The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 27, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,653, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 661 tenement houses, 131 private dwellings, 55 other dwellings, 15 manufactories and workshops, 36 stores and warehouses, 76 stables, 17 slaughter-houses, 6 fat-rendering establishments, 1 fertilizing works, 4 public sewers, 1 lime kiln, 1 garbage dump, 3 manure dumps, 27 sunken and vacant lots, 1 roadway, 1 dyeing establishment, 68 yards, courts, and areas, 58 cellars and basements, 93 waste pipes and drains, 221 privies and water closets, 62 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 3 cesspools, 2 piggeries, 40 other nuisances, together with 61 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 853.

During the past week 230 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 110 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

157 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 27 dwellings where contagious diseases were found and have disinfected and fumigated 27 houses, 27 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 2,956 privies and water closets, 242 yards, courts, and areas, 360 cellars and basements, 380 garbage boxes, and 141½ miles of street gutters.

There were 732 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, July 27, 1878, which is an increase of 14 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 15 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending July 20, was 805, which is 67 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 38.61 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,084,109.

The number of deaths reported to have occurred in this city for the 4 weeks ending July 27, shows a decrease of 119 when compared with the mortality of the corresponding weeks of the past year, during the same period the deaths of children under five years were 140 less and the deaths in tenement houses 56 less, while the mean temperature was 3.7 higher. A comparison of the mortality for the past four weeks compared with the corresponding weeks of 1877, is as follows, viz.:

296 of the deaths of children under five reported during the week were in tenement houses, and 31 in institutions, showing a decrease of 4 and an increase of 10 respectively.

The deaths of children who had Austrian mothers decreased 4 and fathers 6; Bohemiam mothers decreased 8, and fathers 7; English mothers increased 1, and fathers decreased 7; German mothers decreased 13, and fathers 10; Irish mothers decreased 11, and fathers 7; and native mothers increased 8, and fathers 3.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 100 were in institutions, 431 in tenement houses, 192 in houses containing 3 families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 150 were on the first floor, 220 on the second, 135 on the third, 91 on the fourth, 22 on the fifth. There were no deaths of non-residents reported during the week. 66 of the deaths reported were of single persons, 124 married, 54 widowed, and the condition of 488 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 693 deaths and still-births, or 89.88 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 18; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 268; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 90; Greenwood (undenominational), 47; Lutheran (undenominational), 150; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 49; Woodlawn (undenominational), 27; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 11; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 7.

Sec. 2. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately,

The Metropolitan Gas-light Company bid for such lamps, situated between Thirty-fourth and Seventy-ninth streets, as are now lighted by said Company, being 3,850 in number, at \$19.50 each for one year.

Seventy-ninth streets, as are now lighted by said Company, being 3,850 m number, at \$19.50 each for one year.

The New York Mutual Gas-light Company bid for 4,654 lamps situated on various streets or parts of streets between Beaver street on the south, and Sixty-fifth street on the north, at \$16.65 each for one year. Of these lamps, 1,118 are situated south of Grand street, and were bid for by New York Gas-light Company; 2,950 are situated between Grand and Thirty-fourth streets, and were bid for by the Manhattan Gas Company, and of these, 763 were also bid for by the Municipal Gas Company; 586 are situated north of Thirty-fourth street, of which 387 were bid for by the Municipal Gas Company.

The Municipal Gas-light Company bid for 1,761 lamps situated on various parts of streets between Grand street on the south and Fifty-eighth street on the north, at \$20 each for one year. Of these lamps, 941 are between Grand and Thirty-fourth streets, and were bid for by the Manhattan Company, and 763 were bid for by the Mutual Company; 461 are north of Thirty-fourth street, of which 74 were bid for by the Metropolitan Company and 387 by the Mutual Company.

The Harlem Gas-light Company bid for all the lamps situated between Seventy-ninth street on the south, and Harlem river on the north, 4,252 in number, at \$21.00 each for one year.

The Yonkers Gas-light Company bid for the 72 lamps at Riverdale, at \$33.00 each for one year.

The New York and New Jersey Globe Gas-light Company bid for 500 lamps or more, in any portion of the city, to be lighted by naphtha, at \$20.00 each for one year.

In 1876, when no competition faced the Harlem Co., they received \$36.66 per lamp per annum. When, in 1877, the present Gas Commission awarded us two thousand lamps as competitors with the Harlem Co., the result thereof was shown in the bids for the first quarter of this year, when the Harlem Co. bid at the rate of \$33.70 per lamp per year, against their bid of \$36.66 per lamp the year previous. If you will consider that we alone are competitors with the Harlem Co., and from the fact that we were again invited to bid for the ensuing year, it prevented the Harlem Co. from a monopoly of the district.

Our bid is lower than that of the Harlem Co., and in consideration of this, and in view of the

fact that if we are awarded no lamps, it will leave them practically without opposition in the future, we respectfully ask that our bid be duly considered, and that we be awarded five hundred or more lamps in the district of the Harlem Co.

Whereas, The work of the Street Cleaning Bureau would be facilitated and cheapened if the owners of the vehicles and teams would sweep the portions of the streets occupied by them, leaving the material conveniently heaped so as to be accessible to the dirt carts; therefore it is

Resolved, That the Common Council be and hereby is requested to so amend the ordinances as to require all persons who place their wagons, carts, or other vehicles, while not in actual use, in the public streets or places, to clean and sweep the whole extent of the street in front of the premises where the vehicles are placed, so as to perfectly clean the street from the curb-stone to the centre of the street, placing the material in a compact pile in the centre of the street; this work to be done three time a week, to wit: Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, before eight o'clock in the morning.
