

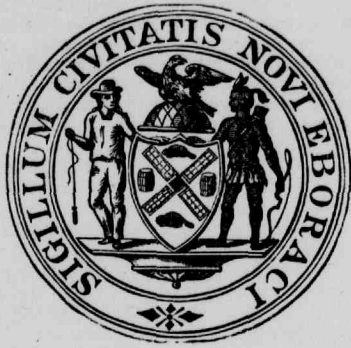

Commissioner Erhardt offered the following preamble and resolutions, and moved their adoption :
Whereas, It appears by the reports to the Board of Police, herewith submitted and marked A, B, C, D, E, F, that in many cases a large number of persons are reported as having registered as qualified to vote at the election to be held November 5, 1878, do not reside at the place designated ; that in one instance eleven are registered as residing in the basement of a house, which, it is reported, has not a lodger nor resident in any part of the building, and had not at the time of the registration ; and,

Whereas, So far as the Department has been able to investigate, there is necessity for the closest scrutiny, to the end that the law regarding elections shall be observed, and that the canvass be honestly conducted ; and,

Whereas, The violations of the provisions of the law regarding registration or fraudulent voting is a "felony punishable by imprisonment in a State Prison not less than one nor more than five years ;" therefore,

Resolved, That the superintendent, inspectors, commanding officers of precincts, sergeants, officers detailed for special duty, and all members of the force, will be held to a strict accountability for the rigid and impartial enforcement of the law of this State, regarding elections, passed May 14, 1872, and the acts amendatory thereto, within their commands, precincts, or on the posts patrolled by them ; and,

Resolved, That special attention be called to sections 64 and 65, which read as follows :

SEC. 64. If at any general registration of voters, or at any meeting of inspectors of election, held for such purpose, or for a revision thereof, as provided in this act, any person shall falsely personate an elector or other person, and register, or attempt to offer to register, in the name of such elector or other person ; or if any person shall knowingly or fraudulently register, or offer to attempt, or make application to register, in or under the name of any other person, or in or under any false, assumed or fictitious name, or in or under any name not his own ; or shall knowingly or fraudulently register in two election districts ; or, having registered in one district, shall fraudulently attempt or offer to register in another ; or shall fraudulently register, or attempt or offer to register in any election district not having a lawful right to register therein ; or shall knowingly or willfully do any unlawful act to secure registration for himself or any other person ; or shall knowingly, willfully or fraudulently, by false personation or otherwise, or by any unlawful means cause or procure, or attempt to cause or procure the name of any qualified voter in any election district to be erased or stricken from any registry of the voters of such district, made in pursuance of this act, or otherwise than as is in this act provided ; or by force, threat, menace, intimidation, bribery, reward or offer, or promise thereof, or other unlawful means, prevent, hinder or delay any person having a lawful right to register or be registered, from duly exercising that right ; or who shall knowingly, willfully or fraudulently compel or induce, or attempt or offer to compel or induce by such means, or any unlawful means, any inspector of election or other officer of registration, in any election district, to register or admit to registration any person not lawfully entitled to registration in such district, or to register any false, assumed or fictitious name, or any name or any person, except as provided in this act ; or shall knowingly or willfully, or fraudulently interfere with, hinder or delay, any inspector of election or other officer of registration in the discharge of his duties, or counsel, advise or induce, or attempt to induce any such inspector or other officer to refuse or neglect to comply with, or to perform his duties, or to violate any law prescribing or regulating the same ; or shall aid, counsel, procure or advise any voter, person, inspector of election or other officer of registration, to do any act by law forbidden, or in this act constituted an offence, or to omit to do any act by law directed to be done, every such person shall upon conviction thereof be adjudged guilty of a felony, and shall be punished by imprisonment in a State prison not less than one nor more than five years.

SEC. 65. If, at any election hereafter held in the city and county of New York, any person shall falsely personate any elector or other person, and vote, or attempt, or offer to vote in or upon the name of such elector or other person ; or shall vote or attempt to vote in or upon the name of any other

person, whether living or dead, or in or upon any false, assumed, or fictitious name, or in or upon any name not his own; or shall knowingly, willfully, or fraudulently, vote more than once for any candidate for the same office, except as authorized by law, or shall vote, or attempt, or offer to vote in any election district without having a lawful right to vote therein, or vote more than once, or vote in more than one election district, or having once voted, shall vote, or attempt, or offer to vote again; or shall knowingly, willfully, or fraudulently do any unlawful act to secure a right, or an opportunity, to vote for himself or for any other person; or shall by force, threat, menace, intimidation, bribery, or reward, or offer, or promise thereof, or otherwise unlawfully, either directly or indirectly influence, or attempt to influence any elector in giving his vote, or prevent or hinder, or attempt to prevent or hinder, any qualified voter from freely exercising the rights of suffrage, or by any such means induce, or attempt to induce, any such voter to refuse to exercise any such right; or shall by any such means, or otherwise, compel or induce, or attempt to compel or induce, any inspector of election or other officer of election, in any election district, to receive the vote of any person not legally qualified or entitled to vote at the said election in such district; or shall knowingly, willfully, or fraudulently interfere with, delay, or hinder in any manner any inspector of election, poll clerk, or other officer of election, in the discharge of his duties; or by any of such means, or other unlawful means, knowingly, willfully, or fraudulently counsel, advise, induce, or attempt to induce, any inspector of election, poll clerk, or other officer of election, whose duty it is to ascertain, proclaim, announce, or declare the result of any such election, or to give or make any certificate, document, report, return, or other evidence in relation thereto, to refuse or neglect to comply with his duty, or to violate any law regulating the same, or to receive the vote of any person, in any election district, not entitled to vote therein, or to refuse to receive the vote of any person entitled to vote therein; or shall aid, counsel, advise, procure, or assist, any voter, person, or inspector of election, or other officer of election, to do any act by law forbidden, or in this act constituted an offense, or to omit to do any act by law directed to be done; every such person shall, upon conviction thereof, be adjudged guilty of a felony, and shall be punished for each and every such offense by imprisonment in a State prison for not less than one nor more than five years.

And resolved, That, as copies of the Registry are accessible to all for inspection, it will be deemed a sufficient cause for dismissal from the force, for neglect of duty, of any member of the police force, whatever his rank, if it appear that a violation of the Election Law before mentioned has been committed within his precinct or command which he might have prevented by attention to his duty.

JOEL B. ERHARDT, Esq., Commissioner of Police:

SIR—In compliance with your order, I herewith respectfully submit the following report on 103 Bowery:

The first floor is occupied in front by the bar and dancing-room, a wooden partition separating them; the second floor, the full depth of the building and having a bar, is occupied as a drinking-place; the third floor front is vacant, and the fourth floor front is occupied as a store-room for goods belonging to the museum formerly occupying the building.

The third floor, rear, contains three small bedrooms and furnishes the only sleeping accommodations in the whole building; two of the rooms contain a bedstead each, the other has a mattress on the floor; the beds might hold two persons each.

The following list of names was obtained from the bartender, who represented that they all live there, and are employed in different capacities about the establishment; he also states that some of them sleep in the daytime and some at night, but that yesterday there was none of them sleepy and they had all gone out.

In my opinion the only ones properly registered, that is if they live there, are James Byrnes, Edward Halloran, and Austin Gould, as they register from the top floor rear, which, as previously stated, contains the only sleeping accommodations in the building. Those registered from the second floor must be wrong, as before stated that floor is occupied as a drinking place, and (a large well hole being cut in the centre, so as to afford a view of the dancing on first floor) contains a piano, probably nine or ten tables, and about twenty-five or thirty chairs, and the bar, but no sleeping rooms.

The explanation for having five bartenders, as given by Norman E. Mills, is that he attends bar in the day time and the others at night, two downstairs and the other two upstairs.

SIR—In compliance with your order, I herewith make the following report, relative to the premises No. 50 Bleeker street, 61 Thompson street, and 79 Sullivan street.

No. 50 Bleeker street is a four story and basement building. The basement is occupied by Michael McGlory as a liquor store, known as the Burnt Rag, and is the resort of thieves and prostitutes, and is provided with no beds or accommodations for sleeping. The first, second, and third floors are unoccupied. The fourth floor is occupied by William Romann, manufacturer of ladies' dress trimmings, and does not reside on the premises. There are no beds or accommodations for sleeping throughout the whole building.

No. 61 Thompson street is a three story building, and is rented out as a five and ten cent lodging-house for whites and blacks, and is kept by a white man named Charles Walkins. The first floor has accommodations for fourteen persons in beds, and is also provided with benches and bunks capable of accommodating forty-eight persons. The second floor has tiers of benches and bunks so arranged as to be capable of accommodating about two hundred persons. The third floor contains fifty-four beds, and has accommodations for about one hundred and sixty on benches and bunks, arranged similar to those on the second floor. Lodgers occupying beds are charged ten cents, and those occupying the benches pay five cents.

No. 79 Sullivan street is a two-story and basement front and rear house, and is kept by Joseph Buckley as a ten and fifteen cents lodging-house. Basement in the front house is occupied as a restaurant by William Donnelly, and has no accommodations for sleeping; first floor, front, has ten beds, each bed accommodating one person.

Second floor, front, has eighteen beds.

Attic has nine beds.

First floor, rear, has eight beds.

Second floor, rear, has seven beds.

Attic, rear, has nine beds.

Basement in rear house is used as a sitting-room for the lodgers.

The proprietors of Nos. 61 Thompson and 79 Sullivan streets state that they have a number of lodgers who have been lodging with them for some time, and Joseph Buckley states that some of his lodgers have been there from six months to two years past.

SIR—I respectfully make the following report:

No. 61 Thompson street is a three (3) story brick building and is in use as a cheap lodging-house, Charles Watson, proprietor. The first floor is occupied exclusively by colored men, and contains fourteen single beds, ten cents each, nightly, and there is accommodation for about fifty, who sleep on boards and benches, at 5 cents each. The average number, nightly, being sixty-four on the floor.

Second floor is occupied by white men, of which there is an average of two hundred sleep nightly at five cents each, on boards and benches, no beds on this floor.

Third floor contains fifty-four beds, single, ten cents a night, and about fifty sleep on boards and benches, at five cents each, which is an average nightly attendance of 104.

No. 79 Sullivan street is a two-story and attic, front and rear houses, brick, occupied as lodging-houses, Joseph Buckley, proprietor.

Basement occupied as a restaurant.

First floor contains nine single beds, fifteen cents nightly.

Second floor contains eighteen beds, at fifteen cents each, nightly.

Attic contains nine beds at fifteen cents each, nightly.

Rear house basement unoccupied.

First floor contains eight beds, at ten cents each, nightly.

Second floor contains seven beds, at ten cents each, nightly.

Attic contains nine beds, at ten cents each, the beds are all single.

The average number of lodgers in those two houses is about forty.

Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or intercession permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.

The nature and extent of the improvement hereby intended, is the acquisition of title in the name and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, to all the lands and premises, with the buildings thereon, and appurtenances thereto belonging, required for the opening of a certain road, avenue, or parkway, known as the Spuyten Duyvil Parkway, and streets connecting the same with Broadway from the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad to Broadway, as the same is shown on certain maps made by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, under authority of chapters 329 and 604, Laws of 1874, and chapter 436, Laws of 1876, and filed in the office of the Secretary of State, of the State of New York, in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, and in the office of the Department of Public Parks, said road, avenue, or parkway and streets being more particularly bounded and described as follows, viz.: All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land situated in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York, and bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the eastern line of Port Morris and Spuyten Duyvil Railroad distant 3,654 22-100 feet westerly from the eastern line of Tenth avenue, produced and measured at right angles, to the same from a point 18,082 13-100 feet northerly from the southeastern corner of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and Tenth avenue.

6. Thence on an arc of a circle of 235 feet radius to the right for 117 58-100 feet to a point of reverse curve.

7. Thence on an arc of a circle of 140 feet radius to the left for 210 14-100 feet to a point of reverse curve.

8. Thence on an arc of a circle of 225 feet radius to the right for 227 77-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

9. Thence on an arc of a circle of 150 feet radius to the right for 145 87-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

10. Thence on an arc of a circle of 1,260 feet radius to the right for 105 62-100 feet to a point of tangency.

11. Thence on the radius of the last described curve easterly towards its centre for 30 feet to a point marked by a white marble monument.

12. Thence without deflection for 30 feet.

13. Thence southeasterly on an arc of a circle of 105 feet radius whose centre lies in the prolongation easterly of the last above-described course for 212 55-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

14. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 838 51-100 feet radius for 230 45-100 feet to a point of tangency.

15. Thence on a tangent northeasterly for 72 32-100 feet to a point of tangency.

16. Thence on an arc of a circle of 320 feet radius to the right for 193 3-10 feet to a point of reverse curve.

17. Thence on an arc of a circle of 160 feet radius to the left for 173 45-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

18. Thence on an arc of a circle of 24 feet radius to the left for 37 18-100 feet.

19. Thence deflecting 90 deg. to the right northerly on the prolongation of the radius of last described curve for 30 feet to a point marked by a white marble monument with the number 33 inscribed thereon.

20. Thence without deflection continuing northerly for 30 feet.

21. Thence northeasterly on an arc of a circle of 21 74-100 feet radius whose centre lies on the prolongation of the last previously described course for 34 61-100 feet to a point of tangency.

22. Thence on a tangent northerly for 64 3-100 feet.

23. Thence deflecting 90 deg. to the right easterly for 30 feet to a point marked by a white marble monument with the number 36 inscribed thereon.

24. Thence without deflection continuing easterly for 30 feet.

25. Thence southeasterly on an arc of a circle of 35 3-100 feet radius whose centre lies on the prolongation of the last previously described course for 59 33-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

26. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 430 feet radius for 97 25-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

27. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 100 feet radius for 122 32-100 feet to a point of tangency.

28. Thence northeasterly on a tangent for 450 feet to a point of tangency.

29. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 2,640 feet radius for 59 6-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

30. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 45 feet radius for 54 34-100 feet to a point of tangency.

31. Thence northeasterly on a tangent for 16 3-10 feet.

32. Thence deflecting 90 deg. to the right northeasterly for 60 feet across a certain intersecting street or avenue to the northern side thereof.

33. Thence northeasterly on an arc of a circle of 14 96-100 feet radius, whose centre lies on the prolongation of the last previously described course for 29 61-100 feet to point of compound curve.

34. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 2 640 feet radius for 57 21-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

35. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 36 68-100 feet radius for 58 38-100 feet to a point of tangency.

36. Thence on a tangent westerly for 14 67-100 feet.

37. Thence deflecting 90 deg. to the right northerly for 60 feet.

38. Thence to the right northeasterly on an arc of a circle of 38 99-100 feet radius, whose centre lies in the prolongation of the last described course for 63 56-100 feet to a point of reverse curve.

39. Thence to the right on an arc of a circle of 920 feet radius for 500 54-100 feet to a point of reverse curve.

40. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 44 78-100 feet radius for 89 91-100 feet.

41. Thence deflecting 90 deg. to the right northerly on the radius produced of the last described curve for 10 feet to a white marble monument with the number 3 inscribed thereon.

42. Thence without deflection northerly for 40 feet to a white marble monument with the number 5 inscribed thereon.

43. Thence without deflection northerly for 10 feet.

44. Thence northeasterly on an arc of a circle of 70 5-10 feet radius, whose centre lies in the prolongation of the last previously described line for 84 1-10 feet to a point of compound curve.

45. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 2,260 feet radius for 907 99-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

46. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 1,200 feet radius for 386 42-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

47. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 994 feet radius for 65 64-100 feet.

48. Thence deflecting 90 deg. to the right easterly on the produced radius of the last described course for 70 feet to a white marble monument with the number 22 inscribed thereon.

58. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 650 feet radius for 296 41-100 feet to a point of tangency.

68. Thence southeasterly on a curve of 55 6-100 feet, whose centre lies on the prolongation easterly of the last described course for 69 65-100 feet to a point of reverse curve.

69. Thence to the right on a curve of 370 feet radius for 90 5-10 feet to a point of reverse curve.

70. Thence to the left on a curve of 102 feet radius for 216 36-100 feet.

71. Thence deflecting 90 degrees to the right easterly on a prolongation of the radius of the last above described curve for 30 feet.

72. Thence deflecting 22 degrees 26 minutes 39 seconds to the right easterly for 58 47-100 feet.

73. Thence to the right on a curve of 320 feet radius whose centre lies on the eastern prolongation of the last above described course for 130 36-100 feet to a point of tangency.

74. Thence on a tangent southerly for 148 feet to a point of curve.

88. Thence to the right on a curve of 325 feet radius for 325 feet to a point of tangency.

90. Thence to the left on a curve of 65 feet for 90 26-100 feet to the western line of Broadway.

91. Thence deflecting 180 deg. southerly along the western line of Broadway for 181 65-100 feet.

92. Thence deflecting 90 deg. to the right westerly for 2 5-10 feet.

93. Thence on an arc of a circle of 55 feet radius whose centre lies on the prolongation westerly of the last above described course for 96 41-100 feet to a point of tangency.

94. Thence southeasterly on a tangent for 107 56-100 feet to a point of curve.

95. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 265 feet radius for 265 feet to a point of tangency.

96. Thence southerly on a tangent for 157 61-100 feet to a point of curve.

97. Thence to the right on an arc of a circle for 239 14-100 feet to a point of tangency.

98. Thence westerly on a tangent for 118 82-100 feet to a point of curve.

99. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 109 9-10 feet radius for 69 17-100 feet to a point of tangency.

100. Thence southeasterly on a tangent for 156 75-100 feet to a point of curve.

101. Thence to the right on an arc of a circle of 120 feet radius for 208 11-100 feet to a point of tangency.

102. Thence northeasterly on a tangent for 225 53-100 feet to a point of curve.

103. Thence to the right on an arc of a circle of 315 54-100 feet radius for 166 21-100 feet to a point of tangency.

104. Thence northerly on a tangent for 157 52-100 feet to a point of curve.

105. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 57 53-100 feet radius for 108 63-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

106. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 214 96-100 feet radius for 253 4-10 feet to a point of tangency.

107. Thence southerly on a tangent for 157 63-100 feet to a point of curve.

108. Thence to the right on an arc of a circle of 433 23-100 feet radius for 377 16-100 feet to a point of reverse curve.

109. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 136 5-10 feet radius for 206 23-100 feet.

110. Thence deflecting 90 deg. to the right southwest-ly for 10 feet to a white marble monument with the numbers VI-65 inscribed thereon.

111. Thence southwest-ly without deflection for 30 feet to another white marble monument with the numbers VI-38 inscribed thereon.

112. Thence southwest-ly without deflection for 40 feet.
