I return herewith, without my approval, a resolution adopted by you on May 21, 1901, setting aside a room in the former Village Hall in Richmond Hill for the use of the Morris Park Hook and Ladder Company.

My objection to this resolution is that the City does not assume to provide quarters for the various volunteer companies for which allowances are made out of the City Treasury.

I return herewith, without my approval, a resolution adopted by you on May 14, 1901, authorizing the Commissioner of Highways to issue a permit for the construction of vaults adjoining the new Custom-house building without the payment of any license fee.

My objection to this resolution is that the fees from such licenses are pledged to the Sinking Fund of the City and cannot be diverted therefrom. Similar exemptions in favor of churches and religious corporations have, under the present Charter, been uniformly disapproved for lack of power to grant them.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to John Lamb to place and keep a stand for the sale of newspapers and periodicals under the stairs of the elevated railroad at the northwest corner of Fifty-ninth street and Columbus avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, provided the said stand shall be erected in conformity with the provisions of chapter 718 of the Laws of 1896, and subject to the conditions of an ordinance to regulate the placing of stands under the stairs of the elevated railroads, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

No. 918.

Whereas, By section eleven of title nineteen of chapter five hundred and eighty-three of the Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-eight, being the Charter of the City of Brooklyn, it is provided that the Common Council of said city may at any time before any contract shall be made for any local improvement referred to therein, cancel such assessment, and any and all proceedings had relating thereto, or to the improvement for which the same was laid, and that in case of such cancellation all moneys paid for or on account of such assessment shall be refunded to the person or persons who shall have paid the same, or to the legal representatives of such person or persons; and

Whereas, By section forty-six of the Greater New York Charter it is provided that all the powers and duties conferred or charged upon the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn shall be exercised and performed by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, subject, nevertheless, to the power of approval or disapproval by the Mayor of said city as provided in said Charter; and

Whereas, The improvement known as the grading and paving of Bay Eleventh street, from Eighty-sixth street to Croysey avenue, with macadam pavement, was such a local improvement as is referred to in the section of the Brooklyn Charter above cited; and

Whereas, By sections seven and eight of title nineteen of said Charter before any contract for such local improvement could be entered into, an assessment therefor must be laid and one-third of the amount thereof collected; and

Whereas, In said improvement of grading and paving Bay Eleventh street, from Eighty-sixth street to Croysey avenue, with macadam pavement, such assessment was laid, but one-third thereof has never been collected and no contract has ever been entered into for such improvement, and no work has been done thereon.

Resolved, That the resolution of the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn, known as Resolution No. 115 of the meeting of March 22, 1897, relating to the grading and paving of Bay Eleventh street, from Eighty-sixth street to Croysey avenue, with macadam pavement, and the resolution of said Common Council, known as Resolution No. 28 of the meeting of May 10, 1897, relating to the same subject, and the resolution known as Resolution No. 64 of the meeting of August 2, 1897, confirming the assessment for the said improvement, be and the same hereby are each and every one rescinded; and that said assessment for grading and paving Bay Eleventh street, from Eighty-sixth street to Croysey avenue, and any and all proceedings had relating to said improvement be and the same are hereby canceled.

Resolved, That all moneys paid for and on account of said assessment be refunded to the person or persons who shall have paid the same or to the legal representatives of such person or persons.

avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, the work to be done and water supplied at her own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mrs. Kerwin to place, erect and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of her premises, on the southeast corner of Sixty-fifth street and West End avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, said watering-trough to be placed on the West End avenue side, the work to be done and water supplied at her own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

Resolved, further, That the said City Clerk shall inaugurate an inquiry with a view of ascertaining whether it is not possible to obtain copy of the missing records for the period dating from 1776 to and including 1783; and in order that said investigation may be thorough in all respects, the said City Clerk shall communicate with and invite the co-operation of the historical societies of this city.

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with a motion passed by the Central Federated Union, at its regular meeting held on May 5, 1901, I am instructed to inform your Honorable Body that they have endorsed the following resolutions:

Whereas, It is universally conceded that the improvements and economics which have been

made in recent years in transportation have made possible the reduction of the present standard rate of fare without injustice to the investors in railways; and

Whereas, We believe that the public should derive a fair benefit from advances made in inventions, which in non-competitive enterprises such as a railroad, can only come through legislative enactment; and

Whereas, We believe a low rate of fare would do much toward breaking up the obnoxious tenement-house system by making it possible for people of small means to live at a distance from the places where they work; and

Whereas, The saving of four cents or more per day for each person would be a material benefit to people struggling to live on the low wages now prevailing; therefore be it

Resolved, That we most emphatically protest against the making of a contract, or the acceptance of a bid for the construction of any extension to existing railroads, or the granting of any new franchises, either by the Municipal Assembly or the Rapid Transit Commission, unless it contains a proviso stipulating a maximum fare of three cents per passenger.

No. 948.

Communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated May 31, 1901, transmitting the Budget for the year 1901, accompanied by his certificate of the amounts of the appropriations authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for the year 1901, and an estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation during the current year.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,

To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly:

Section 247 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said The City of New York to prepare and submit to the Municipal Assembly, at least four weeks before their annual meeting, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement, setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts by the City Treasury during the then current year, from all the sources of revenue of said general fund, including surplus revenues from the Sinking Fund, available in accordance with law, other than surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund for the payment of the City debt, and the said Municipal Assembly are hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which, by law, they are required to order, and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised, by tax only, the balance of said aggregate amount, after making such deduction."

Section 902 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the municipal assembly, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings and Richmond, respectively, and the sum or sums which should be paid for like purposes by that part of Queens county included within the City; and the Municipal Assembly is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties and part of county, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county or part of county; to the end that each of said counties and said part of Queens county shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county or part of county for county as distinguished from city purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statements, as follows:

1. The Budget, in detail, for the year 1901.

2. The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said budget, and to be raised respectively by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by said section 902 of the Charter.

3. Correspondence, showing the amounts to be levied on the taxable property in the Borough of Brooklyn and the Thirty-first Ward thereof (late Town of Gravesend), respectively, under the provisions of chapter 522 of the Laws of 1899.

4. The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation.

The attention of your Honorable Body is respectfully called to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the municipal assembly to include in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your attention is also specially called to the provisions of section 903 of the same act, prescribing the method of preparing and disposing of the assessment rolls, and also to the provisions of section 911 of the same act, designating the first day of September as the date when the assessment rolls shall be finally completed, to be delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, with the proper warrant or warrants annexed thereto, directing him to collect the several moneys mentioned in said rolls, and to pay the same, from time to time, when so collected, to the Chamberlain of said city.

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of February 4, 1901, in which you refer to the provisions of chapter 522 of the Laws of 1899, for levying an assessment, one-half upon the Borough of Brooklyn, and one-half upon the Thirty-first Ward of that borough, individually,

for the purpose of providing for the deficiency caused by the discharge of certain assessments and installments of assessments for the grading, construction and improvement of Surf Avenue.

You say:

"It would seem to me that in order to provide for the collection of this deficiency it will be necessary for you to direct that the necessary additional columns be printed in the assessment rolls so that the deficiency may be extended in the same."

It was my opinion that the provision for this deficiency should be made in calculating the tax rate for the borough and ward affected, and in answer to my inquiry the Corporation Counsel has rendered an opinion to that effect, a copy of which is herewith inclosed.

THOMAS L. FEITNER, Esq., President:

SIR—I have received your communication of February 8, 1901, which reads as follows:

"May not one-half of the deficiency chargeable against the whole borough be charged in one item and thus increase the tax rate of that borough?"

Further, may not the other half of the deficiency chargeable against the old Town of Gravesend be levied by the Board of Assessors, in an assessment-roll prepared by them in the usual manner, and thus carry out the provisions of the act more properly than to encumber the assessment-rolls with additional columns?"

In reply thereto I would say that chapter 522 of the Laws of 1899 provides for the discharge of all assessments and installments of assessments for the improvement of Surf Avenue upon the receipt of one-third part of the same originally assessed by the assessment confirmed April 13, 1899. Section 5 of the act sets forth the manner in which the deficiency thereby arising is to be met, to wit:

By the levying and raising of the same in the general taxes of The City of New York in the manner provided by law, one-half of said deficiency to be charged and levied upon the taxable property of the late Town of Gravesend, now the Thirty-first Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, and the remaining one-half to be charged and levied upon the taxable property in the Borough of Brooklyn.

No mention is made in the act of any additional column to be borne by the assessment-rolls. The charges authorized by the act are to be made a part of the general taxes of the city and are to be apportioned and levied in the same manner as such general taxes are apportioned and levied.

In answer to your first question then, I say that the deficiency chargeable against the whole borough may be charged in one item, to be added to and become a part of the general tax, and to be ratably distributed as a portion of said tax. The same answer will apply to that portion of the deficiency chargeable against the late Town of Gravesend. This deficiency is no longer to be considered as an assessment for a local improvement but as a tax upon the property of the Borough of Brooklyn and upon the former Town of Gravesend in the respective proportion fixed by the act.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:	
1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be audited from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial liability to provide for such inmates.	

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for carrying expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the inspection and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimates and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made in such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day.....	\$0 28

The necessity for the issue of such Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$10,000 has arisen in the present conditions of the water service from the public water system and pumping plant at Tottenville, in the Borough of Richmond. The Local Board of Improvements of the First District of that borough has, through the President of the Borough, petitioned the Board of Public Improvements to take the necessary action to have water-mains laid in Central avenue, from Amboy avenue to Karitan Bay; in Amboy avenue, between Central avenue and Church street; in Church street, between Broadway and Amboy avenue, and in Broadway, between Church street and Lehigh avenue. The total distance for which the mains are to be laid is 7,950 feet, on which there are thirty-one dwelling-houses, several stables and barns, a factory establishment and other buildings requiring water supply and fire protection, and these water-mains can be placed and fire-hydrants erected thereon at a total estimated cost of \$10,000.

There is no other provision to meet this expenditure, and in order to enable this Department to carry out the work, I respectfully ask the adoption by both houses of the Municipal Assembly of the requisite resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to make the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$10,000.

That it shall be unlawful for peddlars, vendors, hawkers, agents, criers, salesmen and all persons offering for sale goods, wares or merchandise of any kind, and persons seeking to purchase the same or soliciting work or employment of any kind to cry aloud their wares, offers or solicitations to ring bells or blow horns in any street, avenue, highway, public place or park in The City of New York, before the hour of 9 o'clock A. M. or after 5 o'clock P. M.

Sec. 2. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction by a City Magistrate, be fined not less than two (\$2) or more than ten dollars (\$10) for each offense.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

To the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York:

The Municipal Art Society is informed that you have under consideration a proposed ordinance for the proper designation of street names by signs upon the street corners. In that connection it respectfully asks your earnest attention to the great opportunity which exists for adding very substantially to the beauty of the streets by the character of the signs proposed, and it also respectfully offers its services to the City in the effort to procure an adequate and artistic name designation.

The necessity for such a designation is manifest. The signs will be constantly present to the eye, and they should be of such form, design and material as will contribute to the artistic value of the City's streets. It is manifest that every effort should be directed towards keeping the streets as free and open as possible. It is impracticable to keep them wholly so. Lamp-posts or electric lighting poles, fire-alarm boxes and hydrants are a necessity, and in connection with some one of these should be considered a device for indicating the street names. It is practicable, however, to minimize the number of objects. We think that the City should seize the opportunity to inaugurate a system which will combine all these things in one construction. Such a construction would not only be a relief to the streets, but, if artistically done, would add appreciably to their beauty. It may not be possible for various reasons to put such a scheme into complete operation at once. But it is quite possible to begin it in the more congested portions of the city, and extend it as occasion demands.

But, irrespective of any general treatment of the streets, the City manifestly owes to itself a proper system of street marking, useful to all classes of citizens or strangers, by day and night. It is to be borne in mind that the street names are to be indicated for two different classes of persons; one, the person ignorant of the locality, usually a pedestrian, and often a stranger, and the other the traveler in the street cars who knows the avenue he is on, but who wishes to know the street which he is approaching or passing. For the pedestrian the signs must be placed parallel with the street designated, otherwise confusion is inevitable. For the street car traveler the name of the cross street should be at an angle of forty-five degrees to the avenue; it can then be read from the approaching and passing car. We respectfully submit that all streets should be marked by signs affixed to the corner buildings, or where there is no corner buildings, by a temporary sign-post erected on the corner lot. The letters should be so large as to be read by night as well as by day. On avenues or streets which are largely used for transportation (which will be in the Borough of Manhattan substantially only the longitudinal avenues), there should be an additional sign showing the cross street placed at about an angle of forty-five degrees to the avenue on diagonally opposite corners affixed to the electric-light pole or other standard. It seems unnecessary for us at this time to elaborate this plan, or specify more in details our reasons for urging it.

But whatever manner of designation be adopted, it is of the highest importance that the signs should be pleasing and educating to the eye. The city streets are at present too much incumbered with disfiguring private signs. Those which the City provides should be such as to be not only beautiful, but an object lesson. We respectfully submit that the design or designs should be considered a work of art, and as such subject to the approval of the Municipal Art Commission, and we respectfully request and urge that the ordinance to be passed shall so provide.

We believe that the designs should either be uniform, or limited to one of a few designs which may be warranted by the different character of different sections of the city. A designation for streets on unimproved property in the outlying portions of the city may properly differ from that prescribed for the better business or residence portions of the city. It should, however, be equally pleasant to consult. For that reason, we respectfully suggest that the ordinance to be passed should prescribe generally the plan of designation, leaving further details to the Commissioner of Highways. If this society can be thus advised of the requirements of the city, and also of a limit of cost, it offers to prepare and submit, at its own expense, designs for adoption and use by the City. It contemplates that these designs will be the result of a competition, and it feels confident that in this or a similar way your Honorable Body may accomplish a greatly needed reform, and add materially to the beauty of the streets.

DEAR SIRS—The provisions of paragraph 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter provide for the issue by the Comptroller of Special Revenue Bonds, when thereto authorized by the concurrent vote of all the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, upon a joint resolution requesting such authorization, adopted by the affirmative vote of three-fourths of all the members elected to each branch of the Municipal Assembly, provided that the amount thus issued shall not in any one year exceed \$250,000.

The necessity for the issue of such Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$10,000 has arisen in the present conditions of the water service from the public water system and pumping plant at Tottenville, in the Borough of Richmond. The Local Board of Improvements of the First District of that borough has through the President of the Borough petitioned the Board of Public Improvements to take the necessary action to have water-mains laid in Central avenue, from Amboy avenue to Raritan Bay; in Amboy avenue, between Central avenue and Church street; in Church street, between Broadway and Amboy avenue, and in Broadway between Church street and Lehigh avenue. The total distance for which the mains are to be laid is 7,950 feet, on which there are thirty-one dwelling-houses, several stables and barns, a factory establishment and other buildings requiring water supply and fire protection, and these water-mains can be placed and fire-hydrants erected thereon at a total estimated cost of \$10,000.

There is no other provision to meet this expenditure, and in order to enable this Department to carry out the work, I respectfully ask the adoption by both houses of the Municipal Assembly of the requisite resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to make the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$10,000.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The item for additional help necessary at this Hospital was incorporated in the Kings County Hospital Salary Account, which made a part of the general salary estimate, it being intended to detail the additional help from the Kings County to the Emergency Hospital at Coney Island, as required. No allowance was made by the Board of Estimate for this item, and it is absolutely impossible to spare any of the present employees from Kings County for that purpose, as we are already much crippled for want of sufficient help.

I would respectfully recommend that application be made immediately for the following items, so that the Coney Island Hospital may be organized early enough this season to prevent the serious conditions occurring in previous years:

The premises in question, consisting of a two-story and basement brick building (35 feet by 45 feet) on a lot 70 feet by 100 feet, on the east side of Bradford street, Borough of Brooklyn, 185 feet north of Atlantic avenue, was leased by the Comptroller in pursuance to resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of December 21, 1898, and January 20, 1899, to the Twenty-sixth Ward Homoeopathic Dispensary for a term of ten (10) years from February 15, 1898, at an annual rental of \$250. The lease has never been signed by the Directors of the Twenty-sixth Ward Homoeopathic Dispensary, although notices have been sent to execute the same; they have paid \$375, being the rent from February 15, 1899, to August 15, 1900.

A number of improvements and repairs have been made to the building by the Dispensary. The first and second floors have been divided into rooms; new stairs from first to second floor and from first floor to basement; a dumb-waiter from basement to second floor; new plumbing put in the building; water-closets, wash-basins and baths; a kitchen in basement with new range, boiler and sink, and the hot-air furnace in basement put in good condition; the old privy in the yard has been changed into a Morgue.

In view of the fact that this property is under lease for a term of ten years from February 15, 1899, to the Twenty-sixth Ward Homoeopathic Dispensary, some action by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is necessary before it can be turned over to the Department of Charities.

To effect this the Twenty-sixth Ward Homoeopathic Dispensary should apply to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for leave to surrender the existing lease, which being approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the premises can then be properly assigned to the Department of Charities for its use.

The repairs, improvements, equipments, etc., necessary for an Emergency Hospital (provided the premises are assigned to the Department of Charities) are given as follows:

(a) Steam Heat, \$1,500.—The present hot-air furnace in cellar will heat the building, but Dr. J. T. Duryea, General Medical Superintendent of Kings County Hospital, claims that a hot-air furnace is not suitable for a hospital. Steam heat is better and more economical to run, and would be a decided improvement. The estimate for the work, \$1,500, I think is fair but not excessive.

(b) Stable (brick), \$4,000.—To run an Emergency Hospital it is necessary to have homes, ambulances, etc.; there are no accommodations on the premises for these, so it will be necessary to build a stable or rent quarters in a neighboring stable. The estimate, \$4,000, for a brick stable, I consider high; \$3,200 will be sufficient to build a stable, two stories high, 25 feet by 30 feet, to accommodate three horses and two wagons on the first floor, and a loft above for storage and sleeping apartments for stablemen.

(c) Painting and Incidental Repairs, \$1,500.—The building is in a fair condition inside and out, but a storm-door in front and rear I would advise be constructed; some of the plaster needs repairing; and I would also recommend one coat of paint on the entire inside; some of the window frames and sashes should be repaired and all painted two coats. The estimate, \$1,500, for repairs, etc., I consider high; \$900, in my opinion, will be ample to put the building in a first-class condition.

(d) Furniture, Surgical Instruments, etc., \$2,500.—I do not know the details of this item, but I am informed that this amount will fully equip the building with new furniture, etc.

(e) Horse, Harness, Ambulance, etc., \$1,200.—To purchase two horses, one set of harness, one ambulance and equip the stable, I would estimate the cost at about \$750.

To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—In my Departmental Estimate for the year 1901 I requested from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, among other things, the allowance of an appropriation of \$150,000 for the purpose of procuring by contract, at public letting, two new fire-boats, which it was estimated at the time would cost \$75,000 each, one to replace the "William F. Havemeyer" (Engine 43), a wooden vessel, constructed more than twenty-five years ago, and the other in order to afford increased protection to the shipping in the harbor and to the City's water-front, upon which is stored at all times merchandise worth millions of dollars.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment failed to act favorably upon my request, and, as a result, nothing can be done this year by the Department in the way of increasing the number of its fire-boats.

Existing conditions are, however, such as to render it imperative that prompt action be taken to place our fire-boat service in proper shape. To do this work effectively with the apparatus at hand I have decided, after consultation with the Chief of Department and the Chief of Construction and Repairs to Apparatus, that this can only be accomplished by making extensive repairs to the fire-boats "Zophar Mills" (Engine 51) and "The New Yorker" (Engine 57).

Concerning the condition of the fire-boat "Zophar Mills" the Chief of Department reports: "This boat was placed in service in 1883; the hull is in good condition. Two new boilers were placed in the boat in 1897 which are still good. The marine engine is too small, is worn out and in such bad condition that a full head of steam cannot be used. The fire pumps are too small and are liable to burst at any time, thereby rendering the boat useless in case of fire."

He also calls attention to the fact that about three months ago, while working at a fire on a lighter owned by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, the cast-iron section chamber on the fire-pumps, which was already defective, became more so after working for a short time, in consequence of which the streams of water were so poor that the engines were compelled to shut off the main fire-pumps and use the auxiliary pump, which of course gave no better stream on account of its size.

In regard to the fire-boat "The New Yorker," he reports:

"At the last annual inspection by the United States Government of the fire-boat 'The New Yorker,' held on November 21, 1900, the following work was ordered to be done before the next inspection, which will take place not later than the 21st of November, 1901: Remove 8 corrugated furnaces and boiler, and replace same with new ones; replace 60 defective frames in the wake of the engine room. If such work is not done by the above date the steam pressure now carried on boat will be reduced to such a low figure as to render the boat practically useless. In order to do the foregoing work it would be necessary to remove the forward bulkhead, steering-engine, floor in fore-castle, a considerable part of trunk deck and some of the main deck beams, in order to make room to put the furnaces in boiler. This work would cost about \$15,000, and taking into consideration the condition and age of the boilers—ten years—I consider this expenditure would be a waste of money, as the present boilers would have to be replaced in about two years."

As a result the Chief recommends that these boats be extensively repaired to meet the necessities of the case, and in default of which he reports that both of these boats within a short time will have to be withdrawn from service.

Below is a summary of the work required on each of the two boats and its estimated cost:

age of eighteen years within the limits of the territory embraced in The City of New York as now constituted, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punishable by a fine of ten dollars or ten days' imprisonment in the City Prison, or both, within the discretion of the magistrates trying such offense.

Sec. 3. This ordinance will take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE WEST TENTH STREET CONNECTING RAILWAY COMPANY THE RIGHT OR FRANCHISE TO CONSTRUCT AND OPERATE A STREET SURFACE RAILROAD IN, UPON AND ALONG CERTAIN STREETS, AVENUES, PARKWAYS AND HIGHWAYS IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

WHEREAS, THE WEST TENTH STREET Connecting Railway Company has duly presented to the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, by presenting and filing with each house thereof, its application, in writing, for a grant of the franchise or right to use the streets, avenues, parkways and highways in The City of New York hereinafter mentioned, for the construction, maintenance and operation of a single-track street surface railroad in or upon the surface of the same; and

WHEREAS, The said Municipal Assembly, by resolution adopted March 20, 1900, approved by his Honor the Mayor of said city on March 28, 1900, gave public notice of such application, and that at the Councilmanic Chamber, in the City Hall, in The City of New York, on the 15th day of April, 1900, at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon, such application of said railway company would be first considered and a public hearing had thereon, which notice was published daily for at least fifteen (15) days successively prior to the hearing, in two daily papers published in The City of New York, viz., in the "New York Press" and in the "New York Journal and Advertiser," which papers were first designated, in writing, by his Honor the Mayor of said city, on March 28, 1900; and

WHEREAS, After public notice given as aforesaid and at a public hearing duly held in pursuance of such notice, whereat all persons so desiring were given an opportunity to be heard and were heard, such application was first considered by the Railroad Committees of both houses of said Municipal Assembly;

SECTION 1. The Municipal Assembly of The City of New York hereby grants to the West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and franchise to use the streets, avenues, parkways and highways of the said city, and to construct, maintain and operate a single-track street surface railroad in and upon the following streets, avenues, parkways and highways, viz.: Commencing at the intersection of Sixth avenue and West Tenth street, in The City of New York, running southerly with single track through, upon and along West Tenth street to the intersection of said West Tenth street with Greenwich avenue, all in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

SEC. 2. The grant of said franchise or right to use said streets, avenues, parkways and highways is made subject to the following conditions:

First—That the said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate its said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years with the privilege of a renewal of said grant for the further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of the right, such revaluation to be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and not to include any value derived from the

ownership, control or operation of any other railroad, line or tracks by the grantee, its successors or assigns; provided, however, that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded on such streets, avenues, parkways and highways shall be first obtained, or in lieu thereof the favorable determination of three Commissioners, approved by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, that such railroad should be constructed and operated.

Second—Upon the termination of the said franchise or right, whether original or renewed, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee in the streets, avenues, parkways and highways aforesaid, with its appurtenances; and the said plant and property shall be and become the property of the City on the termination of the grant on paying the grantee such valuation. Such payment shall be at a fair valuation of the said plant and property as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise.

Third—The mode of determining the valuations and revaluations herein provided for shall be as follows: One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railroad company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the valuations and revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least sixty days prior to the expiration of the grant, or of the renewal thereof, and their reports shall be filed with the Controller of the City not more than thirty days thereafter. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation without the presence of either party; they shall have the right to examine the books of the railroad company. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties.

Fourth—The said West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company shall, for and during the first five years after the commencement of the operation of any portion of its railroad, annually, on November 1, pay into the treasury of the City, to the credit of the Sinking Fund thereof, three per cent. of its gross receipts for and during the year ending September 30 next preceding; and after the expiration of such five years make a like annual payment into the treasury of the City, to the credit of the same fund, of five per cent. of its gross receipts, as required by section 95 of the Railroad Law, but such percentage of gross receipts shall not be less than one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) annually for the first five years and not less than three hundred dollars (\$300) annually thereafter.

That but one fare shall be exacted for passage over the railroad constructed under this grant and over the lines of any railroad system or systems operated in connection therewith, and that the gross receipts from joint business shall be divided in the proportion that the length of said railroad operated hereunder shall bear to the entire length of the railroad system or systems which shall be operated in connection therewith, and of the railroad to be constructed hereunder.

Wherever and whenever this connecting railway shall make it possible for the cars of a non-percentage paying line to operate upon the tracks of a percentage paying line, the former line shall keep a separate and accurate account of all fares collected from passengers who enter said cars upon the routes of percentage lines, and account to the City for them the same as if they had been collected on the percentage line, and to pay the same percentages thereon as is now provided by law to be paid by the company upon whose route they operate.

Fifth—The said railroad may be operated by underground electrical power substantially similar to the system of underground electrical traction now in use on the railroads in Second, Sixth, Eighth, Lenox and Madison avenues in this city, and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Sixth—The said railroad shall be constructed and maintained subject to the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Highways and the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies of The City of New York, in all matters with respect to which said Commissioners are respectively invested with the power of regulation and control by the Charter of said city; and the consent of the City, as owner of property bounded on West Tenth street and on Christopher street, is hereby given to the operation of the railroads now or hereafter constructed on said streets by the forms of motive power provided in section fifth.

Sec. 3. The said grant is also upon the further conditions, namely:

First—The said railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street-railway construction, and the railroad and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the full term of this grant.

Second—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railroad shall be five cents; and said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any point thereon or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of The City of New York. The cars on said railroad shall be run as often as the public convenience may require.

Third—The said railroad company shall apply to each car a proper tender and wheel-guard conformably to such laws and ordinances as may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fourth—All cars of said railroad company shall be heated during cold weather conformably to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the kerosene gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fifth—In case of any violation or breach of or failure to comply with any of the provisions of this section, this grant may be forfeited by suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railroad company.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and expressed condition that the provisions of article IV. of the Railroad Law applicable thereto be complied with.

Sec. 5. The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side thereof free and clear from ice and snow.

Sec. 6. The said railroad company, so long as it shall continue to use any of its tracks upon said streets, avenues or public places, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of such streets, avenues and public places between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

Sec. 7. This grant shall not become operative unless, within ten days after the approval thereof by the Mayor of said City, or the final passage thereof succeeding the return with the disapproval thereof, or subsequent to the taking effect of said grant by reason of the failure of said officer to return the same with his disapproval, the said railroad company shall duly execute under its corporate seal an instrument in writing, wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to pay the compensation and to conform to, abide by and perform all the conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and within the said period file the said instrument in the office of the Controller of The City of New York.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Published in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York on the 21st day of May, 1901, and approved by his Honor the Mayor on the 24th day of May, 1901.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the City of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,000), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the City of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 630.

An Act to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ACCEPTED BY THE CITY:

Became a law April 25, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum; and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately. Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 210 Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

JULY 1, 1901,

JULY 1, 1904, and
JULY 1, 1905.

Stock so extended will be payable in gold and will bear interest from July 1, 1901, at the rate of three and one-half per cent. per annum, payable also in gold, semi-annually, on the first day of January and of July in each year. The Comptroller proposes to appropriate the amount of stock thus extended so that, as nearly as practicable, one-fifth of the whole amount extended shall be redeemable at each of the five maturity dates above mentioned. Preference will, as far as possible, be given to the proposals received according to priority in the date of their receipt; the proposals first received being entitled to the privilege of the longest extension period, unless such proposal shall indicate a preference for the shorter terms.
