The work of constructing new sewers, thereby adding to the mileage of the system, is largely in the northern part of the borough. There are still some tracts not yet developed where streets are not laid out or grades established. This condition prevails to a greater or less degree from 160th street north to the end of the island in territory west of Fort Washington avenue. A portion of this avenue has not yet been sewered, as well as a portion of Riverside Drive extension, otherwise known as Boulevard Lafavette.

grading not yet having been completed.

Considerable tracts have been laid out by private owners and sewers built therein, the same afterward having been accepted by the City after due examination and

The tract known as Inwood Hill, lying between Dyckman street and Broadway, and Hudson and Harlem Rivers, is at present without any street system, and, therefore, without sewers, nothing in the way of drainage having been done except to care for a few isolated houses on the property.

I might also state that there are in the thickly populated part of the City many single blocks where the buildings drain into side streets or adjoining avenues, no public sewers being in their front. Petitions are occasionally filed for such improvements, and the work of construction is undertaken to accommodate new buildings or meet other necessities. The great problem, however, of the future yet to be solved is to construct an entire new system of drainage in a large portion of, if not the entire, borough. This question has been forced upon the consideration of the department by the great increase and congestion of population, and by the shifting and rebuilding of sewers to accommodate tunnels for rapid transit railroads and many other utilities of less importance. The result of these changes has been such and will be such as to render the present sewer system inaccessible and inefficient. To the end of adopting a plan for creating an entire new system where greatly needed, the Consulting Engineer, Mr. E. P. Goodrich, has secured the appointment of a party of engineers on an appropriation made for that purpose, and under his general supervision it is now engaged in getting data as to lines and levels in the sewerage district drained by the sewers discharging into the Harlem River at 110th street. I can only report progress on this work at present, but before the end of another quarter it is expected that some definite recommendations can be made.

# REPORT OF THE ENGINEER OF STREET OPENINGS.

During the past quarter (ending September 30, 1910), the force of this Bureau, both field and office, has been extensively engaged in the preliminary work of great benefit to the relief of the congestion of traffic, both northward and across the city; such as the widening of the roadways of streets by the reduction of the width of sidewalks and the removal of stoops, court-yards, privileges and other incumbrances which had accumulated during many years past, as well as a rearrangement of the City's own water service, gas pipes and sewer basins, etc. This work required that an accurate survey and diagrams be made showing the exact location of these various encroachments by permission from the City authorities and otherwise. These diagrams were on an ample scale, giving all details, and were extensively duplicated for use by street and 59th street. Although some of the work was done in the preceding quarter, much of it came over to this quarter.

New survey and map was made for the opening of Croton place, between Amsterdam avenue and Audubon avenue and East 165th street, owing to alterations and additions requested by the owners of the property to be taken.

Since the original maps were made and delivered to the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of opening Buena Vista avenue, from West 171st to West 178th street, and additional survey and levels were made of the property Violations of Law and Unsafe Buildings During the Quarter Ending Sept. 30, 1910. adjoining the avenue at the request of the Commissioners.

Three copies of damage, benefit, profile and rule maps of an unnamed street for pedestrians from Fort George avenue to Dyckman street, are being made for the Commissioners in this proceeding. Several tentative plans have been prepared for the proposed tunnel for pedestrians

from Broadway to the subway station now building at West 191st street and St. Survey and five lines of levels were made on Broadway, from Dyckman street

to West 211th street, with the streets on each side to the next avenue, also the water table and floors of the existing buildings upon the streets. The survey for the proposed extension of Seventh avenue, from its present

terminus at Greenwich avenue through private property and by way of Varick street to West Broadway at Leonard street, is being made, and will be pushed to a conclusion as rapidly as possible.

During the past three months several of the office force have been detailed to the Highway and Sewer Departments for a time making illustrated drawings and assisting the Sewer Bureau in its field work, which, with the annual vacations, has reduced the working force of this office to a very great extent.



Fourteenth-No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight or ex-press cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway; and the existing siding in Atlantic and Flatbush avenues and the tracks hereby authorized shall not be used for the storage of cars. Free and uninterrupted access to and passage over Atlantic, Fourth and Flatbush avenues shall be maintained at all times, and no cars shall be allowed to remain stationary within

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, quired by resolution of the Board. Seventeenth—All cars operated on said rail-
