BUDGET FOR 1901.

[PUBLISHED AS REQUIRED BY SECTION 226 OF THE GREATER NEW YORK CHARTER.]

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the affirmative vote of all the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and one, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said city for the said year; secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the State taxes and charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, for the said year, and, thirdly, the amount audited pursuant to the provisions of chapter 525 of the Laws of 1897, and which, according to the provisions of said act, is to be raised by taxation levied upon the taxable property in the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-eight million one hundred thousand four hundred and thirteen dollars and forty-three cents (\$98,100,413.43).

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions: 1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be kept as in and to the receipt of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should be withheld, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment in a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, not withstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

In addition to the statistics which this Bureau has compiled, it has prepared a brief and careful treatise on the seals and coats of arms of The City of New York, and submits them in their proper colors.

The statistical abstract for the year 1899, which is now being prepared from the completed statistical report made by this bureau, is now being compiled and when the statistical data are filled in will be submitted to the Municipal Statistical Commission for action.

This abstract, when completed, will show the results attending the work of the various departments of the City Government and other statistical facts of interest which relate to The City of New York.

The abstract, however, will be incomplete unless the bureau succeeds in obtaining the reports for the past year of some of the important departments, courts, bureaus and offices of the City, which have not yet been published and which I have failed to obtain.

It was my intention to illustrate some of the important work done by the Greater City and compare it with like conditions that existed in old New York, to show the progress by contrast that has been made since its earliest existence; but I have been disappointed in not being able to get suitable draughtsmen to execute the work.

I have endeavored to obtain the total number of buildings in this city classified, as well as the amount of moneys paid into the City Treasury, by boroughs, from franchises and privileges granted to corporations; the former when received will be of advantage to those engaged in sanitary and other work where the number of people inhabiting each dwelling, as well as the density of localities, is desired, as the United States Census of the population of this city is now available.

The amount of moneys paid into the City Treasury for franchises and privileges granted to corporations, will show the amount of money they pay for the privileges they enjoy. It is stated on reliable authority that in some cities the amounts received from the franchises and privileges granted by these cities pay the great bulk of the taxes, while in New York City this is chiefly paid by the owners of real and personal estate.

The statistics relating to small parks in the crowded tenement districts and the recreation piers along the water-front in the vicinity where the population is densest will be of interest to the citizens interested in providing breathing spots and recreation for the poor.

I suggested this great sanitary necessity in the New York newspapers in the year 1884, and in a pamphlet I published in 1885 I called special attention to the park area in each ward, its population, etc., and urged the necessity of these parks and recreation piers in the crowded tenement sections of the city. Since this pamphlet has been published, several small parks and recreation piers have been established by the City.

The popularity of the public baths along the river front is attested by the numbers that attend them, as the statistics will show, and an increase in their number is suggested; but public baths located in the crowded localities where the very poor dwell and where they can enjoy the benefit of shower, needle or rain baths in summer and winter is desirable and would greatly add to their comfort and improve their condition. A grand and large public bathing-house, to be located at Coney Island, which is the popular seaside resort of the poor of New York, would improve their health by the invigorating pleasures of ocean bathing and would be a welcome addition to the public bath system of New York.

The list of contracts which I have asked for when furnished will show the amount of and for what purpose the contract is awarded. This will enable the citizens of New York to know what City pays for labor, material, etc.

The abstract which is submitted is subject to modification, alteration and addition when complete reports are received. The information now in detail relating to the above-mentioned departments, etc., is compiled and ready for the printer.

The statistical bureaus of European cities are usually two years late in publishing their volumes of statistics, while this Bureau would be able to present the statistics that the law calls for within a year, if it could obtain the annual reports of the different departments, etc., within six months after the end of the calendar year.

Section 137, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, states that the Statistical Commission shall publish annually, with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in so far as it may deem advisable, the results attending the work of the various departments of the City Government for the preceding calendar year, etc., etc., and includes the Judiciary and its various departments and branches; to crimes; to the business and proceedings of the criminal courts and officers of the City. If the annual statistics relating to all branches of the Judiciary, County Clerks, Registers, etc., are essential for publication, I believe that additional legislation will be necessary to accomplish it.

The Statistical Abstract of this Bureau for the year 1899 will show the following facts relating to The City of New York for the year 1899, viz.:

The area, population, aggregate taxable value of real estate, the aggregate value of personal property, tax rate, tax rate on property exempt from local taxation for State purposes, amount of money in City Treasury, amount of money received, expenditures, balance in Treasury to account of Budget, total indebtedness of the City, gross funded debt, net funded debt, net bonded debt, the latitude, longitude and meteorological observations; the Department of Public Charities, cost of maintenance, admissions to the different institutions and the number of institutions under its control; the Board of Public Improvements, its cost of maintenance, the number of resolutions for bridges, fences, grading, paving, repaving, sewers, sewer-basins, sidewalks, water-mains and the estimated cost to comply with the resolutions; the number of labor organizations; statistics of strikes in New York City, the number of strikes, the number of persons on strike, the duration of strike, result of strike, the borough where strike occurred and the title of business; the statistical report of the Department of Public Parks, the cost of maintenance, the number of parks and their area, also the area of the parkways; the number of statues in the parks, total attendance at the Aquarium, the species of fish, mammals, crustaceans and reptiles; the statistical work of the Commissioners of Accounts, showing the various reports of the Departments, etc., made by them, and the number of vouchers and warrants examined; the results of the work of the Department of Water Supply, showing the number of miles of water-mains and pipes in the city, the number of miles of mains and pipes owned by the City and those that are owned by private individuals; the work of the Street Cleaning Department, showing the statistics of the stock and plant, amount expended for street sweeping, the amount expended for the collection of ashes, street sweeping, refuse and garbage; the amount expended for final disposition of ashes, street-sweeping, refuse and garbage; the number of men in Uniformed Force of the Street Cleaning Department, etc.; the amounts received, by boroughs, for the collection of City Revenue of the Department of Finance; the statistics showing the amounts received from street railway companies for licenses, fees and percentages from the different boroughs, showing the name of road or company, miles of track and motive power, compensation to the City, and the date of charter;
