DEAR SIR—I respectfully transmit to your Honorable Board quarterly report of work done, ending June 30, 1892, at this Institution, by paid and unpaid labor:

Masons—Reset stones and iron railings on Elm, Leonard and Franklin streets; built wall in cellar; built windows in four cells in old prison, and placed iron bars in the same; plastered wall in yard on Franklin street; built ventilator in boys' prison; built a cesspool in yard.

Carpenters—Built 10 large wooden bunks in new prison; sash, door and casing in storm house, new prison; storm house at Leonard street entrance.

Plumbers—Placed 14 faucets in water-pipes; repaired water-closets and repaired water and gas-pipes in new prison, female prison, old prison and boys' prison.

Tinsmiths—Made a number of tin cans, pans, boilers and dippers for kitchen; placed new bottoms in 30 tin boilers for kitchen, gutter and leaders from roof.

Blacksmiths—Placed a wire screen and frame on window in Leonard street; grates and boilers, iron bars and sheet iron in new room; sheet iron to cover ventilator and storm house; 4 iron railings in hall of female prison.

Roofers—Repaired roof of Magdalen.

Painters—Painted windows, iron bars, and two storm houses on Centre, Leonard and Franklin streets; iron railings on Elm street, 3 large gates on Franklin and Leonard streets, walls of kitchen, iron bars, railings and stairs in female prison; walls, windows and doors of 4 cells in old prison; calcimined ceilings in kitchen, dining-room and carpenter shop.

LABOR REPORT.

Of the male patients, a daily average of 90 have been engaged in the following manner: 20 in kitchen, 4 in laundry, 2 in engine-house, 1 in office, 1 in store-room, 1 pumping water, 1 in carpenter shop, 12 at work in halls, 48 in making sea-wall, working on the farm, tearing down old Pavilions D and B, and old boat-house and removing lumber from same, grading, repairing roads, making new roads, unloading coal, removing freight from dock, burying swill, drawing coal to engine-house and pavilions breaking stones, removing ashes from engine-house, and keeping the grounds around the pavilions clean.

Of the female patients, a daily average of 504 have been employed as follows: Housework, sewing and knitting, 422; in the laundry, 65; scrubbing offices, drug store, employees' rooms, etc., 8; as help for Medical Staff and Officers, 9.

140,451 pieces have been laundered during the quarter.

26,253 articles of clothing and bedding have been repaired, and 3,770 articles made.

The Engineer, Plumber, Fireman and assistants have put main water pipe in Pavilion 5; renewed all hot and cold water connections in same; repaired 4 hot water tanks, sinks, water closets, 6 Rumsey's pumps, ball cocks in all pavilions, electric light engine, electric lights in all pavilions, weighing machine for kitchen, water pipe connections in all pavilions, water heaters, leaks in main water pipe, water pipe in laundry and steam and water pipes in kitchen; put new blow off pipe on both horizontal boilers; tapped main water pipe on the hill and put a supply pipe to pavilions; connected water pipe to drug store; put in 4 new water heaters; removed printing press from Branch Workhouse; renewed water pipe in kitchen; put new steam pipe in for general dining room and made connections to tea urns; made new connections to sewer in Pavilion 2 and cleared all sewers.

The Tinsmith made 4 large dippers, 3 small dippers, 1 mess box, 1 new coffee pot, 1 large monkey strainer, 2 new oil cans and 2 funnels, made and put in 43 new handles in milk cans and mess boxes; put 45 new bottoms in 6 and 3 gallon cans and 9 new bottoms in dinner boxes; repaired roofs in the different pavilions; made and put up 63.2 feet new leaders and elbows; kept all tinware, leaders, elbows, stoves, roofs, etc., in repair.

The Painter has painted 2 Attendants' Rooms, book shelf and washstand in Physician's residence, water closets, office, dressers and closets, fire pumps and lamp posts, 2 stoops, wire screens, landing stairs, well platforms, mosquito bar frames for Pavilion C, bedsteads, water tower, ceiling of access hall and statues for the church; primed electric wire boxes; put in new window lights where required, and kept the paint in all the pavilions in repair.

The Stone Mason has built 6,400 cubic feet of sea wall, built a cess pool and repaired concrete in floor of kitchen; repaired brick in pavilions and plastering of walls in Pavilion 5.

The Carpenter and assistants have made and put up a new pair of stairs, 15 steps, for outside of Pavilion 3, dusting poles 15 feet long, screen doors; fitted up clothes room closets with shelves, brackets and separate divisions; made and put up medicine chests; put on new locks on bread closets, drawers, cupboards and repaired all locks on doors; put casing around pipes; eased doors and windows; laid 2 new floors; repaired pantry doors and closets; put up new roller shades in Attendant's Room; put in new sash door cords and repaired sashes; put new panels in

2 doors; put up railing in office; cased in sinks; took down all fixtures in old buildings, Pavilions D and B, and tore down same; been working on framework for new boat-house and kept all furniture, etc., in repair.
