depended upon the probability of improvement under the additional opportunities for adequate home treatment; a qualification which is partly medical and partly personal or social.

The class idea is to give a large amount of attention to a small number of patients, rather than the usual method of a small amount of individual attention to a large number of patients. The idea originated in Boston, where the classes were connected with churches, and were known as Church Tuberculosis Classes, but in its adaptation to the work of a tuberculosis clinic this group or class system of treatment finds its most useful sphere.

One Nurse has been assigned to these few patients (30-40), and through charitable societies and the Women's Auxiliary, the financial assistance in each case has been fully supplied. Each class meets once a week, and the meeting includes in addition to the personal interview with each patient, a comparative study of the condition of the patients and their faithfulness to instruction, and a short practical talk upon the principles and problems involved in the course and treatment of tuberculosis. The results have been gratifying beyond our expectations, and it is proposed during the coming year to extend this system to a much larger number of patients.

A large part of the successful extension of the various branches of the work above described has been due to the hearty and substantial support received from the Women's Auxiliary.

This auxiliary was organized in April, 1908, for the purpose of securing the personal interest and financial assistance of its members for the various social problems of the clinic. It is divided into three committees corresponding to the three main divisions of the clinic work: 1. The clinic proper; 2. The day camp, and 3. The wards.

The members of these committees by frequent visits and conferences at the hospital, follow closely the problems which confront the Physicians and Nurses, and aid in their solution, by advice, personal effort, and when needed, by financial assistance.

The first annual report of the auxiliary, published April 1, 1909, showed a total membership of fifty women, and a total disbursement of \$5,381.67. This expenditure was partly for social work of the clinic, and partly for salaries for Nurses, a Clerk and three Assistants.

The Social Service Department of the Free Synagogue has co-operated very largely in this work also. This Department is affiliated with the auxiliary in this tuberculosis social service, and has undertaken to care for most of the responsibility which arises in the case of the Jewish patients, who form a large proportion of all. Approximately \$1,500 has been expended by the Free Synagogue in this work.

These two organizations working in close harmony, have lightened very materially the burdens of the Physicians and Nurses, and have made possible much of the success attained.

2. The Medical Staff.

Starting with the authorization of the Board of Trustees for a director and four attending Physicians, the Medical Staff of the clinic passed through many vicissitudes during the first four years. Rarely was it possible to obtain more than two attending Physicians at one time, and these usually stayed only a short time. The insufficient staff, the frequent changes and the rapidly growing clinic, all combined to render the medical work of the clinic very unsatisfactory for these three or four years, and was a terrible tax upon the Physicians who remained faithful. It was evident that some inducement was needed to attract Physicians to this service or the clinic would have to be abandoned.

In May, 1908, as already stated, the clinic was affiliated with the hospital ward service, and the attending Physicians to the clinic were appointed adjunct attending Physicians to the hospital. The desired results followed, and four excellent Physicians have occupied these positions since that time.

A further change of advantage was brought about at the same time by consolidating the two separate afternoon sessions of the clinic into one, with one attending Physician in charge at a time on alternate days. Thus only two attending Physicians are on duty at any one time, and each Physician has only six months' service during the year in two periods of three months each. The rest from tuberculosis work thus afforded for two periods of three months each, dispels a good deal of the fear of undertaking this service, and enables each Physician to do some other more general medical work during this time if he wishes.

The chief difficulty under this system has been to provide necessary Assistant Physicians. They have been almost impossible to obtain, but the recent action of the Board of Trustees in recommending salaries for these positions has resulted in a large number of applicants from whom the required number of well qualified Physicians have been selected.

3. The Nursing.

The work of the Nurses consists in (1) assisting at the clinic by taking temperature, pulses, weights, taking histories, caring for the records, and, especially, in bringing to the Physician's attention facts obtained by their visits to the patients' houses which are essential for the accurate knowledge and intelligent management of many cases; (2) in visiting the homes of all patients, recording the conditions found, remedying those which are unfavorable when possible, and teaching the patient and family how to live, and, by subsequent visits, endeavoring to educate these people how to improve their own condition and prevent the spread of the disease.

With the class patients, this is carried out with a high degree of perfection because of the small number of patients and the frequent visits from a Nurse who has no other duties.

One Nurse devoted a good share of her time to the children, being on duty at the children's clinic, and trying to bring in for examination the seemingly well children of the adult patients.

Two Nurses are on duty all of the time at the day camp. The Head Nurse of the camp having the responsibility of a good sized institution in itself.

One Nurse is delegated to the ward service and has charge of all of the difficult social service work which arises in connection with these advanced cases.

One Pupil Nurse from the Training School is assigned to the clinic to assist at the clinic and in the home visiting and to obtain this training in district nursing.

Nine thousand and sixty-six visits were made in the homes by the Nurses during 1909, as compared with 1,698 in 1904.

Two of the Nurses on the staff have been supported by the Women's Auxiliary, and one by the Red Cross Society. The Women's Auxiliary has also paid a portion of the salaries of three other Nurses.

4. Social Service.

Through the Nurses, the Women's Auxiliary and the Free Synagogue the tuberculosis clinic is affiliated with the main Social Service Bureau of Bellevue Hospital, and a very large part of the work of the clinic may properly be included under the general heading of what is generally known as Social Service.

The strictly medical work is inextricably bound up with the study of the purely social aspects of tuberculosis, and this in itself, has a very broadening effect upon the point of view of Nurses and Physicians.

The problem of the relief of poverty and actual want, while a relatively small part of the total actual social service rendered, is, nevertheless, a persistent and difficult portion of it.

The usual method of supplying relief is appeal to one of the large charitable societies, and the cordial spirit of co-operation shown by their agents in the cases brought to their attention by the clinic Nurses, has done much to further the interests of these patients.

In addition to these societies, the Women's Auxiliary and Free Synagogue have helped exceedingly by affording the means for prompt assistance in emergencies or in cases a little above the border line of dependence, who have shunned applying to a charity society, but have been willing to accept assistance for special needs when coming through the visiting Nurses, whom they regard more as personal friends.

Milk and eggs to a very limited amount have been given free by the hospital upon recommendation of the Physicians and Nurses.

Another important part of the social service work is facilitating the admission of the various classes of cases to suitable institutions. This requires a wide knowledge of this subject and much perplexing effort upon the part of the Nurses in order to find just the right place for the right patient, and the means of sending him there.

In general, it may be stated that social service defined by Dr. Cabot as "the study of character under adversity, and the influences that mould it for good or ill," claims a very large share of the work of the clinic.

5. Co-operation With Municipal Organizations.

With the Department of Health, and the Association of Tuberculosis Clinics, especially, each tuberculosis clinic has a good deal to do. In the effort of both of these organizations to co-operate in raising the standard and increasing the efficiency of the home control of tuberculosis the Bellevue Clinic has had an important share.

6. Medical Instruction.

All three of the undergraduate medical schools represented in Bellevue Hospital have made some use of the vast clinical material of the clinic. It is expected that this may be extended to post graduate instruction, and that the clinic may become recognized as a centre of education in the subject of tuberculosis.

7. Results.

It is not easy to summarize actual results obtained in a work which has so many aspects. Without much doubt the most important results are in the influences exerted toward the education of the patients in the actual principles of hygienic living, and through them and their families this influence has spread widely through the district of the city in which the clinic has done its work. These results cannot be accurately measured as yet, but may become evident in the coming generation through the decreased prevalence of tuberculosis.

Not an unimportant result of the establishment of the clinic is the fact that it has become a natural centre to which charitable societies, settlements, social and church workers, etc., located in this district turn for advice and assistance regarding their many cases of tuberculosis.

Also as a clearing house for various institutions its importance is very great, giving to hundreds of patients the benefit of expert knowledge as to how best to locate them to their best advantage.

Perhaps the most helpful result obtained is the spirit of friendship and mutual interest that has grown up between the patients and their Nurses and Physicians. This gives a peculiar charm to this work discouraging as it often is, and the benefit derived is by no means all upon the side of the patient.

As to actual results obtained in the physical condition of the patients, the report herewith submitted for the past year shows to a certain extent.

In presenting this report, it is a great pleasure to express the deep appreciation felt by all of those who have been active in this work, for the hearty and sympathetic support which they have received from the officers of the hospital and of the training school, and also directly from the Board of Trustees.

THE CLINIC PROPER.

The detailed statistics of the general work of the clinic are given in Table A, by months.

For comparison, the totals for the first year of the clinic, 1904, and for the preceding year, 1908, are also shown.

It is interesting to note that the number of new patients in 1909 was 2 1/2 times that of 1904, 1,399 as against 577, while the number for 1908 and 1909 were practically identical. The number of readmissions, however, in 1909 was much larger, 459 against 107 in 1908.

There were 11,646 visits to clinic by all patients in 1909 as compared with 10,483 in 1908, and 3,092 in 1904. There was a total of 96,718 visits to the entire Out Patient Department in 1909, the tuberculosis clinic therefore representing 12 per cent. of the work of the entire dispensary.

The Nurses made 9,066 visits in the homes as against 5,134 in 1908, and 1,698 in 1904. In addition, 851 other visits were made by Nurses on behalf of the patients, making a total of 9,917 Nurses' visits for the year.

Social Work and Relief.

In addition to the social work incident upon the regular duties of the Nurses and Physicians, and which can in no way be estimated in figures, there has been a considerable amount which has been grouped together in Table B.

* This was expended mostly for outfitting patients going to sanatoria, payment of incidentals there, for transportation, payment of work done by patients, for emergency relief and minor office expenses.

Especially attention is requested to the extensive co-operation with the large charitable societies, 288 of our patients in all having received aid from them during the year, also to the substantial aid given by the Women's Auxiliary and the Free Synagogue, and finally to the relatively small number of patients to whom milk and eggs were given, only fifty individuals out of the total number of 1,399 new cases.

Fresh Air Work.

Especially effort has been made to secure for the children of the clinic an opportunity for a stay in the country in the summer, and to a less extent at other seasons of the year. The extent to which this has been possible is shown in Table C, and the benefit to the children has been marked.

The large number of cases (371) found not to be tuberculous shows the extent to which suspicious cases apply to the clinic for diagnosis. The non-attendance and untraced cases, numbering 372, represent to a large extent the failures of the clinic, those for whom nothing definite was accomplished. Some of them, however, are improved cases which moved away, leaving no trace behind. This class has been considerably diminished in number during the past year, but they still constitute so large a proportion of all cases that one of the most important problems of the future is the more satisfactory control and care of these patients.

Those sent to hospitals and sanatoria, 315 patients, represent an important part of the work of the clinic. The transferred cases, 364, were those applying who lived outside of the Bellevue District, and were transferred to the care of the tuberculosis clinic of their respective district of the city.

It may be noted that the Bellevue Clinic received by transfer from other clinics 422 cases during the year.

This table shows the medical character of these cases. The large proportion of incipient cases, 34 per cent., is surprising. It is explained as a result of the general anti-tuberculosis propaganda which influences patients to seek advice earlier than formerly, but is especially due to the policy of examining the children and other members of the family of our patients.

The results evidenced by this table seem most discouraging, showing that 69 per cent. of all cases discharged either became worse or died.

This showing is largely explained by Table G, which shows that 59 per cent. of these cases attended this clinic less than a month, and 38 per cent. came only once. It is manifestly impossible to expect any results in this time, and all such cases were discharged as progressive. It was not possible from our records easily to compile statistics of the condition of the patients who were under treatment for a longer time, but this will be provided for in subsequent reports.

Social Conditions.

Certain data obtained from the Nurses' reports of the home conditions of the patients have been tabulated. They concern the general character of the lodgings, the sleeping arrangements, the relation of overcrowding, and the question of ability to work.

Character of Lodgings (of these discharged cases, housing conditions could be investigated in 788 instances)—The classification of the condition is made by the visiting Nurse especially from the point of view of crowding, cleanliness and ventilation. The reasons for not being able to investigate all were that some came from lodging houses, others gave wrong addresses, and many came only for an examination and were found not tuberculous.

Congestion—Information as to number of individuals in each family and the number of rooms occupied by these same families. This is known in 539 cases, and the figures have been separated for the children and for the adults who came to the clinic. And, again, it has been separated for those of the patients who were found either tuberculous or not tuberculous, so as to bring out the importance of congestion in the spread of the disease. In the case of the adults this would appear to have had some definite relation to the presence or absence of tuberculosis.

REPORT OF CLASS PATIENTS.

The class was organized March 1, 1909, and has been under the direct charge of the director of clinic. A second class was organized later and has been conducted by Dr. Charles N. Haskell, of Bridgeport, Conn., who volunteered for this work.

The purpose was to give to the improvable class of patients of sufficient intelligence to co-operate properly, an opportunity for every advantage which looked toward ultimate cure. One Nurse has given her entire time to these few patients, and considerable financial assistance has been given them. The Women's Auxiliary has supplied a good deal of this and has also paid the salary of the Nurse. The Free Synagogue has also contributed largely to this part of the work. The table showing the results of treatment is very interesting as showing what can be accomplished in New York City under these conditions.

Of the 32 cases discharged, 81.2 per cent. were improved or better; 53.1 per cent. being either cured or their disease arrested. The cases were, of course, selected ones, but were distinctly less favorable for treatment on the average than those usually received at Sanatoria and the results are nearly if not quite as good.

The day camp has been a distinct help in the cure of these patients, 25 of the 32 having taken "the cure" in that way during the day. The expense entailed was small compared with that of supporting a patient at a sanatorium and moreover the homes are not broken up, which is an important consideration in the case of the heads of families.

It is planned to extend this system of class treatment to a considerably larger number of the patients of the clinic during the coming year.

The cost of this class of treatment has been \$3.38 per patient weekly for administration expenses, and \$2.06 for relief, making a total of \$5.44 for each patient a week. This is just about one-half the average cost for sanatorium treatment. This difference demands serious consideration from those interested in the economical aspects of the treatment of tuberculosis.

THE DAY CAMP, GENERAL STATISTICS.

These statistics are for the most part self-explanatory. Attention is directed especially to the results obtained in the 248 patients who remained thirty days or more, 81.6 per cent. of these patients improved or better, 34.9 per cent. being either apparently cured or their disease arrested.

The night-camp patients make an even better showing with 39.1 per cent. arrested or apparently cured.

The surgical tuberculosis cases were only under treatment a few weeks, so that no results of value could as yet be reported.

The statement of expenses has been carefully compiled and gives considerable information of interest. The total cost per patient of \$3.72 a week is very moderate as compared with similar institutions elsewhere.

Report of Cases Discharged From the Day Camp.

This report on discharged cases brings out the various reasons why patients discontinued treatment, and it is gratifying to note that the objections to conditions which can be controlled at the camp are much less than last year.

The attendance still leaves a good deal to be desired, 58 per cent. staying less than thirty days. A gradual and steady improvement in this regard is noticeable however.

The results of the treatment in the discharged cases corresponds very closely with those reported on all cases.

THE WARD SERVICE.

Although not directly connected with the clinic, the ward service has an indirect affiliation through the visiting physicians and the Women's Auxiliary. It is therefore included in this report for the sake of completeness, although the clinic has no responsibility for this part of the work.

The very large number of cases treated in the wards (2,572) during the year, shows the service which they render as a distributing centre for other hospitals. This large and constantly changing number, however, is a tremendous strain upon the nursing and medical staff, which is much inadequate. Moreover, there is considerable

overcrowding a large part of the time, which is particularly undesirable in these advanced cases.

The Nurses and Physicians on duty have struggled faithfully and well against great odds, but it is to be hoped that some relief from the present conditions may be afforded in the near future.

The visiting Nurse and the ward committee of the Women's Auxiliary have been a real blessing to these unfortunate patients, and also have been of great assistance in securing suitable permanent hospital accommodations for many of them; also by relieving distress in the homes, the patients have oftentimes been persuaded to continue hospital treatment and thus considerable possibilities for further home infection have been prevented.

The proposed "new plan" between Grand street and Broome street, East River, Borough of Manhattan, comprises the following:

The establishment of two new piers 50 feet in width with a slip room of 140 feet extending from the established bulkhead line to the established pierhead line, the northerly side of the northerly pier being identical with the northerly side of the present Pier (old) 56, or Broome Street Pier.

Also the establishment of a new pier 45 feet in width, its northerly side extending from the proposed modified bulkhead line, its southerly side extending from the established bulkhead line to the established pierhead line. The southerly side of the new pier is coincident with the southerly side of the present Pier (old) 55, or Grand Street Pier; also the discontinuance of the marginal street, wharf or place between Grand and Broome streets.

The Commissioner of Docks in his communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund states that this change is rendered necessary owing to the fact that when the plan was originally adopted ferries were in operation in this locality which have since been abandoned, and there is no likelihood that the area will be required for such purposes in the future. A pier layout is therefore shown in red lines, and when such piers are constructed, will tend to greatly relieve the wharfage congestion in this vicinity. There is embodied in the plan a proposed modification of the bulkhead line, and request for same has been made to the War Department, which will no doubt be approved.

The marginal street, wharf or place, as shown on the plan adopted December 19, 1883, is to be discontinued, as there is no necessity for it; adequate access to the proposed piers can be had by the way of East street.
