The following report was received from the Select Committee of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, relative to the allottment of space in the New Municipal Building:

December 3, 1912.

To the Honorable Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners of The City of New York: On June 12, 1912, and also on June 26, 1912, your honorable Board, following the suggestions contained in reports of this Committee, assigned space in the Municipal Building to various City Departments. The total space in the building available for assignment is 704,815 square feet and of this amount the space assigned to date is

580.508 square feet There are still some departments which should be housed in the Municipal Building and to which spaces have not been assigned. A study of the needs of these departments by the architects has been so far completed as to now enable the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners to complete the allotment of space in the building subject to final disposition of allotment to the Departments of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and Docks and Ferries. We therefore beg to recommend that the following departments or hureaus he allotted approximate space in the building, namely

In addition to the above allotment of space to be made there are questions which have been before your Committee relating to the allotment of space to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the Dock Department. In the first study of space to be allotted the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that Department was placed on the twenty-third, twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth floors. The total approximate space at its disposal is 55,000 square feet. The question has arisen as to whether the Bureau of the Water Register should not be located on a floor nearer the street rather than with the main offices of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and-Electricity. The Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity does not deem the separation of the Bureau of the Water Register from the other offices of his Department as advisable. We recommend that a hearing on this matter be had before the Board.

Your Committee deems that the offices of the Dock Department should be located in the Municipal Building. Commissioner Tomkins of the Dock Department is not decided in his preference as to whether the offices of the Dock Department should remain in the present location, Pier "A," North River, or whether they should be moved into the Municipal Building. He has suggested, however, that it pursuant to chapter 189 of the Laws of 1883, arrangement may be made whereby the Police Department, joint occupant with the Department of Docks and Ferries, Pier "A," North River, will surrender that portion of the pier used for police purposes at the same time that the Dock Department surrenders its portion of the pier—the pier may be turned over for commercial use and the removal of the Dock Department offices to the Municipal Building would, at least, gain the advantage of an additional dock for public use.

The statute referred to provided that the Dock Department should construct a pier for the use of the Police Department of The City of New York. It was provided in the statute that if, at any time, the Police Department should relinquish its right to use such dock, it would thereupon revert to and be in the control of the Dock Department to the same extent as other piers. The total amount of space which the Dock Department will need is approximately 12,281 square feet and this space may be provided on the twenty-fourth floor of the building if the Board determines to locate the Bureau of the Water Register on the second floor. If, however the Bureau of the Water Register is to be located with the other offices of the Dartment of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, the space where the Dock Depart ment may be located is on the thirteenth and fourteenth floors. This would necessitate

The Committee respectfully recommends also modifications of space allotment made heretofore to the following departments: Armory Board-Assigned 1.000 square feet on the third floor, June 26, 1912. This assignment to be modified to 1,000 square feet on the ninth floor.

In accordance with this provision, the Board of Education has the honor to present the Fifteenth Annual Report of the Department of Education for the school year ending July 31, 1912.

The whole number of schools under the jurisdiction of the Board at the close

of the school year ending July 31, 1912, was 527.

The number of teachers in all schools on July 31, 1912 (including teachers of special branches, directors and superintendents), was 18,892.

The number of pupils on average monthly register in elementary schools during the school year ending July 31, 1912, was 648,524; the average daily attendance for the school year ending July 31, 1912, was 588,393.

The number of high schools and training schools for teachers under the jurisdiction of the Board on July 31, 1912, was 24; the number of teachers, including principals et al., in the service on that date in these schools was 4,746; the number of pupils on average monthly register in these schools during the school year ending July 31, 1912, was 43,848; the average daily attendance at these schools during the school year ending July 31, 1912, was 38,014.


