

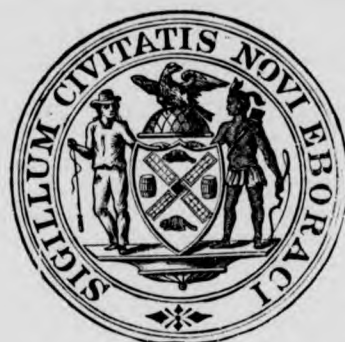

The Board of Health met this day.

Orders.

268 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

Suits for Penalties.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 43 cases, and for violation of the Sanitary Code in 3 cases.

Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on slaughter-houses; on operations at receiving dock; from Riverside Hospital; on disinfection of privies, etc.; on plumbing in new buildings; on application for permits; on suspension of certain orders.

Resolutions.

That Swift & White, contractors for removal of offal, dead animals, etc., be directed to resume possession of the dock at the foot of East Forty-second street, for the reception and removal of offal, the same having been assigned by the Department of Docks to this Department for this purpose.

That the applications for relief from or modification of orders Nos. 3945, 3948, 4024, 4057, 4058, 4261, and 4262 be denied.

That the report of the Sanitary Superintendent upon the communication from the Department of Buildings in respect to plans and specifications for plumbing in new buildings, be and is hereby accepted and approved; and that the Department of Buildings be respectfully requested to carry out and enforce the recommendations contained therein, in case the same meet the approval of that Department.

Whereas, Separate arrangements for the manufacture of gas for Riverside Hospital would be very expensive to the city; and

Whereas, This Department has no appropriation for that purpose; and

Whereas, The gas for Riverside Hospital can be readily furnished to said Hospital by the Department of Charities and Correction from their manufactory; therefore

Resolved, That the Department of Charities and Correction be respectfully requested to continue to supply the Riverside Hospital with gas during the year 1876.

That the Register of Records be instructed that in no case shall a paper, return, or certificate which cannot be received for file or record under the rules be stamped, received, placed on file or recognized in any way.

That if there be filed in the Bureau of Vital Statistics any such irregular papers received since the organization of this Department, they shall be taken from the files and boxed or returned to their owners, any stamp that has heretofore been placed upon them in the Bureau being first erased.

That the Attorney and Counsel be and is hereby directed to commence action in the name of this Board, against the following-named persons for violation of the Sanitary Code:

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau during the week ending December 11, 1875: The total number of inspections made was 1,777, as follows: 4 public buildings, 811 tenement houses, 147 private dwellings, 142 other buildings, 7 manufactories and workshops, 14 stores and warehouses, 63 stables, 54 slaughter-houses, 1 dangerous building, 10 dumps, 1 smoke-house, 8 fat-rendering establishments, 1 public sewer, 1 cemetery, 26 sunken and vacant lots, 28 yards, courts, and areas, 62 cellars and basements, 127 waste-pipes and drains, 104 privies and water-closets, 36 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 2 violations of Sanitary Code, 4 dangerous chimneys, 3 cisterns and cesspools, 16 other nuisances, together with 102 visits of Inspectors to cases of contagious and infectious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 510. During the past week 49 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

41 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

38 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks, clothing, bedding, etc.

26 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the Hospital and one dead body to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending December 11, 1875: Typhoid fever, 17; scarlet fever, 47; cerebro-spinal meningitis, 0; measles, 30; diphtheria, 144, and small-pox, 46.

901 cans and 2 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending December 11, 1875.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending December 11, 1875, was as follows: Calves (bob), 6 carcasses; calves (case), 4 cases; sheep, 5 carcasses; lamb, 1 carcass; beef, 327 pounds; poultry, 203 pounds; and fish, 500 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending December 11, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 539 burial permits for city deaths, 24 for bodies in transit, and 51 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 539 deaths, 117 marriages, 514 births, 51 still-births, 24 applications for transit permits, and 49 returns from Coroners. There were 22 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 1 of marriage and 19 of death were issued from this Bureau.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held December 8 and 9, 1875 (present—all the Commissioners, except on the 9th instant Commissioner Dimock was absent), the following action was had:

Applications for Leases, etc.

December 8.—From Hoboken Land and Improvement Company, for reduction of rent for ferry premises foot of Christopher street, North river, to the extent of the amount claimed by the Comptroller for the franchise of said ferry, denied, and said company notified in conformity with opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, that the lease for the said premises will not be executed by this Department unless the clause providing for said reduction on account of franchise be omitted therefrom, and that in the event of said company declining to consent to such modification of said lease, then the said premises must be immediately surrendered to the city.
 December 8.—From Frederick Habkeimer, for a reduction of rent of pier foot of Little Twelfth street, North river, leased by him. Denied.

Applications for Permits.

December 8.—From coal dealers, to have the derrick situated on the bulkhead between Piers 5 and 6, North river, made a permanent one. Advised that there were no objections to said derrick remaining during the pleasure of the Board; but as said derrick was located on private property, this Department could not grant the permit requested.
 December 8.—Action of the President in granting permission to James W. Mott, to discharge canal boat at bulkhead north of Pier 41, North river. Approved.

Repairs Ordered, etc.

December 8.—Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair the following-named dumping boards on the East river, at foot of Market street, at a cost of \$50. At foot of Seventeenth street, at a cost of \$125. At foot of Forty-sixth street, at a cost of \$75.

Dredging Ordered, etc.

December 8.—Action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to proceed without delay in the work of dredging slips at Pier 7 and lower half of Pier 12, East river. Approved.

Contracts, etc.

December 8.—David Tillson advised that the Department accepts his offer to sell 13 pieces of granite coping, at 39 cents per cubic foot, the Engineer-in-Chief having recommended that said coping will make excellent headers and stretchers for the "A" course of the bulkhead wall.
 December 9.—Consent given to the substitution of George A. Gardner, as surety on contract of Warren Rosevelt, for repairing Pier 8, East river, in place of James Bigler, rejected by the Comptroller.

Miscellaneous.

December 8.—The following-named piers and bulkheads set apart as places from which clean snow and ice can be dumped: On the East river—Piers Nos. 2, 23, 37, 56, and foot of Third and Twenty-third streets. On the North river—Piers No. 22 and foot of Eleventh and Seventeenth streets, and bulkhead north of Pier 41, and Secretary authorized to issue permits in usual form to parties applying for same.
 December 8.—Action of the Commissioners in advising the Health Department that if the contractor for grading East Forty-second street cannot use the dock foot of said street conjointly with the contractor for removing offal, the first named contractor must seek wharf accommodations elsewhere.
 December 8.—Action of the President in purchasing 1,006 small dock piles from Phelps & Kimpland, at \$5.75 each, to be used in constructing the bulkhead wall. Approved.
 December 8.—Two reports and twenty-two communications were received, of which twenty were placed on file, no further action thereon being required, one was laid on the table, and one was referred to the Executive Committee for consideration and report.
 December 9.—Form of pay-roll suggested by Finance Department for use of Department of Docks. Accepted and adopted.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice" requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

When possible and legal, serving jurors will be allowed to select a convenient season—if application be made in time.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of delinquents.

The Commissioner will receive applications for relief from those jurors who have served continuously and promptly for several years, or have done excessive jury service in the State Courts.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted. No fees of any kind exist or are allowed in regard to jury notices, and any one asking, receiving, or giving any such "fee" or "present" will be arrested, and, if possible, punished to the full extent of the law.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET,

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, on the 30th day of November, 1875, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 100 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

Section 100. That every owner, lessee, tenant, and occupant of any stall, stable, or apartment in which any horse, cattle, or swine, or any other animal shall be kept, or of any place in which manure or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, within the built-up portion of said city, shall cause said liquid and manure to be at once removed to some proper place, and shall at all times keep, or cause to be kept, such stalls, stables, and apartments, and the drainage, yard, and appurtenances hereof, in a cleanly and wholesome condition, so that no offensive smell detrimental to health shall be allowed to escape therefrom; and when within three hundred feet of any occupied dwelling-house, or of any manufactory where more than five persons are employed, the removals from the stalls shall not be made, nor shall the manure or refuse from the stable be allowed to remain on any street or place near such stable, any time between 10 o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock P. M., without a permit from this Board. Every such stall, stable, or apartment, where horses or cattle are kept, shall have an underground and properly covered manure vault of not less than sixty-four cubic feet capacity. But the Sanitary Superintendent is authorized to issue permits to be regularly reported to this Board regulating such removal within said hours.
