STATION-HOUSES.

The Inspectors of Police report upon the condition of certain Station-houses, as follows:

Eighth, Ninth and Sixteenth, sanitary condition very bad. Twelfth, sanitary condition very bad, and prison unsafe.

The sleeping apartments for the men in the Twelfth and Thirty-third Precincts are crowded and inadequate, and better accommodations in this respect very much needed. In the Thirty-third Precinct an additional building adjacent to the Station-house has been leased for dormitory purposes, and will soon be in possession of the force. In the others, repairs will be made as soon as practicable to render them fit for Police occupancy and the safe detention of persons arrested.

On the twelfth day of January, 1892, the northerly boundary of the Twenty-second Precinct was changed to Fifty-ninth street, from Eighth avenue to the North river, and the southerly boundary of the Twenty-sixth Precinct changed to Eighty-sixth street, from Eighth avenue to the North river. This was done to establish the new Twenty-fourth Precinct, the boundaries of which are Fifty-ninth street, Eighth avenue, Eighty-sixth street and North river. The new Precinct being numbered 24, necessitated a change in the number theretofore given the Precinct known as the Harbor Police. The latter is now called the Thirty-sixth Precinct.

The new Station-house in West Sixty-eighth street was formally opened and set apart for Police purposes on the 26th of February, 1892, and the premises so occupied on the 1st day of March, 1892. The house is admirably adapted for the needs of the force and is well located in that rapidly growing section of the city.

The new Station-house in East One Hundred and Fourth street is nearly completed, and will be ready for occupancy about June 1, 1893.

Portions of the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth Precincts will be taken to make up a new Precinct, for which this Station-house is erected.

Plans and specifications are in course of preparation for a new Station-house in Macdougall street, for the Eighth Precinct, and new houses are in contemplation for the Ninth and Twelfth Precincts, appropriations therefor having been made.

In view of the progress made during the past few years toward the increase and improvement of facilities for the proper transaction of Police business, there is every reason to believe that this Department will soon be in possession of first class Police buildings. In the Annexed District, however, the need for better Station-houses is seriously felt.

Board of Surgeons.

The following tables show the sick time of the force by Precincts and Squads, during the year, together with other results of the labor of the Surgeons of the Department.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disabilities and injuries during the year, is shown by the first table, from which it will be seen that the time actually lost was 49,073 days—3.66 per cent. of the total days' time of the force.

This is an increase of 4,298 days over the record for 1891, and 0.22 per cent. of full time. The amount paid for sick time lost was \$80,713.27 (an increase of \$7,013.75), which does not include allowances of full pay for disabilities incurred by the force while in the actual performance of duty, and which allowances were made by the Board of Police some time subsequent to the recovery from the disability.

The additional amounts so paid aggregate the sum of \$1,232.83, which added to the amount above stated, makes the total sum paid for sick time lost, \$81,946.10, an increase of \$7,366.52 over the preceding year. Though this increase is less than that of 1891 over 1890, the per cent. of sick to full time indicates a steady gain, not entirely attributable to the influence of epidemics. By comparing the percentage of sick time in the various Precincts for a series of years, there will be found a fluctuation so great as to forbid conclusions based upon the good or bad sanitary conditions of certain Station-houses. The matter deserves careful consideration.

Elsewhere in this report will be found a table of arrests for a series of years and comments thereupon.

The proportion of arrests in the Fourth, Sixth, Tenth and Eleventh Precincts, heretofore so pronounced, is still very large. The number arrested in these precincts was 22,631, or 26.78 per cent. of the entire number. This is a decrease of 1.88 per cent. as compared with the arrests in the same district during 1891. The decrease in the number of arrests in this district, as compared with the preceding year, was 3,205, while the decrease in the entire number was 5,626, thus showing that in the entire city, exclusive of these precincts, the decrease was 2,421, or 784 less than the decrease in the small territory within these four contiguous precincts. It will be noticed, further, that the said decrease is confined almost exclusively to the Fourth Precinct.

The number arrested in the Annexed District will be found 49 less than during the preceding year.

A study of the figures in the foregoing table, and comparison with similar tables in former years, will show surprising changes, for which no satisfactory reasons can be given. The fact that while there was a decrease of 5,626 in the entire number of arrests, and yet that the arrests of females was 161 greater than in 1891, is among the more conspicuous of these surprises.

In the table of offenses, above presented, it will be found that only 31 arrests were made during the year for violation of the pool law, and 104 for violation of the lottery law. As compared with the number arrested for these offenses in former years—particularly for violation of the pool law—there is a very marked decrease. The causes of this decrease have been fully discussed in previous reports, and as there is no immediate prospect of a settlement of the vexed question as to the legal status of pool-selling, no further reference to the subject is deemed necessary at this time.

HOUSE OF DETENTION FOR WITNESSES.

SANITARY COMPANY.

Bureau of Steam-boiler Inspection and Engineers.

The report of this Bureau shows the number of steam-boilers examined, tested hydrostatically, and their condition, together with the number of applicants examined as to their qualifications as engineers to take charge of and operate stationary and portable steam-boilers and engines in the City of New York; also the amount of money paid to the Treasurer of the Police Pension Fund, collected from owners of steam-boilers for certificates of inspection, as provided by chapter 437 of the Laws of 1885.

For the year there have been 6,736 applicants examined for engineers' certificates, to take charge of and operate stationary and portable steam boilers and engines. Each applicant has been examined as to his experience, qualification and knowledge of steam-boilers and engines. Of this number, 6,217 passed a satisfactory examination and have been granted certificates, and 519 have been rejected.

Notwithstanding the large increase in the number of steam-boilers operated in the City of New York, as shown by the foregoing report, the danger necessarily attendant upon such operation is very greatly diminished by the constant vigilance exercised by this Bureau and the only real apprehension held by those having this particular duty in charge is in that class of boiler known as "tramp boilers," portable steam-boilers used for rock drilling, excavating, etc., and boilers used for heating purposes only. The first is a class of boilers that are constantly exposed to all kinds of weather and when not in use are left lying in some open lot, subject to corrosion, rust and other damaging influences which, when they are again brought into requisition and put under pressure, are to a great degree dangerous. Provision should be made requiring an inspection of this class of boiler every time they are removed from one place to another and before they are allowed to be put into operation. Boilers used for heating purposes only are now exempt from test or inspection by this Department, this class of boilers are generally operated by janitors and others who know nothing of their care or construction and frequent complaints are received as to dangerous condition of these steam-heaters. If provision was made by law placing these boilers under the supervision of this Department and requiring a certificate of inspection to be annually obtained to operate them, it would greatly lessen the danger which now exists, as frequent visitations would then be made to them by the Engineers of this Department and any defects would be readily discovered and means provided for their correction.

Steam-boiler Casualties in 1892.

At 9.10 A.M., April 18, 1892, Portable Boiler No. 3281, a locomotive flue and return tubular boiler, owned by William E. Dean, contractor, and being operated at Dyckman street, Inwood, by Thomas McDonald, Engineer of the Second Grade, slipped the braces, dropped the crown sheet some ten inches at the front tube head, the heads of the rivets and braces were pulled through the rivet holes, except the front cross section over the furnace door, where the rivet heads remained intact in the shell above the crown sheet, the steam and water was forced through the furnace door and severely scalded the engineer. The boiler was tested November 24, 1891, and a certificate issued limiting the pressure to go pounds. This is one of the so-called "tramp boilers" constantly exposed and moved from place to place, causing severe strains and other damage. It had recently been moved to this location, and as no evidence as to its having been burned was apparent, it is concluded that it was damaged by being roughly moved and the rivet heads worn away; there was not sufficient metal left on the rivet heads to resist the pressure on the crown sheet and when the braces (which first gave way) slipped, the crown sheet being sagged in the centre, the sudden stress in the rivets caused them to give way.

At 9.40 A.M., May 9, 1892, a portable locomotive-style steam boiler owned by Thomas Fitzgerald, contractor, and registered as Boiler No. 2675, blew out the inside sheet of the water-leg under the furnace, at Sixty-ninth street, between Eighth and Amsterdam avenues, killing the engineer, William Dougherty, and severely injuring a laborer named Wm. McNeery. The inside plate of this boiler was completely ruptured, the seams giving way, and the sheet was torn apart in several directions the whole length of the furnace. The plate was $\frac{1}{4}$ inch thick and was not burned; there was no evidence of low water, the crown sheet remaining intact. The cause of the explosion was an overpressure of steam; the safety valve was oxidized, for if it had been in condition and left at the pressure allowed, viz., 90 pounds, it would have remained intact, but instead it was blown off and could not be found, and the seat of the valve, which is in the dome, shows oxidation. The boiler was tested April 11, 1892, and was in good condition; it had been removed to the place where it exploded on the 7th of May, a distance of three-quarters of a mile, and only started up, when the explosion took place. The engineer was an exceptionally good man, having a record of upward of twenty years on the books of this Department. It was a case of carelessness on the part of a competent engineer.

TENEMENT HOUSE SQUAD.

This squad of Policemen is detailed, to the service of the Health Department in this city. The following schedule shows some of the results of the labors of this squad, in addition to which they are expected to make arrests for offenses, and are subject to the orders of the Superintendent

in all emergencies requiring the services of the entire force of the Department. This squad made 59 arrests during the year just closed.

FOUNDLINGS.

During the year 145 foundlings were taken temporarily in charge by the police. During the same period the police found 70 dead infants and 61 foetuses. These figures show a very considerable decrease from the figures for 1891 in each item. On inquiry it is found, however, that the number of foundlings received in the New York Foundling Asylum during the year 1891 was 1,018, and in 1892 1,164, an increase of 146. Adding together the number received in the asylum and those taken in charge by the police for each year we find an increase of 89 in the latter year.

In addition to the Police cases sent to the prison ward for treatment, 88 male and 28 female prisoners in confinement in the City Prisons were transferred to this ward for treatment; also 2 male and 1 female prisoners were sent here by the Park Police.

HARBOR POLICE.

In the appropriations for 1893 for this Department provision has been made for a new twin-screw steel steamboat and steam launches for harbor and river service (see appropriations elsewhere in this report). With new and improved facilities for water service about the city there is every reason to believe will succeed a much more efficient performance of Police duty in the harbor.

TWENTY-EIGHTH PRECINCT.

For the two years last past this Board in its annual reports has endeavored to show the value of the service rendered by the force of this Precinct by figures as to the immense traffic carried on at our wharves and piers. The tabular statements of those years, reliable so far as they pretended to cover the ground, were of necessity so incomplete as to lead to conclusions wide of the actual mark. For the reason that complete details cannot be obtained, and that some of the great forwarders decline to furnish full statements, it is believed that the preparation of such schedules should be discontinued. It nevertheless remains true that the necessity of a large Police force along the river front grows more and more conspicuous year after year in proportion to the increase of population and business interests.

The increase in the number of messages transmitted by telegraph and telephone during the year was 17,000 over the preceding year. The total number of messages transmitted as given in this report includes only those of which a record is made in the telegraph blotters. A large number of messages are transmitted by telephone of a conversational nature, requiring no record. The steady increase in the number of messages transmitted each year has drawn the attention of the Board of Commissioners to the necessity of introducing, as soon as practicable, a system of telegraph to take the place of the one now in use, known as the "dial system"; this system has been in operation for more than thirty years, and while it has answered the needs of the Department in the past, it does not meet the requirements of the service at the present time.

The nature of the messages transmitted over the police lines is so varied and important that it is of the utmost importance that nothing should be left undone to place the telegraph bureau in a position to transact its business in the most reliable manner.

TELEPHONE SYSTEM.

The telephone service of the Department, although at present limited, has given great satisfaction during the past year. It consists of a Central Office plant, connecting the principal offices therein with one another, and with the exchange system of the Metropolitan Telephone Company (1424 Spring and 4528 Cortlandt), (the Eighth, Ninth, Nineteenth, and Twenty-eighth Precincts have telephones). All the telephone lines coming into headquarters are connected on a switch-board in the telegraph office, where all the calls are answered and the necessary connections made. A record is made of all messages transmitted by telephone of an official character. The telephones were originally placed at the above mentioned Police stations to ascertain their adaptability for police purposes. It has been fully demonstrated that they are a most essential auxiliary to a Police telegraphic system. During the recent Columbian celebration, when New York City had more visitors than ever before, and these immense gatherings were concentrated along the routes of the various parades, and it was necessary that they be kept well in hand by the Police, some very effective means of communication had to be established between the Superintendent of Police and the commanding officers in charge at various points along the line. Fourteen booths were erected with telephones attached, extending from Liberty street to Fifty-eighth street and Fifth avenue; at each booth a Policeman was stationed to do the telephoning, the telephones were connected in the most approved manner, so that the booths were in communication with one another and with Police Headquarters. The Superintendent of Police could communicate direct from his desk with each booth, or with all of them at the same time, and was conversing from time to time with the Inspectors and Captains in charge along the line, and was kept as thoroughly informed of what transpired as if present at each place. At each booth was stationed a Police Surgeon (a Doctor of the Board of Health), and an ambulance, with attending Surgeon. During the three days' celebration these Doctors attended as many as 200 emergency calls, and the ambulances removed many cases to the hospitals. But for these arrangements there would certainly have been much suffering among the people gathered to witness the parades; the service rendered by means of this system of booths was so satisfactory as to receive special commendation from the Superintendent of Police.

The Metropolitan Telegraph and Telephone Company gave the use of their wires, instruments, etc., on this occasion, without cost.

The Superintendent of Telegraph recommends that the telephone service of the Department be extended so as to embrace all the other Precinct Station-houses, City Hospitals, and Police Court Squad offices, so as to have them connected direct with Police Headquarters, and with this object in view, in the plan for placing the Police Department wires in the subways, provision has been made for a metallic circuit telephone line in each place.

The nature of these signals are : Officers reporting during their tour of patrol duty, calls for patrol wagons, calls for ambulances, calls for sick wagons, and emergency calls of all kinds. Residents in the vicinity of these boxes may be furnished with keys to be used only in cases of extreme emergency—fires, burglaries, etc.

The signal-boxes in the Nineteenth Precinct have been discontinued excepting two, one at Twenty-third street and Broadway, the other at Madison Square Garden.

These boxes are used during large meetings. There were formerly six signal-boxes in this precinct, but owing to the removal of the poles by the Board of Electrical Control, we were obliged to discontinue the use of four boxes temporarily.

During the coming year the signal-boxes, instruments and lines in the upper precincts will require considerable attention ; in many cases the lines and instruments require an overhauling, and the boxes need painting.

Many exchanges, banks and other institutions in the city are connected by telegraph with Police Headquarters, and with the station-houses. These places are connected so as to secure Police protection and assistance. They are connected by permission of the Board of Police, and are under the supervision of the Superintendent of Police Telegraph ; the expense of construction and maintenance is borne by the bank or other place connected.

There are at the present time in operation at Police Headquarters and at the station-houses, 43 sets of dial telegraph instruments ; in addition to these there is a complete electric-bell system at each station-house, connecting the Captain's and Sergeant's rooms, dormitories, prison, sitting-room and Matron's room, with the desk.

700 cells of batteries are used as follows :

For main line battery, "Gravity."

For local battery, "Smee."

For electric bell battery, "Smee."

For telephones battery, "Carbon."

There are 90 miles of wire in use in the Department for the telegraph, telephone and signal-box systems.

During the year ten miles of police wires were transferred from pole-lines to house-tops, so as to permit the removal of the poles by the Board of Electrical Control.

It is contemplated during the next year to secure for the Department much-needed improvement in its electrical service, and the first step to be taken in this direction is the placing of its wires in the subways, providing, at the same time, the necessary wiring for a complete telephonic and telegraphic system between Headquarters and the Precinct Station-houses. After this is accomplished it is desirable to extend the signal-box system throughout the city, to be used in connection with patrol wagons. The introduction of these improvements into the Department will greatly facilitate Police work ; it will take considerable time to complete them, but as much as possible will be accomplished during the coming year.

This is a considerable decrease in every particular from the figures of 1891. The fines amounted to \$11,033.65, which sum was paid into the Pension Fund, pursuant to law. The number of charges for intoxication and disobedience of orders is a very small percentage of the total number made, and shows the force to be under such discipline as to prevent complaints, in a great degree, for serious offences.

The above shows a continued decrease in the number of lodgers accommodated in the cheap dormitories of the city. The number is 312,135 less than in the year 1891. It will be seen, however, that the number lodged in the Fourth, Sixth, Tenth and Eleventh Precincts (a territory to which attention has been called for several years past) was 2,709,424, an increase of 13,534 over the preceding year.

The three last named precincts show a great decrease, while the increase in the first-named was 140,585. The Health Department of this city, it is believed, maintains a surveillance over these lodging-rooms to the extent of frequent examinations as to their sanitary condition. It is probable these examinations have had the effect to reduce the occupancy of the rooms. Adding the station-house lodgings (137,436) to total above given for the year, we find a grand total of 4,223,174, an average of more than 11,500 persons per night.

That report, found in the appendix hereto, is a complete resumé of the operations of the Fund and its condition at the close of the year.

From the above it will be seen that the receipts of the Pension Fund (including balances in bank) for the year 1892 were \$42,194.07 greater than for the preceding year, and the disbursements \$28,844.40 greater.

The increase of disbursements is slightly in excess of the average of twelve years past. It will be noticed further that the number of officers (in each grade except Doormen) retired during the year is largely in excess of the number retired in 1891, while the number of pensioners dropped from the roll shows very little change in the aggregate.

By the provisions of chapter 539, Laws of 1892, the income of the Pension Fund is derivable from the following sources:

- 1st. Fines against members of the Police force.
- 2d. Percentages of rewards permitted to be received by the force.
- 3d. Proceeds of sale of unclaimed property and all unclaimed money coming into possession of Police.
- 4th. Pay deducted from the salaries of the force for account of absence with or without leave, and sick time lost.
- 5th. Fees for inspection of steam boilers.
- 6th. \$300,000 per annum from the excise fees of the City.
- 7th. Fees for permits to carry pistols.
- 8th. Fees for permits to hold masked balls.
- 9th. Proceeds of sale of condemned, unfit or unserviceable property belonging to or under control of the Police Department.
- 10th. Unexpended balances of appropriations for account of salaries of Police force remaining in the Treasury at the close of the preceding year.
11. In case the above sources of income are not sufficient to pay the pensions, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is authorized to appropriate a sum to make up the deficiency.

For the year 1893 the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has appropriated the sum of \$50,000, that amount being estimated by the Trustees of the Pension Fund as the probable deficiency for the year. The Trustees of the Fund are, therefore, relieved of the embarrassment alluded to in a former report, and are enabled to properly provide for the gradually increasing number of dependents upon the fund.

APPROPRIATIONS.

The appropriations for 1892 and 1893, made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the purposes of conducting the business of the Police Department, are given so that information can be had at a moment's notice by all interested in the matter. Salaries are paid monthly to the members of the force at the following rates per annum, subject to deduction for lost time by reason of sickness, absence, with or without leave, and fines:

Bureau of Elections.

The following schedules show some portion of the work done by the Bureau of Election during the year:

It will be noticed the number of election districts were increased 250 over the number in 1891. The number of Inspectors in each election district were, by act of the Legislature, reduced to three, and as the New York County Democracy and New York Democracy were prohibited from representation on the Board of Inspectors, the total number of persons under investigation for selection as officers of election was very considerably reduced, notwithstanding the increase of districts. The preparation of ballots and all the labor involved in the preliminaries of election in this city under the new ballot law, was more rapidly and accurately done than in the preceding year owing to the experience had.

Commissioner Deering proposed the following amendment to Rule V.:

V.—NOTICE OF HEARING.

A notice of at least eight days shall be given in writing to the Counsel to the Corporation, in the form usually known as a notice of trial, specifying a day on which it is proposed to take testimony, or to make argument in relation to any particular claim. No testimony will be taken or argument heard in reference to any claim until proof of service of such notice shall have been filed with the Clerk, together with a copy of the notice of claim and proof of filing of the same as required by the provisions of the act. Proof of service of such notice of hearing, together with the copy of the notice of claim, must be so filed with the Clerk at least two days before the proposed hearing.

Which was unanimously adopted.

On motion of Commissioner Deering, the Clerk was instructed to spread in full upon the minutes the rules of the Commission, including therein Rule V. as amended.

RULES.

I.—CHAIRMAN.

The Chairman shall preside at all meetings of the Commission. In the event of his absence at any meeting the Commissioners present may select a Chairman pro tempore, who shall have the same duties and powers as the Chairman.

II.—CLERK.

The Clerk shall prepare a list of all the notices filed with the Comptroller and Counsel to the Corporation under the provisions of the act, which list shall state the name of the petitioner or claimant, the particular street or avenue in relation to which it is claimed damages have been suffered by reason of a change of grade and the name of the attorneys representing the petitioner or claimant. Such list shall at all times be open for inspection.

The Clerk shall from such list prepare for the use of the Commission at each meeting, a calendar of the cases which have been duly noticed for hearing and such other cases as the Chairman shall designate shall be placed thereon. All notices shall be numbered in the order in which they shall have been filed, and the number of the case shall be indorsed upon all papers, exhibits or briefs which may be submitted, in addition to the usual indorsement or title.

The Clerk shall keep the minutes of the Commission and attend to the printing of the same. He shall be present at all meetings and shall give the necessary publication to both notices of meeting and to the minutes, and shall perform such other duties as shall be required of him by the Commission in relation to the business thereof.

III.—STENOGRAPHER.

The Stenographer shall attend at all meetings of the Commission and shall report the proceedings thereof and all testimony taken, and shall furnish to each of the Commissioners and the Counsel to the Corporation a transcript of his notes, and to the Clerk a transcript for use in preparing the minutes. He shall also furnish to the attorney for any petitioner or claimant a transcript of such minutes, at not exceeding five cents per folio.

IV.—NOTICE OF CLAIM.

The notice of claim filed with the Comptroller and Counsel to the Corporation shall, as far as possible, briefly state:

1. Name of the owner or owners in fee, and other persons interested, if any, in the lands and premises on account of which said claim is made.
2. A brief description of the property in relation to which the claim is made, giving also the farm, block and ward numbers by which said premises are described upon the tax maps of the city.
3. The name of the particular street or avenue in relation to which it is claimed damages have been suffered by reason of a change of grade.
4. When and in what manner and by what authority the grade of the street or avenue was originally established.
5. When and by what authority the original or subsequent changes in such grades have been made.
6. When and by what authority the street or avenue has been graded or improved and upon what grade.
7. Whether the said street or avenue has been opened or title thereto vested in the City of New York.
8. When the claim is made on account of damages to buildings, the date of the erection thereof.
9. Whether in any proceeding or suit heretofore had or pending, damages have been claimed or allowed.
10. The facts or circumstances by reason of which damages are claimed.
11. The amount of such loss and damage.

V.—NOTICE OF HEARING.

A notice of at least eight days shall be given in writing to the Counsel to the Corporation, in the form usually known as a notice of trial, specifying a day on which it is proposed to take testimony, or to make argument in relation to any particular claim. No testimony will be taken or argument heard in reference to any claim until proof of service of such notice shall have been filed with the Clerk, together with a copy of the notice of claim and proof of filing of the same as required by the provisions of the act. Proof of service of such notice of hearing, together with the copy of the notice of claim, must be so filed with the Clerk at least two days before the proposed hearing.

VI.—HEARING.

The Commission will make such disposition of the cases before it as will facilitate the dispatch of business. Any case set down for hearing must be completed within such time as the Commission shall designate, and will not be postponed without legal excuse satisfactory to the Commission.

VII.—MEETINGS.

The Commission will hold regular public meetings on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week, at 2 o'clock P. M., and on such other days as may, in the judgment of the Commission, be necessary to facilitate the dispatch of business.

Notice in writing of each meeting held on any days other than a regular meeting day, shall be sent by the Clerk to each Commissioner, and such meetings may be called by the Chairman in his discretion.

VIII.—SUSPENSION OF RULES.

These rules may be suspended, modified or altered at any meeting at which all the Commissioners are present, by a majority vote, and may be suspended, modified or altered at any meeting, provided written notice of the intention to move such suspension, modification or alteration shall be given to each Commissioner at least two days prior to the meeting at which it is intended to make such motion.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until bid work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
