

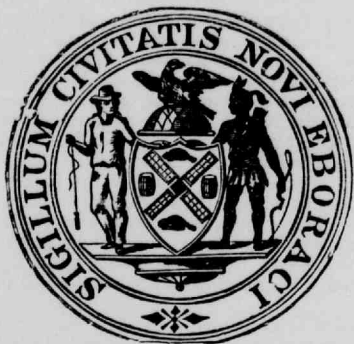

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held October 2, 1882, pursuant to adjournment.  
Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meetings held September 18 and 25 ult., were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From Comptroller of the City—Requesting information as to the approximate estimate of the cost of excavating the solid filling westerly of the established bulkhead line between Dey and Vesey streets; also an approximate estimate of the cost of building the three piers and bulkheads proposed to be erected on said premises; also an approximate estimate of the yearly rental for the same, when completed; and also an estimate of the time required for the execution of the whole work. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to report the estimated cost of dredging, and of building the piers and bulkheads; also the time which would be required to do the work. The Treasurer requested to report as to the estimated rental from the piers and bulkheads when built.

From John F. Doyle—In reference to the Union Ferry Company proceeding with the work of building their new ferry-house without first dredging the slip. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report; and Secretary directed to request Mr. Doyle to call and see the Commissioners.

From Francis Maguire—Application for position as watchman or inspector in the Department.

From Compagnie Générale Transatlantique—In reference to the condition of and repairs required to Pier, new 42, North river; also respecting damages sustained by reason of the operations of the Hudson River Tunnel Company, at said place. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From White Star Line, lessees—Requesting permission to erect and place an elevator on Pier, new 45, North river, to facilitate the handling of outward bound freight. Referred to the President and Commissioner Voorhis.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation—Approving schedule of rates of wharfage.

From Comptroller of the City—Requesting the Board to fix the yearly rental that should be charged for proposed ferry landing at Second avenue and Harlem river. Secretary directed to advise that the Board have conferred with Mr. Charles D. Burrill in reference to the matter, and learning that the ferry proposed was as yet only an experiment, and it being undetermined as yet what accommodations would be required for the ferry purposes, that the parties had consequently agreed to regular wharfage rates until the matter was more fully matured and its requirements determined.

From Department of Street Cleaning—In reference to the condition of the pavement at dumping-board at Market street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and repair the same.

From John E. Develin—In reference to communication left by him on behalf of the Union Ferry Company.

From Mutual Benefit Ice Company—Requesting extension of time to make repairs to the Pier at Sixteenth street, North river. Time extended for ten days, and Secretary directed to advise the Ice Company of the action of the Board.

From Eben Peek—Requesting that the slip at the Pier at Twenty-first street, North river, be dredged. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report thereon.

From Chittenden, Townsend & Chittenden—In reference to and protesting against the removal of tally-houses from Pier 3, East river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to remove all unauthorized buildings, or tally-houses, anchors, chains, etc., from Piers 2 and 3, East river, to the Department Yard at Seventeenth street.

From Sutton & Company—Requesting permission to retain old tally-house on Pier 19, East river, until new one can be built; and applying for permit to erect and construct a tally-house in accordance with the rules, to be located on said pier. Permission to erect and maintain tally-house on Pier 19, East river, granted; and, when built in accordance with the rules, Secretary to issue permit therefor; in the meantime to be allowed to retain the old structure for two weeks.

From Walter Noble—Requesting increase in salary as fireman on the tug "Manhattan."

From Patrick McMary—Requesting increase in salary as day watchman.

From Henry A. Ganbert—Application for permission to erect and maintain a building on the bulkhead, between Piers 16 and 17, East river. Application denied.

From the Portchester Transportation Co.—Application for permission to erect and maintain tally-house on Pier 41, East river. Application denied.

From Atlas Mail S. S. Co., Pim, Firwood & Co., agents, lessees—Requesting permission to retain tally-house on Pier 2, East river. Application denied.

From Shepherd Knapp—In reference to communication sent to Edward S. Knapp, who is at present out of the city.

From Theodore F. Tone—In reference to the repairs needed to the bulkhead and pier at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to prepare plans and specifications for repairing the said premises, and the Secretary directed to notify Mr. Tone, the lessee

of said premises, that he will be required, in accordance with his proposition, to pay \$400 as his portion of the cost of repairing the same, and for the repairs required since commencement of the term of the lease to him.

From Simpson & Spence, lessees—Requesting that the lease for Pier, new 56, North river, be executed and delivered to them. Secretary directed to advise that the lease is being prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, and that as soon as received from him it will be executed by the officers of the Department, and they would be promptly notified in regard thereto; but that in the meantime the Board would require that the rent for said pier should be paid with promptness when due.

From John J. Britt—In reference to procuring stone and rip-rap for Dump, foot of Twenty-sixth street, North river.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1. Reporting the suspension of Acting Watchman Charles Curren, for inattention, being off his post on night of September 25th ult. Action approved, and the said Curren discharged.

2. Reporting the suspension of Peter McDermott, Watchman, for inattention, being off his post on the night of September 26th ult. Action approved, and the watchman discharged.

3. Reporting the suspension of John A. Thompson, Watchman, for being off his post on the night of October 1st instant. Action approved, and the watchman discharged.

4. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending September 23, 1882.

5. Reporting on Secretary's Order No. 2673, as to condition of and repairs required to the Pier at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, and the bulkhead adjoining the same. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to prepare specifications for repairing the same.

6. Reporting in reference to regulating the grade of the branch railroad tracks on the newly made land on West street, used by the Albany Brewing Company, near Pier, new 41; Inman Steamship Co., at Pier, new 36; and Williams & Guion, at Pier, new 38, North river; to make the same conform to the grade of the new pavement now being laid in that section. Secretary directed to notify the said parties to have the grade of the rail tracks used by them, respectively, made to conform to the grade of the new pavement; the same to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From John Butler, Corporation Wharfinger—Reporting on Secretary's Order No. 2695, as to the present occupation of the water front at Second avenue and Harlem river.

A communication from the Counsel to the Corporation giving his opinion in reference to dredging the old crib work at site of Pier, new 27, North river, being covered by the terms of the contract with the Union Dredging Co., was received, read, and was, together with the communications from the Union Dredging Co. of August 15 and September 6, ult., in relation thereto, which were,

On motion, taken from the table, ordered on file, and the Secretary directed to have the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation recorded; and to direct the Engineer-in-Chief to notify the Union Dredging Co. to proceed with the work.

A communication from the Counsel to the Corporation in reference to the premises between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, East river, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the resolution of this Board, adopted April 6, 1871, whereby permission was granted to Edward F. De Lancey and James F. Chamberlain, on behalf of the New York Protestant Episcopal Public School, to erect a bulkhead in front of the property between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, East river, to remain during the pleasure of this Board, be rescinded, and that the privilege thereby granted be and the same is hereby terminated;

Resolved, further, that notice in writing be given to the said School and to William H. Simonson, who claims to be in possession of said premises as lessee, to remove the said bulkhead within ten days; and,

Whereas, This Board did on the first day of September, 1881, resolve that the resolution of this Board adopted December 7, 1871, whereby William H. Simonson was permitted to erect a platform on piles between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, East river, and retain the same during the pleasure of the Board, be rescinded; and,

Whereas, The said Simonson has been notified of such resolution, and has been requested to remove the said platform, but has not done so;

Resolved, further, that notice in writing be given to said William H. Simonson, to remove the said platform within ten days.

The communication from the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting that the slips at Forty-seventh street, North river, and at Twenty-second, Seventeenth and Stanton streets, East river, be dredged, was,

On motion, taken from the table, and, with the report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2672, as to the amount of dredging required at the respective places, which was received and read, was ordered on file, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare specifications for dredging the said slips in accordance with his report.

The Engineer-in-Chief submitted specifications and form of contract for repairing the bulkhead at the foot of Seventeenth street, East river, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, in relation thereto, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the specifications and form of contract, as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, for repairing the bulkhead at the foot of Seventeenth street, East river, be and hereby is approved and adopted, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form; and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed, and proper advertisements inviting bids for doing the said work inserted in the papers designated by law.

A communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, enclosing letter from Mitchell & Mitchell, in reference to a raft of timber obstructing access to the bulkhead at Twenty-eighth street, North river, was received, read, and placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department be and hereby is directed to remove any obstructions existing over which this Department has jurisdiction, which may have been placed at or near the foot of Twenty-eighth street, North river, in violation of the terms of the injunction order served on this Board in the suit of the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company against the Mayor, etc., and which in any manner interferes with or obstructs free access to the premises mentioned in the said order.

A communication from the Board of Education, requesting that the slip on the north side of the Pier at Twenty-fourth street, East river, be dredged, was received, read, and, together with the previous communication of June 28, 1882, and the report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2522, in relation thereto, which were, on motion, taken from the table, was ordered on file, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare specifications for dredging the slip on the north side of the Pier at Twenty-fourth street, East river.

A communication from the Comptroller of the City, approving the sureties of Richard Cronin to his estimate for repairing the bulkhead between Piers 20 and 21, East river, and the Pier at Third street, East river, was received and read.

On motion, the bids received and publicly opened on September 25th ult., for doing said work, were taken from the table, and, with the communication from the Comptroller, ordered on file, and the following resolution, offered by the President, in relation thereto, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the contract for repairing the bulkhead and platform between Piers 20 and 21, East river, and the Pier at the foot of Third street, East river, be and is hereby awarded to Richard Cronin, of 138 Luquer street, Brooklyn, his bid for doing said work being the lowest under estimates publicly opened 25th ult., and the Comptroller having approved of the sureties thereto the 29th ult.

A communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, reporting in respect to the necessity of dredging the slip between Piers 15 and 16, East river, occupied by the Union Ferry Company, was received, read, and, with the communication from John F. Doyle, also received in relation thereto, was ordered on file, and the following preamble and resolution, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, It appears by a communication from John F. Doyle, bearing date the 25th ult., and this day presented to the Board, that the slip at the foot of Wall street, East river, occupied by the Union Ferry Company, is in a very filthy and unsanitary condition, resulting from the deposits of mud and filth therein to such an extent as to close the mouth of the sewers emptying into said slip, and thereby endangering the health and lives of all doing business in the vicinity, as also of the passengers using said ferry; and,

Whereas, The Engineer-in-Chief has this day, in a report submitted to the Board, confirmed the statement of Mr. Doyle as to the necessity of the immediate dredging of the slip for sanitary reasons, therefore,

Resolved, That the Union Ferry Company, lessees and occupants of the slip between Piers 15 and 16, East river, be and hereby are directed to dredge the whole area of the slip between said piers, to a depth of twenty-five feet at mean low water, from the existing bulkhead to the outer end of said piers, said dredging to be commenced within five days from the receipt of this notice; and, in default thereof, the said ferry company be notified that this Department will cause the same to be done, at the cost and expense of said Union Ferry Company.

## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending October 7, 1882.

MEETING HELD WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 4, 1882—ELEVEN O'CLOCK, A.M.

Present—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, and Olliffe.

On motion of Commissioner Olliffe, Commissioner MacLean was called to the Chair.

The following communications were received :

From the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, transmitting copies of ordinances and resolutions adopted by said Board and approved by the Mayor.

From the Counsel to the Corporation, acknowledging the receipt of copies of letters of Mr. Haight and Mr. Van Winkle, in relation to an assault alleged to have been committed on Mr. Haight by James J. Mooney, referred to him for his opinion as to the powers of the Department in the matter, and stating that under the provisions of law this Department, and all persons acting under its authority, have power to enter, in the day-time, upon any lands which shall be deemed necessary to be surveyed for the purpose of laying out streets, etc., and if while in the performance of these duties any assault is committed upon one of the surveyors by any one, the surveyor so assaulted has his remedy by proceeding criminally against the person who assaulted him, and also by bringing a civil action for damages.

From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of a resolution transferring the sum of \$10,169.88 to the appropriation "Maintenance, etc., Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, 1882."

From Cyrus Clark, C. R. Roberts, Joseph H. Godwin, and others, in relation to the improvement of the Riverside Drive.

Mr. Cyrus Clark and General Viele appeared before the Board, and were heard in relation to the improvement of the Riverside Drive.

From the Comptroller in relation to the Departmental Estimates for 1883.

From the Mayor, calling a meeting of the officers designated by section 13 of chapter 742, Laws of 1871, to consider a requisition of the Fire Department for acquiring a plot of ground for the use of said Department.

From H. B. Claffin, W. S. Dunn, Francis Perot, and others, in relation to the regulating and grading of Sedgwick avenue, from its intersection with the old Boston road to its intersection with the Kingsbridge road, and desiring permission to do such work at their own expense.

Commissioner Wales moved that the charges made by Commissioner Lane against Superintendent Jones be taken up and acted upon.

Superintendent Jones appeared and presented a written statement in relation to the charges.

The following preambles and resolutions were adopted :

Inasmuch as the statements made and evidence submitted by the Superintendent in his answer to the charges heretofore made by Commissioner Lane, have been in no wise impeached ; and as Commissioner Lane has failed to present any proof whatever in support of his allegations of negligence, or extravagance, or waste on the part of the Superintendent, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the charges made by Commissioner Lane against the Superintendent of Parks, be and the same are hereby dismissed.

Whereas, A Commissioner, after being placed under serious charges of official misfeasance, has admitted in a confession published over his own name, that he had reason to believe that extravagance and waste have been covered in many of the bills professedly audited by him ; and

Whereas, The Commissioners (saving the one above referred to) being anxious to prevent all extravagance or injudicious expenditure, desire an honest and careful examination of all accounts and bills ; therefore, be it

Resolved, That all bills and vouchers therefor be referred, after due entry thereof, to Commissioner Wales for examination, and report to this Board.

Resolved, That a pavement similar to that now being laid on Fifth avenue, be laid in the centre of the broad walk on the north side of Fifty-ninth street, between Fifth and Eighth avenues, said pavement to be laid feet wide, and at an expense not exceeding 22½ cents per square foot.

Resolved, That the sidewalk of the Bowling Green be laid with the Granolithic pavement, at an expense not exceeding 25 cents per square foot.

Resolved, That Thomas J. O'Connor be and he is hereby appointed a Gatekeeper on the force of the Department.

Resolved, That Michael Halpin, Patrick Burns and Thomas Doyle, laborers on parks, be and they are hereby restored to duty.

Resolved, That B. C. Murray be allowed an extension of time of twenty days upon the time named for the completion of his contract for regulating, grading, etc., One Hundred and Fifty-third street.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be respectfully requested to examine the plans now before him, and as prepared by this Department, showing the treatment of the sidewalk entrances and parapet walls of the streets and avenues bounding Morningside Park, and report thereon at his earliest convenience, whether the same harmonize with the grades of said streets and avenues, as adopted by the Department of Public Works.

Resolved, That permission be granted H. B. Claffin, W. S. Dunn, Francis Perot, and others, to regulate and grade, at their own expense, Sedgwick avenue, from Boston road to Kingsbridge road, under a stipulation to be prepared by this Department, and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation.

Resolved, That when this Board adjourns, it do adjourn to meet on Wednesday next, 11th instant, at 9.30 A. M., when the subject of the Departmental Estimates for 1883 will be taken up and considered.

Resolved, That the Chairman be authorized to appoint, upon consultation with the Topographical Engineer, two Assistant Engineers, at a salary of \$1,500 per annum, each.

Resolved, That it be referred to Commissioner Olliffe to enter into a contract with an Engineer, under the direction of the Topographical Engineer, for the compilation and preparation of a construction map of Riverside Park and avenue, showing all the lines of surface construction, sidewalks, parapet, curb and gutter, bridle-paths and carriage-way, steps and approaches to the park ; and also all the lines of underground sewerage, drainage and Croton water-pipes, and sewer openings, and also the topography of the park, with grades and dimensions, at a total cost not to exceed \$750.

Permission was granted the Board of Managers of the Life Saving Benevolent Association, to present Gatekeeper Gilbert Higgins with a token of their appreciation of his services in saving the life of Mrs. Williams, on September 21, 1882.

Pay-rolls amounting to \$2,469.64 were approved and sent to the Finance Department for payment.

Each estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the same, that the several matters therein stated are true, and must be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York to the effect that if the contract is awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall refuse or neglect to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The consent last above mentioned must be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, or otherwise, and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith, with the intention to execute the bond required by law.

No estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the national banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the Estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall neglect or refuse, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York, as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

### NOTICE.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS,  
Nos. 117 and 119 DUANE STREET,  
NEW YORK, April 22, 1882.

RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED for the government and proper care of piers, bulkheads, slips, and other wharf property, under the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks, and published, to take effect on and after

MAY 1, 1882.

The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as follows:

"The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regulation, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said Board."

And every person guilty of a violation of or disobedience to any of the following rules or regulations, in addition to the penalties thereby fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions, is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or by both.

No. 1.—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on any part of the water-front of the city, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars, for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit any such work to be done upon his premises before such permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time which may be allowed for such removal, by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant, by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, to be also recovered from such owner, lessee, or occupant.

No. 2.—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoisting-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or

maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such premises, or the owner, lessee, or agent, of any such structure, erections, or obstructions, shall fail to comply with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district to remove any such structure, erection, or obstruction, after the expiration of the time allowed by such notice for the removal, such owner, lessee, occupant or agent, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day, which shall elapse before any such structure, erection or obstruction, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time for the removal thereof specified in said notice.

No. 3.—No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel upon any bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such vessel is being unladen, after service by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, upon the owner, consignee, master, or other officer, or stevedore, of such vessel, of a notice that such bulkhead or structure will be endangered by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the damages of every description which shall be caused by the further discharging of cargo upon such bulkhead or wharf structure, after the service of the said notice, both of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, consignee, master or other officer or stevedore, severally and respectively.

No. 4.—All goods, merchandise, and materials of every kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, or upon reclaimed land, must be removed therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within twenty-four hours after the Corporation Wharfinger for the district shall have served upon the owner, shipper or consignee, of such cargo, a notice to remove the same, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each and every day, during which any part of said cargo shall remain upon such pier, bulkhead, structure, or land, after the expiration of the said twenty-four hours, to be recovered from such owner, shipper, or consignee, severally and respectively.

No. 5.—All goods, merchandise, and materials of every kind encumbering any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, or reclaimed land, after the time designated for the removal thereof shall have expired, will be liable to be removed by the Board to any warehouse or yard, at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such property, and all expense incurred for such removal and storage or otherwise, shall be and become a lien thereon, and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be delivered to the owner until the expense of such removal and storage has been paid.

No. 6.—No person shall construct or maintain any engine-house, tally-house, or other small structure, under permit of the Board, on any unshedded pier, or other wharf structure, unless the same be placed on wheels so as to admit of easy removal thereupon when required, and to prevent the accumulation of dirt or refuse thereunder, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day which may elapse before the discontinuance of such offense.

No. 7.—No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or discharged by horse power, nor shall stones or similar cargo be discharged from any vessel, upon any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, unless proper plankings be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure from injury consequent upon the travel of the horse, or the throwing of the stones or similar cargo thereupon, under a penalty of five dollars a day for each horse so employed, and of twenty-five dollars for each offense of discharging such stones or like cargo, upon such pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 8.—No sand shall be discharged from any vessel unless canvas or similar material be extended from the vessel's side to the bulkhead or wharf structure at which such vessel is being unladen, to prevent the falling of the sand into the water, and if the surface of any such wharf structure is not sufficiently tight to prevent the sand dumped thereon from going through into the water, then no sand shall be discharged thereon from any vessel, unless canvas or similar material be first laid thereon to receive the sand, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 9.—The owners, lessees and occupants of every pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices, signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or collector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required, and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or occupants so notified, fail to comply with the terms and requirements of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall elapse before they comply with such notice.

No. 10.—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or any other substances, shall be thrown into the waters surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any other part of the water-front of the city, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant, severally and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf structure, or other property, from which any such substance shall be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the same; or if any such substance be thrown from any vessel lying in the waters within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11.—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from time to time, by the Board, for such dumping, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier, bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such snow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually dumping the same, severally and respectively.

No. 12.—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk discharged on any bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending removal, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day, for each and every day such lumber, brick or other material shall remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or from the person placing, or causing the same to be placed, on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

No. 13.—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads constructed under the new plans adopted by the Department shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be fixed and established by laws of this State, until otherwise ordered by the Board.

No. 14.—The term "Board," when used in the foregoing rules and regulations, shall be taken to mean "The Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York," and the term "Corporation," when so used, shall be taken to mean "The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York."
