PUBLIC NOTICE.

A resolution, of which the following is a copy, was adopted by the Common Council, May 26, 1886, and was approved by the Mayor, May 28, 1886, viz.:

"Resolved, That in consideration of the fact that little, if any, business is transacted in the public offices of the Corporation after 12 o'clock, M., on Saturdays during the summer season, the various offices of the City, except those specially required by law to be kept open, be closed at noon every Saturday during the months of June, July, August and September, and the heads of the several departments of the City government be and are hereby requested to give their employees a half-holiday on Saturdays during the months above named."

APPROVED PAPERS

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending June 5, 1886.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized to pave with Trinidad asphalt pavement the roadway of Chambers street, from Broadway to Centre street, the work to be done without public advertisement and letting, as provided by section 64 of said act; the pavement to be furnished and laid at a cost not exceeding four (4) dollars per square yard, the contractor or contractors to guarantee the maintenance of the pavement in good order for ten (10) years, and to complete the work in ninety (90) days from the date of contract, and that in addition to the security to be given by the contractor or contractors for the faithful performance of the contract, he or they shall give bonds and an indemnity bond against the claim or claims of any person or persons claiming to be patentees of any process connected with said work, said bonds to be approved by the Comptroller, as a guarantee that he or they will maintain the pavement in good condition for ten (10) years.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 26, 1886.
Approved by the Mayor, June 2, 1886.

Whereas, It is with profound sorrow that this Common Council has learned that John Kelly died at his residence in this city yesterday, Tuesday, the 1st instant; and

Whereas, The death of an ordinary friend or acquaintance occasions gloom and sorrow, but when death strikes down one of the most prominent and influential men of his day and generation—a man universally known, beloved and admired—one whose name is associated with all that is manly, brave and honorable, whose word was his bond—sadness and gloom give place to the deepest grief, the most profound sorrow. John Kelly has been prominently before the people of this city for more than one-third of a century: He was an Alderman of his ward; twice a member of Congress from his district; twice Sheriff of this county; Comptroller of this city and an Assessment Commissioner, and he performed the duties incident to these various positions and others of minor importance with singular intelligence and fidelity, deservedly earning the commendation and praise of grateful constituencies. Through all this time and amid all these changes he retained the name bestowed upon him, when but ten years old, by his first employer, James Gordon Bennett the elder, that of "Honest John Kelly." He was a self-made man in the highest and broadest acceptance of that honored term. He began his career when but ten years of age as an office boy, and by patient application to business by day, and to study by night, combined with industry, energy and perseverance, he attained, step by step, the exalted position he held at the time of his death—the leader of the oldest political organization in the country—an organization co-eval with the organization of our government—and became also recognized as a counsellor and guide to the great Democratic party as well of this State as of this Republic; and

Whereas, When such a man dies it is incumbent upon this Common Council to take such measures as will best testify the sorrow of the people and government of this, his native city, for his death, to manifest respect for his memory and to sympathize with his stricken family and sorrowing friends; be it therefore

Resolved, That the members of this Common Council, for themselves and the people they represent, do most sincerely lament the death of John Kelly, and we hereby tender to his bereaved family—his stricken wife and her fatherless children—our heartfelt sympathy in their affliction, and we feel assured that the sympathy of the people of this city also goes forth to them, and that it is the universal prayer that He who "tempers the winds to the shorn lamb" will take them into His holy keeping; and be it further

Resolved, That out of respect for the memory of John Kelly the public offices of the Corporation be closed and no public business be transacted on the day appointed for solemnizing the funeral rites, Saturday, June 5, 1886 (except in the offices specially required by law to be kept open), that the flags on the City Hall and the other public buildings be displayed at half-staff from sunrise until sunset on said day, and the owners or occupants of private buildings and the owners or masters of vessels in our harbor are hereby requested to display their flags at half-mast on that day, and that a committee of five, of whom the President shall be one, be appointed by the Chair to take such other action and make such other and further arrangements as to them may appear more impressively to manifest sorrow for the death and respect for the memory of the illustrious deceased; and be it further

Resolved, That, as an additional mark of respect for the memory of John Kelly, this Board do now adjourn.

Adopted unanimously by the Board of Aldermen, June 2, 1886, and Aldermen Ryan, Hunsicker, Quinn, and Smith appointed the Special Committee, the President being named as a member in the resolution.

NEW YORK AND BROOKLYN BRIDGE.

SIR—Under date of September 15, 1885, I reported to you having examined the Income and Maintenance Account of the Trustees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge up to August 1, 1885. By your request, I have continued the examination from that date up to May 1, 1886, covering a period of nine months, and beg leave herewith to hand you a report of the same, of which the following is a synopsis:

Of which amount there is on deposit in the Long Island Bank, \$30,344.85; in the Commercial National Bank of the City of New York, \$18,223.74; in the Brooklyn Trust Company, \$25,190.31; and petty cash on hand, \$244.67; all of which is verified in the accompanying report.

It is but proper to remark that in the disbursements by check, there is included the payment to the cities of New York and Brooklyn, respectively, the sum of 90,000 and 180,000 dollars, which amounts (together \$270,000) taken from \$705,308.99, leaves the actual amount disbursed for maintenance as \$435,308.99.

I find the account to be correct in all particulars, and every vouch filed in a careful and proper manner.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending May 29, 1886, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending May 22, 1886.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., *Sanitary Superintendent and Register:*

SIR.—There were 635 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, May 29, 1886, which is an increase of 9, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 23 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending May 22, 1886, was 639, which is 44.4 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.16 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,434,491.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
