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### PROCLAMATION.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,  
NEW YORK, June 14, 1878.

By virtue of the authority vested in me by the ordinance adopted on the 30th day of April, 1877, as amended on the first day of June, 1877, I, Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby give notice that the said ordinance will be enforced on and after Monday, the seventeenth day of June, 1878.

And I do hereby give notice that I have caused to be provided and do hereby indicate the dog pound at the foot of Sixteenth street, East river, as the place where all dogs seized and captured, pursuant to said ordinance, are to be delivered, and that said pound is to be kept open from eight o'clock A. M. until five o'clock P. M. of every day, except Sundays.

And I do hereby designate and appoint the following persons to seize and capture all dogs found loose or at large, and authorized to be seized and captured by said ordinance, and to deliver the same at the aforesaid dog pound, said appointments to take effect from and after the seventeenth day of June, 1878, viz.:

The persons so appointed shall have a shield, with the number of their respective districts thereon, which shield they shall be obliged to wear in a public manner, at all times, when in the performance of their duty.

And I hereby designate and appoint John McMahon as the Keeper of the Dog Pound, to take effect from the fifteenth day of June, 1878; and I direct that all dogs delivered at the said pound, not claimed within forty-eight hours, and redeemed by the owner, by paying the sum of three dollars therefor, or otherwise disposed of, shall be killed and destroyed by drowning, by and under the direction of the said John McMahon, and such workmen, in the said dog pound, as may, from time to time, be appointed to assist him.

### AN ORDINANCE to prevent the Danger of Hydrophobia to any of the Inhabitants of the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:  
Section 1. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose or at large in any of the public streets, lanes, alleys, highways, parks or places within the corporate limits of the City of New York, under a penalty of three dollars for each offense, to be recovered against the owner, possessor, or person who knowingly harbored such dog within three days previous to the time of such dog being so found going abroad loose or at large; and the Commissioners of Police are hereby authorized and directed to cause complaint to be made to the Corporation Attorney against the owner or possessor of every dog permitted to go loose or at large within the corporate limits, as aforesaid, for the recovery of the penalties prescribed in this ordinance; such penalties and all license fees, when collected, to be accounted for semi-monthly, and paid to the Comptroller of said city, and upon the requisition of the Mayor, to be applied towards the payment of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance. Nothing in this ordinance shall prevent any dog from going into any such street, lane, alley, highway, park or public place, provided such dog shall be held, by such owner or other person, securely by a cord or chain, to be not more than four feet long, fastened to a collar around the neck of the animal.

SEC. 2. Every owner, possessor, or person who harbors any dog shall take out a permit for each dog, at the Permit Bureau, paying the sum of two dollars (\$2) for the same. All permits, and renewals of the same, shall be dated from the first day of May in each and every year, and shall be for one year from date, and all renewals shall be one dollar (\$1). Said permit shall have the name of the owner and the number of the permit or license on it. Any dog so licensed must have a collar around his neck, with a metal tag attached, having the number of the license on it. And any dog so licensed must, when in the street, be held by such owner, or other person, secured by a cord, rope, or chain, not more than four feet in length; but the owner, at his option, may use, instead of the above, a muzzle, constructed so as to prevent the dog from biting. Any dog that is not so secured, although he is licensed, shall be captured the same as if no license was granted. No dog having a collar and tag, with the number of his license on it around his neck, that may be in a wagon or other vehicle belonging to his owner, shall be captured. Any person appointed by his Honor the Mayor to capture dogs who shall permit any person to take one or more dogs from him for nothing, or for pay, shall be arrested, and taken before a police justice, and upon the facts being proven, the judge shall impose a fine of not less than \$10, or more than \$50, for each offense. Any person may make a complaint of persons having dogs unlicensed at the police stations, and the officer in command shall entertain the same; and all policemen on patrol duty must report all violations of this ordinance the same as any other violation of a Corporation ordinance. All such reports shall be transmitted to the Corporation Attorney, the same as for other violations of city ordinances, and in addition to the \$3 fine, shall be added all costs of suits for the recovery of the same as for any other violation of the city ordinances. The provisions of this section, except those relating to leading and muzzling dogs, shall not apply to dogs owned by non-residents, in remaining temporarily or in passing through this city, or to dogs brought into this city and entered for exhibition at any dog show or annual exhibition of dogs.

Sec. 3. The Mayor of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such

measures as he may deem most efficient to carry into effect the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance. All dogs found loose or at large, as aforesaid, shall be seized, captured, and delivered by such persons as the Mayor shall designate, at a place to be provided and indicated by him, where such animals, if not within forty-eight hours thereafter claimed and redeemed by the owner or some other person, shall be killed and destroyed in such manner and by such persons as the Mayor shall designate.

Sec. 4. Any owner or other person who may claim such dog shall, before being placed in possession thereof, pay therefor the sum of three dollars. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply only to dogs owned or claimed by residents of this city; and any person who shall knowingly present any such dog, and claim payment for the capture thereof, which shall not be owned or captured within the corporate limits of the city, shall thereby incur a penalty of ten dollars.

Sec. 5. No person shall hinder or molest any person or persons so appointed by the Mayor while engaged in seizing or capturing and delivering any such dog as aforesaid, or any other person engaged in the performance of any duty enjoined by the provisions of this ordinance, under a penalty of not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars for every offense, to be sued for and recovered in the manner now provided by law or ordinance for the recovery of penalties for violations of the ordinances of the Common Council, on the complaint of the person so hindered or molested; the penalty, when recovered, to be accounted for, paid, and appropriated, as provided in section one of this ordinance. The Commissioners of Police are hereby authorized and required to cause the persons so engaged in the performance of any of the duties prescribed by this ordinance, to be protected from hindrance or molestation.

Sec. 6. Chapter XLIV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

*Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held June 13, 1878.*

Present—Hon. Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; and J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolutions, which, on motion, were adopted, viz.:  
Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby appraise and fix the value of the franchise of the ferry from the foot of Roosevelt street, in the City of New York, East river, to South Seventh street, Brooklyn, E. D., as now established, at five thousand dollars (\$5,000) per annum.

Resolved, That this Board do hereby fix the terms of sale of the lease of premises on the northeast corner of Third avenue and Eighty-fifth street, to be sold at auction on Friday, June 14, 1878, as follows:

#### TERMS OF SALE:

Twenty per cent. on the yearly rent bid to be paid to the Collector of City Revenue at the time and place of sale; and the successful bidder will be required, at the same time, to have an obligation executed by two sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, for carrying into effect the terms of sale.

Twenty per cent., when paid, will be credited on the first quarter's rent; or forfeited, if the lessee does not execute the lease and bond within fifteen days after the sale; and the Comptroller shall be authorized, at his option, to resell the premises bid off by those failing to comply with the terms as above; and the party so failing to comply to be liable for any deficiency that may result from such resale.

No person will be received as lessee or surety who is delinquent on any former lease from the Corporation. No bid will be accepted from any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as security or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation. (Sec. 99 of Charter of 1873.)

The leases will contain the usual covenants and conditions, reserving to the Corporation the right to cancel the lease whenever the premises may be required by them for public purposes.

All repairs will be made at the expense of the lessees, and no deduction whatever will be allowed for damage by reason of any sickness or epidemic that may prevail in the city during the continuance of the lease.

The lessees will be required to give a bond for double the amount of the annual rent, with two sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, conditioned for the payment of the rent quarter-yearly, and the fulfillment on their part of the covenants of the lease.

A communication was received from the Commissioners of Docks in relation to change in width and location of pier, new No. 40, North river; whereupon, the Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby consent to and approve of the width and location of pier, new No. 40, North river, as altered and changed from the lines therefor as laid down in the plans, prepared by the Department of Docks and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on 27th April, 1871, so as to fix the width for said pier at 75 feet instead of 100 feet; and so as to establish at the line of the new bulkhead wall the southerly line of said pier, at about 188 feet north of the northerly line of pier new 39, as approved by said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on 15th of August, 1877.

*Report of Standing Committee.*

From the Sanitary Committee—  
Report upon alleged poisoning of persons engaged in the manufacture of artificial flowers, from lead and picric acid.

*Resolutions.*

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby directed to reply to the communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, dated May 31, 1878, and to inform him that all fences constructed in accordance with the provisions of any ordinance of the Common Council, by or under the direction of the Department of Public Works, will be approved by this Board.

Resolved, That the consent of this Board be and is hereby given to the construction of a picket fence on and around the vacant lots in the block interlying Fifth and Madison avenues, Eighty-second and Eighty-third streets, New York City.

Resolved, That section 196 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 196. That it shall be the duty of every owner, lessee, or tenant of any vacant, sunken, or excavated lot in the City of New York, to keep the same at all times clean and inoffensive, and to provide around the same a proper fence so as to effectually prevent the throwing or depositing therein or thereupon any garbage or offensive thing whatsoever, and also to prevent persons passing from falling into such excavation.

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to publish the above ordinance as required by law.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of the Sanitary Committee upon alleged poisoning of persons engaged in the manufacture of artificial flowers, from lead and picric acid, be forwarded to Coroner Moritz Ellinger.

Resolved, That copies of the reports of Sanitary Inspectors, upon the condition of certain street pavements, etc., be forwarded to the Department of Public Works, for the necessary action, as follows:

Resolved, That permit No. 761, to render fat at No. 90 Ninth avenue, be and is hereby revoked.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Sanitary Inspector Post upon the condition of manure dumps at the foot of West Fiftieth and Fifty-seventh streets, be forwarded to the Police Department for the necessary action.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of the Sanitary Superintendent on the filling in at the foot of East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, be forwarded to the Police Department with the request that the sanitary ordinance which prohibits the use of garbage as filling material, be enforced by said Board.

Resolved, That all permits to bring rough (unrendered) fat into New York be revoked.

Resolved, That the services of Samuel A. Goldschmidt, Ph. D., be and are hereby continued for one month longer.

Resolved, That the Counsel and Attorney be directed to discontinue all suits against citizens for non-compliance with orders, without cost, on proof from the Sanitary Bureau that the orders have been complied with.

Resolved, That C. E. Colby be and is hereby appointed Chemist to the Board during the absence of Elwyn Waller, at a salary at the rate of seventy-five dollars per month.

Resolved, That the Department of Public Works be respectfully requested to grant a permit to this Department to use water for washing wagons at the Disinfecting Depot, 128 Worth street.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be, and is hereby authorized and directed to issue a temporary permit to James Brooks, foot of West Fifty-fifth street, to burn shell lime, to be revoked by him upon evidence that a nuisance is created by transacting the business.

Resolved, That section 198 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 198. That on and after the 10th day of May, 1878, no cows or cattle shall be led or driven through or along any of the streets of that portion of the City of New York bounded by Fifty-seventh and Sixty-fourth streets, Tenth and Eleventh avenues, exclusive of these boundary streets and avenues, without a permit in writing from this Department, and in strict accordance with the routes, hours, and terms prescribed and designated therein.

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to publish the above ordinance as required by law.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to make the following correction in the Register of Births:

Albert Reimond Wiedmer, born May 13, 1874, in place of Albert Reimond Widner, the same being a clerical error.

Resolved, That the usual vacation of two weeks be granted to each of the officers and clerks of this Board, and that the Secretary, Sanitary Superintendent and Attorney be and are hereby authorized and directed to so arrange the vacations of the subordinates, respectively, that the business of this Department shall in no wise be interrupted, or its efficiency impaired by such leaves of absence.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby directed to communicate with the Department of Docks respecting the present dangerous condition of the night-soil dock at West Twenty-eighth street, to horses and carts on account of the rotten condition of the planking, and to respectfully request that the same be repaired.

*Sanitary Bureau.*

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 8, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,758, as follows, viz.:

4 public buildings, 679 tenement-houses, 209 private dwellings, 121 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 69 stables, 31 slaughter-houses, 25 fat-rendering establishments, 4 fertilizing works, 1 dyeing establishment, 4 public sewers, 6 manure dumps, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 1 lime kiln, 3 soap factories, 1 offal dock, 50 sunken and vacant lots, 48 yards, courts, and areas, 59 cellars and basements, 145 waste-pipes and drains, 165 privies and water-closets, 34 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 6 smoky chimneys, 2 piggeries, 1 cesspool, 1 violation of the Code, 2 glycerine works, 1 stock yard, 1 dumping ground, 13 other nuisances, together with 57 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 664.

During the past week 173 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 100 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

144 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 30 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 28 houses, 28 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One person sick with typhoid fever, and one with scarlet fever were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

## APPROVED PAPERS

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to notify the several elevated railway companies to replace the pavements in the several streets and avenues (which were displaced in the erection of the foundations for the columns of such railways) to the regular grade of such streets and avenues, in as good condition as previous to the erection of such foundations, and to the satisfaction of the said Commissioner of Public Works; and in the event of a neglect or refusal on the part of such railway companies, or either of them, to comply with the directions so to be given, for a period longer than thirty days, then the said Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized to replace such pavements, and restore the surface of such streets and avenues as nearly as possible to the condition in which they existed previous to the erection of such foundations, paying therefor from the appropriation for "Repairs and Renewal of Pavements," and to sue for and recover from such railway company or companies the full cost of the work; and the Counsel to the Corporation is hereby authorized and directed to appear for and in behalf of the City of New York as counsel in any and every case of suit by the Commissioner of Public Works to recover back to the city treasury the amount so expended in replacing the pavements and restoring the grade of such streets and avenues.
