Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the affirmative vote of all the members thereof, makes this the budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred, being, first, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said city for the said year, and secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the State taxes and charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, for the said year, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety million seven hundred and seventy-eight thousand nine hundred and seventy-two dollars and forty-eight cents (\$90,778,972.48):

## CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.
2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for annually recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.
4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.
5. No payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution.

## BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, November 22, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names: The Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Levey), the Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways (Deputy Commissioner Shannon), the Commissioner of Street Cleaning (Deputy Commissioner Gibson), the Commissioner of Sewers, the Commissioner Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, the Commissioner of Bridges, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of Queens, the President of the Borough of Richmond, and the President of the Board.

The minutes of the meeting of November 15, 1899, were approved.

In the matter of the proposed change in the grades of Creston avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth to East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, Borough of The Bronx, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing, as required by law.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed change of grades, the following resolution was adopted:

SIR—In reply to the anonymous communication addressed to Hon. Fred. Bowley, President of the Borough of Queens, relating to a public place at the railroad depot in Richmond Hill, I wish to report as follows:

A map was filed October 9, 1873, in the County Clerk's office, Jamaica, called map of Richmond Hill, on which the area in question is called "park." This map was filed by Mr. A. P. Man. The same party filed a second map, being map of the southerly portion of Richmond Hill, on which map the area in question is also called "park," but has written over it "A. P. Man."

A number of deeds executed between 1873 and 1887, contain the following restriction: "The parties of the first part reserving the right to change or modify their plans of the said place called Richmond Hill, in respect to all other streets, roads and parks laid down on their maps of said place." A number of deeds executed since 1887, contain the following restriction: "Reserving the right to change or modify their plans in respect to all other streets and roads, and in respect to all parks laid down on the maps of said places."

Mr. A. P. Man was one of the first residents of Richmond Hill, and the estate has had for a number of years made streets and kept them up, planting trees and keeping them in shape, and has also kept in shape the present land known as a park. The Department of Taxes and Assessment show the land as a park, having colored it green on their maps, and I have been informed that the local employees of the Department seem to be contemplating the putting of this tract on the assessment rolls for 1900. For many years the property in question has paid no taxes, but I have been informed taxes have been paid for the last seven or eight years, on the representation of Mr. A. H. Man that the property in question is not a public park.

The Village of Richmond Hill, even after its incorporation in 1894, seems never to have taken care of that land.

Mr. Man, of No. 56 Wall street, maintains that the park is private property.

Upon personal examination, it was found that a one-story frame building is about completed on this area westerly of the railroad tracks, and it was stated by Mr. Man that it is not the intention to occupy the land any further, but may do so in the future when the land shall have become more valuable.

In conclusion, I wish to say that the matter should be investigated by the Corporation Counsel.

I return the papers in the matter, and submit herewith a copy of the map of that part of Richmond Hill, property of A. P. Man, filed in the office of the County Clerk, Jamaica, October 9, 1873; also a map showing the parks at Richmond Hill Station of the Long Island Railroad as shown on the maps of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—The combined capacity of the present storage reservoirs in the Croton watershed is 41,000,000,000 gallons, which, as stated by the Chief Engineer of this Department, assures to the city a daily supply of 250,000,000 gallons in the driest years. The daily consumption of water received through the Croton aqueducts already exceeds that limit, amounting to an average of 264,000,000 gallons during the month of September last. The Chief Engineer further states that for every one million gallons per day added to the consumption of water, additional storage capacity to the amount of 300,000,000 gallons is needed to insure the full supply in dry seasons, and, in view of the very large annual increase in the consumption of water, it is evidently necessary to prepare without delay for the construction of an additional large storage reservoir.

To this end I submit herewith, for approval by your Board, under section 486 of the Greater New York Charter, the map of lands required for building a storage reservoir on the Cross river branch of the Croton river, which presents the advantages of being the most economical of the remaining available sites in the watershed in respect to construction and cost of land, together with the fact that its capacity will be about 9,000,000,000 gallons, adding 30,000,000 gallons per day to the capacity of supply, and that the site is so situated that the reservoir will fill each year from the stream or streams and watersheds which are tributary to it.

When the map is approved by your Board, it will be necessary before its final adoption to give all persons interested full opportunity to be heard in respect thereto, and to give public notice of such hearings once in each week for three successive weeks in the CITY RECORD, the Corporation newspapers, and in two papers published in the county or counties in which the real estate to be acquired or affected is situated, and in two daily papers in The City of New York.

And the said party of the second part, in consideration of the undertakings herein contained on the part of the said party of the first part, do hereby covenant and agree to and with the said party of the first part, that the Commissioner of Water Supply of The City of New York, or his successors, shall and will furnish and set, at or near the southerly line of the City of Yonkers, where the water-pipes now laid by the said party of the first part terminate, suitable water-meters through which the aforesaid water supply shall pass, and which said water-meters shall be satisfactory and acceptable to both parties, and shall be kept in perfect and complete order by said Commissioner of Water Supply, or his successors;

Also, that the said party of the second part shall and will pay the said party of the first part for all water supplied by it, as aforesaid, for the Twenty-fourth Ward of The City of New York, and passing through the aforesaid meters, at the rate of 13 cents for each and every one hundred

cubic feet of water, said payments to be made at the office of the said party of the first part in the City of Yonkers on the first day of March, June, September and December;

Also, that the minimum quantity of said water to be paid for by the said party of the second part shall be two thousand cubic feet per day, although the daily average water supply for any quarter may be a smaller amount.

It is mutually understood, covenanted and agreed by and between the respective parties hereto that the said party of the second part shall not have, or be entitled to have, any reduction or claim therefor by reason of any temporary suspension of the water supply aforesaid, on account of repairs, except in the event of such suspension continuing more than one week, in which case the minimum rate aforesaid shall be deducted for the period during which the shut-off shall last;

Also, that if the said party of the first part shall find it necessary to shut off said supply at any time, it shall give timely notice to the Department of Water Supply of The City of New York, so that consumers may be duly notified;

Also, that no deduction from the aforesaid meter statement shall be made on any account unless the meter shall not register correctly, in which case rectification and allowance shall be made therefor by the said parties respectively;

Also, that the first payment under this agreement shall be computed from the date of the commencement of such supply.

The street is comparatively well built up, there being a row of flats on the south side extending from Seventh avenue eastward to the centre of the block. The rate of grade is 2.5 per cent., which is not too steep for sheet asphalt. However, the resolution of the Local Board calls for asphalt-block pavement on concrete foundation, and the estimated cost is \$9,600, with five years' maintenance, while the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$206,000.

The estimated cost of sheet asphalt on concrete foundation, with the same period of maintenance, is \$9,200. As the rate of grade is small and sheet asphalt is preferable to asphalt blocks, except in cases where grades require the use of the latter, I recommend that the improvement provided for in the resolution of the Local Board be authorized, except that sheet asphalt be substituted for asphalt blocks.

Richardson street, from Graham avenue to Union avenue. In reply, I beg to report that this part of Audubon avenue is unpaved, except the intersection of One Hundred and Seventieth, One Hundred and Sixty-ninth, One Hundred and Sixty-eighth

and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets, which are paved with granite. A sewer has been laid in the street with the exception of the blocks from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth to One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets, and One Hundred and Seventy-second to One Hundred and Seventy-third streets. Water-pipes have been laid only in the blocks from One Hundred and Sixty-sixth to One Hundred and Sixty-eighth streets.

The grade is 2.4 per cent. The resolution of the Local Board calls for asphalt block pavement on concrete foundation. Sheet asphalt is to be preferred to asphalt blocks, except where steep grades necessitate the use of the latter. As the grade of Audubon avenue is slight, I recommend that the part of Audubon avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred and Seventy-third streets, be paved with sheet asphalt on concrete foundation, instead of with asphalt block.

The estimated cost of the improvement, including five year's maintenance, is \$31,500, payable by assessment. The assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$680,000.

GENTLEMEN—On December 10, 1898, this Association complained to the Mayor of the failure to abolish the nuisance known as the "Mott Haven Canal," and the matter was referred by his Honor to the Corporation Counsel, who, on December 21, 1898, replied:

"The main responsibility for the situation now rests with the Board of Public Improvements. If that Board will pass the ordinary resolution requesting me to take proceedings to open a street on the line of this canal, I believe the whole subject will be disposed of speedily."

Your Board very promptly passed the required resolution, and in July of this year Judge Scott appointed the Commissioners of Estimate, etc., so that the title now rests in the City.

The nuisance complained of, however, still remains, and will continue to the detriment of this section until the street is actually regulated and graded.

DEAR SIR—Referring to the letter of July 15, 1899, from the Secretary of the Board, transmitting to this Department a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Eighteenth District, Borough of Manhattan, recommending that the sidewalk on the south side of Seventy-fifth street, between Avenue A and the East river, be reflagged and regraded so as to conform to the established grade, I have the honor to report that, as the grade of this street has been changed since it was originally paved, and is now 3 feet lower at a point 706 feet more or less east of the east house line of Avenue A, the change commencing 550 feet, more or less, east of said house line, the regrading and reflagging of the sidewalk to the newly established grade would necessitate the regrading, paving, flagging and curbing of the whole street, from a point about 550 feet east of Avenue A to the East river. On the other hand, if the sidewalk should be simply re-regulated and reflagged to conform to the existing grade, it is probable that any assessment levied might be vacated by the property owners claiming that the work was not in accordance with the established grade.

Under these circumstances, I am not disposed to recommend that the work called for in the resolution of the Local Board be authorized.

The total estimated cost of regulating and grading, curbing and repaving East Seventy-fifth street, between Avenue A and the East river, in accordance with the present established grade, is \$4,600, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$59,700.

The estimated cost of merely reflagging and recubing the south sidewalk according to the existing grade is \$810. It would be well if the property owners could be induced to do the necessary work on the existing grade at their own expense.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements :

DEAR SIR—In the matter of correspondence with the Merchants' Association of New York, on the subject of an additional water supply for the City, and the resolutions adopted by your Board on the 8th instant, which I received on the 11th instant by letter from the Secretary of your Board, I respectfully report :

On the 13th instant I sent the following letter to the President of the Merchants' Association :

" WILLIAM F. KING, Esq., President, Merchants' Association for New York :

" DEAR SIR—By letter of 10th instant to the President of the Board of Public Improvements I requested that there be officially transmitted to me the resolution adopted by the Board on the 8th instant, referring to me the communications from your association in reference to an additional water supply, together with the correspondence therein referred to.

" In response thereto I received on Saturday last, the 11th instant, the following letter of same date :

" Hon. WILLIAM DALTON, Commissioner of Water Supply :

" DEAR SIR—In accordance with the action taken by this Board at the meeting held on the 8th instant, I inclose herewith copy of a communication from the Merchants' Association of New York, transmitting copies of communications from signers of original petitions for an increased water supply, stating that they do not wish to have their names quoted as favoring the Ramapo contract, together with a further communication from the said Association, volunteering to make an investigation into the proposed contract, and asking the aid of this Board and the Department of Water Supply.

" The resolution adopted by this Board on the 8th instant reads as follows :

" Resolved, That the whole of this correspondence in connection with the Merchants' Association be referred to the Commissioner of Water Supply, with instructions to enter into correspondence with those persons who have presented this communication, and to ascertain from them such information as they may have upon the subject, and that he use it to the best advantage in making up his report upon the matter to this Board.

" Will you kindly comply with the above resolution, and report in the matter as early as possible.

" I also send you herewith the copies of communications referred to in the first communication from the Association, which kindly return as soon as they have served your purpose,

" This being the first occasion that the subject has come officially before me, I now respectfully ask that you will present to me, as early as possible, such further definite information thereon as is in the possession of your Association, other than that conveyed in the correspondence referred to.

" In making this request, I desire to say that this Department is at all times ready to give all reasonable facilities and co-operation in any investigation which can be made without jeopardizing, by unnecessary or indefinite postponement of action, the vital interests of the City, which are involved in the question of an adequate water supply.

To this I received the following reply :

" Hon. WILLIAM DALTON, Commissioner of Water Supply, New York, N. Y. :

" DEAR SIR—In response to your esteemed favor of November 13 in relation to previous communication from this Association to the Board of Public Improvements, we beg to summarize our position as follows :

" This Association comprises one thousand two hundred firms, corporations and individuals, all taxpayers, and representing a very large aggregate of property subject to destruction by fire. Therefore, the question of an ample water supply is of very grave importance to this Association. The facts as to the public necessities are in dispute between two co-ordinate branches of the city government, one of which can nullify the action of the other and prevent the City from obtaining needed relief. It is not for the interest of property-owners to have this City's water supply deficient as the result of protracted litigation upon disputed questions of fact or law, and such a result appears likely unless the grounds for dispute are removed. This Association desires to fully investigate all the existing conditions as to the City's actual needs, the best sources of an increased supply, the financial ability of the City to construct its own works and the desirability of a private contract as a source of supply. At present it takes no position in the matter further than to urge the necessity of full knowledge before action. When such full knowledge shall have been obtained, it will then support whatever measure may seem prudent and desirable to secure an increased water supply, if the same shall appear necessary, by municipal construction if practicable, and if not, then by private contract, upon terms that shall fully protect the public interest.

We, therefore, request that you will lay this communication before the Board of Public Improvements at its meeting of to-morrow, November 15, and offer for passage the following preamble and resolution :

Whereas, There is a division of public opinion as to the expediency of the proposed contract between the Ramapo Water Company and The City of New York ; and

Whereas, Litigation has already ensued and is threatened in the future, with the probable result of so entangling the City in lawsuits as to cause a protracted delay in securing an increased water supply ; and

Whereas, The Merchants' Association of New York, a body comprising about one thousand two hundred taxpayers, representing very large property interests, desires that all action in the matter be suspended for a period of three months, in order that it may cause due expert examination to be made into all the questions involved ; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board defers all action upon the proposed contract for three months, and that it give to said Merchants' Association all reasonable and proper assistance in the way of information and of access to the records of this Department and the Department of Water Supply, in order that the actual necessities of this City as to water supply may be fully shown to the satisfaction of the taxpayers and the public.

I desire to reiterate what I stated in my letters of 14th and 17th instants to Mr. King, that this Department is ready and willing to give all possible opportunity and aid to the Merchants' Association or its representatives, as it has done for the past three months, in an investigation conducted by the Comptroller through expert engineers, to obtain the fullest information contained in the files and records of the Department.

In view of the pending investigation by the Comptroller and the injunctions granted by the Courts, restraining action by the Board, I submit the question of postponement for the consideration of the Board.

In connection with this matter Deputy Comptroller offered the following resolution, which was seconded by the Commissioner of Bridges :

Whereas, The Merchants' Association of New York proposes, at its own expense, to undertake a thorough and expert examination of all questions involved in the improvement and enlargement of the water supply of The City of New York, whether by municipal ownership or by contract with private corporations, and for the purpose of properly undertaking such examination, has requested that all action by the Board of Public Improvements in regard to a proposed contract with the Ramapo Water Company be suspended for a period of three months ; and

Whereas, The scope of said examination, as set forth in a printed pamphlet issued by the Merchants' Association, includes (1) the necessity for an additional supply ; (2) the localities from which such additional supplies can best be obtained, both on Long Island and the region northward and northwesterly from the city line ; (3) the cost of obtaining such additional supply from private companies and by municipal ownership, and (4) the city's financial ability to provide for such municipal ownership ;

Resolved, That this Board approve of the scope of such inquiry, and defer all action upon the said proposed contract with the Ramapo Water Company for three months, and that it give to said Merchants' Association all reasonable and proper assistance, and that the Commissioner of Water Supply be and is hereby requested to give similar assistance in order that the actual necessities of this city as to water supply may be fully shown to the satisfaction of taxpayers and the public.

The resolution was adopted by the following vote, the Commissioner of Water Supply not voting :

Affirmative—Comptroller, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Commissioner of Bridges and President of the Board.  
Negative—None.

On the roll-call, the names of the Borough Presidents were omitted, but, on motion of the Commissioner of Bridges, the Secretary was directed to call all the Borough Presidents.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx voted in the affirmative, and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and President of the Borough of Queens, while not claiming the right to vote, stated that they were in favor of the resolution.
